## JOURNAL OF SYNOD

#### SECOND SESSION.

OTTAWA, MAY 31st, 1897.

In accordance with Canon Three, the second Session of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa was preceded by Divine Service in Christ Church Cathedral. Evensong was said by Reverend J. J. Bogert, M. A., Rural Dean of Carleton. The First Lesson was read by Reverend Rural Dean Pollard, and the Second Lesson by Reverend Rural Dean Nesbitt.

The sermon was preached by Rev. A. Elliott, B. A., Rector of Carleton Place, from St. Matthew, IV, 19: "And He saith unto them, follow Me and I will make you fishers of men."

#### FIRST DAY,

OTTAWA, JUNE 1st, 1897.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in Christ Church Cathedral at 7.80 A. M., by the Lord Bishop of Ottawa, assisted by Reverend Rural Dean Pollard, Reverend E. A.W. Hanington and Reverend W. M. Loucks.

The offerings at both services were in aid of the Diocesan Mission Fund, and amounted to \$20.22.

Mattins was said in St. John's Church at 9.30 A.M.

#### CREDENTIALS OF LAY DELEGATES.

Immediately after service a committee consisting of T. M. Clark, H. S. Shaw and W. H. Rowley, the latter appointed by the Lord Bishop to act for the Lay Secretary, who was absent, met in St. John's Hall to receive and examine the certificates of the Lay Delegates.

#### BUSINESS MEETING.

At 10 A.M. His Lordship took the chair in St. John's Hall and opened the business meeting of the Synod with prayer.

#### ACTING LAY SECRETARY.

Mr. John Bishop was appointed to act as Lay Secretary in the absence of Mr. Orde.

#### MEMBERS PRESENT.

The roll of the Clergy and Lay Delegates was called, when 43 Clergymen and 30 Lay Delegates answered to their names.

### AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

The report of the Audit and Accounts Committee was then presented by the Chairman, Revd. G. J. Low, together with the report of the Auditors, dated May 17th, and their supplementary report.

It was moved by the Revd. G. J. Low, and seconded by Revd. John Osborne,

That the report of the Audit and Accounts Committee, together with the appended report of the Auditors, dated 17th May, and their supplementary report, dated 31st May, be adopted.—Carried. (Appendix B. 1.)

That Revd. G. J. Lowe and W. H. Berry be members of the Audit and Accounts Committee,—Carried.

#### MINUTES OF SYNOD CONFIRMED

Moved by the Clerical Secretary, and seconded by John Bishop,

That the minutes of the last day's proceedings of the first session of Synod as printed in the Journal of that session, be confirmed.—Carried.

#### THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS

His Lordship the Bishop then delivered a most powerful and instructive address. (Appendix A.)

Moved by Revd. Rural Dean Nesbitt and seconded by Rev. G. J. Low,

That the Bishop's address be printed in pamphlet form.—Carried.

It being 1 o'clock, the Synod adjourned until 2.30 P.M.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2.30 p.m. the Synod met again.

The Chancellor then read the report of the arbitration between the Synod of Ontario and the Synod of Ottawa, but it was agreed that the report should not be discussed during the absence of Venerable Archdeacon Lauder.

#### CLERGY SUPERANNUATION FUND

Revd. Rural Dean Pollard made a report on behalf of Clergy Superannuation Fund Committee, and moved its adoption, seconded by Revd. C. Saddington. (Appendix B.—8.)

The Lord Bishop read a letter from Revd. Wm. Fleming, on the subject, and a long discussion took place on the clause which proposed a reduction of \$100 in Rev. Wm. Fleming's grant.

Moved as an amendment to the Revd. Rural Dean Pollard's motion for the adoption of the report, by Mr. E. A. Johnson and seconded by Dr. Powell,

That the report of the Committee on the Clergy Superannuation Fund be referred back to that Committee, with instructions that the sum of \$200 be paid to Revd. Wm. Fleming, instead of \$100.

The amendment was lost on division, and the main motion was then put and carried.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Revd. G. J. Low presented the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools.

Moved by Rev. G. J. Low, and seconded by Rev. R. N. Jones, That the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools be adopted.— Carried. (Appendix B.—14).

That the agreement of the 12th of August, 1896, between the Synods of the Dioceses of Ottawa and Ontario be confirmed, and that the report of the Commissioners of this Synod, dated 18th of May, 1897, and accounts appended, be adopted, Carried, (Appendix C.)

The Chancellor then moved, seconded by Judge Senkler, the adoption of the following Canon:—

WHEREAS, by Section 4 of its Act of Incorporation, this Synod has conferred upon it, within the limits of this Diocese, all powers, rights and privileges which by any statute have been conferred upon the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario: AND WHEREAS, the latter Synod has, by virtue of its Act of Incorporation (Section 1), and of the Act 7 Victoria, Chapter 68, Section 4, the power to make and also to abrogate, repeal, change or alter its constitution, bylaws, rules and regulations, as may be found expedient, and was also, by the Act 39 Victoria, Chapter 109, Section 1, invested with full power and authority to make, and from time to time to amend, such canons, rules, regulations and bylaws as by the said Synod may be considered necessary in the exercise of the powers conferred upon it by its Act of Incorporation, and also for the conduct of its proceedings, etc., and in such other matters as may pertain to the proper and orderly discharge of its business: AND WHEREAS, by Section 3 of its Act of Incorporation the then subsisting Canons of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario were constituted canons of this Synod (subject to the exceptions therein mentioned), until the same are altered or repealed by this Synod:

BE IT RESOLVED, that Section 7 of Canon II be and the same is hereby repealed.—Carried.

The House then resolved itself into a committee of the whole to consider the Chancellor's motion, respecting the repealing of old and the passage of new Canons.

#### CONSOLIDATED FUNDS ACCOUNT

The committee adopted, after some amendments, the proposed Canon on the Consolidated Funds Account.

#### CLERGY TRUST FUND

During the discussion of the proposed Canon on the Clergy Trust Fund, the committee decided to rise, and the Synod resumed its session.

### ELECTION OF DELEGATES, ETC.

It being now twelve o'clock, the Lord Bishop declared the election of the Mission Board, delegates to the Provincial Synod, and delegates to the General Synod would be proceeded with.

