tinent, at a special rate of 5c. per
word (no minimum charge) subject to
the following conditions:

1. All messages must have the pre-
fix WSM written before the address.
2. When the persons are with the
Expeditionary Forces in France or
Belgium, the messages will be sent by
post from London.

3. The following particulars considered
by the British authorities to be
essential, must be given as far as
practicable:

- Regimental rank and name.
- Squadron, Battery, or Company.
- Regiment or other unit.
- Expeditionary force concerned,
whether British, Canadian, Aus-
tralian, etc., or, in case troops
not with Expeditionary forces,
name of place where stationed
must be given.

The Anglo-American Company will
also transmit free messages relating
to wounded combatants, subject to the
following conditions established by
the authorities:

1. The privilege is restricted to bona
fide enquiries made by relatives con-
cerning persons officially reported to
have been wounded or killed. Matter
of a social nature may not be includ-
ed in the messages.

2. The messages must be handed in
to the Hon. Colonial Secretary, at St.
John's, who will arrange their free
transmission over Anglo Cables. The
prefix WSM must be written before
the address.

3. The number of free messages
which may be sent concerning any in-
dividual wounded combatant is limited
to a maximum of three.

4. Persons offering such messages
must present the original official ad-
vice or information about the particu-
lar casualty to which the message re-
lates, and each message sent must be
checked on such original advice.

5. No free messages are allowed in
respect of persons reported only
slightly wounded.

6. The particulars specified in A. B.
C. and D. above, must be given as far
as possible in every case.

"Did you read your country cousin the new dances?" we asked a neighbor who had planned to entertain her cousin from the country by teaching her the new dances. "Deed, I didn't," she answered with a laugh. "She taught them to me. She knew all that I did and several others."

Don't you think that incident is typical of the new variety of country cousin? I do. It seems to me that among the many changes which this generation has seen, none is more remarkable than the cosmopolitanizing of the country districts.

Where Is The Country Cousin of Yesterday? The country cousin of yesterday is disappearing as rapidly as snow in April under the warm sun of the educative influences of telephone, better postal service, the popular lecture and especially of the magazines and newspapers.

A year or two ago I met at a summer resort a pretty young girl whose home was on a big western ranch. We became sufficiently acquainted for me to comment on her trunkful of smart and dainty gowns. Not long ago I went shopping with a country girl and was astonished at her perfect familiarity with the latest shades of their pet names and had the correct pronunciation for the newest materials and cuts. She, too, had been educated by the fashion magazines.

Again, the travel agencies say that they draw just as large a patronage from the small or middle sized country towns as from the cities.

Dictionary makers, please take notice. From your next editions, "countrified," in its old, invidious sense, must certainly be omitted.

Question: "When two people apparently care for each other should an idea of mistaken pride keep a man from telling that love although a fulfillment might be for a time impossible? Would it not be better to endure the waiting together with a great thought helping both over the hard places?"

Answer: Dear letter friend, of course it is only the fair thing under circumstances like these for the man to tell the woman that he loves her. The Coban's Work.

It was to the Dominion Coal Company's steamer Coban, Captain McPhail, that fell the honor of towing the Camino into Halifax harbor. When, on Monday evening, the Camino was in such danger off Chebucto Head, the Coban, which had that day arrived from Sydney, and had discharged her cargo at the Dominion Coal Company's wharf, was ordered to be in readiness to put to sea to the Camino's assistance. The Coban, as one of the Dominion Coal Company's fleet, is under subsidy to the Dominion Government for such work as this, and the order was promptly complied with. At 7:30 o'clock Monday evening, with an officer, petty officer, gunner and six sailors from the Dockyard and a Lyal rocket gun and life saving apparatus on board, the Coban left the Company's wharf and passed down the harbor. Owing to the thick fog she was forced to anchor in the harbor, but early Tuesday morning, when able to proceed and at daylight, was standing by the Camino, which was anchored by the outer automatic buoy. In a few minutes the rocket gun, which had been placed on the poop, was fired and the first shot was effective, the line hung over the aerials of the Camino's wireless. A four and a half inch wire hawser was then passed to the Camino and the Coban started ahead. The first strain was very heavy as the Camino had just come up on her anchor, and the hawser swung so badly that it carried away the iron towing beam on the Coban's counter.—Halifax Chronicle, Jan. 28th. [The S. S. Coban is now in this port with a load of coal.]

