Another Triumph Marked
Mr. Whitney and His Touring Colleagues Speak to 1000 at Thessalon.
HEARTY WELCOME EXTENDED.
Thessalon, May 7.—The tour of Mr. Whitney and his colleagues through Ontario has been marked by another triumph. To-day they arrived here in the evening addressed 1,000 people in the skating rink, which had been gaily decorated for the event. The party's reception here was a repetition of what they have met with at every place they have visited on their tour. There was the same cordial welcome extended to them, and the meeting in point of enthusiasm was not less than that which they had held during the entire campaign.

Australia Goes into Iron.
The establishment of an iron industry in New South Wales, which has been often proposed and discussed, seems at last to be probable. A syndicate, headed by Mr. W. Jamieson, is arranging to build extensive works and to take up the offer made by the state of a long-time contract to furnish rails, bridge work and other material for the state railroads. The new company proposed to use some of the South Wales iron, but the bulk of its supply will be drawn from the Bytne River deposits in Tasmania, upon which very favorable reports have been made. The works are to be located on the Parramatta River, near Sydney, where supplies of fuel and flux are to be had and where the Tasmanian ore can be delivered by water. The company is arranging for the erection of works to turn out about 150,000 tons of finished iron and steel yearly, a considerable part of which will be required to fill the government contracts.

Sweep Them Out.

There was little feature to the local stock market today, prices exhibiting a little firmness on the demand dropped, C.P.R. as for some days past, attracted most of the buying, and the international price apparently allow of trading on both sides of the market. MR. TARTE FEARS MORGAN AIMS TO INJURE CANADA

Continued From Page 1.

could gather there was nothing objectionable in Mr. MacLaren's motion, but being submitted as an amendment retained from accepting it. He was glad, however, to have Mr. MacLaren's motion so thoroughly understood the importance of the question.

Mr. Fisher went on to say that the difference between Canada and the United States in freight rates to Europe was not due to the difference in cost of transportation by land, but to the higher steamship rates from Canada than from intermediate ports.

This was chiefly due to the higher insurance rates on the St. Lawrence route. The sum of \$200,000 was spent in improving the aids to navigation on the St. Lawrence, and the result, he hoped, would be to lower those rates. As for the charge of discrimination by the railways, Mr. Fisher thought it would be remedied by the Railway Commission. He was surprised that Canadian carriers had not established a line of freight steamers, to do business on our waterways between the Great Lakes and Montreal.

Railways Discriminate. Jabel Robinson declared the subject was the most important one that has been discussed this session. To prove that the railways discriminated against the Canadian waterways, he produced two shipping bills from the same railway company. One was for 100 pounds of live cattle from Chicago to Boston. The other was for 100 pounds of live cattle from Toronto to Boston. Besides there was a charge of 50 cents on the Chicago shipment, so that there was a discrimination of \$1.14 per hundred of every animal shipped by the Canadian farmer.

Serious for Canada. Mr. Tarte said that, while it was too early in the day to say what was to be the effect of the Morgan steamship amalgamation, yet, for himself, he believed it would be a serious proposition for Canada to face, but he did not despair. We were not so poor that we could not provide for our own needs. The reason the Canadian waterways were not used to a greater extent was that we had no port at the entrance to the Welland Canal, which a big lake steamer could unload. He was providing that facility at Port Colborne. The canal system would be completed next year, and he would ask the leaders of both parties in the house to respect his work. He regretted that the procedure would not allow the government to accept the motion, but he believed the hon. member for having given the government the benefit of his great practical knowledge and his ability, as applied to this question.

Georgian Bay Canal. (Thomas Murray (Lindsay) said that the facts and predictions as to the great production of grain in the West were strong arguments in favor of constructing the Georgian Bay Canal. He was disappointed that Mr. Tarte had placed so much emphasis on the deepening of the River Rouge route, and completing a survey and canalizing the same. There was a divergence of opinions as to how the canal should be constructed, but he was himself in favor of the government building it, as it would be the means of opening an important part of Canada's grain trade.

E. P. Clarke spoke in favor of the route, and gave reasons to show how seriously the canal route was discriminated against the St. Lawrence route. Mr. Kemp, in reply, addressed, and supported the resolution, as did Mr. Bell of Pictou and Dr. Reid of St. John's.

Large New Vessels. Mr. Tarte, replying to a question by Dr. Reid, said that large new vessels for inland traffic were being constructed in Canada, to which Dr. Reid replied that, at that rate, he had no fear of the effect on Canadian commerce of the Morgan Steamship Trust.

Friday resolution was then put to a vote, which, in view of the refusal of the government to accept it, was thus made a party issue, and so the session of the Cheese King was voted down by 33 to 43.

STAMP OUT ANARCHY.

Police Chiefs in Annual Convention at Louisville Urged to it.

Louisville, Ky., May 7.—The ninth annual convention of the Association of Police Chiefs of the United States and Canada was called to order here to-day by Mayor Chas. W. Granger. About 225 delegates were in attendance. Chief Richard Sylvester of Washington, the presiding officer, opened the convention by reading the annual report, urging the necessity of the police chiefs taking steps to stamp out anarchy. He said that the organization should be made an international organization, and that the directors of safety of all countries should unite in this movement.

CRUSHED TO DEATH.

St. Thomas, May 7.—A fatal accident occurred at Newbury yesterday afternoon, by which a man was crushed to death. The frame of a grist mill for Joseph Hetherington was being raised, and Mr. Archer, one of the men who was assisting, the chain holding the bottom of the mill broke, and fell, crushing Mr. Archer dead. The body was at once summoned, but the victim was before he arrived.
