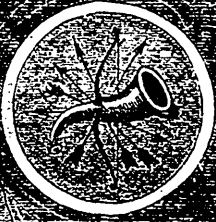

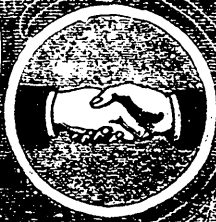

(2) Thereafter on each recurring birthday he shall pay the increased rate for his increased age, as given in the table in the next preceding subsection.

(3) No applicant in the Extra Hazardous Class can be initiated, after passing his *fiftieth* birthday.

(4) An applicant in the Ordinary or Hazardous Class who has passed his *fifty-fifth* birthday, may be admitted to Beneficiary membership as provided in Section one hundred and twenty, sub-section six.

Sick and Funeral Benefits.

The Sick and Funeral Benefits as already stated are optional, and are \$5 per week during 12 weeks of any one illness and \$50 on death towards funeral expenses.

The rates for the Sick and Funeral Benefits are, besides an Enrolment Fee of \$1, which is paid but once, as follows

That at each session, after initiation into the High Court Degree, members of Subordinate Courts attending be admitted to the High Court Degree and received as honorary members of this High Court, and that the Committee on Constitution and Laws report a by-law to that effect. Carried.

At this stage Brother A. McGuire, H.J.B., entered the High Court and assumed the duties of his office.

DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.

Brother Hon. Fred. Dunn, High Secretary of the High Court of Michigan, at this stage entered the High Court, was received with honors due and invited to a seat on the dais.

REPORT OF HIGH OFFICERS.

The High Chief Ranger then presented and read his report, which was circulated amongst the members and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

High Chief Ranger's Report.

Chambers of the High Court of Ontario,
Independent Order of Foresters,
GUELPH, 12th August, 1890.

To the Officers and Members of the High Court of Ontario,
Independent Order of Foresters, in Session Assembled :

OFFICERS AND BRETHREN,—

1. I have the honor to submit to you my report for the past year.
2. To-day we meet in the 131st Annual Session of the High Court of Ontario, and, as your chief executive officer, on behalf of my fellow members of the High Standing Committee and myself, I desire to extend to you fraternal greetings.

MEMBERSHIP.

3. The past year has been one of continued prosperity for our Order in this Province. I refer you to the report of the High Secretary for the statistics which show a healthy increase of membership.

WORK AND PROGRESS.

4. During the year I have had the pleasure of paying 22 visits to Courts. I have delivered 13 public lectures on the objects and benefits offered by our Order. I have commissioned 33 P. D. H. C. Rangers, 20 D. D. H. C. Rangers, and

140 C. D. H. C. Rangers. Wherever I have gone I have met with the utmost kindness from the brethren of the local Courts, the remembrance of which will ever be fondly cherished by me; 40 New Courts were instituted, of which 5 were organized by Brother C. C. Whale, 2 by Brother Thomas Butler, P.D.H.C.R., 1 by Brother R. E. Armstrong, P.D.H.C.R., and one by myself. Since this report was written, I am informed 9 new Courts have been organized in Ontario for the month of July.

5. The membership of our Order, since the separation, ten years ago, is now upwards of 21,000. The following figures show the strides being made from year to year in this province:

6. Our continued prosperity affords a complete answer to those advocates who have lately been rushing into print to attack us. We successfully withstood their assaults when we were numerically weak, now in our giant strength, we can afford to let them write on.

7. Fraternal Societies, having for their object mutual protection and assistance, flourished a thousand years before Life Insurance Companies were known. They are the natural outcome of man's gregarious nature. Communities combine for mutual aid and assistance. From the earliest days, in every civilized country, aggregations have been formed for more specified purposes of mutual benefit, and designed to cover almost all the needs and wishes of man, which can be helped by association.

8. They were known to the ancient Greeks and Romans. In the mediæval period they were very active. In the 18th century, numerous mutual aid societies sprung into existence, many of which are in active operation to-day.

Fraternal societies combining cheap insurance, such as does our Order, stand forth before the working classes as permanent institutions, like life insurance to the wealthy classes.

In England they are encouraged and fostered by the government, which receives their funds on interest, and legislation in their behalf was known as far back as the end of the last century.

The principle upon which our Order offers insurance is identical with that of the life Companies except that our rates are lower, as do they, so do we, depend on the principle of substituting the certainty which attends the futures of large numbers of men for the uncertainty which belongs to the future of each.

