President's Annual Report

HE Work Undertaken and carried out by the Ontario Society of Artists during the past year has been of an extremely arduous nature. It is safe to say that in no previous year of the Society's existence have there been so many and important public-spirited projects under consideration. This should be very gratifying to us, as by such activity we are strengthening the position our Society occupies in the public mind. Our work as a Society should always be characterized by a disinterestedness which would place this, the recognized body of artists of the province, on the highest plane.

The Term to be Recorded is somewhat less than a year, and though the work of one year must always overlap that of another, there is this year more unfinished work than usual, making it the more difficult to estimate the success which is attending our efforts. There are, however, results which are tangible enough to cite, and evidence of public appreciation which should give us courage and hope.

The Important Function our Society is performing as the representative Art body of the province, has been kept in view during the past year. A careful rearrangement of our works in the Provincial Gallery was made in June last, and the Committee has been in communication with the recently appointed Minister of Education with a view to making some improvements in the administration of the collection.

An Initiative Project of an important nature involving much work is yet in hand. The investigations we have been making during the past two years with a view to promote the founding of an Art Museum in Toronto have been completed and are now published in pamphlet form. A meeting of citizens interested, and societies and bodies affected, has been called to be held in our Gallery on the 15th of March, when the subject will be discussed. It is intended that the Society's particular part in the matter will cease at this meeting, where it is hoped an Art Museum Association will be formed to continue the work we have begun.

An Exhibition of Applied Art has been undertaken, and the work in connection with it has gone on concurrently with the preparations for the present Annual Exhibition, and the Art Museum Meeting; this Exhibition will open as soon as possible after the closing of the Annual Exhibition. It is important that our members should all interest themselves in this work, as its purpose is partly to show that we are interested in the movement to strengthen the union of all the plastic arts.

The Leagues of School Art to which we have lent our aid, and the organization of which was recorded in the report of last year, has met with a very welcome reception by the people throughout the city. Twenty branches have been established in the different school sections, and a central body is now organized to carry out a uniform plan. The work done in this connection by Mr. Hughes, the Inspector, is worthy of our mention. The Advisory Board of School Art Leagues, appointed jointly by our Society, the Guild of Civic Art and the Woman's Art Association, have been called upon to advise on various matters, and a committee of the Board have completed the renovation of the Kindergarten room of the Rosedale School with marked success. The Board have also compiled a pamphlet treating of he subject of School Art, which has been published by the Education

Department and distributed throughout the Province. Such work as this should interest all our members; they should inform themselves upon it thoroughly, so that their influence may be felt in the best possible way. There will no doubt be much variety of opinion as to the best way such activity should be directed, but no one will deny that even should there be some misplaced effort, that it is sure to improve, and bring good results.

The Toronto Guild of Civic Art is wielding a quiet but powerful influence which proves the value of municipal art bodies. The presentation to the City in May last of the mural decorations painted by your President was made an occasion of distinction, and some of the remarks made in the speeches go to show that very soon the Fine Arts bid fair to be regarded as an important factor in our municipal affairs. Steps are now being taken to have these decorations in the City Hall continued, and also to define a scheme of decorative panels for the Parliament Buildings, and to induce the Government to undertake the process of carrying it out.

During the Early Part of the year a special meeting was held to consider the claims of native art to a measure of protection from an unfair competition with imported works of indifferent merit, and it was resolved to ask the Dominion Government to place a specific duty on all imported works of art not the work of Canadian artists, the duty to be of such an amount as would not prevent the bringing in of works of merit and importance, and serve to exclude those which would not be an acquisition to the art possessions of our country. The Society united in a petition emanating from the Montreal Art Association and the Royal Canadian Academy asking the Government to prevent the holding of art lotteries by abolishing the law allowing art unions; a deputation made up of representatives of the Societies waited on the Government at Ottawa, and presented their views on the two foregoing questions, and also endeavored to obtain space for Canadian Art at the Paris Exposition of 1900.

No success can be reported to the present time, beyond the fact that the President, and the first President of the R. C. A. have each been invited to contribute one work to the British Section of the Art Department of the Exposition.

It was mentioned in the report of last year that an effort was being made to bring the collection of Tissot paintings to Toronto for exhibition. This has been accomplished under our auspices, the arrangement having been completed by us, but finding our Gallery too small our responsibility was passed over to the management of the Massey Hall.

A Competition has recently been arranged between our members by the Dunlop Tire Co. for a design, or picture, advertising the Dunlop Tire. A prize of \$100.00 is offered for the best work, as judged by a committee composed of two members of their firm and one appointed by our Society.

The Industrial Exhibition Art Department has been, as usual, under our control; 274 works were hung this year, and considering that no improvement has been made in the Gallery an excellent exhibit was made. Mr. Knowles worked with the Secretary to obtain loans to add attraction to the collection.

The Thanks of the Society are due Messrs. J. W. Flavelle, Esq., Dr. L. W. Sweetnam, A. A. Allan, Esq., G. Booth, Esq., and others for loans of pictures for this exhibition.

Efforts have been Supplemented to those mentioned in the report of last year to have a new Art Building erected at the Industrial Exhibition, a deputation having waited on the Mayor, and the attention of the Exhibition Board having been directed to the matter through our representatives.

An Agreement with the Central Canada Exhibition Association of Ottawa to show 200 pictures at their exhibition was carried out with satisfaction to both bodies.

The 28th Annual Exhibition now open shows gratifying improvement, and promises to be a success in every way. 183 works by 60 exhibitors have been hung.

It is with Regret that we record the loss by death during the year of two members, F. L. Foster and L. R. O'Brien, R. C. A., who was the Vice-President of our Society from 1875 to 1880, and first President of the Royal Canadian Academy.

The Names of five members have been dropped from the the roll. They are as follows:—A. C. Williamson, T. G. Wickson, Harriet Ford, T. H. Wilkinson and J. A. Radford.

Two Painter Members were elected at the last Annual Meeting, Miss W. D. Hawley and Miss Clara S. Hagarty.

Four Names have been duly proposed for election.

The Advanced Life Class, managed by a combined committee of our Society and the R. C. A., has been in operation as heretofore with the exception of the addition of an afternoon class. The evening class is free to those admitted by the committee on their showing capable work.

The Saturday Night composition class has continued its work as usual, and recently gave an evening to a number of young men engaged in various art industries.

The Central Ontario School of Art and Design in affiliation with our Society is demonstrating the high quality of work done in this school in various ways. Many of the students are actively engaged in different art pursuits, and many of their names appear in places of honor in competitions, others are distinguishing themselves in the schools abroad. A small increase of the grant from the city has helped to make the work go more smoothly and rendered it more effective.

The Financial Statement will come before the Regular Monthly Meeting in May, when it will be published in connection with this report.
