Constabulary Notice!

I hereby notify the owners and drivers of all horse drawn vehicles that the following section of an Act respecting Municipal Affairs, passed during the last session of the Legislature, and which became law on the 11th of March last, will after this notice be rigidly enforced by the city police:—

Dredging.

We have before us the report of the Marine and Fisheries Department for 1913. The Department reports that the Dredge did good work in removing 100,000 tons of silt, sand, gravel and rock from the bottom of various harbors, from Fortune 20,605 tons, Grand Bank 16,890 tons, St. John's 17,500, Wesleyville 18,725 tons, Lamaline 10,270 tons, Newtown 6,720 and Port au Bras 4,160 tons. The operations at Grand Bank had to be abandoned after taking out 399 tons, owing to the nature of the bottom and the shallowness of the water.

The Dredge Priestman went into commission and began dredging on August 5th, 1912, so that the work represents about seventeen months' work. Much better work may be expected as experience is gained. Considerable time was lost in moving from place to place, obtaining coal supplies, mending buckets after dredging away rock and boulder formations and in choosing unsuitable times for dredging certain places. Acting Marine Surveyor Fitzgerald reports: "Stormy weather in exposed places also accounts for a large proportion of the lost time indicated during winter and late fall season. This was experienced last year in Fortune Bay, where through ice blockade and heavy sea at times, 140 days were occupied in taking 58 loads to sea, whereas under ordinary conditions over 40,000 tons could have been removed in the same time. This proves the advisability of confining dredging operations as much as possible to harbors and channels less exposed to sea and undertow in late fall and winter seas.

leaving such bar harbors and channels to be dredged from June to October."

It is abundantly clear from these experiences, that the work can be mapped out differently and much more efficiency gained in the work done, a great output of silt, rock, etc. made, and more harbors dredged, as the work is better understood by those engaged in it. Considering the handicap of inexperience and the fact that for a time there was not a rock bucket on the dredge to cope with rock formation and the other disadvantages, good work was done, but much better work should be expected for the future. The work is absolutely necessary and we are hopeful of excellent results in the future for this venture of the Marine and Fisheries Department.

The Rev. Mr. Souter, of Bell Island, was the preacher at Gower Street Church yesterday morning, and his discourse was one which marked him as a close student of events, and as a logician of high order. His subject was "The Search after God," and was based upon the request of the apostle Philip to the Master, when he said: "Lord show us the Father and it sufficeth us."—John. Men of all classes and in all ages had been searching after God, and all were desirous of finding Him. The desire for such knowledge is universal; hence the dieties of the peoples; for every tribe, of the many into which mankind has deteriorated, the Father divides his duty, its superior Being, its God. To this great one they look, and while in many cases much doubt and ignorance exists, there is at the same time an instinct of best which, of confidence, and a sense of dependence, which implies a desire for something higher, and which really and essentially is, a search after God.

In Christianity we have the highest and most fully revealed knowledge of God; and this is given to us by the work, life and revelation of His Son, to whom Philip made the request that he show them the Father. The answer which Philip received was such as he could understand. His request was a tremendous one, or rather it implied a tremendous truth: "No man hath seen God at any time"; but the answer was "he that hath seen me hath seen the Father." How could this be? And yet it was so.

Philip had seen God's works as he had heard His gracious words. "He spake as never man spake." Those words and works revealed Divinity, and in His words we see God—see the Father. Inasmuch as they had seen the sick healed, the dead raised, the blind restored to sight, and the elements of wind and wave obey Him, they had seen the Father. Such works were beyond human agency; they were Divine, and in seeing them, there was a revelation of God.

In all God's works He is found. Though atheists deny Him, and attempt to rule Him out of His own creation; and though agnostics fail to grasp the possibility of His existence, His works reveal Him. But there is a better source, a more sure word of prophecy than these; and it is from this source that the world is finding the solution of Philip's request. This source is the Holy Spirit, who knows Him in the relationship of Father is very different from knowing Him only as the great Creator. It implies a closer relationship, and partakes of the nature of the Son, confiding in His father. It means trust—in short it means faith.

Time does not permit of further notes, but the above will convey the spirit of the sermon.

Tritonia in Port.

UNABLE TO REACH BOTWOOD OWING TO HEAVY ICE—SHIP IS LEAKING.

The Donaldson Liner Tritonia, Captain Murray, which was thirty-two days out from Glasgow to Botwood, with a cargo of coal, put into this port at three o'clock this morning, accompanied by the s.s. Bellaventure, which is now locally known as the "Rescue Ship." The Tritonia was unsuccessful in many attempts to reach her destination. She is leaking badly as the result of contact with heavy ice, and will be dry docked. After being ten days out from Glasgow, the ship met the field ice. The first of it was loose but the end of the voyage the ice was very heavy so much so that the ship was jammed repeatedly, unable to make any progress. The ice in the Exploits was found impenetrable and despite continual butting the ship had to retreat as water began to rapidly make in No. 1 hold and the forepeak. The pumps had to be kept going and the ship carefully navigated. On Thursday last the ship was off Pogo jammed in the ice and fearing the worst Captain Murray wired A. Harvey & Co., the Agents, to have a steamer stand by them. Accordingly the Bellaventure was despatched and accompanied the disabled liner to port. To-day a diver was down to find out the extent of the Tritonia's damages and the ship will be dry docked on Wednesday of next week. She has 6,000 tons of coal on board but will land the greater portion of this before going on the stocks. At present coal is a badly needed commodity at Botwood and in order to relieve the situation the Bellaventure is taking a full cargo of coal to Botwood, and sailing for Botwood to-morrow. It is more than likely that the Bonaventure will also take along a cargo.

