MAYOR ISSUES CIRCULAR ATTACKING POWER POLICY

Leads for Delay in Signing Whole Contract—Big List of H.E.P. Municipal Candidates.

HAMILTON, Dec. 19.—(Special.)—Mayor McLaren has had a voluminous appeal to the electors printed and distributed broadcast thru the city. He devotes a large part of it to persuade the people that it would be a very dangerous thing for Hamilton to go in for the whole contract of the Hydro-Electric Commission, and to specify his breach of faith to the electors, who, last year, put him into the mayor's chair with a tremendous majority because they believed from his statements and former course in the council that he was a staunch friend of the cheap power project. Instead of winning over the voters, however, his appeal only emphasizes the need of opposition, and makes the electors more determined than ever to have a man in the chief magistracy's chair whom they can trust to make the government power project a success.

After devoting a lot of space to complaining because the power owners last June turned down the bargain watched up with the Cataract Power Co., the mayor attacks the government power project as follows: "No sensible person who had been given an estimate of the cost of a line of goods and an opportunity to find out if the actual cost would agree with the estimate, would refuse the opportunity of proving it before committing himself further, unless there was some personal advantage for him or his friends. Actual experience will demonstrate. There will be no need for argument when the goods are here and the price figured up, for we will have an actual basis to figure from."

"Remember, that when any council signs the whole contract the voice of the people is no longer wanted by those who talk so much about it, for then you would be committed to building a street fighting system and to pay for it whether you wanted it or not, no matter what the cost of power might be, and no matter at what price you could buy it for elsewhere."

Want Stewart to Run.—"Altho the petitions asking him to run against Mayor McLaren are being signed by hundreds, representing every class, T. J. Stewart, M.P., has not yet consented to run. He will give an answer probably to-morrow. If he does not enter the contest himself, there will be another man in the field and Mr. Stewart will give him every assistance."

Just how strong the sentiment against the Cataract Company is, and how eager the people are for government power, is illustrated by the fact that out of 15 candidates for the board of control, only three are Cataract supporters. Some candidates who have been identified with the company, are appealing to the electors as hydro men. The great danger is that the vote will be split up by so many hydro candidates that the Cataract gander may slip in. Efforts are being made to re-

Most Bitter Struggle Yet.—As yet the interest is centred in the contest for mayor and controllers. With a candidate in the field for mayor, whom the people can trust to give the people's power project loyal support, there is little doubt but that the friends of cheap power will make a clean sweep.

Altho there have been three stirring campaigns on the question, all of which have gone against the Cataract, the present struggle will be the most strenuous of the series. The power ring, backed by two of the papers, is showing signs of activity and realizing that the battle will free the citizens from its clutches, will spare no effort to elect a council who will serve its ends.

Another Raid.—The police and License Inspector Sturdy made a raid on Luigi Domenico's abode, Sherman-avenue and Clinton-street, Saturday night and all they could find was six cases of bottles labeled "Lagerine." They seized the stuff after tasting it. It is supposed to be a temperance drink, but it did not prove it.

S. YORK CONSERVATIVES HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Big Rally on Saturday Afternoon—Suburban and County Happenings—News Notes.

The annual meeting of the South York Liberal-Conservative Association, held at the Labor Temple, Church-street, on Saturday afternoon, was a large, representative, and most harmonious.

Dr. W. R. Walters, president, was in the chair, and associated with him on the platform were W. F. Maclean, M.P.; Capt. Tom Wallace, M.P.; Alex. McCowan, M.L.A.; Dr. Godfrey, M.L.A.; W. F. Maclean, M.P., referred to the Controller Geary, Ald. T. L. Church, and R. A. Agnew, president West Toronto Conservative Association.

Reviewing briefly his course in parliament and the outstanding questions before the country at the present time, W. F. Maclean, M.P., referred to the growth of public ownership, as applied to telegraphs, telephones and railways, stating that he would continue his fight against the cutting of the C.P.R. M.A. as before. Mr. Maclean urged the giving of a direct money contribution to Great Britain sufficient to build two or three Dreadnaughts, and charged that apart from the German peril, the American nation were seeking to unify the American continent.

Capt. Tom Wallace met with a splendid reception, as did Dr. Godfrey, M.L.A., and Alex. McCowan, M.L.A., all of whom spoke along practical lines on the leading federal and provincial issues. Controller Geary, Ald. Church and R. G. Agnew briefly addressed the gathering in national and civic matters, and were well received.

Dr. Walters was unanimously re-elected president, Warden Henry first vice-president, and Sam Rydine second vice-president, and H. H. Ball secretary-treasurer.

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YORK TOWNSHIP NOTES. Indications municipally out in York Township at the present time would seem to imply that there will be no election for the position of reeve or councillors.

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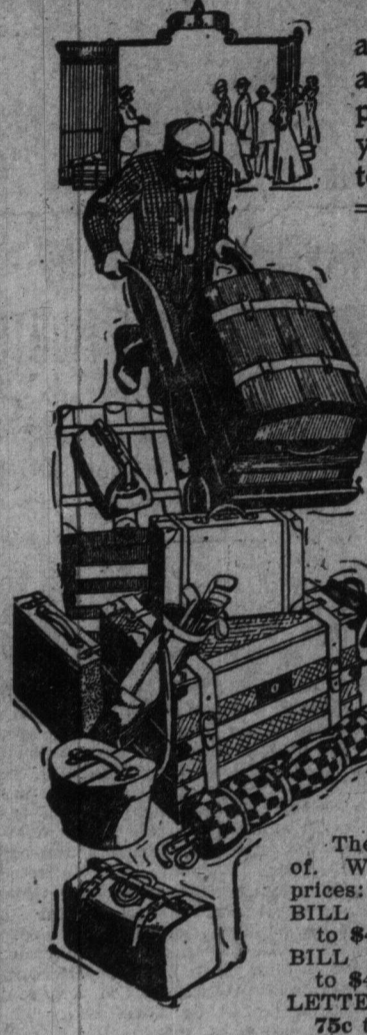
