RULES AND REGULATIONS  
OF THE  
Industrial House of Refuge,  
FOR FEMALES.

SECTION I.

OF THE MANAGEMENT OF THE ASYLUM.

1. The Institution shall be managed by a Committee of Ladies, assisted by a Consulting Board of Gentlemen, of which the Physician, Treasurer, and Secretary shall be *ex-officio* members; and their Report shall be given in at the Annual Meeting, which shall be held regularly in the month of May.

2. The immediate superintendence of this Institution shall devolve upon the Matron, who, under the Ladies' Committee, shall be guided by the following Rules. One or more of the Members of that Committee shall visit the Refuge in the manner and at the times hereinafter specified; but the Members of the Consulting Board shall have access thereto on all occasions. Protestant Ministers, resident in town, shall also have the right of visiting the Refuge, subject to rule iv. sec. 5. The Matron shall keep a book, in which she shall record the name of every one admitted, the date of each admission, her age and religious denomination, the place of her nativity, and her own remarks upon the character and conduct of those received while in the Refuge, and the time and circumstances of their discharge from the Institution.

3. The business of the day shall commence by the Matron reading a portion of the Holy Scriptures, accompanied with the singing of a psalm or hymn (if practicable), and with prayer; and it shall be closed in a similar manner; and both by word and deed the Matron shall endeavour to recommend the religion

of the gospel to those under her charge, always bearing in mind that the salvation of one is vastly more important than the mere outward reformation of many.

4. The Matron shall apportion to the inmates their proper employment for the day, and instruct them in all such handiwork as may not only help to defray the expenses of the Institution, but also tend to form those habits of industry which shall best qualify them to earn for themselves a suitable and honest maintenance.

5. The Matron (assisted by the Members of Committee) shall at all times exert herself to procure such work as may be adapted to the women under her care, and at the same time profitable to the Institution; and she shall insist upon diligence during the hours of employment, as well as correctness in the performance of their task; and, further, the Matron shall not absent herself from the House, beyond what the necessary duties of her office may require, without the consent of the Committee.

SECTION II.

OF THE ADMISSION OF APPLICANTS.

1. Great care must be exercised in deciding upon applications for admission;—guarding, on the one hand, against receiving those who, from caprice, or from the temporary advantages afforded, seek only a temporary lodging; and, on the other hand, endeavouring to afford the means of reformation to every fallen woman, without reference to creed or origin, who seriously desires to amend her life.

2. Applicants shall be received into the Asylum by the Matron, on presenting an order to that effect, signed by two members of Committee. But any one may be received temporarily by the Matron, until the Visitors or Committee meet, to consider the case.

SECTION III.

2. All the inmates who are in health shall rise at five a.m. in summer, and half-past six in winter. Half-an-hour shall be allowed for dressing, private reading, and prayer. Before leaving their room for work they shall open the windows, and spread out the bed-clothes; after that they shall assemble for family worship and breakfast, for which one hour shall be given; then return to their rooms, and make their beds; that done, they shall go to their daily work, and continue at it until 12 o'clock, when they shall dine; and, having dined, they shall rest, or take exercise and recreation, until one o'clock: at that hour they shall return to their occupation, and remain at it until five p.m.; when they shall assemble for tea and recreation until six; from six to eight they shall work at their several tasks. At eight there shall be family worship; after which the inmates shall retire to rest, and every one shall be in bed at ten o'clock.

3. While engaged in the morning and evening worship, due decorum and attention shall be maintained; and during the hours of work, peace and good order shall be preserved. Gossip, exciting or insulting language, and any allusion to past character (except in the way of humiliation and thankfulness) shall be most strictly prohibited.

4. Implicit obedience to the Matron, and due respect to visitors, shall be invariably required of all the inmates of the Asylum; and every phrase and gesture, and their whole conduct, whether towards each other or those who may come into their presence, shall be regulated by kindness and propriety.

5. None of the inmates shall hold any intercourse with their friends, or former associates and acquaintances, either by conversation or writing, except through the Matron, who shall hear or read all communications that may be necessary.

6. No one shall be re-admitted who may have been previously expelled the House, or convicted of having left it to return to former habits, except under very special circumstances.

2. Inmates shall be expelled for wilful and habitual violation of any of the foregoing Regulations; or for any other deliberate offence, opposed to the object and design of the Institution.

## SECTION V.

### MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

1. In case of sickness, the Matron shall immediately notify the attending physician, and shall rigidly abide by his prescriptions, who alone shall exempt the inmates from work on account of ill-health.

2. Great attention shall be paid to the communications from those who may apply to the Asylum for servants; and when families shall receive any of the inmates, they shall promise to correspond with the Secretary of the Ladies' Committee, respecting her subsequent conduct; and a record shall be kept at the Asylum of the reliable information received of those who shall have been taken out to service.

