## Allies Object to Restoration of Constantine.

### Greece Warned of Consequences--D'Annunzio Has Considerable Naval Strength--Liberals Win Doubtful Victory in B. C.--Award in Nordica Salvage Case \$11,000.

**A WARNING TO GREECE.** LONDON, Dec. 2. The Allied Premiers in conference to-day agreed to send a note to the Greek government, declaring that the restoration of Constantine to the throne of Greece would be regarded as ratification by that country of Constantine's hostile acts, and would create a new and unfavorable situation in the relations between Greece and the Allies.

**FOOD SITUATION IN NORWAY.** LONDON, Dec. 2. The food situation in Norway is regarded as serious owing to a railway strike in that country, says the Exchange Telegraph's Copenhagen correspondent to-day, quoting a dispatch from Christiania. Only one week's meat supply is available, and rumors again are current of a sympathetic strike in coastal traffic and an electric railways.

**A NARROW MAJORITY.** VANCOUVER, Dec. 2. Election results give twenty-four Liberals, fifteen Conservatives, and

thrown into the river and is in a critical condition.

**MAY CHANGE HIS MIND.** ROME, Dec. 2. Messages say to-day that D'Annunzio's naval squadron at Fiume, which includes the dreadnought Dante Alighieri, was under orders to leave Fiume when it was learned that D'Annunzio had blocked the port by sinking the cruiser Cortellazzo. The Temps says it learns from Trieste that it is possible D'Annunzio may change his idea and that he already has sent a confidential envoy to Rome to explain his viewpoint to the government.

**RUSSIAN TRADE AGREEMENT.** LONDON, Dec. 2. Krassin, Bolshevik Minister of Trade and Commerce, already has been handed the British trade agreement, which has been signed, says a wireless message from Moscow to-day quoting the newspaper Pravda. Nothing official could be learned here concerning the Pravda's statement.

**WOULD SUSPEND IMMIGRATION TO U.S.A.** WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. All immigration would be suspended for two years by a bill submitted to the House Immigration Committee to-day by its chairman representative Albert Johnson, Washington.

**ARMENIANS OUT OF ARMENIA.** TIFLIS, Dec. 2. Armenian forces have been driven eastward by Turkish Nationalists until the region they hold is entirely outside the bounds of traditional Armenia. Through intervention of the Russian Bolshevik government hostilities have ceased, but conditions are frightful in the territory held by the Armenians.

**CHINESE TROOPS MUTINY.** SHANGHAI, Dec. 2.

British and United States gunboats are hurrying to Ichang, in the province of Hanch, where mutinous Chinese troops have burned and looted a portion of the city.

**FIVE DEAD IN FIRE.** NEW YORK, Dec. 2. Mary Lescomb, a young motion picture actress, and four unidentified persons were burned to death in a fire which swept through an apartment house at twenty-nine West Fifty-Seventh Street this morning.

**AWARDED \$11,000 FOR SAVING NORDICA.**

BOSTON, Dec. 2. The United States Shipping Board steamer Western Comet was awarded eleven thousand dollars in the Federal District Court to-day, for the salvaging of the schooner Nordica on November 21. The crew is entitled to one-half of the award. The Western Comet sighted the Nordica off Grand Banks adrift. A rescue crew sent aboard found the schooner in good condition but deserted. She was taken in tow and brought here.

**THE QUESTION OF RAW MATERIALS.**

GENEVA, Dec. 2. The opposition of Sir Geo. Foster, of Canada, finally succeeded in modifying the resolution presented to the Assembly of the League of Nations, providing for an economic commission to study means of preventing monopolies in raw materials and a measure to insure control of their distribution throughout the world. The resolution, as passed, is taken to mean that the commission will continue investigating the question of raw materials without prejudicing final action, upon any recommendation it may make.

**VERY MUCH ALIVE.** LONDON, Dec. 2. Reports that Baron Desborough had died suddenly at Birmingham last night and published in the Times proved incorrect. It is authoritatively stated he is in the best of health.

**NO CHANGE IN EMPRESS'S CONDITION.**

DOORN, Dec. 2. There is little change in the condition of the former Empress of Germany this morning. Rumors of her death are unfounded, according to the Associated Press.