I fully believe that the superstructure of our noble Order stands upon a sure and certain foundation; that within its Constitution is embodied a system entitling it to the respect and confidence of all fair-minded men, and that under its triune motto of "Liberty, Benevolence and Concord" it will continue to be the comforter of the sick, and the friend of the fatherless and widows in their affliction.

9. After meeting all death claims and paying all the expenses there has ever remained a balance in hand at the end of each year which has gone on with steady increase until it now exceeds \$200,000.

10. Why then our Order should be singled out for attack can only be explained away by the reason that our wonderful success and progress has excited the envy of others.

DELEGATES.

11. You will remember that according to the Constitution you now have it in your power to reduce the representation of Subordinate Courts at the sessions of the High Courts. In view of the very large representation the Subordinate Courts may now send, it is fitting that at this session you consider the question.

12. My immediate predecessor in office, in his annual report recommended an amount be placed to the credit of the High Chief Ranger to enable him to visit Courts. No action having been taken by the High Court on that clause of his report, I confess the inaction in a sense had its influence upon me, for, whilst willing and anxious to visit as many Courts as without an undue sacrifice of my private interests, I could, I yet felt a delicacy in drawing upon the funds of the Court for my expenses incurred in visiting. In this I may have misunderstood your wishes and allowed a mistaken sense of delicacy to prevent my doing more for the Order than I did.

THE ORGANIZER.

13. I have much pleasure in presenting you with the report of Brother C. C. Whale, to whose untiring zeal and indefatigable and successful efforts in furthering the interests of the High Court, I desire in the name and on behalf of the High Standing Committee to bear tribute. In him we have a worthy officer

one who has shown himself deserving of your confidence, and who has exemplified the wisdom shown in creating the office and in appointing him to it. Very many letters have reached me during the year bearing testimony to the good work done by the brother.

14. At the last session of the High Court it was ordered that Brother Whale's expenses be paid by retaining \$2.00 out of the \$5.00 initiation fee of every member brought into the Order through his instrumentality. The brother set out upon his mission endeavoring to follow out those instructions but signally failed, through no fault of his, however, but rather for the reason that when visiting weak Courts he found it very difficult and often impossible to obtain that co-operation from resident members necessary to enable him to successfully canvass for new members. In some cases the candidates would not present themselves for nomination until after Brother Whale had left. The brother reported to me this difficulty. After receiving full explanations from him, I thought I would be best serving you by directing him to forego the *de per capita* until such time as I could ascertain the opinion of the High Standing Committee, which I caused to be called together, and to the members of which I submitted the facts as I had received them. The Committee decided that in their opinion to exact the sum would be to minimize the brother's usefulness, and directed him not to collect the amount. The wisdom of our decision is proven by the flattering report of Brother Whale, and I trust you will see your way to indorsing our action.

DEATHS.

15. During the year the death rate underwent somewhat of an abnormal increase owing to the ravages of "la grippe." 63 of our brethren have passed through the valley of the shadow of death, and gone to the Court above

"Where the tears of earth are dried;
Where the hidden things are clear,
Where the work of life is tried
By a juster Judge than here,
Father in thy gracious keeping,
Leave me now our brothers' sleeping"

16. Our financial position is one for mutual congratulation. The High Secretary's Report, for the first time, shows us not only to be entirely free from debt, but in money and supplies we have a handsome surplus.

17. Immediately after my election to office, I addressed a circular letter to all Subordinate Courts, wherein, among other things, I called attention to the necessity of all such Courts being clear upon the books of the High Court at the close of the financial year. The High Secretary has reported to me that good results flowed therefrom; but that there are still a number of Courts in arrears. Our laws respecting financial matters, of necessity, must be strictly observed, as a continued indulgence in laxity may lead to serious results. Financial officers should ever bear in mind that on their promptitude depends in a large measure the standing of their Subordinate Court.

18. During the year I have carried on a very extensive correspondence in connection with my office. Whilst I have several times been appealed to, yet no serious questions have been presented, and I have reason for believing my decisions have always been accepted, and that under our system all Subordinate Courts are working most harmoniously.

19. From my correspondence I have learned that in some Courts there are Deputies who have not familiarized themselves with the Constitution and Laws, which leads me to suggest, that in nominating a brother for the position, care should be exercised to select one who, from his knowledge of the duties of the office, is best fitted to fill it.

THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS.

20. At the last session of the Supreme Court the Constitution and Laws were amended and rearranged, subsequently an elaborate index was compiled so that now the book is a model one, reflecting credit upon those entrusted with its compilation.

THE HIGH STANDING COMMITTEE.

21. During the year the High Standing Committee held but three meetings, the interests of the High Court not requiring more.

22. The High Standing Committee is of the opinion that it would be well for this High Court to emulate the example of the Supreme Court in offering prizes to Subordinate Courts to induce greater activity in increasing the number of members, and that the subject should be considered at this session.

The High Standing Committee is also of the opinion that organizers working under the High Court should receive greater encouragement, and to that end that they should be allowed \$75.00 of the \$100.00 Charter fee obtained on instituting a new Court.

23. Owing to the large number of Courts within the High Court Jurisdiction it is practically impossible for one brother to visit all requiring assistance, and the High Standing Committee have thought it well to recommend that you not only retain Brother Whale, (the office itself, in their judgment, being now

an actual necessity), but that you either divide the territory into two districts and appoint a second organizer with salary, or that you place at the disposal of the High Standing Committee a sum sufficient to enable the employment of an assistant as occasion may require.

24. This year you are not called upon to vote any sum for expenses of delegates to the Supreme Court. The High Standing Committee have thought, therefore, you might consistently appropriate a sum say, \$500, towards the expenses of the representatives at the High Court Session.

25. I cannot close my report without acknowledging, thus publicly, my lasting gratitude to my fellow members of the High Standing Committee. From them I cheerfully received much valuable aid and counsel, which proved of great assistance to me. I desire also to make mention of their activity in their own districts in visiting Courts and in imparting instruction and brotherly advice.

26. I have thus spoken of them collectively. I feel, however, I owe it to our worthy High Secretary to emphasize my acknowledgments of gratitude to him for having freely given me the benefit of his greater experience and better judgment. With him I have been in almost daily communication throughout the year, and I have ever found in him a wise counsellor, a zealous and pain-taking officer and a kind and loving brother.

27. And now my dear brethren the time has come for me to restore to you the trust you gave me. When I accepted your generous gift at our last Annual Meeting, I did so with misgivings that want of that experience, so necessary to a proper discharge of the duties appertaining to the position, would stand in the way. Though I have endeavored to serve you faithfully, I confess to a feeling that I might have done more, very much more, to further the interests of the Order. In handing you back, therefore, the trust you honored me with, I ask you to draw a veil over my shortcomings, and to remember only, however little, the good, that in your judgment, I may have done. BROTHEREN.—With reverent and heartfelt gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the preservation of health and strength, we are to-day permitted to assemble, as a High Court, in this Royal City.

It is with satisfaction, that after a year of very hard but pleasant work, I have the privilege of again reporting continued progress, an increasing membership, and that the harmony within our borders remains undisturbed.

Since last we met forty Courts have been instituted, and 2,977 have joined our ranks, the roll at present being as under:

As regards the finances you will be gratified to learn that we owe no man anything, that after paying for the large quantity of supplies now required, salaries, expenses, and some heavy outstanding accounts, a surplus remains in the Treasury.

For your information I append statements showing money received, assets, supplies in stock, etc. [The statements alluded to will appear in the printed minutes.]

The Organizer and Instructor, Brother C. C. Whale, has performed his duties in an exemplary manner. His assiduity commended by the High Standing Committee, and the many letters, in my possession, received from Deputies of the Courts visited, are most complimentary. His report speaks for itself.

Notwithstanding Brother Whale was kept busy, without intermission, the rapid strides made by the Order necessitated others engaging in the missionary field. In this connection, and coming more immediately under my notice, I may mention Provincial Deputies Brothers Thomas Butler and R. E. Armstrong, as having rendered efficient service.

No petitions nor memorials reached me in time for insertion in the June FORESTER. Since then I have received two memorials proposing certain amendments to the Constitution which I tabe with this report.

THE INDEPENDENT FORESTER.

To the High Chief Ranger and my other colleagues I tender thanks for personal courtesy and kindness, as well as the cheerful readiness they evinced to aid me in the discharge of arduous and responsible duties.

I likewise desire to express grateful appreciation of many kindly acts rendered by the Head of our Order and the Executive Council, who have always treated me with the utmost kindness.

To the membership I am under deep obligations for generously overlooking imperfections and giving cordial support, which fraternal consideration I am glad of this opportunity to thankfully acknowledge.