WHEREAS, by Section 4 of its Act of Incorporation, this Synod has conferred upon it, within the limits of this Diocese, all powers. rights and privileges, which by any statute have been conferred upon the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario: AND WHEREAS, the latter Synod has, by virtue of its Act of Incorporation (Section 1) and of the Act 7 Victoria, Chapter 68, Section 4, the power to make and also to abrogate, repeal, change or alter its constitution, by-laws, rules and regulations, as may be found expedient, and was also, by the Act 39 Victoria, Chapter 109, Section 1, invested with full power and authority to make. and from time amend, such canons, rules. regulations and by the said Synod may be considered necessary the exercise of the powers conferred upon it by its Act of Incorporation, and also for the conduct of its proceedings, etc., and in such other matters as may pertain to the proper and orderly discharge of its business: AND WHEREAS, by Section 3 of its Act of Incorporation, the then subsisting canons of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario were constituted Canons of this Synod (subject to the exceptions therein mentioned), until the same are altered or repealed by Synod:

Be it resolved that Canon XV be and the same is hereby repealed. —Carried.

The Chancellor then moved, seconded by the Lay Secretary, the adoption of Canons XIV. A. and XV as amended in committee, which Canons are as follows:

## CANON XIV. A. THE CONSOLIDATED FUNDS ACCOUNT.

WHEREAS, under the agreement respecting the division of funds between the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario and the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, dated 12th August, 1896, the Commissioners therein named have divided the securities representing the capital of said funds between the said Synods in so far as the same are presently divisible: AND WHEREAS it was found that since the year 1891 the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario had consolidated all the funds under its control (excepting the Episcopal Fund) and had since that date kept the account of the capital and investments representing said funds in one account known as "the Consolidated Fund": AND WHEREAS, the securities apportioned to this Synod under said agreement are not, therefore, specifically attributable to the several funds so consolidated: BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED:—

- 1. The several funds (except the Episcopal Fund) mentioned in these Canons, and the securities representing the same, shall be administered, invested and dealt with in future as the same were administered, invested and dealt with by the Synod of the Diocese of Outario at the date of the division of the said Diocese in 1896, and the account kept thereof shall be known as "the Consolidated Funds Account, similar to the account of "the Consolidated Fund" heretofore kept by the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, as contained in the reports of the latter Synod since the year 1891.
- 2. The word "income" in this Canon, and in any Canon relating to the funds administered by this Synod (except the Episcopal Fund), shall mean the pro rata share allowed by the Executive Committee, attributable to each of the said funds, of the interest earned and received in respect of the investments and securities representing the whole capital administered in "the Consolidated Funds Account," after deducting all expenses of management.

#### CANON XV.

#### THE CLERGY TRUST FUND.

- 1. The income of the Clergy Trust Fund shall be managed by a Committee consisting of six Clergymen and six Lay representatives.
- 2. Subject to the provisions respecting the Fund contained in the agreement made between the Incorporated Synods of the Dioceses of Ontario and Ottawa, dated the 12th August, 1896, the first charges on

- 3. Subject to the foregoing provisions, the income of the Fund, after the payment of the expenses of management, shall be appropriated to the payment by quarterly instalments to the present annultants on the Fund of the sums set opposite their respective names in the schedule hereto; and, whenever the income permits, then (subject to Section five of this Canon) to the payment similarly to the next senior Clergyman of the Diocese in good standing of an annuity of \$400.00.
- The seniority of any Clergyman shall be determined by his length of service, which service shall consist of the time during which the said Clergyman shall have been employed in the Diocese of Ottawa, either in priest's or deacon's orders, or (as respects any Clergyman who was thus serving in that part of the original Diocese of Ontario now composing this Diocese at the date of the erection of this Diocese) ot the time during which the said Clergyman shall have been employed in this Diocese and previously in the Diocese of Ontario. In the case of any Clergyman who was in that part of the Diocese of Ontario now composing this Diecese at the date of the erection of this Diocese, his service shall be reckoned as commencing on the date of his first appointment by the Bishop of Ontario, and in the case of any other Clergyman, his service shall be reckoned as commencing on the date of his. first appointment in writing from the Bishop of this Diocese; but any period during which any Clergyman has ceased to serve, unless he has been superannuated after ten years' service, or has leave of absence for such period from his Bishop, shall be excluded in reckoning such length of service. If a Clergyman leaves the Diocese of Ottawa under a bene decessit or without leave of absence, and is again admitted into the Diocese, his name shall be placed at the foot of the Any question of seniority which may arise under this shall be decided by the Bishop of this Diocese.
- 5. When the income of the Fund shall be \$400.00 more than the annual sum required to meet the charges and payments mentioned in Sections 2 and 3 of this Canon, it shall be the duty of the Clerical Secretary to report the existence of such surplus to the Committee at its next meeting, and the Committee may then or thereafter direct that the Clergyman next entitled under this Canon be added to the list of annuitants in the schedule hereto, which list shall be continued from time to time by the Clerical Secretary under the direction of the Committee, and shall be in force as finally approved by the Bishop. Should the income of the Fund, however, be found by the Committee insufficient at any time to meet the charges thereon, and the subsisting an-

nuities, the payment or payments to the annuitant or annuitants last in order on the list shall be discontinued, or diminished by such sum or sums and for such a period as may, in the opinion of the Committee, be requisite.

- 6. Subject to the other provisions of this Canon, each of the several annuitants mentioned in the schedule hereto or who may hereafter be added to the list, shall continue to receive his annuity so long only as he continues to do duty in the Diocese, or, after having completed ten years' service, is on the Superannuation list thereot, or has leave of absence from the Diocese, or holds office in the Synod; and he shall forfeit all claim to such annuity for any time during which he may be under ecclesiastical censure. Provided that the word "Diocese" in this subsection shall, in the case only of the present annuitants mentioned in the schedule hereto, be deemed to include the Diocese of Ontario as well as the Diocese of Ottawa.
- 7. No Clergyman while in the possession of an endowed living, yielding a clear income of twelve hundred dollars per annum, shall be placed upon or remain on the list of annuitants. His right to such annuity shall be suspended during the time he may be in possession of such living, but shall revive on his ceasing to be in such possession; and such suspension shall not affect his seniority.
- 8. The Committee shall have power from time to time to require any annuitant, or Clergyman claiming to be an annuitant, to submit a statement to the Committee as to the amount of income derived from his parochial endowment. In case of non-compliance with such requirement within three months after being notified in the case of an annuitant, he shall forfeit all right to his annuity until he makes such statement, and the arrears during the time he makes default shall not in any event be paid him; and in the case of an applicant, his name shall not, while he is so in default, be placed on the list of annuitants under this Canon in the event of his becoming eligible meanwhile, but he shall be passed over in favor of the next in seniority until he makes such statement.
- 9. Upon the death of any annuitant, the amount of his aunuity shall continue to be paid to his legal representatives for the quarter current at the time of his death, and also for the two quarters thereafter ensuing.