**LIFE THREATENED, RESIGNS.**

BELFAST, Dec. 2. County Inspector Munsell, Royal Irish Constabulary, who was a witness at the trial of MacSwiney and has been the recipient of threatening letters ever since, has resigned.

**WILL NOT INTERFERE.**

CORK, Dec. 2. United States Consular authorities will not interfere in the case of Richard Murphy, citizen of the United States, who was arrested on arrival at Belfast from New York on a charge of bringing seditious literature with him.

**SMASH WINDOWS.**

LONDON, Dec. 2. Uniformed men smashed nearly all windows in the business section of Killarney this morning, according to the evening news.

**NOT TAKEN SERIOUSLY.**

TRIESTE, Dec. 2. The declaration of war with Italy made by D'Annunzio is not regarded as a serious situation here by the military commanders.

**IRON ORE SHIPMENTS.**

DULUTH, Dec. 2. Iron ore shipped from the head of the lakes thus far amounts to forty-seven million, seven hundred and seven thousand, three hundred and seventy-two tons, as compared with forty million, sixty-seven thousand, eight hundred and fifty tons last year.

**Ancient Inventors.**

That ancient Greek and Roman engineers were ingenious as well as skilful is proved by works that are still extant, for instance when the Eupalines, Island of Samos, water-works mentioned by Herodotus were constructed in the middle of the sixth century B.C., a tunnel about one mile long was driven through the Kastro mountain, certainly a respectable achievement when one considers the limited mechanical means at the disposal of the builders. From the books of the Alexandrian mathematician Heron, one sees that ancient engineers knew how to figure beforehand the direction of a tunnel. The fine medical instruments, of which many have been excavated, give evidence of high mechanical skill. Ancient instrument makers manufactured clepsydras (water clocks) that could be carried in pockets and devices used by Herophilus to measure the temperature of patients. The present day slot machine and taxi-meter are imitations of similar ancient inventions. Even to ballistic war machines ancient people applied ideas which play an important part in modern warfare—the "polybon" being in a certain meaning, the predecessor of our repeating arms, and the "monankon" of the mine thrower.

**Llewellyn Club.**

**DR. JONES AND MR. C. E. HUNT DELIVER ADDRESSES ON IRISH QUESTION.**

There was a very large gathering at the Canon Wood Hall last evening when the monthly meeting of the Llewellyn Club was held, the hall being filled. Mr. L. Colley occupied the chair, and in opening the meeting stated that the feature of the evening would be an address by Rev. Dr. Jones in reply to some of the arguments of Mr. Lindsay Crawford, but that before introducing Dr. Jones he would call on Mr. C. E. Hunt to give his views on the subject from the standpoint of an English colonial.

Mr. Hunt felt that in a self-governing colony like ours, where we were so remote from the seat of the trouble and where very few gave the questions involved any careful study, sentiment was certain to govern our views, and he was convinced that a continuation of the discussion for years would alter the views of exceedingly few people and was for that reason futile and far more likely to create ill-feeling than to help in even the smallest measure in coming to any settlement. We had, however, to admit that the matter was being discussed from different viewpoints and, that being so, a frank expression of views was certainly preferable to secrecy, which invariably bred suspicion and distrust.

He then dealt with the question from the standpoint of one who was English in sentiment and descent and under the people of Newfoundland, enjoying the fullest liberty under the British flag should, respect it and the form of government that it represents; (3) that firm in the belief that our security rests upon the preservation of the Empire, of which England is the corner-stone, the security of England must be our first consideration; (3) that Ireland is entitled to a full measure of Home Rule within the Empire consistent with the security of England.

At the conclusion of Mr. Hunt's address the chairman introduced Rev. Dr. Jones, who in opening said that he thought Mr. Hunt had expressed the views of the great majority of those present. He intended to deal with some arguments that had been advanced by Mr. Lindsay Crawford in his recent address. He had not been present at the meeting, but gathered the views of the lecturer from the newspaper reports and from reliable parties who had attended the meeting. He had taken care to obtain a fair and accurate report as he had no desire to misquote him in any way. He understood that Mr. Crawford had devoted much time in answering a former address that he had given and he wished to reply to his arguments.