Since last we were in council, sixty-three brothers have been taken home, leaving to us the sacred trust of caring for their loved ones. May we be faithful and, imitating the virtues of those gone before, be worthy of meeting again "seeing the angel faces smile, which, hushed in grief, were lost awhile."

Brethren, it has been the aim of your officers to "advance the interest, promote the welfare, and preserve unaltered the reputation" of Independent Forestry. How far they have succeeded it is for you to judge. Whatever be your verdict may we, inspired by the benediction of the widows and orphans sheltered beneath the banner of our noble Order, put forth greater effort to extend usefulness in advancing the interests of the brotherhood.

clause permanent disability, this disability to be considered in connection with and governed by the trade, occupation or profession the disabled has been engaged in, and so registered in the books of the Supreme Court.

Referred to the Committee on Constitutions and Laws.

A RIGHT ROYAL WELCOME.

At this stage it was announced that the Reception Committee of Court Guelph, No. 37, was waiting in the ante-room to tender the High Court the welcome of Court Guelph to the Royal City.

The High Chief Ranger appointed Brothers Joseph Jamieson, Q.C., M.P., and James B. Halkett, H.S., a committee to introduce the deputation. The committee retired and on returning introduced to the High Court Brothers James Hewer, John Haugh, Robert Haugh and J. A. Lillie, members of the Reception Committee of Court Guelph. After the committee had been escorted to the platform Brother James Hewer, on behalf of Court Guelph, read the following address of welcome :

The High Chief Ranger declared a recess for thirty minutes to give members an opportunity to become better acquainted.

On resuming business,

Moved by Brother A. E. White, seconded by Brother T. D. Bailey :

That this High Court views with disfavor parades and demonstrations of all kinds on the Sabbath, and hereby petitions the Executive Council to select in future the evening of a week day when the members shall be asked to attend church in a body to return thanks for divine favors received during the year.

Moved in amendment by Brother G. W. Holman, seconded by Brother Rev. A. K. Birks :

That all after the word "that" in the original motion be struck out and the following inserted : "While disproving of unnecessary display in church parades this High Court wishes to reaffirm its belief that all Subordinate Courts should at times attend divine worship as a body, said times to be at the discretion of the several Courts so long as the Courts conform as nearly as possible to the constitutional authorities of the Order.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Rev. W. B. Carey, S.Ch., seconded by Brother Dr. Oronhyatekha, S.C.R.:

That the motion and amendment be laid on the table.—Carried.

A motion to that effect prevailing the High Court adjourned until 8 o'clock this evening.

Tuesday Evening Session.

The High Court resumed business at 8 o'clock this evening, High Chief Ranger, Brother N. F. Paterson, Q.C., presiding.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and confirmed.

On motion, the High Court was reduced to work in the Subordinate Court Degree.

COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND LAWS.

Brother Dr. Oronhyatekha, S.C.R., Chairman, brought in the first report of the Committee on Constitution and Laws, which was adopted.

[NOTE.—This and the second report of the same Committee are consolidated in the final report.]

A number of members were then initiated in the High Court Degree and admitted as honorary members of the High Court.

TIME OF HIGH COURT MEETING.

Moved by Brother Rev. W. B. Carey, S.Ch., seconded by Brother Montague :

That the Rules of Order be suspended to permit the introduction of a motion to fix the date and location of the next meeting of the High Court.—Carried.

The following dates were then moved, namely :

Wednesday Morning Session.

CITY HALL, GUELPH, 13th August, 1890.

The High Court assembled at 9 30 o'clock this morning, and resumed business, Brother N. F. Paterson, Q.C., High Chief Ranger, presiding.

The minutes of Tuesday evening session were read and confirmed.

CONSTITUTION AND LAWS.

Brother Grmiston, Secretary, brought in the second report of the Committee on Constitution and Laws, which report was considered clause by clause and upon such consideration was adopted.

[NOTE.—This and the first report of the same Committee are consolidated in the final report.]

STATE OF THE ORDER.

