The Kinsky Palace was plundered of its furniture, which was thrown through the windows, heaped in the street and set on fire, the mob preventing the fire brigades from approaching.







To indicate how much more generally the returns are being made, it need only be said that while in 1895, 78,076 births, marriages and deaths were registered, the number last year was 86,630. Tae laterage of returns is chiefly as regards births and deaths, for so far the clergy have been negligent about complying with the law, which requires them to make returns as regards marriages to the Registrar-General. Under the new act, all license issuers have now to make returns of licenses issued to the department, and by means of this provision it has been discovered that the clergy have neglected to report no less than 1500 marriages within six months.

The death rate for the entire province is 10.9 per 1000. England's rate is 18.7 per 1000. Toronto's rate is 15.1; Hamilton's 14.1; Ottawa's 21.1; London's 11.9.

There were 6.5 marriages for 1000 of population, i.e., 13 persons in every thousand got married during the year. More wedded in towns than in rural districts, and more in border towns than in other parts of the province. In Windsor the marriage rate was 53 per 1000, i.e., 100 persons out of every 1000 entered marrimony during the year. This is probably due to the fact that many couples cross the line to marry under the laws of Canada.