## WELCOME TO THE MOST REVD. THE ARCHBISHOP OF RUPERTS LAND AND PRIMATE OF CANADA.

The Dean here announced that the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Ruperts Land and Primate of Canada was present. His Grace was at once invited to a seat on the platform.

The Lord Bishop in a few words expressed the joy and pleasure which it gave to the Synod to have His Grace present.

His Grace addressed the Synod, congratulating it upon the formation of the new Diocese of Ottawa, and upon the election of his old friend as the first Bishop. His Grace also expressed his great pleasure at having been present at the service of dedication of the Cathedral last evening, and at the close of his address bestowed his solemn blessing upon the members of the Synod.

### METROPOLITAN SEE

Moved by the Chancellor, and seconded by Revd. R. Samwell.

That the Lord Bishop be requested to appoint a Committee to consider and report to the Executive Committee and the Synod the terms of such a compact between the Synod of this Diocese and the House of Bishops in this Province, as may secure to the House of Bishops the power of electing their President and Metropolitan, and by which the Diocese of Ottawa shall in the future be secured in the distinction of being the Metropolitan See of the Province.—Carried.

Moved by the Lay Secretary and seconded by the Chancellor, WHEREAS, by Section 4 of its Act of Incorporation, this Synod has conferred upon it, within the limits of this Diocese, all powers, rights and privileges which by any statute have been conferred upon the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario: AND WHEREAS, the latter Synod has, by virtue of its Act of Incorporation (Section 1) and of the Act 7 Victoria, Chapter 68, Section 4, the power to make and also to abrogate, repeal, change or alter its constitution, by-laws, rules and regulations, as may be found expedient, and was also, by the Act 39 Victoria, Chapter 109, Section 1, invested with full power and authority to make, and from time to time to amend, such canons, rules, regulations and by-laws as by the said Synod may be considered necessary in the exercise of the powers conferred upon it by its Act of Incorporation and also for the conduct of its proceedings, etc., and in such other matters as may pertain to the proper and orderly discharge of its business: AND WHEREAS, by Section 3 of its Act of Incorporation the then subsisting Canons of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario were constituted Canons of this Synod (subject to the exceptions therein mentioned), until the same are altered or repealed by this Synod:

That Canon XVI be and the same is hereby repealed.—Carried.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND

On motion the House went into a Committee of the Whole to consider the proposed Canon on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, introduced by the Lay Secretary. After much discussion the proposed Canon was somewhat amended, and the Committee reported to Synod.

Moved by the Lav Secretary, and seconded by the Chancellor, That the proposed Canon on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund as reported by the Committee of the Whole be and the same is hereby adopted, the Canon reading as follows:—

### CANON XVI.

### THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND

1. There shall be a Committee, consisting of five Clerical and five Lay members of the Synod, to superintend and manage the income of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

- 2. The income of the said fund shall consist of the pro rata share of the interest on the capital of "The Widows' and Orphans' Fund" administered by the Synod in the 'Consolidated Funds Account,' as defined in Canon XIV A, for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen of the Diocese, and of the revenue mentioned in the following paragraphs hereof.
- 3. A sermon shall be preached and a collection made annually by every Clergyman holding a Cure in this Diocese (save and except in such cases of sickness or absence from his Parish or Mission as the Bishop allows as sufficient cause) on the fifth in Lent, or one of the two following Sundays, Church in which service is celebrated on that day, and in every other in Church, Chapel or Mission Station in each Cure in which Sunday services are held as soon after the said Sunday as the Incumbent of such Parish or Mission finds practicable; and the proceeds of such collection shall be sent by the Clergyman to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod immediately after the taking up of the same, and shall be placed by him to the credit of the said fund.
- 4. Pursuant to the agreement between the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, and the Incorporated Synod of this Diocese, dated the 12th August, 1896, all the Widows and Orphans who were entitled to the annuities from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the former Diocese of Ontario on the 30th day of April, A.D. 1896, under Canon XVI of the said Diocese as then in force, are hereby declared to have been since the said date, and shall be hereafter, entitled to be paid from time to time (either directly or through the Incorporated Synod of the present Diocese of Ontario, as may be arranged between the officers of the respective Synods) from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese, one half of the amount of such annuities as shall be payable to them from time to time under the Canons of the Diocese of Ontario and of this Diocese.
- 5. Every Clergyman of the former Diocese of Ontario who was a subscriber to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the said Diocese on the 30th day of April, A.D. 1896, and who had not on or before said date forfeited his claims upon the said Fund of the said Diocese of Ontario under Section 6 of Canon XVI of said Diocese as then in force, and who immediately subsequent to the said 30th day of April, A.D. 1896, held a Cure of Souls in the Diocese of Ottawa, or held office in the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, or was a Curate within the Diocese of Ottawa, or whose name was on the Synod list of the Diocese of Ottawa, shall be deemed to have been in good standing within the meaning of this Canon as of the 1st day of May, A.D. 1896. Provided however, that any Clergyman who was in arrears for subscriptions, but who had not forfeited his claim on the said Fund under Section 6 of Canon XVI aforesaid, shall forfeit all claim on the Widows' and

Orphans' Fund of this Diocese under this Canon unless said arrears are paid to the Clerical Secretary of this Diocese within six months from the passing of this Canon.

- 6. The right of the Widow and Orphan children of a deceased Clergyman to participate in the benefit of said Fund, shall be conditional upon such deceased Clergyman having during his lifetime complied with the requirements of this Canon, and paid annually into the said Fund the sum of Five dollars with all arrears as herein provided, dating, if he were in the Diocese of Ontario on the 25th day of March, A.D. 1862, from that date, or if admitted to, or ordained in the Diocese of Ontario, between the said date and the first day of May, A.D. 1896, from the date of such admission or ordination (with interest at six per centum per annum, upon all such arrears from the date when the same respectively fell due,, or if in good standing on the 1st day of May, A.D. 1896, as provided in section 5 of this Canon, since the 1st day of May, A.D. 1896, or if admitted to or ordained in this Diocese since said last mentioned date, then from the date of his ordination, unless he satisfies the Committee of his inability to pay such arrears in which event he shall be excused from payment of such portion thereof as the Committee may deem advisable.
- 7. Any Clergyman not in arrears to the said Fund may commute his annual subscription by one payment of fifty dollars, to be placed by the Clerical Secretary to the credit of the said Fund; and every Clergyman so commuting shall be released from any further subscriptions or payments.
- 8. In case a Clergyman neglects to pay his annual subscription for two years at any time, the Clerical Secretary shall notify him that he has forfeited all claim on the said Fund; if, however, he at any time afterward pays to the Clerical Secretary the sum of five dollars for each year, during which the same has remained unpaid, together with interest at the rate of six per centum per annum on each year's subscription in default, up to the time of payment, he shall be entitled to all the benefits of the Fund in the same manner as if the annual subscription had been regularly paid by him.
- 9. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Widow or Orphan children of a Clergyman holding an office in the Synod, or duly licensed or recognized by the Bishop as a curate, from participating in the benefits of the Fund, although no annual collection has been made by him during such time.
- 10. In addition to those annuitants who are entitled to receive payments from the said Fund under section 4 of this Canon, the Widow and Children of every Clergyman in good standing, who at the time of his death is duly licensed to the Cure of souls in this Diocese, or holds