Brother Edward Botterell, P.S.C.R., Chairman, brought in the report of the Committee on the State of the Order, which was adopted, and is as follows :
To the High Chief Ranger, Officers and Members of the High Court of Ontario :

The Committee on the State of the Order beg respectfully to submit :

That they have again to report the continued prosperity of the Order. Last year this High Court was congratulated on the unparalleled success of the Order throughout the Province, and it is a cause of sincere thankfulness to the Supreme Ruler of the Universe that this success has not diminished, but on

the contrary has materially increased until we now number 12,460 members, an increase of 2,977 during the past twelve months. Much of this success has undoubtedly been due to the energy and zeal displayed by the High Chief Ranger, Brother N. F. Paterson, Q.C., and the Chief Organizer, Brother C. C. Whale, in the discharge of their arduous and important duties, assisted by the Deputies and other officers whose names do not appear in the printed reports before you, but whose services are none the less deserving of record. Your Committee must express their regret that the efforts of the High Chief Ranger have been seriously hampered by the want of funds, owing to the fact that the grant recommended last session for this purpose was entirely overlooked by the Finance Committee.

It is also a source of much gratification to your Committee to report that, notwithstanding the unusually heavy death rate, owing to the late prevailing epidemic, after paying all claims and expenses, there has been a steady increase in the reserve fund until it has now reached the magnificent sum of \$23,000.

During the past year 63 of our brethren have been summoned from their labors with us here below, and have passed through the dark valley to the Great Court above, a number unprecedentedly large, entailing a heavy demand upon our funds. Instead, however, of weakening our position, this has had the contrary effect, the prompt payment of the encumbrances and the steady increase of our reserve fund plainly shows the sound financial policy of the Order. The present standing of your High Court, financially and numerically, is a matter for mutual congratulation. We are entirely free from debt, and have on hand a satisfactory surplus both in money and supplies.

Your Committee desires to express their appreciation of the untiring energy of the High Chief Ranger in disposing of the multitudinous matters connected with his office: his decisions have given general satisfaction and have been acquiesced in by the Subordinate Courts interested, as the deliberate judgment of an officer who has the welfare of the Order at heart, and who is thoroughly conversant in its laws and usages.

It is also a cause of satisfaction to your Committee to note that the harmony in our Order is such that the High Standing Committee have had comparatively little to do, only three meetings having been necessary during the year now past the work having been carried on with the greatest unanimity throughout the entire jurisdiction. If any doubt existed as to the precision of this portion of the report, your Committee have only to direct attention to the courteous acknowledgments paid by the High Chief Ranger to the different High Court officers, whose duty it was to assist him in his work, more particularly the High Secretary, Brother James B. Halsett, with whom he has been of necessity in constant communication. The High Secretary's duties we know to be most arduous, and he has always shown himself to be courteous and painstaking officer.

Your Committee further mark with satisfaction the report of the Chief Organizer, Brother C. C. Whale, and the impetus that has been given to the Order in the localities he has visited, and respectfully suggest that in the future all his time, talent and energy be devoted to building up and inspiring with new life and vigor those Courts that are known to be weak and apathetic, leaving the organizing of new courts to the Deputies and other officers available for this purpose. We have further to say that in this connection we fail to see our way clear to make any recommendation with reference to Clause 3 of the Inspector's Report, inasmuch as the matter has already been referred to the Finance Committee in Clause 14 of the High Chief Ranger's report.

In conclusion, your Committee note with much satisfaction the general work done during the year by the officers of the High Court, and which has, so far as we are aware and can judge by the comments and reports of brethren representing Subordinate Courts, given the greatest satisfaction to the body at large. We trust that through the blessing and guidance of the Almighty Ruler of the Universe, the work done during the year upon which we have just entered may be as satisfactory as that which has been reported during the present session.

Brother John A. McGillivray, Q.C., S.S., brought in the first report of the Finance Committee, which was considered clause by clause, and upon such consideration it was amended, and as amended was adopted and is as follows:

To the High Court of Ontario, I. O. F.:

The Finance Committee recommends as follows:

1. That the High Chief Ranger be granted the sum of \$200

as a slight mark of our appreciation of services, ably performed during the past year.

2. That inasmuch as the work of the High Secretary has very largely increased during the year the salary attached to the office be \$700 for the incoming year.

3. That the High Treasurer be paid the sum of \$225 for the ensuing year.

4. That the salary of the High Inspector for the next year be \$1,200.

5. That the sum of \$25 be paid to each of the High Auditors.

6. That the sum of \$15 be paid to the High Journal Secretary.

7. That each member of the Press Committee be paid the sum of \$10.

8. That the High Messenger be paid the sum of \$8.

9. That the Caretaker of the hall be paid the sum of \$8.

10. That the first clause of the 22nd paragraph of the High Chief Ranger's report be not concurred in, but that the second clause thereof be adopted.

