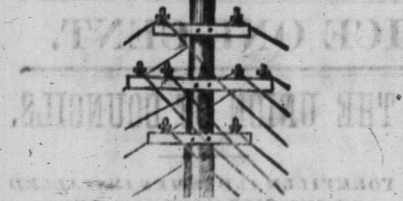

THE TIMES OF COLONIAL INDEPENDENCE.

The London Times has an article, suggested by the recent reception of the colonial agents by Lord Derby, from which it will be seen that our view of the extra importance of the occasion is amply sustained by the leading journal. The London Economist has a similar and stronger article.

My Lord—On behalf of the accredited representatives of all the self-governing colonies, I am charged to offer to your lordship our congratulations upon your acceptance of the office of secretary of state for the colonies, and your resumption of those duties which were usually discharged by you under a former administration.

There is one point in the case which seems especially to strike English critics of our new pretensions. It is that, under the new conditions which have been developed a governor or governor-general is no longer a sufficient medium of communication between the home government and a colonial government.

The Hon. David Laird, ex-governor of Keewatin, has been writing some interesting articles in a Charlottetown paper on his sojourn in the Northwest. That the district is progressive has long been allowed, but the ultimate is the sticking point. It is therefore, interesting to be told by such

The Boston Globe issued a midnight edition on the occasion of the military bill of the Boston Times a week or so ago. The edition contained a five-column account of the bill, and was sold to those in attendance. The sheets were perfumed and sold by "dewdrops" in full dress.

It will now be in order for the other blanket sheet to give a whole page of contrary views from equally eminent authorities, and what will be the good of it all?

The basis of union has been carried at the quarterly meeting of the Methodist church by overwhelming majorities. In many places the voting was unanimous in its favor.

Heretofore the French and English-speaking people in Montreal have lived in almost perfect unity. The contest for the city council now in progress in that city has unfortunately given rise to a good deal of feeling between the two peoples, and the English appear to think that a French-Canadian school teacher has been elected.

We are promised security against amalgamation with any other corporation and against any higher rate being charged than twenty-five cents a word. The latter provision is of the utmost importance, as it must lead to the cutting down of rates all round. The security against amalgamation or absorption, however, is not so much a paper as it is written on, for the simple fact that no power on earth can justify a rival cable buying up the Canadian institution, providing the owners of the latter were willing to sell, and at a good profit they would doubtless be nothing lost.

The nature of the kind is, perhaps, difficult to define, but it is not tolerably clear that as we have relinquished claims which we could not enforce, we have gained a settlement which we could not enforce. The more we leave our colonies free to follow, to grant them favors in London may seem giving them the status of "independent nations." But what of it? Any one of them can declare itself as independent nation to-morrow, and compel us, in the interest of our own interests, to open up regular diplomatic intercourse. We do not say that any one of them would do this, still less can we think that such a course would be any more for the benefit of a colony than it would be for ours to throw it off.

The real power of the government may not be very great in a political battle with the legislature, but his influence as representative of the imperial government may yet have the most salutary effect in elevating and moderating political action. Fortunately, there is no need to enter into any nice analysis of the motive of benefit to the relationship existing between our colonies and the little island which is still in common parlance known. Enough that it is highly proper to both sides, and cannot be managed by anything except ill-fitting or mismanagement, which we venture to think is now-a-days impossible.