Every Widow or the guardian of the Orphans of a Clergyman desiring an annuity from the Fund, shall present to the Committee, through the Clerical Secretary, a memorial setting forth the date of the death the of Clergyman, the name of his 0. the guardian, as the case may be, and the names ages of his Children; and such memorial be taken into consideration by the Committee at its next meeting after the receipt thereof; and if it appears that the deceased Clergyman has complied with the requirements of this Canon, the Committee shall, if the Fund suffices, make a grant to such Widow not exceeding the annual sum of \$200 during widowhood, and the annual sum of \$40 to each Orphan under the age of eighteen years and unmarried.
- 12. In the event of a Clergyman leaving no Widow, or in the case of the Widow dying, leaving Orphans under the age of eighteen years and unmarried, the annuities to the Orphans shall be doubled, but in no case shall the sum granted to the Orphans of any one family exceed the annual sum of \$160.
- 13. The several annuities shall be payable in equal quarterly payments on the first days of January, April, July and October to the Widow or Guardian, and the first of such payments shall include the arrears of annuity due from the day of the death of the Clergyman.
- 14. Every annuitant on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund shall, before he or she may be paid his or her quarterly annuity, make one of the following declarations in the presence of a neighboring Clergyman, who shall duly attest the same:—

Save and except as provided by this Canon, no Widow or Orphan of any Clergyman who might otherwise have been entitled to a claim upon the Fund of the Diocese of Ontario prior to the division thereof on the 1st day of May, A.D. 1896, shall be entitled to any claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese.—Carried.

That the Bishop be requested to appoint a committee authorized and empowered by the Synod of Ottawa to arrange with an agent to de vote six weeks in every year to making the S. P. C. K. known in the Parishes of this Diocese as the Church Bible and Prayer Book Society, and to promoting the sale and circulation of Literature on Church lines, and the establishment, when feasible, of a Branch Depository of the S. P. C. K. in the City of Ottawa. That assuming the number of subscribers who may be induced to contribute \$1 per annum to the S. P. C. K. will provide the larger part, if not all, of the agent's stipend, the Committee is hereby authorized to obtain guarantors, who shall formally bind themselves to pay PRO RATA to the amounts for which they sign, a sum not exceeding \$200 to meet any difference between the sums raised by the Agent and the stipend of \$1,350, it being understood that the agent is undertaking to devote a proportion of each year to like work on like terms in the Dioceses of Toronto, Montreal, Quebec, and probably Ontario.-Carried.

### STATE OF THE CHURCH

Moved by Revd. Rural Dean Bliss, and seconded by the Clerical Secretary,

That Canon XXIII as printed in the Book of Canons, Diocese of Ontario, and adopted by the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa at its first session, be amended by striking out all the words after "Executive Committee" in Section 2, fourth line, and substituting the following:—

"Which form shall be filled by each Clergyman for the year ending the twenty-fifth day of April, and he shall be responsible for placing it in the hands of his Rural Dean before the first day of May."

- 3. The Rural Dean shall, with the Clergy in Chapter, read over each report and make sure that each enquiry is filled up on one and the same principle, and that each return is accurate.
- 4. The Rural Dean shall prepare a report on the state of the Church within the Deanery, founded upon the returns of the Clergy, and the information obtained at the Chapter meeting in May, and elsewhere.
- 5. The Rural Dean shall be responsible for forwarding, on or before the twelfth day of May, the returns of the Clergy and his own report on the state of the Church in the Deanery to the Clerical Secretary, for the use of the Committee on the state of the Church in the Diocese, and also of the Mission Board.
- 6. A Committee on the state of the Church in the Diocese shall be appointed annually, consisting of four Lay representatives, and all the Rural Deans.

7. This Committee shall present annually to the Synod a report on the state and progress of the Church in the Diocese as shown by the returns of the Clergy in each Deanery and the report of each Rural Dean.—Carried.

Moved by the Archdeacon of Ottawa, and seconded by Mr. E. A. Johnson,

That the thanks of the Synod are hereby tendered to Mrs. Samuel Mooney, of East Hawkesbury, for her liberal donation of fifty dollars to the Mission Fund.—Carried.

Moved by Canon Pollard, and seconded by Revd. T. J. Stiles, That a hearty vote of thanks be and is hereby tendered to the Chancellor, the Hon. Judge Senkler, and W. H. Rowley, Esq., the Commissioners appointed in connection with the division of the funds, for the able manner in which they have discharged their duties, and for the time and trouble expended by them in connection with this division.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. W. E. A. Butler, and seconded by Mr. A. Code,

That the thanks of this Synod be and hereby are tendered to the city newspapers and their representatives for the very full and careful reports of the proceedings of Synod, and to the Ottawa Free Press for the free distribution of fifty copies of the paper each day amongst the members of the Synod.—Carried.

Moved by the Very Revd. the Dean, and seconded by Canon Nesbitt,

That a hearty vote of thanks be and is hereby tendered to Mr. J. F. Orde for the very courteous and able manner in which he has discharged the duties of Lay Secretary.—Carried.

Moved by Revd. R. B. Waterman, and seconded by Revd. R. L. Houston.

That the thanks of the Synod are due to the people of Ottawa for their kind hospitality extended to the members of this Synod.—Carried.

Moved by Revd. W. H. Stiles, and seconded by the Revd Rural Dean Scantlebury,

That the thanks of this Synod be given to Mr. Steele, organist of St. John's Church, for his efficient services as organist at the daily services; also to the organist and choir of Christ Church Cathedral for their assistance at the opening services.—Carried.

The Bishop's Address delivered at the opening of the Synod.

