Manufacturers represented in Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

What I have said about the woollen mills is also applicable to the shoe manufacturing industry which is suffering acutely on account of inadequate tariffs.

The high freight rates brought about by war conditions are a measure, have been greatly aggravated by the merging of our connecting link the Intercontinental Railway with the Transcontinental and other bankrupt lines, thus imposing on the old interlocking carrying charges which it was never intended should bear, as the I. C. R. was built as an inducement to the Maritime Provinces to come into confederation and thus provide a way of easy access to the markets of the provinces west of Maritime products.

It is true that our great coal industries are in a stagnant condition today and we cannot but view with alarm the great influx of foreign coal into this country. Yet I cannot but believe that this is only a temporary condition and that our leaders will come to realize sooner or later the necessity of maintaining these industries for the Canadian people and take such measures as will stop the flow of the millions of Canadian dollars which are sent out of the country annually for coal which should and can be produced in this country and thus give much needed employment to our own people.

HYDRO DEVELOPMENT.

It is with much interest that we view the development of hydro-electric power in these provinces in the last few years, such as Sheet Harbor, St. Margaret's Bay, Gasperaux and Muskeg. These should all be helpful to many communities in the furnishing of cheap power, and with the still greater development in prospect at Grand Falls it should be a great impetus to industrial, particularly in the Province of New Brunswick.

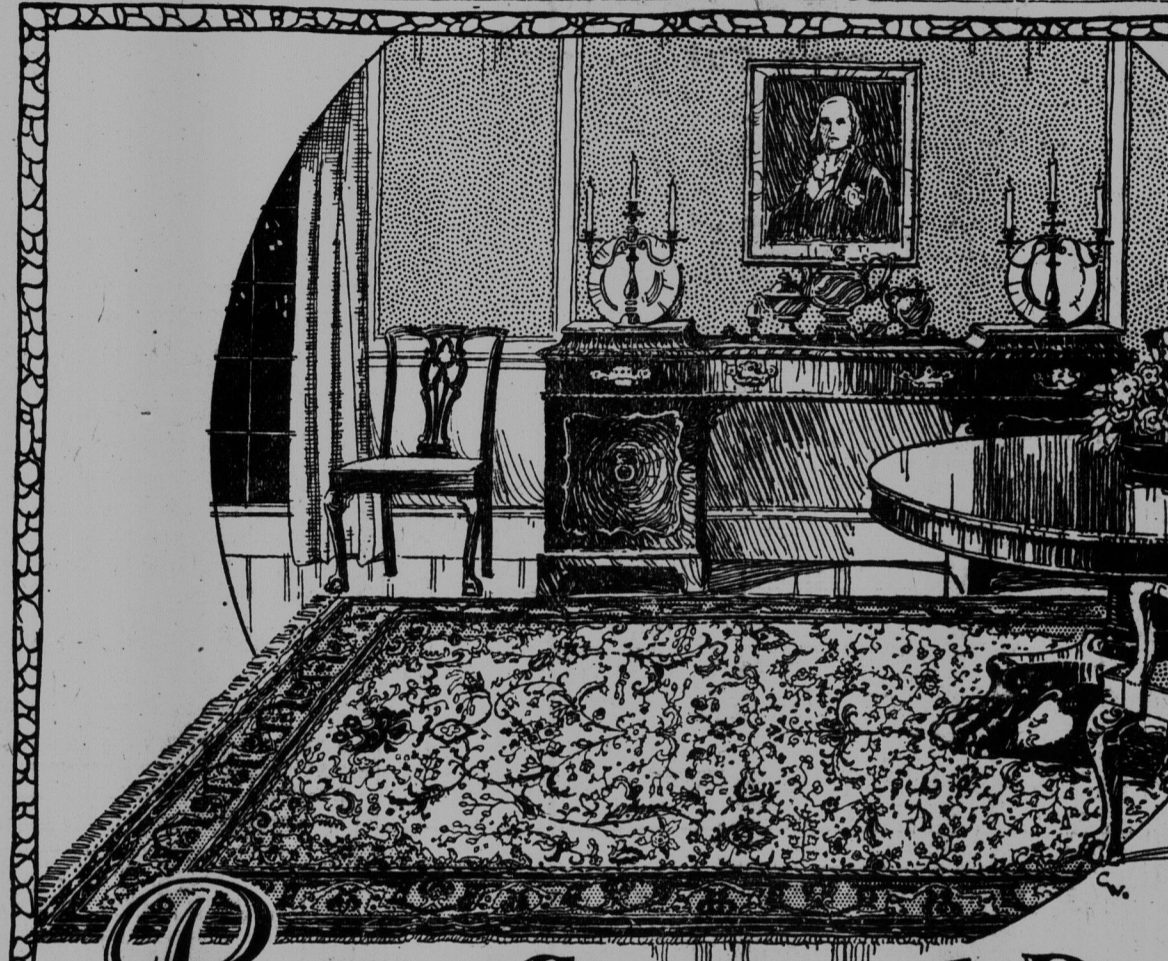
Miss Stewart holds "Thank badges" from both the Boy Scouts and the Girl Guides.