Mr. Crawford had said that he (Dr. Jones) had spent about a day in Belfast, but as a matter of fact he had spent about ten days and was present at a convention, at which many Irishmen were present, and he had the opportunity of meeting many leading men from different parts of the country and of learning their views. Furthermore, Mr. Crawford had quoted some views as being the personal views of Dr. Jones, when as he had expressly stated, they were the views of Ulster and had been given as such.

To the assertion of Mr. Crawford that the question was neither a racial nor a religious one, Dr. Jones replied that it was undoubtedly a religious question to Protestant people and to at least some Roman Catholics. Mr. Crawford himself admitted this at a later period in his address, when he stated that for the past one hundred years Ireland had been throwing off stage by stage all the badges of England and the Protestant ascendancy.

In reply to Mr. Crawford's statement that statistics showed that Leinster was the wealthiest province in Ireland, the doctor read statistics to show that Ulster was the wealthiest province. Mr. Crawford had stated that Ireland could not be economically free as she was not politically free, but he showed that Ireland's imports at the time of the union were four million pounds and these had increased in 1916 to over a hundred million pounds, and in 1917 the Irish people had over one hundred million pounds on deposit in their banks. He argued that these figures refuted Mr. Crawford's statement.

He denied that England had shown any tyranny in Ireland as alleged by Mr. Crawford and that such statements were unfair. He said that Mr. Crawford had quoted him as saying that the Irish were an inferior race. He had not done so, for in his opinion the Irish were a superior race in very many respects and Ireland had produced some of the finest statesmen, soldiers and men in every walk of life. He denied Mr. Crawford's statement that labor conditions in Ulster were appalling and read extracts to prove such was far from being the case. If as Mr. Crawford had stated, the right of a people to mould its own destiny and determine its own form of government was not debatable, Ulster certainly had such rights as well as the rest of Ireland.

He could not hold with Mr. Crawford that the present bloodshed in Ireland was merely incidental to revolution or accidental. He agreed with Mr. Crawford that there was no hatred in the hearts of many Irishmen towards England, but many leaders of the Sinn Fein movement had hatred towards her and openly expressed it. He denied that the old established church had gone in favour of Sinn Fein and maintained that it was the English church that had given England the Magna Charta.

Dealing with the local Self-Determination League, Dr. Jones stated that if they came out openly for Dominion Home Rule within the Empire they would win thousands of supporters from Protestants, but as long as the opinion existed that they wanted only to have Ireland a Republic outside the Empire, all who were Imperial in their sentiments would strongly and openly oppose it. Dr. Jones in closing made a strong appeal for a United Empire and the abandoning of any movement that tended to bring in this colony discord and hatred.

At the conclusion of the speech of Dr. Jones, which was very warmly applauded, the chairman expressed the thanks of the meeting to the two speakers and the singing of the National Anthem brought a very interesting meeting to a close.



#### ON WANTING THINGS EASY.

How we do resent anything that comes hard! And yet it is only the hard things of life that make us grow and develop and keep our souls alive.

I can't remember who it was who said "Help us to pray not for easier lives but for greater strength," but whoever it was, he struck at one of the fundamental cravings of the human heart.

The intensity with which we all want, or think we want, ease and cessation from effort is really astounding.

Instead of craving and working for the strength that shall make us adequate to every fate and every circumstance, we long and pray and work for pleasant and easy circumstances.

#### JUST AS WE ALL DO.

A friend of mine was complaining bitterly her life was over-shadowed by the illness of a near relative. "It doesn't seem as if I could stand any more sickness," she said, "I'm tired of it. I've had such a lot, you know."

She has had a good deal, mostly her own. And during that illness she has received kindness and attention from everyone, especially the relative who is now ill. The opportunity to do for others as they have done for her will be a wonderful experience. But she doesn't want that opportunity. She wants things easy--just as we all do.

We seem to be born with an idea that we have a sort of inalienable right to happiness and ease, and that anything which gets in the way of that ease and happiness deserves our resentment. That is part of youth's difficulty in adjusting itself to life--the discovery that happiness is not the first law of the universe.

And Then They Aren't Satisfied.

Some people never make that readjustment. They go on fighting against everything which gets in the way of their immediate happiness to the end. Sometimes they don't get what they want and live an embittered, soured existence. Again they do what they want, and find to their

astonishment that as they grow older it doesn't keep on satisfying them. "The worldly hope men set their heart upon, Turns ashes--or it prospers, and anon Like snow upon the desert's dusty face, Lighting a little hour or two, is gone."