My Reverend Brethren and My Brethren of the Laity,-

We have already in the Church's great act of thanksgiving offered up to God our humble, grateful acknowledgements for enabling us to settle harmoniously and happily, and at the same time wisely and well, the numerous questions and difficulties attending the erection of Ottawa into a SEE of the Church of England in Canada, and the separation of its financial interests from those of the Mother Diocese of Ontario. One of your first and most agreeable acts in this Synod will be to put on record your sense of the excellent service rendered to the Church in this Diocese by those faithful and efficient men, in whose hands you piaced the responsible and laborious task of carrying into effect the conditions and principles on which it had been agreed that the financial interests of Ontario and Ottawa should be divided. They will present their report, so that there is no occasion or room for me to do more than testify that they have spared neither their days nor their night's nor themselves in promoting our fair and righteous claims.

The Treasurer of the Diocese, Mr. W. L. MARLER, manager of the Merchants' Bank in Ottawa, who on being chosen by the Synod last July to fill the office of Treasurer of the Diocese, kindly entered at once upon its responsibilities and duties, handed to me his resignation on 15th October, because the Bank authorities did not consider it well that they should have the care of our account, and their manager in Ottawa at the same time act as our Treasurer. There being no appeal from this decision, I accepted very reluctantly Mr. Marler's resignation, tendering to him on your behalf my high appreciation of his services, and my great regret that the Diocese should lose his valued abilities and large and long experience.

Acting upon the powers entrusted to me as Bishop under section 5 of Canon II, I at once appointed Mr. C. A. Eliot, of the City of Ottawa, in the room of Mr. Marler, and he has acted as Treasurer, devoting his time without stint to the affairs of the Diocese. He will in due course present to you his report. It will rest with the Synod at this session to appoint a Treasurer, as Canon II authorizes the Bishop to fill the vacancy only until the next meeting of the Synod.

### CLERGY NOT IN ACTIVE WORK.

The Rev. Wm. Fleming, the Rev. J. Frazer, and Rev. W. Mercer are on the list of retired clergy of this Diocese.

### CONFIRMATIONS.

During the year ending 25th April. the date of all our statistical returns from each Parish, and including therefore, the number reported to the Synod in July last, 1,459 have received the blessing of the Lord in answer to prayer and through the laying on of hands in Confirmation. Of these, 670 were males and 852 were females, and 188 were brought up outside the Church of England. Confirmation has been administered on 84 occasions.

I desire to hold up to all Parents, and Godfathers and Godmothers, and to the Clergy in particular, the rich reward which awaits the faithful and thorough and loving preparation of their young people for Confirmation. The opportunity is large and favorable and attractive, and never recurs. If the preparation of heart and mind is made devoutly and intelligently, the effects can hardly fail to be recognized all through life. No two candidates are exactly alike in their attainments and experience. The home life and its associations and influences have probably been very different for each. It is accordingly very difficult for any clergyman to do justice to any large number of young people at once. Ample time is needed not only for the candidate, but for the Clergyman.

Our Sunday schools and their senior classes should be so arranged as to lead up to the preparation for confirmation. And, my Brethren of the Laity, your homes ought to be so ordered that life in them from day to day all through the years of childhood should be in continuous anticipation of and preparation for Confirmation, with its high and holy gift of the Blessed Sanctifier to be not merely with, but in your sons and daughters.

### DAY SCHOOLS.

Mr. Lawrence H. Baldwin of Toronto is keeping before the public of Ontario the great advantages and the feasibility of allowing each Christian Body under certain conditions to have its own day schools with their share of the public money in proportion to the results, as tested by government examiners.

The minds of our people need much information and aid in this most important subject. Are we, my Brethren, in our several positions, doing all we might do to set the vital question of religious instruction in our own day schools intelligently before the community. I do not look for any rapid movement towards separate schools for each denomination, but I am persuaded that there is no other way of securing religious education for our children, and religious education will be insisted on by our people sooner or later.

### SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

So long as our Sunday schools afford us our only opportunity of giving religious instruction to our children, we must put forth persistent and unsparing efforts to make them as effective as we possibly can. I would appeal to our laymen to come to the help of the Church by offering themselves as teachers in our Sunday Schools. I appeal to my Reverend Brethren to secure at almost any cost, 15 minutes at least every Sunday for each Sunday school in their Parishes, so that they may catechize the children and afford their teachers an opportunity of seeing how definite and exact instruction on religion should be imparted to the children.

I have large confidence in teaching the young and the old also definitely and distinctly by question and answers. I dread the mischief which is being done almost everywhere by pouring over children a stream of vague, inaccurate talk about religion, drawn from the papers and periodicals of the day.

The Inter-Diocesan Sunday School Committee appointed by the Provincial Synod, have requested the Bishops to recommend their clergy to make use of the Canadian Church Sunday School Lessons prepared by this Committee, on which each Diocese is represented. This syllabus of lessons on the Bible and Prayer Book, which is issued annually, secures that all our children shall be following from Sunday to Sunday the same portions of the Bible and of the Prayer Book. It is left to each clergyman to select his own text book explanatory of the Catechism.

I have no hesitation in advising you to adopt the St. Paul's series, which was endorsed by our late Metropolitan, Dr. Medley, the Bishop of Fredericton. It has been recommended also by the Right Rev. Dr. Doane, the Bishop of Albany, to our Brethren of the Sister Church in the United States, and by the late Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, London.

This same Inter-Diocesan Committee provides an examination for both teachers and pupils. The examination is held annually in Advent, in every parish in which four candidates may present themseves, and suitable diplomas are given to each according to his or her proficiency.

You will find yourselves, my Reverend Brethren, amply rewarded if you can aid some of your teachers and scholars to prepare for this examination year by year in Advent. The effects will show themselves in the new life and interest and the more accurate, definite instruction which will characterize your Sunday schools. A Sunday school in which even four persons obtain a diploma each year, will soon lift itself up into a bright and happy position, affording you an effective and attractive instrument for the religious instruction of your children. The committee most reasonably ask for a small sum of 25 cents per annum from each Sunday School to enable them to meet their expenditure on printing and diplomas and prizes. The money may be paid through the Diocesan Secretary Treasurer.

### MISSIONARY MEETINGS.

These ought to be, as they certainly might be made far more attractive and effective than they are.

