

MINING OUTLOOK IN THE YUKON

Big Record is Prevented by Delay in Placing the Equipment

Yukon, B. C., Oct. 9.—October 9th of the Canadian Yukon Dredging Company arrived from the Yukon on the Princess Royal.

It is possible for the Canadian-Yukon Dredging Company to receive the extra parts and new appliances ordered early in the season from the general manager of the company.

Last fall, for instance, had they been properly prepared, they could have run until the middle of November.

With the season being almost six months in length, or to be exact, six months, this year's operations have been delayed several days at the beginning.

The extra parts for the old dredge are not the only cause of disappointment to the company. Last year a new machine was ordered for delivery this summer.

It was intended to place the new machine on the lower mouth of Bonanza, a tract that was well prospecting last season with a keystone drill.

There remained the question of cost. The right of way will not cost anything, as the C. P. R., which owns practically all the land traversed by the road, will give the necessary land.