3. The Members of the Committee shall endeavor to procure employment for those who shall have given satisfaction in the Asylum; they shall exert themselves to restore to favor and confidence such penitents as may have parents or relations in the country; and, further, they shall supply with what may be necessary, those who have to journey a distance to join their friends, or enter upon service.

4. No stranger shall have access to the Asylum, or be allowed to address the inmates without the special permission of a member of the Board or of the Committee; and the Matron shall be most careful to prevent infractions of this rule; but it shall not operate to prevent the friends of the Matron from visiting her in her own apartments, at fit and proper times.

5. There shall be a Religious Service in the Asylum every Sabbath day; and it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Ladies' Committee to see that this regulation is duly attended to.

6. The Matron shall make out a list of articles required during the week, and present it for approval to the Weekly Committee, at the time of their visit. The said list, being approved, shall be endorsed by the Presiding Member, and duly executed by the Matron.

7. The Committee shall hold a meeting on the first Wednesday of each month, at 11 o'clock a.m., when they shall inspect the House, examine the accounts, order payments, and transact other recurrent business, and the Consulting Board shall meet quarterly, on the first Thursday in May, August, November, and February, to examine generally into the affairs of the Institution, and to consider any matter bearing upon the great objects intended to be subserved by all Institutions of a similar kind. On such occasions the Committee shall communicate officially with the Board in writing, or personally by its officers.

8. The Committee shall, at each monthly meeting, appoint a sub-committee of visitors for the month, consisting of eight members, or of two for each week; and it shall be the duty of the visitors of the past and present weeks, to meet at the House, with the Minute Secretary and, if possible, with a Directress and the Cash Secretary, every Tuesday forenoon, at 11 o'clock, for the purpose of arranging the visitation for at least three days in each week, receiving and discharging inmates, receiving payment for work done, paying current expenses, and attending generally to the prescribed duties of visitors.

9. No by-law shall be passed unless it shall have been proposed at the preceding monthly meeting of the Committee of Management.

10. The meetings of the Board and of the Committee shall be opened and closed with prayer.

11. The Committee shall choose annually from their number three Directresses, one Recording and Corresponding Secretary, and one Cash Secretary.

**DUTIES OF DIRECTRESSES.**—One of their number shall, if possible, be present, and they shall preside alternately at all meetings of Committee, and no special meeting shall be held without the written sanction of at least one Directress, upon receiving a written requisition from at least three members of Committee.

**DUTIES OF VISITORS.**—The Visitors shall, during their term of appointment, exercise a general supervision over the inter-

nal affairs of the Institution; see that the laws are duly enforced; and give religious counsel and instruction to the inmates, as they have opportunity; and being held responsible for the discharge of those duties, no member nor officer shall interfere with the internal management of the Asylum, except in the discharge of their special duties, or otherwise through the Visitors, or at the meetings of Committee, or sub-Committee.

**DUTIES OF THE RECORDING AND CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.**—The Ladies' Secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all meetings, giving the resolutions submitted in full, with the names of their movers and seconders; and shall conduct all correspondence under the direction of the Committee and Directresses. Notices of meetings shall be posted by the Secretary to each member of Committee, in all cases, two days before the meeting is held.

**DUTIES OF CASH SECRETARY.**—The Duty of the Cash Secretary shall be to keep a detailed account of receipts and expenditure, and of work done by the inmates. She shall receive the subscriptions, and make out the monied list of Subscriptions; and pay current expenses. A specified sum for disbursements shall periodically be drawn by her from the Treasurer, but only by vote of the Committee. The Directresses and Secretary shall see that the Books and documents necessary to an examination of the affairs of the Institution, be ready, periodically, to be laid before the Consulting Board at its regular quarterly meetings, and they shall submit then, or at other times, any business deemed necessary or desirable by the Committee to be brought under the notice of the Board.

**ORDER OF MEETINGS.**—The lady presiding shall, at all Meetings take the chair at ten minutes after the appointed hour; and after calling to order and prayer, shall request the Secretary to read the minutes of the previous meeting, and shall then submit briefly the various items of business for the day. These shall then be discussed separately in order, and all desultory conversation shall be reserved until business duties are fully discharged, and the meeting declared adjourned.

## RESOLUTIONS

ADOPTED AT THE

# ANNUAL MEETING,

*Held 1st June, 1855.*

The Annual Meeting of the supporters of the Institution was held in the Hall of the Mechanics Institute, on Friday evening the 1st June; JOHN ARNOLD, Esq., the President of the Institution, in the Chair.

The Meeting was opened with prayer, by the Rev. William Reid; when Mr. Lesslie was requested to read the Report for the year.

