He entered the Pipes Government without portfolio, but he rapidly became the leading figure in his party, and in 1885 he became Premier and Provincial Secretary. He remained at the head of the Nova Scotia Government until 1896, when the famous Laurier ministry was formed. It was described as a cabinet of all the talents, and it included Fielding as Minister of

# FEATURE ADDRESS.

FEATURE ADDRESS. The feature address of the after-noon's session was delivered by Dr. Calixte Dagneau, of Quebec, on the "Clinical Symptoms of Tuberculosis of the Kidney." He said that the germ of tuberculosis when present in the system was ever circulating and very often arrested or settled in the kidney tract. The signs and symptoms of such a condition were described and the significant signs stressed frequency, he said, was always to be regarded suspiciously and was an early indica-tion of trouble in the kidneys. Find-ings under the microscope were all im-portant, but pain itself was not always significant and a general pain over the kidney region was usualy muscular in origin. origin.

# FAVORS OPERATION.

Surgical removal of the affected kid-Surgical removal of the affected kid-ney in the case of tuberculosis usually effected a cure, however, he said. The general merical treatment for ordinary sysmetic tuberculosis would often prove successful and in the case of both kidneys being involved this was the only resource. The operation for such a condition was a comparatively simple one and should be recommended the speaker maintained. Pathological specimens were exhibited by the loc-turer and served to forcibly illustrate his remarks. **PAPER DISCUSSED.**

In the discussion which followed the early treatment of suspected cases of tuberculosis was stressed and particu-larly when the kidney was involved. Questions pertaining to the subject were asked by several of the delegates and Dr. Dageau in his replies confirm-ind his conviction that early operation was advisable when a positive diag-posits was made and if this was contra-indicated, then a general rest cure was best.

Asked whether animal injection tests were to be relied upon in a diag-nosis of T. B. kidney, the doctor said that for this condition the tests were of doubtful value.

Custard, corn-starch, plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes, baked apple or apple sauce. 6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (cooked two hours). Give from one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter

7 A.M.—Cornmeal, oatmeal, hominy (prepared as in the above schedule). Serve with milk, or with butter and salt. A soft-boiled egg every two or three days. Hashed chicken on toast occasionally. A drink of milk. Bran bis-cuit and butter, or stale bread and butter.

9 A.M.-The juice of one orange.

Spinach, asparagus tips, squash, strained stewed tomatoes, stewed carrots, mashed cauliflower. Baked apple or apple-sauce. Stale bread and butter. After the twenty-first month, baked potatoes and well-cooked strained beans.

3 P.M.—Chicken, beef or mutton broth, with rice or with stale bread broken into the broth. Custard, corn-starch, or plain rice pudding, junket, stewed prunes. Bran biscuit and butter or stale bread and butter.

6 P.M.—Farina, cream of wheat, wheatena (each cooked two hours). Give one to three tablespoonfuls, served with milk, or with butter and salt. A drink of milk. Rusk or stale bread and butter.

The following suggestions have proved to be helpful when properly used with bottle feedings, and they may be used in conjunction with Eagle Brand Condensed Milk.

Always pour the milk from the can into the spoon—allowing it to level itself but not run over. You can readily understand that by dipping the spoon into the can you get more than a level spoonful, because of the milk that would adhere to the bottom of the spoon. # ORANGE JUICE

When baby is four months old, give one teaspoonful of strained orange juice, diluted with equal quantity of boiled water, once daily before feeding time. Gradually increase the amount until you are giving the strained juice of a half of an orange undiluted, once daily before feeding time. Orange juice may be continued until child is old enough to eat other fruits as well as oranges.

# OATMEAL JELLY


When baby is five months old, add one teaspoonful of oatmeal jelly to each feeding. Gradually increase the amount until you are adding three tablespoonfuls of oat-meal jelly to each feeding. To make oatmeal jelly add four ounces of oatmeal to one pint of water; boil for three hours in a double boiler, and add enough water so when cooking is completed a thin paste will be formed. This while hot is forced through a strainer; to remove coarser parti-cles. When cold a semi-mass will be formed. Oatmeal jelly may be continued until child is old enough to eat well cooked whole cereals. well cooked whole cereals.

Oatmeal water very often relieves this condition. To make oatmeal water add one heaping tablespoonful of oat-meal to one pint of water, and boil for three hours in a dou-ble boiler. This will make a little more than half a pint of thick gruel to which add one pint of water that has been boiled. After straining mixture through fine strainer, you should have a little more than a pint of whitish liquid. This should be used with each feeding instead of the plain boiled water. If you find that this makes bowels too loose, dilute oatmeal water with plain boiled water. Barley or rice water may be used instead of oatmeal wa-ter. If necessary two to three drops of plain codliver oil may be given twice daily added to the morning and night feedings.

DIARRHEA

CONSTIPATION

Give nothing but plain boiled water for twenty-four hours. Then start feeding with barley water, or rice water, to which has been added a little salt to improve the taste. If these feedings are retained, and bowel movements lessen-ed, small amounts of very weak regular feedings may be started and gradually increased according to baby's con-dition. If your baby does not improve after trying the above suggestions, consult your doctor at once.



BARLEY WATER

Obtain the very best barley flour. Add one rounded tablespoonful to one pint of water. Boil for thirty min-utes, strain, then add enough water to make one pint.

# **RICE WATER**

Add one tablespoonful of rice to a pint of water. Boil three hours, adding water from time to time so that you will have one pint of rice water at the end of the three

LIME WATER




THE COMING BOUT between Mickey Walker and Harry Greb
