The Governor-General's Visit.
 Elsewhere we give the programme decided on for the reception of the Governor-General, and also refer to the preparations which are being made. We think it is unfortunate that the Council did not ask the co-operation of the citizens in making the necessary arrangements, as their advice and assistance would have been of great value, and might have given to the reception some features it will not possess. It is too late now, however, to do much in this direction, but we hope that those who can give any help will do so, and that they will unite their efforts in making the reception worthy of the Town of Guelph.

We are glad to say that the preparations are being pushed on as fast as possible, and by noon to-morrow we hope everything will be in good shape. As regards illuminations and other recommendations of the Council, we trust the citizens will endeavour to carry out the programme, as it will add to the rejoicings very much.

The Council of Public Instruction Elections.

We give to-day the result of the election for the Teachers' representative in the Council of Public Instruction. It will be seen that Goldwin Smith has been elected over Dr. Sangster by the handsome majority of 277. Considering the early start Dr. Sangster had in his canvass, the spirited manner in which it was carried on, the means used in some quarters to obtain votes for him, his popularity with the great bulk of the teachers throughout the Province, and the fact that having been a teacher himself, he was likely better to understand their wants and look after their special interest, than his opponent, the majority is larger than any one expected. Had the election taken place a few weeks ago, Dr. Sangster would assuredly have been the man. But the recent disclosures in connection with his family affairs, his attempt to deceive the public about the divorce, his garbling of John Hillyard Cameron's opinion, and his futile attempts to explain these deceptions, turned the scale, and lost to him many votes he otherwise would have obtained. After these disclosures the sentiments of many of the teachers with respect to him underwent a complete change. He took the most effectual way of killing himself, as the result has shown.

We rejoice at his defeat, not on any personal grounds, but because it conveys a signal and unequivocal reproof and condemnation of conduct which has neither legal nor moral sanction. It is mainly attributable to the *Globe*, which day after day showed him up in his true colours, and exposed his little tricks of deception. It has now the satisfaction of recording his defeat, and congratulating the teachers and the public that the cause of morality has triumphed.

The Hon. Geo. Brown has commenced proceedings for libel against the *Ottawa Citizen* and the *Brant Union*, laying the damages in each case at ten thousand dollars. A writ has been also served against the *Kincardine Review*, damages claimed five thousand dollars.

The total of foreign imports received at New York during the seven months since January 1, 1874, have amounted to but \$27,780,727, which is a falling off of \$44,581 from the importations during the same period of last year, and \$19,136,144 less than during the corresponding time of 1872.

Mr. Joseph Price, of the G.W. Railway, has arrived in London, and is assisting the Board in the preparation of the reply to the charges made against them. It is said that the Directors have a strong case, and that they can carry any resolution they please. The only change now spoken of is the deposition of Sir Thomas Dakin and the succession of Sir Edward Watkin to power. The meeting to consider the report of the investigation will be held towards the end of this month.

Beware—The Dundas Banner has the audacity to publish the following:—“And now John Anderson has taken a picture of the Guelph Champion Base Ballists, and the Council of that burgh propose to pass an edict to compel all the pretty girls in the Dominion to buy one and wear it next their hearts. The editors up there have only to look at the picture once a day in order to give them courage to defy all creation—and more especially the Sheriff of Wellington.” We want the jealous editor of the *Banner* that if he tries to poke fun at our Champions and the Guelph editors, we will send a deputation of indignant young ladies to Dundas with a long switch, and if that won't do, we will then try him with a libel suit.

The Governor-General's Movements.

Sarnia, Aug. 20.
 This morning the Vice-Regal party, accompanied by the Hon. A. Mackenzie, left Detroit for Sarnia by the steamer J. W. Steinhoff, a comfortable and rapid vessel, which ordinarily runs between Detroit and Chatham. On this trip the party passed up the beautiful Detroit river, and the equally beautiful St. Clair Lake and St. Clair River. At Mooretown a considerable number of flags were displayed, and as the steamer approached an anvil salute was fired, a crowd of people being seen on and near the wharf. Five miles from Sarnia, which was reached about half-past three, the Steinhoff was met by a procession of six steamers laden with people, and decorated in a most beautiful manner with trees and overgreens. These boats passed the Steinhoff in two lines of three each, one line on either side. As the fleet approached the town a salute was fired by the Sarnia battery of artillery from the gunboat Prince Alfred, which was anchored out in the river.