After the reading of the Report and exhibiting the Treasurer's account, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Lett,  
Seconded by R. H. Brett, Esq.

1. That the Report now read be adopted, and that it be printed and circulated under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by the Rev. William Reid,  
Seconded by Mr. Lesslie;

2. That as the religion of the Bible pre-eminently displays the love of God to man in sending his Son into the world, to seek and save the lost, it is both the duty and privilege of Christians to engage as co-workers with the Saviour, in seeking to restore and save their fellow-sinners."

3. That among the most wretched and least hopeful in the world, is that class for whose benefit this society has more especially been established, that so universally is purity appreciated in the female character, that on a single deviation from the path of virtue, without reference to the weakness of the individual, or the strength or circumstances of the temptation, the victim of vice is too generally regarded as an outcast from society, and under the influence of despair, is led to pursue a life of sin, or is hurried to an early, if not to an untimely grave ; and that it is therefore peculiarly binding on Christians to provide a refuge for the early transgressor, as well as for others who may desire to return from the error of their ways."

That this meeting desires to express its gratitude to God for the measure of success which has attended the operations of this society during the first two years of its existence ; and while earnestly desiring a large increase of fruit, would seek to be guided by the principle of duty, leaving results in the hands of God, and resting upon his faithful testimony, that "in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

## REPORT.

---

In the early part of the year 1853, some individuals, deeply impressed with the wretched and hopeless condition of the male outcasts, who nightly are found wandering the streets of our City, suggested the adoption of some means for their relief and recovery to society. The suggestion was favorably received, and means were employed to raise the requisite funds, and to organize a society of such friends of the cause as were deemed "most likely to harmonize and become its efficient agents."

The appeal to the Benevolent of all denominations for aid was met in a spirit of generous liberality, and the Institution was established, although on a very limited scale at first, until the probability of its usefulness had been tested by experience. During the first year of its existence, although the results were comparatively small, yet the measure of success which had attended the labors of the Society, and the magnitude of the object to be attained, encouraged its managers not only to prosecute the work in which they had engaged, but, if possible, to enlarge the Institution, and establish it on a permanent basis.

At the first Annual Meeting, which was held on the 20th March, 1854, the difficulties arising from want of proper accommodation, the inadequacy of the premises which had been rented to receive the applicants for relief, and to afford opportunity for the classification deemed essential for their recovery, led to a proposal to raise by subscription the sum of

£1,500, in order to erect a suitable building—a site being then anticipated as a gift,—or otherwise to lease larger and better premises, if they could be found.

The Board of Managers, after making the necessary enquiries, called a meeting of the friends of the Institution on the 20th. April following, and reported that a suitable building could then be purchased at a reasonable price, and in a retired locality. The meeting, therefore, resolved that subscriptions should be raised in the several wards of the City, to effect the purchase; but the unreasonable opposition excited by parties living in the vicinity of the building, and other causes, led to the abandonment of that intention, after a considerable amount had been subscribed, chiefly through the labors of the President, who immediately afterwards left for England. The Board and Committee resolved, therefore, to continue the Asylum as before, on its limited scale, until the increasing claims of the objects of the Society, and the indications of Providence, should appear to warrant the proposed extension of its operations and responsibilities.

In reviewing the details of the Institution for the year, or from January, 1854, the Board and Committee have reason for gratitude to the bountiful giver of all good, that their labour has not wholly been in vain, and that encouraging evidences have been given that some have been relieved from suffering, some rescued from a life of infamy, some restored to their friends, and one, it is hoped, has been led to the Saviour, "whose blood cleanseth from all sin!"

During the period named, 30 individuals have been under the protection of the Society, whose ages have ranged from 15 to 40; the average being 23½ years. Of these at least three-fourths are victims of intemperance. Two only have been found of sober habits, and one of these appears to have

More than one-half of the entire number could read, several could read and write; and a few are said to have had the advantage of pious parental instruction, and had been attendants at Sabbath school; but these are the sad exceptions, it is believed, to the early history of the unhappy victims who have come under the influence of the Society.

The record kept by the matron of the Institution, shows that six have been sent into the service of respectable families, and are doing well: four have been restored to their friends: three have been taken into the House of Industry: three or four,\* the number now remaining in the Asylum, are in a hopeful condition; and one has died in the Hospital under circumstances which induce the belief that there was "hope in her death;"—that she had, in the hour of her extremity, "fled for refuge to lay hold on the hope set before her in the Gospel." On the other hand, eight have been discharged from the Institution at their own request; two or three have been dismissed for bad conduct; two who had gone hopefully to service have returned to their evil ways; three have been admitted twice; one three times, and one four times into the Asylum. Amidst these discouragements, which are necessarily incident to the most desolate of all the fields of benevolent and Christian labour, there is abundant cause for gratitude that so much fruit has been reaped within so short a period; an amount which, though small, may be found, on examination to equal that of any similar institution in large cities.