11. That the sum of \$300 be set apart and placed to the credit of the High Standing Committee for the purpose of employing assistant organizers, as occasion may require.

12. That the Representatives to the High Court be paid at the rate of \$2 for each day of actual attendance at the annual session thereof.

13. That the action of the High Standing Committee in not exacting the payment of the \$2, referred to in the 14th paragraph of the High Chief Ranger's report, be sustained.

14. That owing to the fact that High Courts are charged a fixed rate for badges and for all other supplies by the Supreme Court, which does not meet for another year, and hence no variation of the policy of that body in this respect can be made in the meantime, the consideration of the memorials upon this subject of Courts Frontenac and Newburgh be deferred till the next session of this High Court.

15. Referring to the report of the High Auditors, or rather that portion thereof which suggests that the High Court should not furnish supplies to Subordinate Courts unless paid for at the time the same are ordered, we think that the matter should be left in the hands of the High Standing Committee as in the past, particularly in view of the fact that all Courts owing the High Court for supplies are solvent and indeed the most of them are among our very best Subordinate Courts.

16. We take pleasure in congratulating this honorable body upon the happy state of its finances and the efficient manner in which its officers have performed their respective duties during the year that is past, thus giving hope of further success and a promising future.

CONSTITUTION AND LAWS.

Brother Ormiston, Secretary, brought in the final report of the Committee on Constitution and Laws, which was considered clause by clause, and upon such consideration it was adopted, and is as follows : To the High Chief Ranger and Members of the High Court of Ontario, I. O. F. :

Your Committee on Constitution and Laws begs to present its final report as follows :

By-laws for the High Court of the Province of Ontario.

ARTICLE I. SESSIONS.

Sec. 1. The regular session of the High Court shall be held annually.

Sec. 2. Special sessions shall be held as provided in Article 62, Sec. 3, of the Constitution.

ARTICLE II. CONCERNING THE HIGH COURT DEGREE.

Sec. 1. All members of the Order in good standing, other than officers and representatives who attend the session of the High Court, shall be eligible for the High Court degree, and be entitled to sit therein as Honorary Members.

Sec. 2. Honorary Members shall not be entitled to take part in the debates nor shall they have the right to vote on any question nor hold any office in the High Court.

ARTICLE III. REPRESENTATION.

Sec. 1. The basis of representation from Subordinate Courts shall be : Each Subordinate Court with fifty members or less shall be entitled to one representative, and one additional representative for each additional fifty members or major fraction of fifty.

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be elected as provided in Section 88 of the Constitution.

ARTICLE IV. HIGH COURT DUES.

Sec. 1. The High Court dues, payable by each Subordinate Court, shall be at the rate of fifty cents per year for each beneficiary member in good standing upon its roll, which shall be payable in advance, one half on the first day of January and one half on the first day of July, and shall be transmitted by each Financial Secretary with the semi annual returns to the High Secretary.

ARTICLE V.

All supplies used by the Subordinate Courts shall be purchased of the High Court, as provided in Supreme Court rules.

ARTICLE VI.

The order of business shall be as provided in the ritual of the High Court.

ARTICLE VII.

Each Representative immediately after addressing the Presiding Officer shall give his name and address.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS.

These By-laws shall not be altered, amended nor repealed except by the High Court at a session thereof, a two-third vote concurring, provided that no by-law nor any change thereof shall take effect until approved by the Supreme Chief Ranger in writing, and the seal of the Supreme Court attached.

In reference to the subject of making the loss of a hand under certain circumstances a total disability, your Committee, in view of the fact that the Supreme Court, since the last session of this High Court, has given this subject careful consideration, and in view of the fact that as the law now stands the loss of a hand may constitute a total and permanent disability, your Committee deem it unwise to make any change in the present law.

Absurd Comparisons.

From Our Society Journal.

The *Monetary Times*, of Toronto, in criticizing the Order of Foresters, makes a comparison of the amounts levied by the American Legion of Honor, the Knights of Honor, and the Mutual Reserve Fund Association, during the periods of the first four and last four years of their operations, and very innocently asks "why their tables so uniformly show the assessments running doubly as high now as they did during the first four or five years" of their existence, and proceeds to propound a series of reasons which are altogether beside the question, and are in reality no answers at all. It is not because the *Times* does not know, but simply that it serves its mission better, to put interroga-

tories which, if it were only half candid, it would answer correctly. It does not require to be informed that in fraternal societies, assessment associations and old line companies, whose risks have been selected with ordinary care, the death rate is necessarily much lower during the first few years.

