1st ALL WORK TO CEASE, RED FLAG TO FLY IN WARSAW TO-DAY MAY BE ANOTHER LODZ

Social Democrats by Proclamation Call on Workmen for General Strike as Protest Against "New" Crimes of Emperor's Government.

People Inflamed and Clash-Already Occurring With Police—Processions Dispersed and Troops Are Patrolling Factory and Jewish Districts.

Warsaw, June 25.—The proclamation issued yesterday by the social democratic party of Poland and Lithuania, calling on workmen as a protest against the Lodz massacre, declares that in order to show the solidarity of their brethren and to protest against the new and heinous crimes of the emperor's government, all Warsaw must stop work to-morrow.

The proclamation orders that not a single factory or workshop shall be operated and that offices, shops, restaurants and coffee-houses must close and all traffic must cease. It says that the red flag, the flag of the workmen, must float in the streets of Warsaw and call up on all workmen to help their brethren arrange a general strike.

The military authorities are patrolling all the streets in the factory and Jewish districts to-night. In the suburb of Praga, a day workmen shot at a crowd of two policemen. In a crowded street, a crowd of workmen and soldiers were fired on both sides. Three civilians and one policeman were wounded. In other streets processions of workmen were dispersed.

Beginning of Bloodshed. Rioting commenced last night. Guards charged a crowd and infantry fire was opened. The crowd was also armed and fired upon. A street police agent was stabbed. Processions were formed at 6 o'clock and the military authorities were ordered to clear the streets.

Lodz, Russian Poland, June 25.—"Black Friday" in Lodz surpassed all the horrors of "Red Sunday" in St. Petersburg. While it is not yet possible to ascertain the exact number of victims, estimates place the killed at over 100, possibly 200, and the wounded five times that number.

World Office, Saturday Evening, June 24. The tone of the Wall-street market has been strong throughout the week; the market factors conducive to such buoyancy being, in fact, the same as those which have been reasons for the advance for the time being ignored. Stocks, good, had and indifference, have shared in the patronage of the supporting interest, and few chances have been afforded the shorts to operate the market for profits. That a bull movement should eventuate at a season when large stock operators in the ordinary course of events would expect to holiday and forget, if possible, the turmoil of the market, is, perhaps, the best indication of the existence of the present situation. MURDEROUS DOPE FIEND
MAY HAVE THROWN SWITCH

Wanted in Cleveland for Murder and Seen Near Mentor Wednesday Night.

Cleveland, O., June 24. — Detective investigating the wreck of the Lake Shore Twentieth Century Limited at Mentor tonight announced that they believe the switch causing the disaster was thrown open by the man who murdered Marion Bushnell here a week ago last night. This man was seen near the scene of the wreck early Wednesday night. The description of him tallies with that of the man who killed Bushnell, and the fugitive is known as a desperate dope fiend. He murdered and robbed Bushnell, a prominent West Side resident, after he had befriended him.

Coroner Sieglestein began an investigation of the Mentor wreck today. He disclosed facts which he believes to be of great importance. He found evidence that the switch was not thrown immediately before the advancing train, but had been open for some time; that a boy probably did not throw the switch; that a water plug was almost directly in line between the switch light and the west track; that for the tracks 300 yards westward the switch is concealed; that directly beneath the water plug is a switch exactly like the one that caused the wreck. Sieglestein believes this light may have been mistaken by the engineer for the one farther on and that until the farther switch was almost reached did he see the red danger light. He says Lake Shore employees have complained for years of the switchlights at Mentor.

General Superintendent Storrs said in reply to Sieglestein's statements that he could state positively that the engineer and fireman saw the light of the switch that caused the wreck.

New York, June 25.—James W. Alexander yesterday returned to Paul Rowan, chairman of the board of directors of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, the sum of \$25,000.22, his share of the profits in the Equity Syndicate transactions.

This act indicates clearly that all the officers and directors of the Equitable will attempt to save themselves from the prosecution threatened by Attorney-General Mayer and District Attorney Jerome by turning back to the society their shares of the loot they accumulated thru their connection with the society.

It is expected that within the next week all those who have shared the profits of the transactions of the "James H. Hyde and Associates" syndicate will return their profits to the society, provided they can raise the money.

Mr. Alexander's action has been expected for several days. It was all that he could do in view of the attack he had made upon Mr. Hyde, and Mr. Hyde yesterday cleared the situation in the Equitable by issuing a statement in which he denied absolutely the story that his father had received a percentage from all the premiums paid into the Equitable, and that on his death this arrangement had been adjusted by the payment to the Hyde family of the lump sum of \$5,000,000.

TOLEDO PASTOR AMAZED AT TEMPERANCE MASS MEETING

Nothing Like It in Toledo With Half the Population and Five Times the Saloons.

Rev. E. B. Allan of Toledo, O., at the temperance mass meeting in Massey Hall, held by the C.T.L. yesterday afternoon, said that the meeting was unique. There was nothing like it in the United States wherever he had been. He was amazed when he entered the hall and found 5000 people assembled, and when he heard from the speakers of the work the organization was doing. In Toledo, which has less than half the size of Toronto, there were five times as many saloons. It would be an exaggeration to say that school delegates to carry home with them the seed of the great movement in which Canada led the van. Mr. Allan is pastor of the Washington Street Church, Toledo, and is a delegate at the Sunday school convention.

The convention chorus, numbering about three hundred singers, under the leadership of Dr. McPherson, of Jacobs of New York, formerly with Mr. Moody, evangelist, led in the singing and contributed anthems and solos.

Hon. J. W. St. John in welcoming the delegates to Toronto, said that the epitome of the work which the Canadian Temperance League is doing, and referred to its fifteen years of continuous work and the great influence it has been in moulding public sentiment. Not less than 15 have signed the pledge at this meeting, and the number has run as high as 150. He looked for assistance from the American delegates and trusted that the day would come when the evils of intemperance would be finally overturned on this continent.

J. S. Robertson, president of the Temperance League, said that, also the population of Toronto was only one-half that number. There was not enough attention being paid to pledge signing. He extended cordial greetings to the delegates, and said he trusted that this meeting would be an important step in the work which they would return to their cities and institute similar organizations.

Rev. M. C. Mason, D.D., Cincinnati, Ohio (colored), secretary of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society, said that he had been greeted with applause. He said that the greatest enemy that confronts us today is the liquor traffic. No other traffic was so responsible for crime, pauperism and poverty. It demoralized childhood, ruined womanhood and wrecked the domestic life of the human race. With such a meeting of the kind as this, the liquor traffic would be a thing of the past.