Those who are appointed on deputations to our Congregations should make it a matter of conscience to prepare and go through the work assigned to them in the most faithful and thorough manner possible. Not powerful and eloquent appeals, but definite information is needed. Our people will respond to facts. They grow hard and indifferent under rhetorical addresses to their feelings. When anyone sent on deputation work fails for any reason to be present at the meeting in a Parish, he does more to weaken the cause of Missions among the people than he is likely to undo by many addresses. The bare possibility that a congregation may be tempted to think that the clergy are not much interested, and may be indifferent about the Church's missionary work both at home and abroad, ought to make every one of us determined to make full preparation in good season to secure a large attendance, and to promote the punctualty and brightness and interest of every meeting. Much labor and time are necessarily expended on our Missionary Meetings all over the Diocese. The labor and the time are in large measure lost, or at least wasted, for lack of thorough and careful preparttion, and a warm personal interest in the great project. Let us resolve Brethren, to make our missionary meetings all that we certainly can make them, a bright and interesting occasion in the life of each Parish, an occasion to which our people will look forward year by year.

### LAY HELPERS' ASSOCIATION.

In almost every address to those about to be confirmed, I seek to impress upon them and the congregation, that all Christians are, as

such, servants of JESUS CHRIST, and bound to take a personal interest in His work in this world, and to be busy for HIM and Church. At the time I doubt not many resolve, that they will seek to take up some department of church work. Now I desire to indicate to my Reverend Brethren, that an Association of Lay Helpers in each congregation might be of the greatest practical value, in strengthening and directing this resolution, which in not a few cases fades out and vanishes away for lack of encouragement and opportunity. Such associations as I suggest, have been found to be most serviceable, not only in the great city of London, where a vast amount of excellent work is being done by some 6,000 Lay Helpers, but in our own Canadian Dioceses and congregations. The conditions and rules of membership should be very simple, binding all to ask God's blessing on the Association once every Sunday, and to unite in their own church in the Holy Communion on some one Sunday in each year with all the members of the several associations in all our Parishes. When a sufficient number of congregations have formed the Parochial Association of Lay Helpers. they will naturally organize a Diocesan Association, and the Sunday on which al should meet in the highest and most blessed ordinance of our Holy Religion will be agreed upon. All without exception are sensible of the influence of numbers and union in any effort. We have numbers of Lay Helpers in all our congregations, but we have not the union. They are not banded together in such a way as to exhibit their strength. If our Church Wardens, and Lay Representatives, and Sunday school teachers, and the members of our choirs, and District visitors and Collectors for our Parochial and Diocesan and Missionary Funds, and the Brotherhood Men of St. Andrew, were all formed into an Association of Lay Helpers in each congregation, many would be surprised by the number. All would be encouraged and strengthened. I shall welcome the day when a sufficient number of Associations have been formed to warrant the organization of a Diocesan Association of Lay Helpers.

### LAY READERS' LEAGUE IN THE DIOCESE OF OTTAWA.

I have formed the Lay Readers who hold the Bishop's License into a League, with the view of placing them in a position to be more accessible to the clergy—to be of service to the Bishop in opening and strengthening new centres of work and in the hope of creating amongst them an "esprit de corps" such as may render them more effective.

### STATISTICS AND THEIR BEARING ON APPOINTMENTS TO VA-CANT PARISHES.

It is right that all should know that the Bishop is influenced by the Statistics of each Parish. It is accordingly very important that the clergy and churchwardens should from week to week keep such a book and make such entries in it as will enable them to fill in with accuracy the returns required of them by the Synod at the close of each

year. It is also very important that the Rural Dean and his chapter should go carefully over the return from each congregation so as to make sure that the same principle is followed by all in arriving at the figures which are entered in each column of the returns. The Bishop is well aware of all that may be advanced as to the misleading nature of statistical returns. He is also fully sensible that the highest influences and the most blessed and enduring results of the best work in a Parish cannot be reduced to figures or exhibited in tabulated statements. The Bishop will always bear in mind that aptness to teach and spiritual gifts and high attainments ought to influence powerfully his estimate of men. No ability to serve tables, no devotion to the temporalities of a Parish can compensate for the absence of the more excellent and essential gifts of the sacred ministry. The character, the impress upon a clergyman as a good man, as a man of GOD, as a man given to spiritual rather than secular things, must be always first, and will ever carry wost weight with both Bishop and people. wish it to be noted that the Bishop of Ottawa studies the statistical returns from each congregation and cannot help drawing his own conclusions. The Clergyman is the head of the Household, the Father in each Congregation, and like every Father, he ought to oversee and study and protect and promote every interest in every department of the life of his family. He is not indeed to take upon himself to discharge the duties of the Lay Officers in his congregations, but he is to keep himself informed and to induce the Wardens and others to discharge punctually, systematically and thoroughly the duties of the office entrusted to them. A great many of the evils and troubles which attend the life of our congregations are attributable to the absence of system punctuality and thoroughness on the part of Churchwardens. They allow subscriptions and repairs to take care of themselves, or to go by default until all are discouraged, and looking round for some scape goat they lay the responsibility upon the clergyman. This is both unreasonable and unjust. Still it does occur not infrequently. The clergyman's usefulness in a Parish is undermined and he and his family have to face the serious expense and losses involved in moving to another Parish.

In one of our Canadian Dioceses a Canon which specifies some of the leading duties laid on the Churchwardens, is, by order of the Synod, read over at the meeting at which any Churchwarden is appointed or elected, so that all may be reminded of the work in its leading details undertaken by the Churchwardens.

I do earnestly appeal to all Wardens to keep in mind how much of the temporal prosperity of the congregation and how much of the influence and comfort of the Clergyman are in their keeping, and actually depend upn their discharging punctually and systematically and thoroughly the duties which they have undertaken by accepting the office. of tim infl gat fac

I desire to remind them distinctly that the clergyman, as the head of the household of faith, is bound to learn from them from time to time how the work of their office is progressing and to use all kindly influence with a view to the temporal affairs and accounts of the congregation being kept in a way to command the confidence and satisfaction of all.

I desire also to state to the clergy that while I study the statistics of every congregation and draw my own conclusions, I shall observe the Apostolic order that Elders who rule well shall be counted worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in the word and in teaching.

Before I give Letters Dismissory to any Clergyman, or license him to a new charge, he must place in my hand for his successor a list of the Communicants and of the families in each congregation, and also the book in which he has entered from week to week the figures and other facts necessary to enable him to fill up. The statistical required by the Synod.

The Church suffers loss when a clergyman enters upon a Parish without a complete list of the Communicants and families. However ready the wardens and others may be to help him to discover all the Parishioners, some are sure to be overlooked for long months and their disposition to neglect their religious duties is strengthened. Without the book containing the entries down to the date of the resignation of his predecessor the statistics for the year are incomplete and misleading.