The organizations referred to have each reached their normal death rate, the experience of which is a serious menace to the perpetuation of the system of which the *Times* is an able champion.

For assessment associations to meet their death losses with exemplary promptitude and accumulate large reserves at a cost of half that charged by level premium companies, is altogether too disappointing for the latter to sit quietly under. Subterfuge and insinuations and prophecies of collapse no longer avail them. Irrefutable facts are rapid closing the avenues of pure life insurance against them, leaving them to the enjoyment of the banking and speculative features into which old line business is fast resolving itself.

Mr. W. J. McMurty, Manager of the Mutual Reserve Fund for Ontario, vigorously repels the untenableness of the *Time's* prognostications of future increased rates of assessment. In a letter to the editor of that journal on the 25th ult., he says:

Sir,—I have carefully read the article in your issue of the 15th inst., on "The Independent Order of Foresters," and had you not drawn into your discussion the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association, I should not have felt it my duty to ask at your hands for an explanation of the experience of the hereinafter mentioned companies. You assume that the death rate in the Mutual Reserve will increase to such an amount as to compel policyholders either to discontinue or to pay exorbitant premiums.

For this state of affairs you assign four reasons. Applying the same reasons to the level premium companies, I ask, First—Do the New York Life, the Equitable Life, the North-Western of Milwaukee, and the Canada Life receive any benefit by the policyholders "being within five years from the medical officers' hands?" Second—Have they any members nearing to seventy years of age? Third—Do they have any "sifting out of young and healthy lives, with consequent deterioration to the residue?" Fourth—What proportion are the old members to the new? And lastly—Have these companies, and if so, how many, or in what proportion to their business written, paid the face of policies to policyholders at age 97?

The New York Life in 1859 (its seventeenth year) had with 15¼ millions of insurance in force a death rate of \$15.38 per 1000; ten years after, with 102½ millions in force, a death rate of only \$7.45 per 1000; and in 1888 with 419¾ millions in force, a death rate of \$10.59 per 1000.

The Equitable, organized in 1859, had during its first fourteen years a gradually increasing death rate, being in 1873, with 184¼ millions in force, \$12.06

per 1000; twenty-nine years later, with 549 1-5 millions in force, a death rate of only \$11.54 per 1000

The North-Western, organized in 1859, also had during its first fourteen years an increasing death rate, being in 1873, with 61 $\frac{3}{8}$ millions in force, \$10.73 per 1000; for the five years commencing with 1884 the following is that company's experience:

In Force.	Death Rate.
1884..... 98 $\frac{3}{4}$ millions.	\$9 16 per \$1000.
1885..... 110 $\frac{3}{4}$ "	9 11 "
1886..... 127 $\frac{3}{8}$ "	10 53 "
1887..... 147 $\frac{3}{8}$ "	9 06 "
1888..... 172 $\frac{1}{2}$ "	7 81 "

These three companies combined have written since 1859 2,823 $\frac{1}{2}$ millions of insurance, the amount in force in 1888, 1,141 $\frac{3}{8}$ millions, showing that in thirty years 60 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. or 1,681 $\frac{1}{4}$ millions have been lost to the companies, and of this loss death claimed 117 $\frac{3}{8}$ millions, or about 4 1-10 per cent., lapse and defection 1,563 $\frac{3}{8}$ millions, or about 56 4-10 per cent.

The experience by mortality of the Canada Life, as per your own summary, was in 1872 (twenty-five years after its organization), \$4.76 per 1000; 1874, \$10.99 per 1000; 1878, \$9.06 per 1000; 1883, \$11.42 per 1000; 1884, only \$7.50 per 1000; and for the eight months of 1889 less than \$6.50 per 1000.

The above facts seem to me to be opposed to your argument, and are submitted to you for information which will be of interest to not only insurance men, but policyholders and your readers. I have therefore to ask: First—Did the above-mentioned great loss weaken the companies referred to? Second—Was the loss made up solely of young and healthy lives to the deterioration of 45 6-10 remaining? Third—How much of the 117 $\frac{3}{8}$ millions, or 4 1-10 per cent. death claims, was paid to policyholders who had persisted and attained age 97? And lastly—How much of the 1,141 $\frac{3}{8}$ millions, or 45 6 10 per cent., covers risks whose ages are over 80 years? I do not ask you to go to the trouble to ascertain the exact amounts, but, as seems to be the usual course in referring to the Mutual Reserve, approximate or guess at the amounts.

