Venice, Nov. 19—The city has taken on confidence and hope with the visit of Premier Vittorio Orlando, who gave of Premier Vittorio Orlando, who gave directions for the protection and succor of the population, and who noted during a tour throughout the city the calm fortitude with which the inhabitants awaited events. The famous church of St. Mark continues open and frequent masses are attended by crowds of women and children who offer prayers for the preservative of the city.

Venice, Italy, Nov. 18—(By the Associated Press)—The rumble of guns is heard throughout the city by night and day as the fleet and the Venice coast. batteries shell the enemy at the mouth of the Piave. At three o'clock yesterday an Austrian airplane flew over the city, but it dropped no bombs. The batteries of Venice did not fire, but when the machine flew over the Grand Canal Italian torpedo boats discharged a score of shots with effect.

Camouflage as the art of deceiving the enemy has been practised ever since there have been wars ; but it is only in the last three years that it has risen to the dignity of a distinct military art. Before there were aeroplanes there could be no particular reason for concealing and huge man-bearing kites for days when it was windy gave observers with powerful glasses opportunities for noting what was happening back of the enemy lines. Generally speaking, however, it is the aeroplane with the photographer that makes camouflage necessary. If the position of a battery of guns is known to the enemy it can be destroyed. There is very little guesswork about this. It is only a matter of firing enough shells. When the guns are in action their smoke would reveal their position, of course, but at these times the air is usually filled with fighting aeroplanes, which make it a matter of very great difficulty for the enemy planes to approach.

All Positions Photographed.

Each side has a pretty accurate map of the other side's positions, compiled by means of thousands of photographs taken from the sky. The whole position is divided into squares whose distances are calculated with mathematical precision. This map-making cannot be prevented unless one side holds an overwhelming superiority. 

Medill McCormick, Home From Frent, Says Reasons Are Russian Cellapse and Unreadiness of United States

Chicago, Nov. 19—Russia's collapse and the unreadiness of the United States make hopeless any thoughts of peace before 1919, in the opinion of Medili Mc-Cormick, congressmen at large of Illinois, who has just returned after a wisit to most of the Important fronts of the European battle line. Mr. McCormick last night said in parts

"The Germans are not winning the war. Neither are we. The war presents a stalemate from which we are unable to extricate ourselves, because of unable to extricate ourselves, because of the collapse of Russia, and the unreadiness of the United States.

"Nowhere in Europe did I find an informed soldier or public man who believed that military decision could be achieved before 1919, when the United States might add effectively to pressure on the central empires. There is practically no hope that Russia can be useful during 1918. Rusias is so disorganised that she cannot make war. Happily in all probability, neither can she make peace.

"I say very carnestly that we must

make peace.

"I say very earnestly that we must have greater co-ordination of effort. We must have a true war council—such as does not exist in Washington—a council of men who represent in the greatest degree the energy and the genius of America. It will be fruitless if we are ready late."

The treatment of prisoners of war in Austria is most inhuman. Owing to food shortage the rations given to the unfortunate prisoners are hardly sufficient to keep them alive. Sanitary conditions in prison camps are neglected. Proper medical attendance is lacking. Hardly any effort is made to combat contagious diseases and epidemics, with the result that the mortality among the prisoners is appalling. Although insufficiently fed pisoners are forced to work and the hard labor to which they are subjected hastens their exhaustion to such an extent that a large proportion of Italian soldiers return to Italy in a dying condition.


The treatment of Italian prisoners of war is more cruel, as the Austrians bitterly hate the Italians and consider them as traitors because, despite the Triple Alliance; they are fighting against and not in favor of the Central Empires. LARGER U-BOATS TO OPERATE OUTSIDE OF BRITISH WATERS

London, Nov. 19-The lowest record of submarine destruction of any week since German ruthlessness began brings forth an explanation likely to be of the utmost concern to America. It is stated that the British measures of fighting the submarines in narrow shallow waters around the British Isles have been so perfected that Germany is preparing to adopt entirely new tactics. Anticipating the present situation the Huns some time ago began constructing an unknown number of gigantic submarines, about 3,000 tons, capable of 25 knots on the surface. They carry several four or sixinch guns, and can cruise 1,000 miles, remaining at sea two or three months. It is intended to send these on long distance cruises, avoiding the British waters and necessitating entirely different methods of fighting them.