I am sure that I shall have the moral weight of the Synod with me in my determination to refuse Letters Dismissory or a new license until this information, which is of so much importance to the church and her interests, is left with me in proper form.

### MARRIAGES.

Any laxity in reference to the marriage tie must in the very nature of things introduce infinite mischief into the family life and eventually undermine the nation. The very first approaches to any relaxation of the marriage laws and customs whether of the Church or State, ought to be watched with increasing vigilance and strenuously withstood. Moreover, every practice and observance which can serve to make marriage a sacred thing and lift it up into its rightful position as a picture of the mystical union betwixt Christ and His Church, ought to be most jealously guarded and observed. The responsibilities of my office require that I should afford to you, the Clergy, and the Lay Representatives in Synod, and through you to all the members of the Church in this Diocese, the truest information and the wisest counsel which I may be able to reach.

My sense of duty, then, obliges me to impress upon you the following points.—

- 1. The State in England and in Canada has in the exercise of an undeniable right altered the civil laws of marriage. Provision has been made for divorce from the marriage bond. In Canada the State has also made marriage, within one of the prohibited degrees, to a deceased wife's sister, lawful.
- 2. The Church has made no alteration in her laws from the earliest days long prior to the Conquest. She has made no provision for the remarriage of divorced persons, nor has she ever sanctioned the marriage of any person separated by divorce so long as the former partner is living.

In Canada she has canonically adopted the Table of prohibited Degrees, and forbidden her clergy to solemnize a marriage within the Prohibited Degrees.

In 673 A.D., at the Council of Hertford, when the whole Church of England for the first time met in Synod under Archbishop Theodore, it was decreed by Canon 10, "let no man relinquish his own wife but for fornication, as the Gospel teacheth. But if any man divorce a wife, to whom he has been lawfully married, let him not be coupled to another, but remain as he is, or be reconciled to his wife, if he will be a good Christian." See Johnson's Canons, Ed. London, 1720.

In 1009 A.D., at the Council of Eanham—a national Council, Canterbury and York both being represented—the following Canon 8 was adopted:—

"Let no Christian have a divorced woman for a wife, nor take another wife whilst he has one; but so long as she lives let her be the only one if he have really cared for the law of GOD and have saved his soul from the fires of Hell."

In 1537 A.D. the Bishops' Book, issued by Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury, and Lee, Archbishop of York, and all the other Bishops, Prelates and Archdeacons, declares, page 32, The bond of lawful marriage is of such sort that it cannot be dissolved or broken but by death only; and again on page 34, The bond thereof can by no means be dissolved during the lives of the parties between whom such matrimony is contracted.

In 1662 the Prayer Book as we have it now became binding as the law of the Church by the assent to it of the Convocations of Canterbury and York, and in it the language of the marriage service leaves no room for any doubt that the mind of the Church is that marriage cannot be dissolved except by death. The parties pledge each other "till death parts them." The priest, joining their hands, says solemnly, "those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder." Then there is the prayer, "O God who didst teach that it should never be lawful to put asunder those whom Thou by matrimony hadst made one."

- 3. The clergy must be exceedingly careful to enquire into all the circumstances of those who come to be married. The License which the parties may bring from the State, is no longer a safe defence for the clergy, seeing that the State allows marriages which the Church has never authorized. The clergy may not marry even the innocent party in a case of divorce, nor may they marry any persons within the Prohibited Degrees.
- 4. In order that all may be informed as to the unions, which the Church will bless as being joined together by God, the Canadian Church in this Ecclesiastical Province has, in her 16th Canon, ordered that a printed copy of the Table of Prohibited Degrees shall be placed in the Vestry Room or near the entrance of every Church in this Ecclesiastical Province, at the charge of the Parish, in some place where it may conveniently be read.

I shrink from causing distress to those who, in ignorance of the church's laws, may have contracted a forbidden marriage. Faithfulness, however, to GOD, and to our duty, requires that we should take care that none are left in ignorance of the Church's law. A weighty responsibility rests upon us to make known to all in a loving spirit what unions in marriage the Church permits, and what she forbids. Unlawful affection for any who are forbidden to them, will be checked in its very first beginnings by all right-minded persons if they only know that the word God, as understood and interpreted, not by individuals, but by the Church, forbids them. Few will be found to violate the law of the church if they clearly understand that it is the law of the Church. Our duty is to take care that none are left in ignorance of the law.

5. The Lambeth Conference in 1888 did not enact, for it has no power to pass Canons, but it did recommend that the clergy should not be instructed to refuse the Sacraments or other privileges of the Church to those who under civil sanction married after the divorce of one who in a case of adultery has been proved to be the innocent party.

Now let us turn to those observations and practices which may serve to keep matrimony holy and sacred as God intended from the beginning that it should be.

1. Marriages should not be celebrated in private houses. The Church's rule may be read in the Marriage Service, "At the day and time appointed the persons to be married shall come into the body of the church with their friends and neighbors." It is not contemplated that marriages will be celebrated anywhere except in GOD'S House. The disposition to treat marriage simply as a civil contract which may

be made and unmade by the laws of the State, irrespective of GOD'S Ordinance, ought to make us very earnest in inducing all to come to church to be married, so that the civil contract may occupy only its proper place. and the religious character of the holy estate of Matrimony may be fully represented and deeply impressed on the minds of all.

I am sensible of the exceeding difficulty of enforcing a rule of the Church which may have been relaxed when Church edifices were few and far between. This excuse, however, can hardly be advanced in our day in this Diocese. There is a more painful and powerful influence at work in the readiness of some of our people to avail themselves of the ministrations of those who are separated from us. This may weaken our hands, but it ought not to prevent our presenting with all the earnestness and kindliness we can use, the weighty reasons for celebrating all marriages in Church. These will generally win most persons. They will certainly prevail with the woman, who will as a rule appreciate everything which can add to the sacredness of the bond which unites her to her husband, and it is the woman who is allowed to have her choice in all things pertaining to her marriage. Time and kindly persuasion will readily induce the woman to desire that her marriage shall be celebrated in Church.

