The Chibeha Indians, under the leadership of their chief and high priests, assembled periodically on the shores of the sacred lake, the chief having his body covered with gold dust. There they placed their offerings of gold, precious stones and household treasures on a rude raft, which, when it was heaped up with the priceless cargo, was rowed to the centre of the lake by the chief.
