Austrians Are Clamoring for Early Peace.

Canadian Press Despatch. WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.-A de-spatch from a prominent diplomat in Vienna to his government of which officials here learned today, it is stated, insists that leading financial and busi-ness men of Austria desire peace. The diplomat in a cipher telegram confirms recent press reports from Rome of the dissatisfaction which the Austrian populace feels at the lack of the success of its army and states moreover that indignation has been stirred up among all classes because of the recent reverses suffered at the hands of Servia. The same diplomat's telegram states that reports are persistent in well in-formed circles in Austria that Italy will declare war against Austria about New Year's Day. The Turkish army is said to be supplied with the most modern equip-ment, including armored trains, automo-biles, aeroplanes and heavy mortar bat-tories.