**LATEST
From the Front.**
10.00 A.M.
GERMAN ATTACKS REPELLED.
PARIS, To-day.
Official.—The night of Jan. 31st to
Feb. 1st was very quiet. In the morn-
ing of Feb. 1st the enemy made a vio-
lent attack on our trenches on the
North Road between Bethune and La
Basse. The attack was repulsed and
the Germans left a number of dead on
the field. From Beaumont Hamel to
North Albert, the German infantry
attempted a surprise against one of
our trenches but were obliged to take
to flight, abandoning explosives with
which they had been provided. In the
Argonne there has been great activ-
ity in the region of Fontain Madaine
and Forest Lezardrie. An attack by
Germans has been repelled near Bag-
stelle. One of our trenches was de-
molished by two mines and evacuated
without loss. In Vosges and in Al-
sace there is no action. Snow falls
have been very abundant.

TALKS CONFEDERATION.
ST. JOHN, To-day.
In an address before the Canadian
Club at a luncheon in St. John, yes-
terday, Mr. N. R. Rowell, K.C., leader
of the Ontario Opposition, suggested
as one of the results of the strength-
ening of Imperial sentiment through-
out the war might be union of Newfound-
land with Canada. He said, I venture
to hope after the war, Newfoundland,
the only British Colony outside the
Confederation, will see more clearly
than ever the advantages of union
with Canada and that if they do ap-
proach the Dominion with this in
view, that our Parliamentary leaders
will have wisdom and patriotism to
offer the ancient Colony generous
terms. Rowell also expressed the
hope that nothing would be permitted
to interfere with the meeting of the
Imperial Conference this summer.

LONDON, To-day.
A despatch to the Exchange Tele-
gram Company from Dover says the
harbor batteries opened fire early to-

AMERICA'S MIND MADE UP.
TORONTO, To-day.
Addressing the Toronto Canadian
Club to-day, Alexander Noyes, of the
New York Evening Post, said: We
know, and it is hard to see how Ger-
man people should not also know,
that the invasion of Belgium has been
officially explained by the German
authorities in six separate and mutual
contradictory ways. The mind of
the American people has been made
up concerning this war on evidence.
That is the reason it will not change.
Our people have preserved their good
temper towards Germany. We intend

Sealing Commission.
Monday, Feb. 1st.
Henry G. Dawe sworn to Dr. Lloyd

Witness thinks if ships are properly
cleaned and inspected before coaling
there is usually no difficulty, other-
wise there is danger of the bilge be-
ing choked, which may mean disaster
should heavy weather be met. This
work would be best done by an inde-
pendent competent person. The value
of the average punt is confined to ac-
cident in ice, in open sea they are prac-
tically useless. Dories are much bet-
ter and safer in life saving in water.
As to panning seals witness thinks
there should be no right of property in
pans before they are sent to the ice
killed. This would prevent men going
unseasoned a distance from their
ships. The safe distance for men to
go from their ship would depend upon
the master who would be guided by
his best judgment and such other
helps as were available as to possi-
ble weather and ice conditions. In
these days with the powerful ships
employed, about four miles is far en-
ough to send men at any time. Men
can be expected to travel five miles
to seals and do any work worth while,
and return to their ship the same day.
Without prior arrangements men
should not be sent out with the under-
standing that they were to stay on
some other ship that night, though of
course men often get shelter on ships
other than their own. Barometers are
generally reliable if well understood
and watched carefully. Sealing mas-
ters should be subjected to some exami-
nation as to their competence before
taking charge. A sailor is necessary
for the Gulf fishery, while a sealer
may do for the front. Witness would
not advise a low line for sealing
steamers, in his experience only two
cases of overloading have occurred.
There is however no objection to a
load line. Deck lading depends upon
the position of the ship, and her dis-
tance from port. For purposes of
guiding, the Toronto weather report
would be useful, but not invariably re-
liable. If seals are hauled as killed
there will be considerable loss, as they
will melt. Even when panned the
seals must be packed with ice at
times. As to food for men on the ice
the men usually have had bread for
their chief diet, and kettles are some
times taken for use in making tea.
When punts are employed, it is gener-
ally when ice is loose, and from them
there is better provision for food as
well as shelter for the men.
To the Chief Justice.—Witness al-
ways aimed to have his men on board
by 6 or 7 o'clock. At times men are
sent out before sunrise, say 2 or 3
o'clock. Witness would not think it
discreet to send men so far from their
ships that they could not get back at
night.






