THOUSANDS VIEW BODY BUT NO ONE IDENTIFIES

Name of the Man Found Dead Near Chatham Still Unknown. CHEATHAM, Jan. 15.—(Special)—Up till 6 o'clock this evening no one had identified the remains of the young man whose body was found in a deserted shanty on the Bloomfield-road yesterday afternoon.

Coroner Bray's report recommends no inquest, for the reason that there is no evidence on which to base one. A bullet hole in the left breast, round which there was a smudge of powder, was seen on the deceased either committed suicide or was shot at close quarters by someone else.

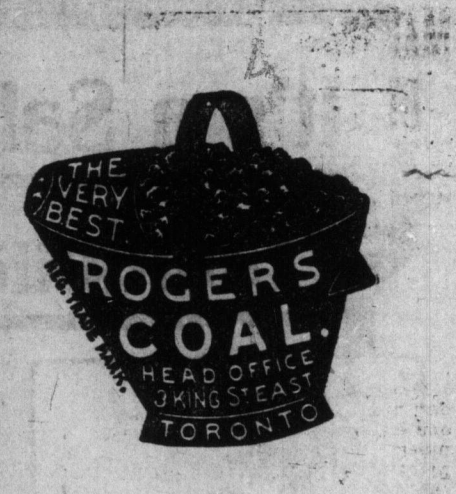

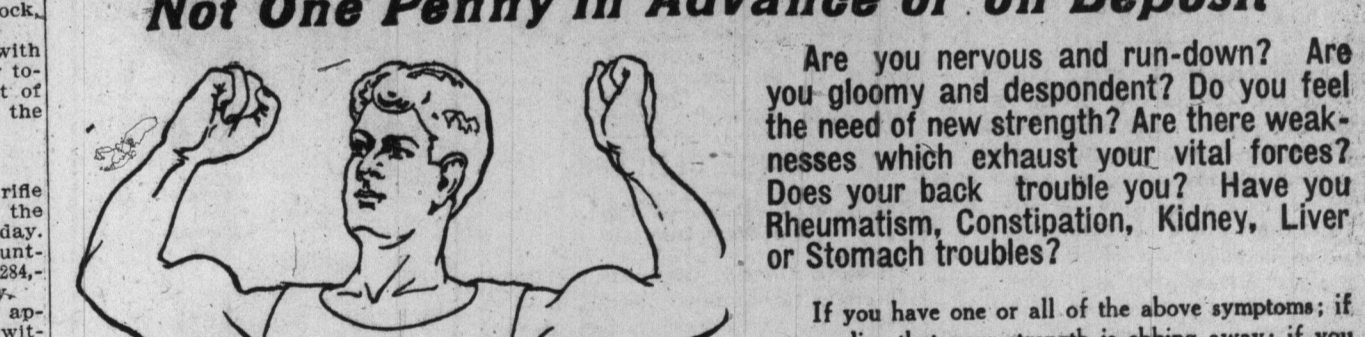