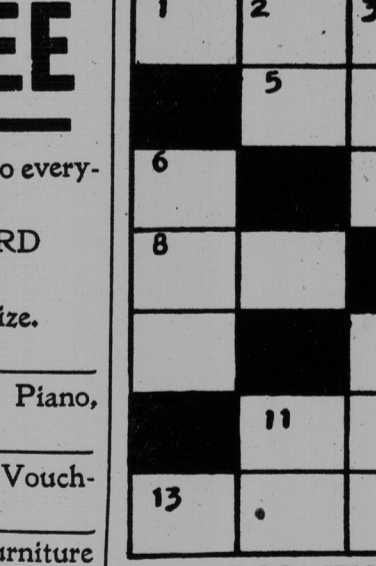

**Armstrong Peace Measure Approved**

HALIFAX, May 6—After a public hearing at which eight representatives of both labor and capital had unanimously voiced their opposition to its main characteristic, Bill 184, Premier E. H. Armstrong's "industrial peace act 1925," passed by the committee of the whole House at tonight's session of the Legislative Assembly, with amendments restricting the scope of its operation to public utilities and coal mines only, and rendering it retroactive to cover any strike or lockout that may be in progress when the act is put into effect.

**THE ROAD TO RECOVERY.**

Sir John Aird, in discussing Canadian conditions yesterday in Winnipeg, dwelt strongly upon the need for greater immigration, saying that an addition of 5,000,000 to Canada's population during the next few years would settle the railway problems. So great an increase would certainly go far in the desired direction, but it is rather too much to expect that the tide of immigration will rise so rapidly. President Beatty, of the C. P. R., in his Association in Montreal last night, returned once more to the immigration question, saying that most thinking men in this country agree that its most pressing requirements to-day are more men and more capital.

Mr. Beatty said he could not conceive a prosperous East without a prosperous West, or a prosperous West without a prosperous East, thus endorsing the position of those who have been advocating greater unity and co-operation throughout the country in order to promote policies of general rather than sectional benefit.

The President of the C. P. R. does not regard the country's difficulties as insurmountable, and he believes that with a more general national point of view and a greater national co-operation the effort sectional feeling would soon disappear. He sees great need for the reduction of expenditure on the part of both individuals and corporations and urges "serious, confident and cool consideration of commercial economic problems" at the present time. He thinks that criticism of manufacturers' associations, bankers' associations, steamship conferences and other groups of men in the same business should be answered by more thoroughly explaining their policies and motives, and in this way it would be shown that their work is beneficial rather than injurious.

President Beatty endorses the "Made in Canada" movement as one designed to encourage Canadians to support home industries and to spend less on imported goods. He points out the benefit of a national attitude in the expenditure of money so that it would give more employment on the farm, in the workshops and on the railroads; that employment in turn provides a greater consuming power and an enlarged expenditure for food, clothing, housing and amusement. Thus internal trade would be increased, he says, and this would mean more business for the transportation companies and an increasing confidence by each part of Canada in all of the other parts, a mutual support without which the full prosperity of the country cannot be realized.

**AT OTTAWA.**

In checking up the situation following the adoption of the budget by a substantial majority, the Parliamentary correspondent of the Ottawa Citizen finds the date of the federal election still a matter of very great uncertainty. Indeed that observer scarcely expects a decision until after the appeal to the point whether an appeal to the country is to be made this year or next. While he argues that the majority on the budget division goes to show that an election is not a necessity so far as the budget itself is concerned, he goes on to say:

"Nevertheless, the vote admits of two constructions on the one hand it may be construed as a warrant to delay dissolution till next year because, obviously, the Government has the parliamentary power to carry on to the limit of its constitutional term."

"From another aspect, there is a possibility that the Government may seek to capitalize this acquisition of strength and accelerate its appeal to the people. The assumption is that the programme will move with reasonable expedition because, outside of the Petersen contract, with which the Government is hardly so enamored as to make an election issue, politics are not a predominant factor in the rest of the order paper."

He does not believe, all things considered, the Government will decide on an election until after the session unless some storm, of which there is no present sign, comes up in the meantime. When the time does come for a decision, he says: "A lot of considerations and contingencies will have to be weighed. The counsel of the following: the results of provincial elections soon to occur in three of the provinces, the business situation, the crop outlook and the degree to which the rates question is satisfactorily adjusted—all these will be influential factors in the ultimate determination. Far from there being a consensus of view as to what should be done, there is an apparent division of opinion and the rush of the session is ordinarily not the time to harmonize such conflicts. Meanwhile, if the election threat were designed as a bluff to influence some wavering on the budget, the card seems to have been played with some measure of success. The Government's position in the House has been unquestionably strengthened, and this may have a reactive influence in the country."

