





Building statistics for the province, published in the last number of the Labor Gazette, show that the new work and repairs done in St. John during 1910 exceeded the figures in 1909 by about 30 per cent. The number of permits issued was 164, being an increase of 28 over 1909, and the value of the buildings represented was \$524,475, an increase of \$148,275, as compared with last year. Other parts of the province showed a falling off. In Moncton the amount expended was \$112,915, as compared with \$239,610 the previous year, and in Newcastle district only about one-third as much work was done as in 1909.



THE SUSPENSION BRIDGE

That the provincial government has become convinced that the Suspension bridge is in a serious condition as represented by James Lowell, M. P. P., at the last session of the legislature and denied at the time by a member of the government, is made amply evident by the employment of a gang of carpenters and iron workers to repair the bridge. One of the men in charge of the work said yesterday that the repairs to the bridge would probably occupy the entire summer as the structure would be given a thorough overhauling. 

We shall probably hear no more about an electric railroad down the St. John valley, between two points on the C. P. R. Government Willing to Operate and Furnish Rolling Stock as Part of I. C. R.—Crocket

of the dominion government if the Vancy railway is not built clear through from Plaster Rock to St. John as speedily as possible and operated by the Intercolonial. This afternoon the bill authorizing the government to lease the line and operate it as part of the Intercolonial system, paying as rental 40 per cent of the gross earnings, was put through committee and given a third reading. It is now to go before the senate.

before the senate. In committee the government gave final evidence of its absolute great faith in promoting this important undertaking. When the bill was under discussion Mr. Crocket raised the objection, he pressed so vigorously against the resolution, that the bill required the builders to provide the initial rolling stock before the dominion government could take it over. He claimed that this imposed a burden on the province which had to finance the project by the guarantee of bonds, which would make it impossible for the project to be undertaken.