Others gradually learn the lesson that circumstance can seldom be wholly controlled and that happiness must come through one's learning to control one's reactions to circumstances instead of the circumstances themselves. Therefore, they make up their minds to try to become adequate to whatever life shall bring. They may not entirely succeed but at least they are on the road to the only true happiness.

Can't We Copy the Oyster?

When some foreign substance is intruded into an oyster's life he at once begins covering it over so that it cannot hurt him. We all know the beautiful things that result from that action. If one will overlay the intrusions of life with a self-protective layer of courage and optimism one cannot only save oneself from hurt, but can also produce something as beautiful as the pearl--a strong and beautiful character.

#### Original Human Beings in China.

The western part of Sze-chuan Province, China, might well be called the Museum of the Human Race, the as-yet-undiscovered happy hunting ground of the ethnologist and physiognomist. Here are to be found the surviving remains in the most heroic struggle for existence that humanity has ever waged and who, for lack of a better term, we call the "Tribemen."

The Chinese call them "The Eighteen Nations," but it is believed that there are several times eighteen nations or tribes, each under its own king, council, or feudal lord, independent or semi-independent of each other and of the Chinese in whose borders they dwell.

Among the tribesmen are found representatives of the black, yellow and white branches of the human family, and some of them, especially the dwarf peoples, are believed to be of very ancient origin.

### Egypt's Waste Basket Found.

"We have found the national waste paper basket of ancient Egypt," was the expression used by a member of the French academy of historic inscriptions to describe a recent discovery of the French Egyptologist, Lecau. Beneath the ruins of a temple dedicated to Thoth in the holy city of Heliopolis, Professor Lecau found a subterranean necropolis containing tens of thousands of muffled bodies of the sacred ibis, each neatly packed in an earthenware jar. The packing was nothing but crumpled papyrus--ancient Egyptian manuscripts--which, say investigators, appear to consist of everything written from love letters to washing bills. There are literally hundreds of thousands to be deciphered, and it is estimated that the work of translation will take several years. When this is completed it is hoped that the whole life of the highly civilized Egyptians four thousand years before Christ will be revealed.

### Postage Stamp 4,220 Years Old.

Philadelphia, Nov. 25.--What is believed to be the oldest portrait of a human being has been discovered in the University of Pennsylvania Museum's collection of clay tablets from Babylon, according to an announcement made by Dr. Leon Lograin, curator of the Babylonian section. The portrait is on a postage stamp, which also served as a seal for a registered package, dated about 2300 B.C.

It is a picture of Ibi-Sin, the last King of Ur, known to Bible students as Ur of the Chaldees.

The package or sack, bearing the seal, Dr. Lograin said, appears to have been sent by the high priest of the Temple of Ur, in which Abraham later worshipped, to a banker named Shulpeo and probably contained gold. "It is of unusual importance to archaeologists," he added, "because it probably gives a clue to the personal appearance of the Sumerians, who were not a Semitic race."

"The portrait is on a clay postage stamp and is the result of rolling an engraved cylinder over the soft clay. It is as clear and distinct and the features as well defined as the day it was made. The astonishing thing is that it shows the king-god as smooth shaven. There are two supposed portraits before the one just discovered, but in neither of them is there any apparent effort at realism."

"The portrait shows a man seated on a throne with an undoubted nose, well defined mouth and general characteristics so individual that it must have been taken from life. It is significant that the picture shows a lock of hair projecting in the forehead from beneath the turban hat and another from behind.

"Before the days of Ibi-Sin we never heard of a king giving any one a seal containing his portrait, but in this instance the seal not only distinctly says the king god hands the seal to the high priest of the Temple of Ur, but shows a picture of the event, which is amazing from an archeological point of view. Possibly the fact that Ibi-Sin was the last of his dynasty and may have seen the end coming was responsible for this remarkable gift."

P. G. Lodge Closes Special Session—Resolutions Adopted.

The special session of the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Newfoundland continued yesterday afternoon and night, concluding at midnight. Large attendance marked the three meetings held, those of yesterday afternoon and evening being wholly occupied with a discussion of the Resolutions submitted by the Special Committee appointed on Wednesday night to consider and report on the particular business for which Grand Lodge was summoned.