SYDNEY, To-day.
Mrs. Atkinson, whose preliminary hearing on the charge of being an accessory after the fact in the murder of Benjamin S. Atkinson, was concluded on Saturday afternoon, and was committed to stand her trial before the Supreme Court on that charge.

OTTAWA, To-day.
It is understood the Government will, in the near future, consider the formation of a naval reserve in Canada; representations have been received by the Government from various parts of Canada, asking for the organization of such a reserve, and a memorandum dealing with the subject will come before the Government for consideration probably before the summer vacation.

HALIFAX, To-day.
Although the survivors were too weak from their sufferings to tell the story completely, the revenue cutter's officers gathered that some of the fifteen men who had hastily piled into the third boat from the Columbian, decided to lighten the boat by casting the bodies overboard at once. Some who had tumbled from their bunks at the first explosion and had rushed on deck half clothed, succumbed to the cold. Others were weakened by starvation and thirst, and gradually sank into lethargy that was scarcely to be distinguished from death. Somehow the survivors managed to keep the boat's head on to the sea when the weather became rough, but for the past few days little or no effort could be made to guide their craft. Day by day the number dwindled until four, who were left sank limply to the bottom of the boat and awaited the end, when the lookout of the Seneca, searching the horizon for bergs or ice, sighted the small boat through his glasses. Not a sign of life was seen. The Seneca put on all speed running down to the lifeboat, the emaciated survivors were quickly transferred to the deck of the cutter and brandy forced between the parched lips. As all the men were in apparent need of hospital attention, the Seneca was pushed under forced draught to Halifax, the nearest port.



Special to Evening Telegram.
NAPLES, May 17.
Mount Vesuvius was again active last night. A high column of vapour and flames is coming out of the crater.

STOCKHOLM, May 17.
A Swedish aviator yesterday, flew from Malmore to Stockholm, a distance of 267 miles, without descending, in four hours and twenty minutes.

HALIFAX, May 17.
The United States revenue cutter Seneca, reported by wireless that she had picked up the third and missing boat from the Columbian, and that the survivors were being brought to Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 17.
The Minto has been ordered from Charlottetown to assist 120 fishing schooners whose passage through the Straits has been blocked by heavy drift ice. The schooners are bound north for port.

WASHINGTON, May 17.
The American Vice-Consul at Saltillo, who was arrested by Mexican federal officials, and over whose safety there were grave fears, left Saltillo yesterday for Mexico City, according to a telegram to the British minister in Huerta's capital.

GALVESTON, May 17.
Fire to-day destroyed the warehouse of the Merchants and Planters Compost Co., and damaged 11,000 bales of cotton. The loss is \$900,000. One man was caught under a falling wall and crushed to death.

LIMERICK, May 17.
The County Council unanimously resolved to-day to support the nationalist volunteer movement, started for the purpose of organizing a national force to uphold the authority of the Crown and the Government of Ireland, similar to the Ulster force.

LONDON, May 17.
In a session when newspaper men are sifting more Irish matter than anything else it seemed appropriate that John Redmond should be the principal guest of the Parliamentary press gallery, which knows no political bias. In accordance with this the Irish leader abstained from treading on delicate ground, only encroaching when he suggested the probability of his membership, at Westminster coming rapidly to a close. This statement was greeted with cries of "shame" and "laughter."

JUAREZ, May 17.
Domingo and Mariano Arista, whose 4,000 irregular troops had Durango terrorized for almost a year are again out in open defiance of Carranza and Villa. The situation has now reached the place where part of Villa's army, which is now advancing on Saltillo, may have to be diverted to suppress them. Carranza is still in Durango City, and is hopeful of bringing about an agreement, but so far his mission has been a failure. While calling themselves rebels, they refuse to recognize any authority but their own, and will not leave the State which has been such a prolific source of profit to them.

HALIFAX, May 18.
A report from the Seneca this morning, says that only five of the crew of the missing boat were alive when picked up off the Nova Scotian coast yesterday morning. The others had succumbed through exhaustion and their bodies thrown into the sea by the survivors. The latter when rescued were in a complete state of collapse, mentally and physically, but are doing as well as can be expected. They are the chief officer, Robert Tiece, Oscar Kendall, Peter Ballanger, seaman, and Michael Budwise, fireman. The men had a terrible experience in the open boat and were picked up in lat. 43.26, long. 59.30. The Seneca is due at Halifax this morning.

by Horse.**