The preparations on the wharf were on a grand scale. A pavilion and marquee had been erected, the floors carpeted and the structures adorned with flags. There was also a grand stand. As the Governor-General stepped ashore the crowd cheered loudly, the Guard of Honor presented arms, and the band accompanying it played “God Save the Queen.” His Excellency and party were met upon the landing by Mayor George Stevenson, and the members of the Town Council. Addresses were then presented from the Town Council, the County Council, also from the Chippawa, Oneida and other Indian tribes. The members of the Town and County Councils, and a number of others, were then presented, and the Governor-General and the Countess were next conducted to the marquee, where they held a reception. This over, the Vice-Regal party were taken for a drive about the town, in the course of which they passed through several arches. The Vice-Regal party was taken in a steamer to Point Edward, where they remained for the night in the Grand Trunk buildings.

The reception given to His Excellency by Sarnia was one of the most enthusiastic he has yet met with, and everything connected with it is most creditable to the town.

FUNERAL OF THOMAS B. HARRIS.—The funeral of the late Thomas Bird Harris, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M., took place on Thursday afternoon. Representatives of the Fraternity from all parts of Canada and the United States attended, and assisted at the obsequies. The procession was formed in Prince's Square by R. W. Bro. Hon. H. B. Bull, Grand Marshal, and marched to the residence of the deceased, and from thence to the Church of the Ascension. They marched in the following order:—Blue Lodges, Royal Arch, Knights Templar, and the members of the higher orders of Masonry, Grand Lodge, hearse and mourners. Upon reaching the Church the procession opened out so as to allow the hearse to pass through, which was followed by the Grand Lodge and body of Masons. After the services at the Church, the procession was re-formed in the same order as before, and to the music of the funeral dirge from the Artillery Band wended its way to the cemetery. Here a circle was formed around the grave, and after the usual services, which were read by Rev. Mr. Hobden, the impressive service of the Masonic Order was conducted by Judge Wilson, Grand Master of Canada. After the services were completed, the Grand Master said a few words in relation to the long and constant friendship which had existed between himself and the deceased, but became so affected that he had to desist, and the melancholy cortege wended its way back to the Lodge room, where it separated. The number of brethren who took part in the services were about five hundred.

On Wednesday, 12th inst., as Mr. Robert Timmon, of South Easthope, was unloading a load of peas, the horses ran away, upsetting the load and throwing Mr. Timmon against the fence and under the load, causing injuries which resulted in death in about 8 hours.

His doctrine is humanity and love. 'Never condemn, but convince people of their errors,' is his method of moral discipline. There was a thread of gold running through his discourse. My friend Mrs. Lucas (sister to John Bright) and I were afterwards introduced to him. He gave us a cordial welcome. Surely he is leading the laboring class out of bondage—and is a grand, noble character."

Dr. Manley, of Owen Sound, was seriously injured on Saturday, 15th inst., by his horse falling upon him and which in getting up set his foot upon the lower region of the stomach, causing severe injuries in that part, and possibly rupturing a blood vessel. Good hopes of his recovery, however, are entertained.

Wesleyan Missionary Society.
The fifteenth annual general meeting of the Wesleyan Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, was held in the Wesleyan Church, Ottawa, on Wednesday. There was a large attendance. James Gooderham, Esq., of Stouffville, was called to the chair. The Rev. Dr. Wood read an abstract of the report, one of the most cheering aspects of which is the record of the baptism and admission into the Church in Jeddo, Japan, of two well-educated Japanese young men. These are the first fruits of the labor of the Revs. George Young and Dr. McDonald, Wesleyan Missionaries in that land of idolatry. The following are some of the principal statistics:—In British Columbia and Red River there are fourteen missions and fourteen missionaries; amongst the Indians in the Saskatchewan, Hudson Bay Territory, British Columbia and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, there are 40 missions and 41 missionaries. On the 161 domestic missions in Ontario and Quebec, there are 190 missionaries; to the French in Quebec, 5 missionaries; to the Germans in Ontario, 6 missionaries, and 2 missionaries to Japan, making the total number of missions 259. There are also 31 schools, supported by as many teachers, among the Indians, and 25 interpreters; exhibiting a paid agency in the mission work of 320.

The Rev. Dr. Lachlan Taylor read the financial statement, which showed a very gratifying increase on last year's income. The total receipts for the year ending 30th June last, are \$118,690, being an advance of more than \$10,000 over last year. Of this large income, \$18,328 were collected and presented to the society by the Sabbath School children. The expenditure for the year now closed exceeds the income by \$5,001.

A gratifying case of liberality to the Society's fund was announced, in the receipt from an anonymous donor, from Quebec, of the sum of \$2,200.

The report was adopted, and a resolution was very cordially adopted, expressive of the high estimate in which Dr. Taylor's services were held by the Committee and by the entire Wesleyan connection. Dr. Taylor had previously placed his resignation before the Committee, in view of his immediate departure for Europe, where he will, during the next two or three years, advocate the cause of emigration to the Dominion of Canada, under the auspices of the Government of Ottawa.

The entire amount to be allotted by the Society will probably exceed \$120,000.