The Resolutions brought down to Grand Lodge were unanimously adopted, and this morning were forwarded to the proper authorities, named in the concluding resolutions. It was ordered that Grand Lodge that the complete series of resolutions passed, should be sent to all four afternoon papers in time for publication tomorrow, but that the Grand Secretary has not had time to get the press copies typed, and consequently publication will be delayed till to-morrow.

Those Meetings.

(Twillingate Sun.) Two big meetings were held last week in St. John's, on Thursday and Friday nights respectively. Which ever side of politics the St. John's paper you read belongs to will give you its description according to its own bias, either being stressed to suit a political expediency. Having read the descriptions from the Advocate, Herald Star, Telegram, Trade Review and Plaindealer and also a gentlemanly account at Thursday's meeting, we have come to these conclusions:

1. That the meeting held by the Fishermen at the C.C. Hall on Thursday night was a bona fide fishermen's meeting. The fishermen paid for the hall themselves, and Frank Green, one of the principal speakers, showed the \$40 he had collected from the fishermen present to pay for the hall, and denounced the Star for saying otherwise, tearing up a copy of the paper.

2. That the speakers, with the exception of Abram Kean who was nominated chairman, were all bona fide fishermen. Among the Union men, being Frank Green, of Greenspond, a returned soldier, and first member of the Regiment to be wounded in Gallipoli; James Winsor, and Sidney Hill, of Wesleyville; and Henry White of Leo Cove, B.E. Edwin Whitt of Greenspond, a man whose leg was amputated at the St. Anthony hospital five years ago, and Aaron Barry of Greenspond, and another fisherman from Bay de Verde.

3. That the hall was crowded, the crowd extending outside the doors, the gentlemen who informed us being unable to get an entrance.

4. That three Resolutions were unanimously passed calling for: (a) The immediate abolition of the Fishery Regulations, and the re-establishment of open trade. (b) That meetings of a similar kind should be held all over Newfoundland. (c) That a deputation of five should be appointed to call on Mr. Coaker the following day to ask him to arrange for the sale of all the Labrador fish being afloat in the harbor at the price of 48 cents per hundred.

5. That the meeting held by Mr. Coaker was as largely or even more largely attended than that of the previous night. Hon. W. W. Hillyard, occupying the chair. It was noticeable that: (1) The speakers were all members of the Government—Mr. Coaker, Mr. Hillyard, Dr. Campbell and Mr. Penney. (2) That fishermen went there expecting to be allowed to speak. (3) That a guard of six policemen was present. (4) That while there were no interruptions at the first meeting Mr. Coaker and the other speakers were badly heckled at the second. (5) That when Frank Green one of the speakers of the previous night mounted the platform to speak Messrs. Coaker, Penney, Hillyard and Campbell left, and the police cleared the hall preventing any reply on the part of the fishermen.

Those are the main facts connected with the two meetings despite what Government or Opposition papers say.

BECOMING INTERESTED. LONDON, Dec. 3. Uncompromising indifference in Southern Ireland towards the Home Rule Bill has been markedly affected by amendments in the House of Lords, according to the Dublin correspondent of the Times, who says that moderate Irish opinion may be radically changed if the Government concurs in the Lords amendments, and improve the financial provisions of the bill.

CARRIED TO EXTREMES. HOUSTON, Texas, Dec. 3. Federal prohibition agents yesterday, seized virtually all Houston's visible supply of Xmas branded chocolates and mince meat, put up prior to prohibition.

DANGEROUS DOCUMENTS. LONDON, Dec. 2. Premier Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons to-day, that documents found in possession of Edmond de Valera, when he was arrested in nineteen eighteen, would be included in those which the Government was about to make public. These documents, asserted the Premier, implicated the Irish Republican army in a German conspiracy.

SCOTLAND YARD BUSY. LONDON, Dec. 2. Keen search by Scotland Yard operatives to uncover Sinn Fein machinations are said to be having results. It is declared that many documents have been discovered, which disclose a complete list of members of the Irish Self-Determination League, and also clues as to the whereabouts of men and women desired by the authorities.

World's Oldest Paper Book.

