

The wages of a builders' laborer are now 25 cents an hour, but it is said that at least half of the men employed at this work are gettling several cents an hour more, and these naturally are averse to quitting work. At the meeting several of the speakers referred to the plumbers' strike, and the statement was made that it had not affected the builders' laborers in the least, as they had still all the work they could do.

onk they could do. Street Railway Will Compromise. It is now stated that the threatened street railway strike will be averted by the company increasing wages all round to 24 cents an hour.

The highest pay now received by the motormen and conductors is 21 1-2 cents an hour, and they have put in for an increase of 8 cents an hour.

One reason for making such a big demand is that under the new Lernieux. maind is that under the new Lemieux law any wages dispute they have with the company must, if an agreement cannot be reached, be submitted to a board of arbitration, and the men believe that under those circumstances they would stand a good chance of getting a substantial advance.



Increases of capital continue to appear with considerable regularity. The announcements this week are all in the shape of bonds and include \$10,000,000 Delaware & Hudson, \$13,000,000 General Electric, \$5,000,000 North American, and \$2,500,000 Karawha & Michigan. The market does not yet receive such increases with favor, and the various interested issues, whether assumed or real immediately respond to the news by selling off. The capital increases since the first of the year will require a good deal of time to digest. Most of them have had to be taken by under writing syndicates, who expect to destribute them at a profit, A stock market similar to that now on is no assistance to developing a buying power for surplus securities. If for no other reason than this a bnoyant stock market must follow at a later date.

The advance in sterling exchange rates has been the only determining point in the money market. The danger of gold exports has not met with any attempt to offset them by a general rise in money rates. There is a lever which can be worked if exports of the yellow metal are not wanted, and which will probably be used. The European money markets give no evidence of being strained, the Bank of England statement for the week showing a continuance in improvement in this institution. The New York bank statement was decidedly favorable, viewed from any standpoint, and should ameliorate the sentiment that might be aroused at gold exports. A cessation in the advance of commodities will find the public all long of grain and cottor futures, and either out of or short of stocks, the result of which is not hard to guess.

Domestic securities are still insintidity dull.

Domestic securities are still insipidity dull, with a tendency in the majority of cases towards a lower level of values. The price changes since a week ago have only been narrew in the majority of instances, but in cases of Canaddan General Electric the fall has amounted to upwards of six points, while in Twin City the decline has been about half that amount. Here and there small advances have occurred, such as in the Rio and Mexican stocks and honds, and Dominion Coal. These latter movements have been at the instigation of the pools, who have the stocks in hand. Just why these shares should have been made strong at a time like the present, when sentiment is directly apposed to market advances, is not plan, but the supporting interests evidently have some design bemeath the movements.


