

In preserving fruit it is better to use three-quarters of a pound of sugar to one pound of fruit than the equal quantities of each, usually prescribed. Add a cupful of water to each pound of sugar and heat to the boiling point. Skim and add the prepared fruit with a few kernals from the stones and cook until the fruit is clear and transparent. Lemon juice is usually add to peach or pear preserve.