The *Times* has carefully excluded the closing paragraph of Mr. McMurty's letter which, with more truth than poetry, adds:

"I think from the above-mentioned facts that your statements are either without foundation in fact or valueless as arguments, and also that you write them for your journal's benefit without regard to the public interest.

There can be no doubt about that, and the sooner the *Times* submits to the inevitable, and acknowledges the soundness and safety of assessment assurance, when honestly conducted and properly surrounded with safeguards to ensure its stability, the sooner will its opinions become more reliable and its usefulness increased in the interest of those who desire trustworthy insurance at its proper value.

The Court, recognizing the importance of the step taken, presented to their genial Chief a pickle dish and a clock to mark the auspicious event. Whether the Court intended to gently intimate to the Brother that he had got himself into a pretty pickle, and that in future there will always be hands in his home pointing to the hour of his return from Court meetings, and therefore no more "we won't go home till morning" for him, our correspondent saith not. He does, however, send us the following address, which was presented to Brother Welland:

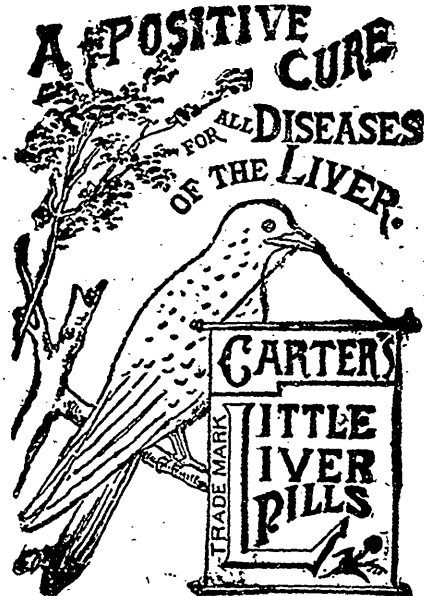

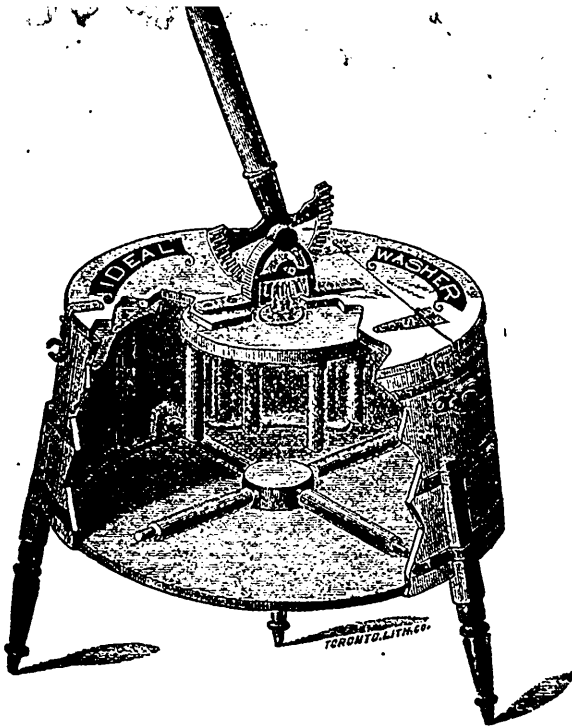

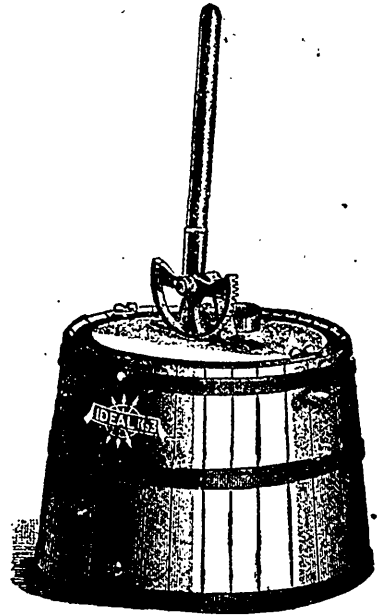
