





IN MEMORY OF THE HEROISM OF

On the 23rd of November, 1797, His Majesty's Frigate, "La Tribune," struck on Thrump Cap Shoal and after coming off, sank a little-to-the south of Herring Cove.

Out of 240 men and some women and children, all but twelve lost their lives. The Nova Scotia Histori-Tablet at the Lighthouse, Herring of Joe Cracker, a fisher lad of thirteen years of age, of Herring Cove, who was the first to rescue two men from the wreck. The plucky lad was afterwands, it is said, made a midshipman or his bravery, but did not stay long in the Navy. The fol-

lowing are the particulars of the loss est fricates in His Majesty's service, carrying forty-four guns, and had been lately captured by the Unicorn frigate. She was commanded by Captain S. Barker, and sailed from Torbay on the twenty-second of September, 1797, as convoy to the Quebec and Newfoundland feets. She lost sight of the fleets on the 19th of October, and on Thursday morning, the 23rd of November, came in sight of Halifax Harbor, when Captain Barker proposed to the master to lay the ship to till a pilot was got. The master remarked that the wind was fair, and as he knew the harbor well, no pilot was necessary. About 12 o'clock the ship had approached so near the Thrump Cap Shoals that the master became alarmed and sent for Mr. Galvin, the master's mate, who was sick below. Galvin had just appeared on deck, not having time to observe the position of the ship, when she struck. The captain had gone below to look over some papers which he had intended to take ashore with him, and on the ship striking, immediately went on deck. Signals of distress were made and answered by the military posts and ships in the harbor. Boats from all the military posts from His Majesty's ships and the dockyard proceeded to the relief of the La Tribune. Some of these reached the ship, but others had to return on account of the weather. The ship was immediately lightened by throwing all her guns overboard. so that at 9 o'clock she got off the shoals. The chain pumps were put in action and it was thought that she might be kept affoat. The gale now intensified, the wind blowing from the southeast. Her anchors were dropped, but failed to bring her to and she was fast driven towards the Western shore. It was now 10 o'clock and little hope was entertained of saving the ship or the lives of those on board of her. About 10.30 the ship lurched suddenly and went down: 240 men and some women and children were now struggling for their life in the water. With many of them the struggle was very short; a number clung to the shrouds, the tops and other parts of the wreck, but owing to the severity of the storm, they, one by one, dropped off through exhaustion, and disappeared in the raging billows. The cries and groans of the unhappy sufferers, from the bruises many of them had received, and as hope of deliverance began to fail them, were heartrending. Although the wreck was so near shore that their cries could be distinctly heard—only eight persons survived to see the light of day. The first effort made for their relief was by a boy thirteen years of age, who ventured off in a skiff by himself, about eleven o'colck next day. After great labor, the little hero succeeded in backing his boat

Some Increase in Buying Power of Saskatchewan

DESPITE LOWER GRAIN YIELD HIGHER PRICES HAVE RAISED REVENUE.

In view of the increased prices of learly all grains, the total farm revenue of the province of Saskatchewan should be a slightly larger amount than that of last year. The volume of the yield, however, will be considerably smaller and this means that many of the farmers will have to buy seed for next year, at the higher level of prices. On the whole, the province has been severely affected by the drouth and other enemies of the farmer. While there are sections where the yield has been greater than that of last year. and where the farmer's net profit will be greater than at any time, at least since 1915, there are vast sections where the outcome has been extremely disappointing, and the purchasing power during the coming winter will

The wheat crop, which is Saskatchewan's most important, and in which Saskatchewan far surpasses the other provinces, has fallen off very materially in volume and quality. With the radical rise in price, however, there is promise that the total value of the crop will exceed \$200,000,000 in comparison with \$164,000,000 last year. If this is the case, the position of the Saskatchewan farmer will be much better than has been the case for some time, despite the bumper yield of 1923. This, of course, will depend on the volume of wheat that the farmer is able to dispose of while prices are still

Whale is Model for **Unusual Speed Boat**

Resembling a whale or submarine in appearance, when out of water, a new type of speed boat under construction in England is expected by its designers to set new speed records when it is tested soon on the Thames

The low part of the hull is of hydroplane design, with a lifting step to raise the hull when the boat is travelling at high speed, and to decrease the water resistance

The deck work is streamlined. For speed driving in heavy seas, the pilot is almost inclosed. Only his head is exposed above the round deck. One of the many novel features of the boat is a tail plane fitted acre the rudder just above the propellor This plane is designed to function in connection with the gliding step under the hull. A 450-horsepower engine is expected to propel the craft at record-breaking speed.

Exploring the Mysteries of Kilauea's Crater

To measure the temperatures lava at various depths, a party of United States volcanologists are drilling a series of holes in the huge crater af Mount Kilauea in Hawaii.

The possibility of utilizing the steam from the crater for power purposes will be studied at the same time. To do this a small laboratory with small engines and condensers has been built over the hottest of the crater holes.