For three years I have been suffering from the golf disease. TEARS HELPFUL TO EYES  
Tears show grief, when they are real, but that's not the only purpose they have. Lachrymal glands at the inner corners of the eyes pour out a tiny bit of the fluid all the time, which serves to keep the eyeballs moist. In addition tears are about the best of remedies for small particles, which occasionally get lodged under the eyelids. When substances become lodged in the eye, do not rub. Raise the lid by taking hold of the lashes and let the tears wash the particle out. If the object is adhered to the lid, turn the lid back by rolling it over a pencil or the finger, and remove with a point made by twisting a handkerchief. Drawing the upper lid down over the lower lid sometimes proves effective. For particles of dust, or cinders in the eye, try flaxseed if other attempts fail.

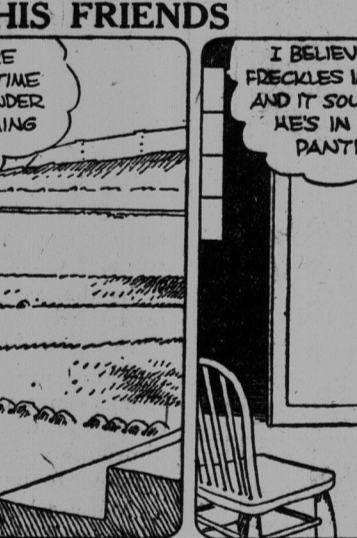

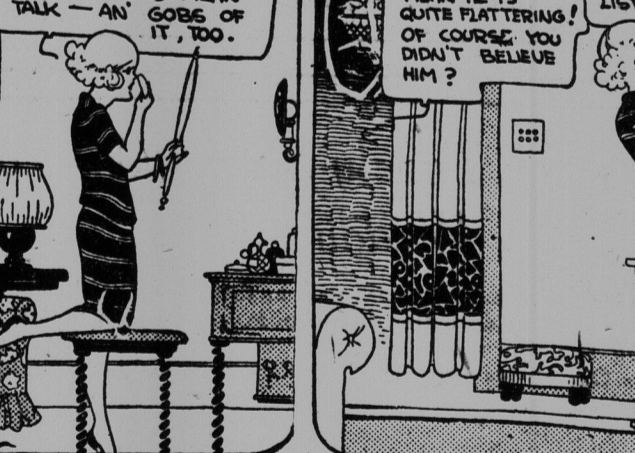



Yankees Trim Mackmen, Red Sox Defeat Champions

NEW YORK, May 6.—The triple tie for first place honors in the American League persists today, with Washington, Philadelphia and Cleveland all smarting under defeats.

While the New York Yankees backed out of their slump of five consecutive defeats and handed the ailing Mackmen an 8 to 4 trimming yesterday, the Boston Americans were busily engaged in humbling the world champions in Washington to the tune of 9 to 4.

On Batting Rampage. Ty Cobb opened a batting assault on the St. Louis Browns by driving out three home runs, a double and a brace of singles for a total of 16 bases, a new record for modern major league baseball, with his Tigers winning in a walk, 14 to 8.

The Phillies had a field day at the expense of three Giant pitchers, and weakened the hold of the National League leaders on first place by registering a 13 to 5 victory.

In Boston, Grimes steadied the uncertain Brooklyn Dodgers by allowing the Braves but six scattered hits, and the Robins won, 6 to 1.

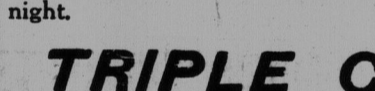

**SWEAR THEY SAW SEMONE NEAR ST. MARTINS**

Two Witnesses Heard in Case About G. G. Murdoch's Automobile  
**SAY ACCUSED 'PHONED TO CITY**  
Then Some One Drove Out and an Axe Was Borrowed

Two witnesses swore at the preliminary hearing this morning in the Police Court into the charge against Harold Semone, of stealing G. G. Murdoch's automobile, that they held conversations with the accused on the day following that on which the car was taken. This occurred at St. Martins, near where the car was found by G. Edgar Wilcox, who also gave evidence this morning. The hearing was set over again until Friday morning. Sergeant Detective Power conducted the prosecution, while J. Starr Tait is appearing for the accused.

Tells of Talk. Dallas Hopie, farmer at St. Martins, said he met the accused walking toward St. Martins on the afternoon of April 28—the day after the car was taken. The witness was driving a team toward Grand Salmon river, but accused asked him if he would drive him back to St. Martins. Semone, he said, told him he was out on a fishing expedition. They turned back, picked up a load on the way, and then drove to the witness' farm. They had supper there, and then the accused, he said, wanted to telephone to Saint John. "They went to the house of J. H. Black, where accused used the phone. He could not remember any details of the conversation except that Semone asked for someone to drive out to meet him. Later, a car arrived. The two men then held a conversation in the barn, the witness said, and he asked him for the loan of his axe. He gave it to them and they left. The next morning he found the axe had been returned. The following day, while searching around in the woods for hooch, he saw Wilcox, who told him about the car being found covered up by bushes. He said he noticed the bushes hiding the car had been freshly cut.
