MONTREAL

PROTESTANT ORPHAN ASYLUM.

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Ladies of the Protestant Orphan Asylum, of the City of Montreal, was held in the house of the Institution, on Tuesday, the 5th January, the Rev. W. Snodgrass, of St. Paul's Church, presiding, when the following Annual Report, was submitted, read, and adopted:—

In a spirit of thankfulness for many blessings received during the year just expired, the Directresses of this Corporation proceed to lay before the members and their kind patrons, an account of their endeavors to execute, to the best of their abilities, the sacred duties entrusted to them.

This is the 36th Anniversary of an Institution, commenced with very slender means, but which has, by Divine aid, been blessed with the power of extending its fostering care to many hundreds of Orphans.

The Treasurer's statements will show the pecuniary status of the Institution, the balance on hand of the General Fund of which is £81 10s. 1d. less than at the corresponding period last year, the amount collected for the purposes of this Fund having, to the regret of the Ladies, diminished to the extent of £217 17s. 2d., as compared with the amount collected last year.

The total expenses of the year, as detailed in the Treasurer's accounts, amount to £513 9s. 9d., being £69 4s. 6d., in excess of last year.

The only deviation from the original intention of the Ladies for the appropriation of the Land Fund, was caused by the very defective state of the wooden out-buildings, which, independent of the danger which might arise from fire, were totally unfit and unsafe, and rendered it necessary that others should be erected in their room.

To enable them to do this, it will be seen that they have expended the sum of £160, collected for the Land Fund, trusting that this necessary deviation, so imperatively called for, will be approved of, and that, ere the last instalment of the purchase money of the land shall become due, their friends will have placed them in funds to meet it. New and commodious out-buildings have been constructed under the gratuitous superintendance of T. Scott, Esquire, Architect, for

whose able services, the Directresses tender their best acknowledgments, as well as to Messrs. William Spiers & Son, who kindly furnished two designs for the same.

After the above allusion to financial measures, the Directresses proceed to that important part of their duties, namely, to an account of the Orphans received, aided, and apprenticed.

During the last twelve months, forty-five orphans, (twenty-one boys, and twenty-four girls,) have received the benefits of the Asylum, of whom four boys have been very advantageously placed out.

At this point, it may be inquired, why, in a country where apprentices are so much needed, and called for, so few have been placed out. An examination of the list of the inmates will afford a ready answer. The great majority of the children are too young. According to the By-Laws, they are apprenticed at the earliest period that may be deemed safe and advantageous for their welfare, to wit, 12 years of age for boys, and 14 years for the girls. But, on the whole, the ladies do not so much regret the long period which these infants have to remain in the Asylum, because the advantages gained by them more than compensate for the care and expense of their support and tuition, for, during that pro-

tracted period, their education, moral and physical training, can be amply attended to. And, consequently, the ladies had rather receive children of a tender age, whose characters they can answer for when they depart, than children within a year or two of the period of apprenticeship, whose habits and morals they are unacquainted with, and who, when bound out, should they behave ill, bring unmerited discredit on the Institution. Whilst on this subject the ladies may be permitted to state here, out of its usual place in their Reports, their continued approval of the conduct of the Superintendant and Matron of the establishment, and, in proof of this deserved commendation, will mention the case of one of the girls brought up in the Asylum, who was indentured to the Ladies of the Corporation for six years, as a servant, and, at the expiration of her apprenticeship, which occurred in November last, asked permission (which was willingly granted) to remain in the capacity of a domestic, stating that she had always found the Asylum "truly her home," and preferred to remain within its walls rather than go elsewhere.

There are 31 children now serving their apprenticeship with respectable families, and the aggregate sum of £130 3s. 10d. has been received and placed at interest for their benefit, to be paid

to them at the expiration of their service, respectively.

The next very grateful, though most difficult duty is to offer well merited thanks for the favors received during the past year.

The most pleasing feature in the donations of this year, is not so much their value (although that was great) in a pecuniary sense, as the varied sources from which they emanated, their continued flow, and the kind expressions with which they were accompanied.

The limits of this report render it impossible to enumerate their benefactors, a list of whom will be found in the Treasurer's Report.

To each and all of them, the ladies here tender their warmest thanks on behalf of their orphan and helpless charge, with a fervent prayer, that they may receive the blessing of our Lord and Saviour, who said "And thou shalt be blessed, for they cannot recompense thee, for thou shalt be recompensed at the resurrection of the just."

The Ladies feel assured those donors will not feel hurt if they individualize for thanks that kind lady by whose exertions so large a sum as £126 was raised for the Land Fund, and without whose zeal and perseverance the improvements alluded to (at least to the same extent,) could not have been effected.

In connection with this Land Fund it may be mentioned that the Institution has already begun to reap some of the anticipated benefits from the purchase, in the healthful employment of the boys in its cultivation and its produce in vegetables of no inconsiderable value.

The happy season of Christmas brought with it a welcome letter from their generous young friend Mr. Robert Finnie, of Marysville, California, enclosing a donation to the Asylum in the form of a County of Yuba, State of California, Bond, for One hundred Dollars, bearing interest at the rate of ten per cent, per annum for thirteen years, the principal redeemable at the end of that period, thus completing the entire contribution of *One hundred and fifty pounds* from that kind benefactor, since the year 1851.

To the Honorable the Legislature of Canada, for their liberal grant of last session, the ladies feel deeply indebted, and pray for its continuance.

To R. P. Howard, Esq., M. D., whose gratuitous and able services are highly appreciated, and duly acknowledged, the best thanks of the Corporation are voted.

To Messrs. Johnston Beers & Co., of the Medical Hall, for the gratuitous supply of medicines, the Ladies offer their sincere thanks.

Without disparagement to all the above generous hearts, may the Ladies not be permitted to allude to those sources from which they can no longer hope to receive aid on earth, and with their thanks record their regret for the loss of those whose personal co-operation, and valuable support, have been forever severed by the hand of death.

Four lamented friends have thus been called away. The late Mrs. Bolton, Robert Armour, Esq., John Siveright, Esq., of the Hon. Hudson's Bay Co., Thomas Williams, Esq., each of whom remembered the cause of the Orphan by a generous legacy, now deposited in the Endowment Fund.

The Ladies before concluding this imperfect sketch, would ask one favor more from their patrons, besides their pecuniary aid, and that is, an occasional visit to the Institution, thereby manifesting a personal interest in their welfare, so grateful to those especially, who have the more immediate charge of the children, assured that no person who possesses a warm and kindly heart can be indifferent to the pleasure derived from the happy little faces that may there be seen, industriously employed in the acquisition of that humble knowledge suited to their station in life, and singing hymns of praise to Him who inspires

the benevolence of those by whose charity they are educated, fed, clothed, and trained up for the Kingdom of Heaven.

If higher considerations were wanting to encourage those of their fellow-citizens who have not hitherto lent their supporting hand to this Institution, the Directresses would most respectfully remind them of the Apostle's injunction, who says "And now let us not be weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not," and also, "I have showed you all things, how that so laboring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said it is more blessed to give than to receive." And, finally, the Directresses fervently pray for all their benefactors, that that God, whose children these are, who are supported and instructed by their bounty, may prosper the work in their hands, and raise up fresh supplies for the administration of this holy charity.