In New York, with its large population, where an Asylum has been in existence for 21 years, the number of beneficiaries under the influence and protection of the Society which supports it, is only sixty. Of these, four were provided with respectable homes as domestic servants, twelve returned to

their friends; six withdrew by consent; twelve left without permission; five were sent to the Penitentiary Hospital, and two died a hopeful death. The Society record, in their Report for 1854, clear and satisfactory evidence of the gratitude both of the beneficiaries and their friends, for the aid the Society has afforded in plucking some as "brands from the burning," and restoring them to their relatives, to society, to the church, and it is to be hoped of some, to spiritual and eternal life. The moral results of the operation of the Institution in this city, as compared with that of New York, are therefore clearly calculated to encourage and stimulate in this important work.

The industrial aspect of the Institution is also equally gratifying and encouraging, and proves, in the most satisfactory manner, the efficiency and fidelity with which the matron has discharged the duties of her onerous and important office. It appears that the total amount of work done at the New York Asylum, where sixty individuals had, during the year, been brought under its protection and care, was about \$128; while the avails of work, during the same period, in the Toronto Asylum, where only thirty individuals had been under its protection and care, exceeds \$157. That is, the industrial proceeds of the latter, in proportion to the number of individuals, is more than double that of the former, and this is more gratifying as several of the inmates had to be instructed in the ordinary branches of needle-work by the matron, after they had entered the Asylum. Steady, useful employment forms an important part of the remedial means employed by the Ladies' Committee for the recovery of the inmates, and in order to fit them for service at home or with others.

The Board and Committee record with gratitude the important services which have been rendered to the Institution



various ministers of the Gospel, who have, in rotation, afforded religious instruction to the inmates every Lord's Day throughout the year. This, together with the daily reading of the scriptures, morning and evening, and the religious instructions given by the weekly visitors and matron, have resulted, there is reason to believe, in awakening some to a sense of their sin and danger, and in leading them to seek to be delivered from the snares of vice in which they have been held.

One of the most important agencies connected with the institution, has been the periodical visits of the ladies to the Asylum, which is steadily occupied by the unhappy victims sought to be recovered by this Society. It is from this agency, principally, that the Asylum has been able to gather in the outcasts; and while the visitors have to add their testimony to that of all others, as to the fearfully hardening influence of licentiousness on the hearts of the individuals, yet they also record with gratitude that their visits have been kindly received; while under the faithful and affectionate appeals of Christian love, the exhibition of the grace and mercy of God our Saviour manifested in the Gospel, many a weeping eye has given testimony that the springs of sensibility had not wholly been dried up in that moral desert, and that *that* Gospel is adequate to the wants of the very chief of sinners.

The importance of keeping open an Asylum for those outcasts from society, who cherish any desire to return to the paths of virtue on being discharged from prison, may be seen in the fact not only that they have generally neither home nor friends, but that they are watched for by those monster criminals who keep their haunts in the most infamous houses of infamy, and live by the ruin and death of woman. The Christian community of Toronto are not sufficiently alive to the gigantic form which the vice of systematic licentiousness has assumed in the city. It is gratifying to learn that, through

the commendable efforts of his worship the Mayor, active means have been adopted of late to trace out those dens of infamy, to ascertain their number, and to check the moral dissolution they are spreading throughout society.

It is said that no less than ten houses of bad fame exist in this city and neighborhood, of a notoriously public character, besides others which are not generally known; and there is reason to believe that the most wicked artifices are being employed to supply them with victims. Many unsuspecting young females, and particularly such as are strangers in search of situations or employment, have, it is believed, been enticed into those haunts of vice, detained by force, and ruined, perhaps for time and eternity. It appears, therefore, to be the duty of the Christian philanthropist not only to stretch out the arm of benevolence to save those perishing victims of crime, but to try to discover and remove the causes which lead to their ruin. Were those monster criminals who trade in the debasement, the sufferings, and the ruin of woman, to be consigned upon conviction, to the Provincial Penitentiary for a period of seven years, or during the term of their natural lives, instead of escaping, as they often do, upon the payment of a fine, or a brief imprisonment, the number of those houses of infamy would no doubt be greatly reduced. This subject is therefore respectfully commended to the consideration of the civil authorities.

It has been suggested by some that the Society might, with some advantage, extend the sphere of its usefulness without impairing its success, by affording temporary shelter and employment to certain other classes of friendless female criminals on leaving the jail. Cases of this kind have come under the notice of the committee, and they recommend a change of the name as therefore desirable on this account, and because the
