The friends of Messrs. Stirton and Gow called a meeting at Sullivan's Tavern, on the Guelph and Pilkington line, last (Monday) night, for the purpose of hearing the Reform Candidates. Some of the Tories in Guelph, true to their instincts, took means to break it up, and prevent Messrs Stirton and Gow from being heard. Accordingly Mr. Saxon and some three or four tavern-keepers scoured that part of the Township, and got together such Tories as E. V. Thompson and John Card, along with a lot of boys—true scions of their Tory ancestors. They made up the number by an importation of a lot of meh from Pilkington, who, being in the Jenter Riding, had no vote in the South, and no interest in the election at all. These worthies took possession of the room, and put Mr. E. V. Thompson in the chair. When Messrs. Stirton and Gow came in they had the cool impudence to propose that they should be allowed to speak half an hour each. Messrs. Stirton and Gow indignantly refused to accept any such proposition. They stated that this was a meeting called by their friends, and that after they had spoken the other side would be allowed full liberty to express their sentiments. Afraid of allowing any fair discussion, they unblushingly took possession of the room, and then had the cool effrontery to limit Messrs. Stirton and Gow to a certain time at their own meeting. STIRTON AND GOW STILL A-HEAD MEETING AT PUSLINCH

A meeting of the electors in School Section No. 12, Puslinch, was held in the School house on Saturday night. Over 100 of the electors in the Section were present. It was feared some disturbance would be raised, by about eight or ten of the residents from Downey's School Section, some of whom felt quite jolly. They were a little noisy before the meeting commenced, and during the speeches varied the proceedings by calling out "Geo. Brown" instead of hear, hear. But beyond these, interruptions were not very

Mr. Stirton, on rising was greeted with loud cheers. He made an able and effective speech, in which he sketched the political history of this country for the past ten years, painting out how during all that time the Reform party had manfully and persistently struggled for justice to Upper Canada on the question of representation, and how that struggle had resulted in victory—in the accomplishment of Confederation. He then adverted to the coalition of 1864, showing the necessity there was for a coalition of parties then in order to carry out the great object for which it had been formed. He combatted the argument now brought up by the friends of the government, that a coalition is as necessary now to carry Confederation into effect, and demonstrated that as it is full and clear in all its provisions, it can be worked even more efficiently and economically by a party government. Their opponents assert, but they have never proved, that a Coalition is necessary. He went on to show that the tendency of such governments is to extravagence, as instanced in the present administration, which is composed of thirteen members, when seven would have done the work as well. Mr. Gow then addressed the meeting in an excellent speech. He referred to the keen party contests in past days when party feeling ran high, and faction often gained the ascendancy. He hoped we would aske a lesson from the past, and that as we are now entering on a new system, our public men would steer clear of faction: He gave both parties all due credit for their efforts to secure Confederation, but because we agree with the Conservatives on that one point it did not follow that we should forget the past character of their leaders, who had been instrumental in doubling our debt in a few years, and many other acts of extravagance. We could not toget that, and consequently we could not have confidence in them. He then referred to the several meetings which had been held in the Riding, and the disadvantage he and Mr. Stirton experienced in not being able torneet the candidates face to face and discuss public questions. Instead of that they were confronted by irresponsible parties, who took upon them to express opinions for which Messrs. Stone and Leslie could not be held responsible. He spoke of the injustice done to Untario in the formation of the Local Government. He also condemned in the strongest language the means resorted to by their opponents, who represented to some of the electors that Mr. Stirton and he were an exationists at heart. They dare not make such accusations publicly, but in a sneaking under-hand way they make this charge where they think it will be believed.
