### BRITISH LABOR IS **GROWING RESTLESS**

Early Session of Parliament Demanded to Hear

London, Sept. 28.—Labor is becoming increasingly restive in the face of the prolongation of the Ruhr problems and the spread of unemployment. With a view to trying to get its demands met, labor is doing its utmost to force the Government to convene Parliament, which has adjourned until November 17. A joint meeting of the Trade Union Council and the Labor Party executives yesterday passed a resolution urgently calling upon the Premier to summon Parliament immediately. Such a step was asked the abse of "the extreme gravity of the function in Germany with its inevitable effect on the state of trade, and in view of unemployment, which is heavily increasing without any adequate action by the Government to start sufficient schemes of employment or to assist the heavily burdened boards of guardians."