There is preserved in the Bibliotheque Nationale in Paris a papyrus roll, which was discovered at Thebes by M. Prisse and is now distinguished by his name. It was first described in 1857 by M. Chabas, who stated that it belonged to the eleventh dynasty of Egyptian kings and was written about 2500 B.C. Yet it is but a copy of a much older treatise written by a governor or vice-roy, Ptah-hotep, son of the seventh king of the dynasty, Assa or Dod-da-ru, who according to W. M. Flinders Petrie, began to reign about 3530 B.C. The book, therefore, carries us back nearly thirty-four or even thirty-six centuries before Christ. Yet even then it does not appear as a first attempt at giving instruction in proverbial form or by writing. It seems rather to belong to an advanced period of society, when education was systematic and books of instruction were employed. The author, is stated to have been 110 years old, and his book opens with a remarkable description of old age. It proceeds in a style which recalls the Proverbs of Solomon, the Greek didactic poems and even the homely "Poor Richard." It inculcates obedience, diligence, patience and other virtues belonging to an official or servant.

FORBIDDEN TO SPEAK. Archbishop Mannix of Melbourne, Australia, has been forbidden to keep a speaking engagement to Bootle, a suburb of Liverpool, next Saturday, and will not be allowed in the Liverpool area, according to Evening Standard. The Home Office and military are responsible for this prohibition.

CANADA MAKES A BID. NEW YORK, Dec. 3. An offer of a site for the staging of the Dempsey-Carpenter heavyweight championship fight in Canada, was received here to-day by promoter Tex Ricard. The proposition, from a syndicate of wealthy Ottawa sportsmen, suggested holding the contest at Hull during June and it was stated that a quarter of a million was available as a guarantee, and Ricard was requested to meet and discuss the matter with a representative of the Canadian syndicate.





**WEEKLY MEETING.**

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Commission was held last night. Chairman Gosling and Commissioners Ayre, Peet, Morris, Mullaly and Vinnicombe were present.

After the reading and confirming of the minutes of last weekly meeting the following business was transacted.

Secretary Government Railway Commission, T. A. Hall, renewed application for permission to erect temporary building east of the railway station. The Council cannot give permission for this erection.

The Secretary of the T. A. and B. Society stated it was their intention to install a sprinkling system in connection with the Theatre flat of their building and asked the necessary connection with the city water mains. Request was accorded to the Society to pay all costs of installation.

Messrs. Morey & Co. and A. E. Hickman & Co., made application for the placing of hydrants and guaranteed the costs of installing same. Work will be undertaken under the usual conditions.

A letter was read from Mr. J. M. Tobin regarding demand for taxes on athletic sports recently held.

A communication was received from Inspector General Hutchings in relation to the application recently made by Marshall's Garage to install a gasoline tank at their station, West End. Permission will be given to erect the tank but supply pipes will not be permitted to be located at the Water St. Curb.

Solicitor Carter reported on lands New Found Pond which the Council intends expropriating.

Regulations in reference to the putting of houses in habitable condition were submitted so as to amend those at present in force.

Communication from K. R. Prowse regarding demand made in connection with costs of improving lands of McLea's and Walbank's estates was referred to the solicitor.

Solicitors Blackwood, Emerson and Winter forwarded a communication in reference to property of E. Power, Duckworth St.

Application of Fleishman Yeast Co. to install electric motor on their premises was granted subject to the supervision of the City Engineer.

City Garage requested share of work in repairing motor trucks, etc.

A. L. Reid asked compensation for loss of horse. The solicitor is to be asked to report as to the Council's liability.

J. F. Milley requested water supply residence Cornwall Ave. The Engineer was instructed to report for next meeting.

A letter was read from H. A. Anderson regarding proposed monument to be erected foot Garrison Hill.

E. N. White asked that attention be given light, South Side. This matter has already been reported to the Electric Light Co.

W. E. Power asked permission to build carpenter's shop, Collier's Lane, off Forest Road. The matter was ordered deferred until next meeting.

Report of Health Officer showed 8 cases of Diphtheria, 2 Scarlet fever and 2 Typhoid fever in the city during the past week.

Reports of Inspector Rooney and City Engineer were read.

With the granting of requisitions for the various departments, the disposal of routine matter and the passing of pay rolls and bills presented, the meeting adjourned at 11 o'clock.