In drilling, much difficulty has been encountered, due to the great hardness of the basalt rock that forms the solid lava foundation. It is possible to bore only two or three feet a day. The work is expected to reveal new facts concerning the increase in temperature toward the center of earth, as well as new knowledge of mineral and gas changes under-

Jagged Rock Spires Carved by the Rain

The same forces of nature that sometimes dig unsightly gulleys in your yard during a heavy rainstorm. were the sculptors that carved the lofty, oddly chaped spires of rock & found at the edge of Crater Lake, a vast depression that once was the crater of an active volcano, in Crater Lake National Park of southwestern Oregon. Geologists who have studied it recently say it is the most striking illustration ever discovered of the tremendous power of rain in cutting away rock formations.

Ages ago, when this cavity was the crater of an active volcano, they say, it threw forth vast masses of volcanic dust and lava fragments. Through the centuries, these consolidated into layers of rock. Near the top of the rock strata was formed a layer harder than the rest.

It was this hard layer that made possible the formation of the strange ook pinnacles. For, as countless rainerms beat down upon the crater, entury after century, certain portions of the hard layer resisted. And wherever it resisted, it served as a

shelter to protect the softer rock that

lay directly beneath it. Meanwhile, where the rain broke through, it washed away the softer material, leaving the protected material standing in the form of rockcapped spires.

The process is known as erosion It is the process that slowly wears away the hill and mountains.



That Offside Game!

By W. CRESSWELL, (The Famous Sunderland Back.)

There is one thing I am never able understand about modern football. nat is, why most forwards seem fraid to take the ball through on neir own occasionally. Of course, I now that good combination and lever passing are essential to sucess, and that the selfish player is of very little use to his side. But there s reason in all things!

If a forward is running at full speed with the ball under proper conrol, a defender who advances to tackle him has very little chance of robbing him of the ball. In fact, I should put the odds at about ten to one against his being successful! Suppose a man is coming towards

ne. As I go to tackle him he might do any one of a dozen different things vithout parting with the ball. Oblously my chance of guessing corretly which he will do is very small ndeed. But what usually happens in nine cases out of ten? As soon as I get anywhere near him, the forward simply passes to the man who is in the best position to continue towards my goal.

That brings about two things. Firstly, as I go forward to tackle, I glance round to see which of my on ponents is most likely to get the pass which I am certain is coming. I note his position and make my tackle in such a way that if the pass does come I shall have a good chance of intercepting it.

Secondly, as I move forward I go away from my goal, but the opposing forwards continue to run towards it, with the result that they at once place themselves offside! So even if I fail to intercept the pass and it goes to one of their forwards, he is at once pulled up by the referee's whistle! If the forward, instead of passing, had kept the ball and beaten me himself, there would have been no offside. At any rate, I know that if forwards went in for a bit more individual play I should jolly soon give up playing back and choose some other position on the field!

I nearly got myself in a very awkward fix a few years ago. During the war I signed on for 'a well-known Scottish team, and a day or two afterwards was sent off by the Army authorities on a course of instruction. By the time my course had finished, my battalion had moved to Aldershot, and I never went near Scotland again!

As I had never played so much as a single game for the team, I thought I no longer belonged to them and, after the war was over, signed on for South Shields

Then I found to my horror that I was still on the lists of the Scotch club and liable to get into serious trouble for joining two clubs

Beginning with a Corporate Communion at 8 a.m. for Church workers found a large number gaged in forwarding the work of the hurch and Parish to ask God's special blessing on their efforts this year. The church workers met again at 3.15 p.m. for their annual service. The Rector, Rev. A. B. S. Stirling, addressed the gathering, and gave them some very practical as well as inspiring and encouraging thoughts to hold their minds during the com-

In the afternoon the two Bible Classes. Young Men's and Young Women's, met for the first time this season, and both registered record attendances. It behoves all the members of these classes to work hard to maintain and also to improve upon yesterday's showing. The Rector and the leaders of the classes were much encouraged by the record attendance

At the evening service one of the largest congregations on record for St. Mary's was on hand to attend the Service of Dedication of the new Altar Rail and Pulpit recently presented to the Church by the Sanctuary Guild and Women's Association respectively. His Lordship the Bishop Newfoundland performed the Dedication Ceremony and preached. The Bishop took as his text Psalm 119, verse 130, making reference to the various readings of that verse found in the authorised, revised and Prayer-Book versions of the Psalms. Before commenting on the text he congratulated the Rector and the congregation on the ever-increasingly evident signs of growth in the spiritual life of the Parish. It was very gratifying to him as Bishop to see such signs. The altar frontals and furnishings, which was his privilege to dedicate last year, the bringing in of extra clerical help, the beautifying of the sanctuary by two such gifts as were dedicated last evening, showed very plainly that great progress was made in the Christian life of the people.



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
