Rioting and Bloodshed at Prague, Bohemia.

CZECHS ATTACK GERMANS.

Three Hundred of the Latter Are in the Hospitals.

The Trouble Arose Over the Proposal to Make the Teaching of German in the Schools Obligatory—Anyone Heard Speaking the German Language Was Sure to be Attacked—The Disturbance Amounts Almost to an Open Rebellion—Cable News.

Prague, Dec. 1.—As a result of the riots and disorders of the last twenty-four hours the authorities have proclaimed the city under martial law. The chief of police who is a Czech, was discovered encouraging rioters and has been suspended from office. It is now known that the number of injured Germans reached 300. They are being cared for at the various hospitals.

The disturbances to-day have amounted almost to a rebellion. Thousands of Czech miners streamed into Prague this evening from the surrounding villages to assist the rioters. The scientific instruments in the German university and High school have been destroyed, and valuable archives preserved for a long time at the Kinsky Palace, the largest in the Altstadt, have been burned.

Two special sufferers from the riots are Baron von Achenthal, a representative of the German land-owners in the Reichsrath, and Count von Salla. Baron von Achenthal's palace is on the Wenzelsplatz. The mob smashed the windows and tore out the window frames. Similar outrages were committed in other parts of the city. The rioting is the editorial office of the German paper Bohemia.

During the night the Achenthal palace was boarded up, but the rioters soon returned to the palace and threw large stones into the luxuriously furnished rooms, smashing valuable objects of art and costly furniture. The constant cry of the rioters was "Down with the Jews!" Ladies venturing on the street were obliged to be accompanied by a man in order to avoid being attacked. Russia and France to Oppose. London, Dec. 2.—It is reported here in the United Kingdom that the views of the Russian Government have undergone a marked change in the situation at Chou Bay. Seeing the large force that Germany is assembling, it is reported that Russia is assembling a force to oppose German action.

A special despatch from Shanghai says that the Chinese Government has arrested for assisting in the murder of German missionaries.

It is currently reported here that France, Germany and Italy are in a compact for acquisition of Chinese territory. Germany taking Kiangsu, Russia Manchuria and France taking Fo-Kien and Formosa.

TURKEY'S TROUBLES. Five or Ten Thousand Albanians Said to be in Full Revolt.

Vienna, Dec. 1.—It is reported here that the Albanian revolt, which recently broke out in the districts of Ipoh and Diakovo, northeast of Scutari, is increasing in seriousness. The Bulgarian and Servian Governments have dispatched considerable bodies of troops to the disaffected district, and sharp fighting has already occurred between the insurgents and the Ottoman troops sent to subvert the Albanian and Montenar. Between 5000 and 10,000 Albanians are in full revolt against Turkey.

DRUMMOND RAILWAY DEAL

A New Development Which May Make Things a Little Awkward.

Remember that the Merchant Government Will Play the North Shore Game and Demand From Interested Parties a Return of the Money Paid by the Egan Government in Subsidies—Mr. Egan of Chicago Looking After Transportation Facilities for His Business—Comments on Centre Toronto.

Montreal, Dec. 1.—(Special)—An important piece of news comes from Quebec regarding the attitude of the Government of this province towards the famous Drummond Railway deal. It will be remembered that the late Premier Mercer subsidized the Drummond Road to a very considerable amount, and now rumor has it that the Merchant Government will make a demand upon the interested parties for a return of this very handsome sum that the Province of Quebec paid to help this famous road. This will of course be exceedingly embarrassing to Mr. Egan, the head-quarters of the expeditionary force, and Oundrum, near Khartoum, the stronghold of the Derwishes. The latter has it upon record that he has a goodly quantity of the return of the subsidies paid to the North Shore Railway after that line became a portion of the Canadian Pacific system.

Mr. Egan is on Business. It is now stated that Mr. Patrick Egan, ex-American Minister to Chili, who is engaged in a very intricate grain shipping business in Chicago, and who is now in Montreal, has come here to see what facilities the Canadian railways offer for quick shipment to Portland, St. John and other ocean ports served by the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways. It appears that the Vanderbilts and Arnolds of New York have engaged to advance all the expenses in most of the shipping winter, consequently a great many other leading shippers of the west, finding themselves entirely shut out of the possibility of exporting by New York, have turned their eyes towards Canada. It is known that Mr. Egan, who assumed a good fortune while engaged in the trade in Dubin, and then lost it in Irish politics, has to some extent regained his former financial standing.

ABLE LAWYERS ENGAGED.

For the Second Time on Trial for His Life.

B. B. Osler for the Crown and E. F. Johnston for the Prisoner.

Great Interest Manifested in the Case in Brazebridge and Vicinity—Many of the Jurymen Challenged and Rejected—The Prisoner Looks This But Shows No Nervousness—Over a Dozen Witnesses Examined the First Day.

Brazebridge, Ont., Dec. 1.—William Hammond, who is charged with having poisoned Katie Tough in 1886, and on whom former trial the jury failed to agree, was brought before Judge Meredith and a jury here to-day. The prisoner looks thin and pale, but showed no nervousness. Mr. E. F. Johnston is his defender, while Mr. B. B. Osler is Crown prosecutor.

The case is causing intense interest here the community. Hammond's god father had a seat at his son's side.

The Crown challenged 17 jurymen, and 15 were told to stand aside.

The jury is composed as follows: W. H. Morgan, Brunel; William Lowe, Ryde; Wm. Clarke, Chaffey; John Dale, Franklin; Wm. Grilly, Chaffey; John A. Clarke, Stated; Harry Field, Sinclair; Charles Ferris, Draper; William Spang, McLean; G. W. Frank, McLean; Robert Hutchinson, Dunster; and S. T. Vincent, Stephenson.

Mr. Osler opened.

In opening, Mr. Osler reviewed the whole case in a speech of nearly an hour's duration.

The first witness was William Gahrdt, a Provincial land surveyor, who identified a map made by him of the district in which Katie Tough was killed.

Miss Ida Campbell and Miss Annie Bailey found the body of Katie Tough on the night she died. It was about five minutes to 9 o'clock, and the girl was alive at the time she was found, but died ten minutes after being removed to the house of her father.

James McAllister of Muskoka stated that the prisoner had been to his house on the night of the murder, and that he had seen him after being removed to the house of her father.
