C. P. R. SUBURBAN SERVICE
On Monday, May 20th, Canadian Pacific Suburban service will be inaugurated. The service will be practically the same as in past seasons, except that the train which left Welsford last season at 8.15 p.m., and returning left city at 10.15 p.m., will not run until June 3.

In past years it has been customary to provide service on a certain day, known as "clean-up" day, to enable suburbanites to visit their homes and make preparations for the season. For this purpose, on Wednesday, May 8th (only) train will be run to leave city at 9.15 a.m., and on the return will leave Welsford at 8.00 p.m., due in the city about 9.00 p.m. All stops to be made in each direction. This actually means there will be suburban train service May 8th only, and between that date and May 30th, when practically full service will be inaugurated, there will be no other service than regular trains now running.

Cement experts had said the flooring of the cellar had been disturbed since it had been laid. It was decided to investigate a rough spot and then abandon the task. It was here that one of the laborers threw aside a shovel of sand and revealed part of the body. When unearthed the corpse resembled an Egyptian mummy. who lived in the Schmidt home for sev-



"X-ray examination has revealed a spongy condition of the bone marrow and the bone tissue. There are only fifty cases of this disease, which is called multiple myeloma, recorded in the history of medicine. The bone tissue gradually becomes spongy, and its course is insidious, steadily making demands on the blood supply until the patient becomes anaemic. The affliction is caused, I think, by overwork, and insufficient sunlight. Miss Held, however, is determined to fight the thing with her characteristic spirit."

Dr. McCaskey added that Miss Held had not gained in weight since her illness became pronounced. She still weighs eighty-five pounds, he said, although her normal weight is around 115 pounds. To increase her strength a blood transfusion has been made.
