

The Olympic Games

By GEORGE FITCH

The Olympic Games flourished in dreece away back before Senator Shelby Cullom went into politics and were revived in 1896, when it seemed likely that the millennium would soon come unless something new was liscovered for the nations to quarrel

The first modern games were held in Athens in 1896 and were disappointingly peaceful, but since then the ill-feeling has grown rapidly until at the London games in 1908, several English editors burst while trying to be polite and hostile at the same time

In the original Olympic games the pest athletes of Greece took part and he winners got laurel wreaaths for their efforts. Now the nations of the world participate and the prize list as been considerably improved. The winners get laurel wreaths, medals, eups, trophies, moving-picture percentages, magazine rights, vaudeville engagements and half the gate receipts at Madison Park the next winer. Many a poor boy has gone to the Olympic games with only a good pair of legs and a return ticket and has had to leave his laurel wreath behind when returning to make room in his suit case for his exhibition contracts. The Olympic games consist of enringing running jumping discus nurling, weight throwing, and whatver other events the entertaining nation has the best chance to win. In England in 1908 they worked in tennis, achery, croquet and tea drinking. Even at that the Americans won the cup and the entente cordiale hasn't been so severely jarred since John Paul Jones sailed up the Eng-

lish Channel. The greatest event of the Olympic games is the Marathon, which is a foot race of twenty-six miles and ome hundred vards, the original winer having died at this distance. The 1908 Marathon was won by Johnny Hayes of America, who beat all the British champions, thus demonstrating that since 1776 the Americans have learned to run and the British have forgotten how. The Olympic games are held once

a every four years, it taking that length of time to allay the ill-feeling over the last event. The games of 1912 were held in Sweden, and as usual, it was the world against the United States with the British newspapers politely aspersing the table nanners and track etiquette of the Yankee victors. America took third place this time in the Marathon.

The Infamy of Wittenberg Prison Camp

A Story of Torture.

"What is the story of Wittenberg? It is a story of torture and a story of murder, a story of starvation, blows, insults, calculated neglect, and deliberate exposure to the attack of loathsome and dangerous sickness," says the Telegraph. "There, on the outskirts of a great German town, a famus centre of education as well as of ndustry, the things were done of which we were all reading yesterday with a feeling of stupefaction that such conduct was possible in menofficers, guards, medical authoritieswho have lived lives not greatly different from our own, and who claim a share, to say nothing of a predominant part, in the civilisation of Europe.

"Search as we may throughout that ghastly story for circumstances of palliation or excuse, we look in vain. that is described happened within the first year of the war, when serious difficulties of supply had not be-

gun to declare themselves. "These 15,000 or more men were given bad and insufficient food, not because decent food was scarce, but because to maintain them in vitality and power to resist disease was not desired. They were packed together in a space of less than eleven acres not because there was no more room for them in the German Empire, but of set purpose. They were without enough clothing, bedding, or fire hrough the winter of 1914 because they were prisoners of Germany, and for no other reason.

"The British and French prisoners were compelled by regulation to share their mattresses with Russian prisoners who were well known to be possible carriers of typhus, and when any fell sick it was forbidden to isolate them from the rest. That was not ack of organisation; it was organisation with an end in view.

Doctors Desert the Camp.

"When, on the outbreak of the epiemic, the entire German staff, medical as well as military, deserted the amp, and left these thousands of iserable men in the hands of a few octors wrongfully kept as prisoners of war, it was not because every Gernan doctor is afraid of disease. When the adequate supply of medical requirements was refused it was not because Germans are ignorant in these natters. The people of the town were allowed to jeer at the daily proession of coffins not because German guards have no idea how to deal with mobs. We have taken only a few of the points in this appalling indictment but they are enough. Nearly one-tenth of the 700 British prisoners died, in the circumstances of filth and misery described in the report; of the French and Russians a far greater number. They were murdered men. There can be no other verdict," adds the Telegraph.

The man mainly responsible for this neglect-the Oberstabsarzt, Dr. Asenbach—has been awarded the Iron Cross, the committee understand, 'for his services in combating the epidemic.' He entered the camp once while the disease existed, in a complete suit of protective clothing, with 'a mask and rubber gloves.'

"It is pleasant to turn from this callous coward to the English doctors and the orderlies who volunteered to work under them," says the Times. "Never-even by doctors-was terrible work more nobly done. Three of the officers and many of the men laid down their lives doing it. We hope with the committee that the devoted service of the survivors will not be forgotten."

"The nobility of the warrior has no place in the lazar-house of a soul like that of Dr. Aschenback," says the Star. "A doctor of medicine even in Germany belongs to a sodality of service and compassion. How can the German colleagues of Dr. Aschenbach hold up their heads and look each hold up their heads and look each other in the face so long as he is not brought to trial and made to answer for his crimes, not merely against humanity but against what is left of German honour and German chivalry? "There is a precedent for the punshment of crimes like those deliberately committed by Dr. Aschenbach. The American Civil War ended on May 26, 1865. On November 10, 1865, Captain Wirz, Commandant of the Confederate Prison at Andersonville, after a long trial, was executed for cruelty to Federal prisoners. Let us emember that precedent," says the



Keeps 1,000,000 Busy.

According to an official statement o the British House of Commons there are more than a million persons now engaged in the British navy and in various branches of naval work.

The return states that the navy proper had 146,000 officers and men when the war started, which number has now increased to 320,000, with the authority granted for a further increase to 350,000 officers and men, besides 67,000 naval reserves. There are also 85,000 men engaged in work at dockyards and other naval establishments and several times that number on Admiralty work under contract and sub-contract.

Besides these, the return specifies men engaged in getting coal for the fleet, dockside workers, and civilian crews of colliers, oilers, mine sweepers, supply ships, etc., and in addition men and women engaged in mak-

ing clothing and preparing food for the fleet.

The return states that "for every man in the navy, of whom there are something like 300,000, there are certainly two persons and possibly even three at work on ship construction, repairing and contributing to the general efficiency and fighting ability of