2. Our people should be encouraged to have their Banns published in Church in preference to buying a License from the State. No doubt there is a natural shrinking from the public announcement of an approaching marriage. There is a desire in our day to keep marriages as far as possible secret. This secrecy in any degree and in every way is unwholesome, mischievous and perilous. No incident in any community will so naturally and so generally stir the interest of people in all classes as the courtship and engagement and marrage of any young couple. Instead of shrinking from it and frowning on it, and discouraging it, the young people and their families should be induced to appreciate the sympathy and good will which are at once the source and the outcome of such interest. The thing above all others to be dreaded in connection with courtship and marriage is secrecy. It is productive of untold evils. Marriage is honorable, and the courtship which leads to it, affording the young people the opportunity of judging and learning whether they are suited to each other," is honorable. There would be fewer unhappy marriages if the opportunities for young people to meet and learn to know each other were provided so that they might have knowledge of each other's principles and dispositions before they commit themselves even to an engagement. From first to last, from the first introduction to each other, on through their courtship to their engagement and marriage, there should be a determination on the part of the young people and their parents that there shall be no secrecy, that

the natural and strong desire to avoid publicity and being talked about shall not betray them into any act or course that will wear the appearance of concealment.

The Civil Law of this Province admits of marriage after the Banns have been published on one Sunday. The Church's Law, which the Clergy are bound in the most sacred obligations to obey, requires "that the Banns be published in the Church on three several Sundays, during the time of morning service or evening service (if there be no morning service) immediately after the Second Lesson."

It must be quite unnecessary to state that the Civil Law does not and cannot release the Clergy from the requirements of the Church's Law. Marriage celebrated by a Deacon is valid before the Civil law. It is irregular, though valid, according to the Church's mind, because marriage is a benediction, and for this the Priest's Office is required.

Marriages should be celebrated in the Church of the Parish in which the woman and her Parents live. The practice of going to some neighboring city or town to be married ought to be discouraged. It is one of the results of that foolish desire to keep everything connected with marriage secret. If we can get people to regard this desire for secrecy, and especially the practice of going to a distance to be married, as being suggestive that there must be something wrong about the marriage, the evil will speedily disappear. ### THE DIOCESE OF ALGOMA.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Ottawa.

MY LORD,—Duly called on the 12th day of November last, by The Provincial Synod of Canada, to be Bishop of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, and consecrated for that responsible office on the Festival of the Epiphany in the present year, I conceive it to be my duty (having had opportunity during the two months which have elapsed since my consecration, to go about a large portion of my new field of yabor, and to gain much knowledge of the condition and needs of my Diocese) to address to Your Lordship, and to all the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province, a few words of information and appeal. And this I do in the confident hope that what I say will meet with a large measure of sym-

pathy and consideration at your Lordship's hands. For surely my election by the Provincial Synod, and the circumstances attending that election, give me, if I am not much mistaken, a special claim upon every Diocese represented in that Synod. I am the Missionary Bishop of the whole Church of Canada. And I feel confident that They who elected me will not now refuse me their substantial succor and support.

In the first place, then, let me assure your Lordship that what I have seen and heard during my brief residence in, and in the course of my hurried journeys through my diocese, has not been of a wholly disheartening nature. Our country, which is vast and varied, possessing not only much rocky and stony territory, but also much fairly good soil and many sources of wealth which capital wilk in time, develop, is slowly opening up and improving. There is, I believe, a future for it, and although (because we have no city in the Diocese and no large and prosperous towns capable of helping the poor places, and no wealthy people living within our limits to contribute largely to our Mission and other Diocesan Funds; and because, as everywhere else in the land, we are sorely weakened by religious division), we are, and must long remain, unable to provide wholly for our own needs, yet we may reasonably hope that in some small degree, if not in proportion to our increasing wealth and population, our need of outside aid will be, year by year, diminishing.

Next, it is surely only fitting that I should assure your Lordship that it is and will be my constant endeavor to pursue and to inculcate a policy of self-help throughout the Diocese, encouraging all our congregations to strain every nerve to increase their contributions towards the support of our own Diocesan Missions. But, I regret that I am compelled to add to the hopeful things I have said, the announcement that, at the present time, we are in very sore need of financial assistance. (1) Our General Mission Fund for the support of our Missions and Missionaries is \$3,208 in arrears. (2) A careful estimate for the current year shows a probable deficit of \$8.000. (3) Some important sources of revenue are diminishing instead of increasing their contributions. The S. P. G., for example, gives us £85 less than last year. (4) And it must be remembered we have ) not yet one dollar of Mission Endowment to which we may apply for help in such a time of need. These are facts which make imperative not only the most rigid economy, but also the most determined efforts to obtain increased contributions for the work, for they warn us that for the time being the very existence of our Mission work on its present basis is imperilled.

In the face of these facts, you will, I trust, think me justified in appealing to your Lordship (1) For your personal interest and co-operation.

(2) For permission to present my case in the near future, or some time during the year, either in person or by a representative, to the Church

The Bishop puts the case and claims of his Diocese so clearly that it only remains for me to express my earnest desire that you should pass a resolution appropriating to the mission fund of Algoma Ottawa's half of the amount hitherto contributed by the Diocese of Ontario to the Stipend of The Bishop of Algoma. You will no doubt also desire to assure the Bishop of Algoma of a warm welcome whenever he may be able to come in person or by a representative to afford our congregations information as to the work and needs of our Missionary Diocese. Let me add my conviction that we may place absolute confidence in the Bishop's determination to do all that can be done to encourage and enforce amongst the congregations the practice of self help, of depending upon themselves as far as possible for the support of the Church's ministrations.

### GENERAL SYNOD.

At the second session hed in Winnipeg last September, a Canon was adopted providing for a General Missionary Society co-extensive with the General Synod, to be managed by an executive committee consisting of two clergymen and two laymen from each Diocesan Synod, which is ordered to meet in Montreal on 2nd Wednesday in October next. Accordingly it is our duty to elect at this session two clergymen and two laymen to represent us on this executive committee. You will probably consider it well to send the same men whom you send to the Board of Management of the D. and F. Missionary Society, which meets at the same time and place.

### BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE D. AND F. M.

The following resolutions adopted by the Board have been forwarded to me:-

That the Board of Management do respectfully and earnestly request the Bishop, Clergy and Lay Representatives of each Diocese in this Ecclesiastical Province in Synod assembled, to appoint a Corresponding Committee, in acordance with Article VII, of those most deeply interested in the Church's missionary work, to promote in every way open to them within their Diocese the large and important interests committed to the Board of Management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and to correspond with the Board of Management; that the following be submitted to the Bishop, Clergy, and Lay Representatives of each Synod, as duties which might, if they approve and see fit so to order it, be assigned to such Corresponding Committee:—

- (1) To study and report from time to time to the Board of Management all plans and directions in which it may be feasible to quicken and extend that interests in the Church's missionary work, which ought to permeate and characterize every congregation and every family and member of the Church.
- (2) To watch and report upon the reading of the two annual appeals for Foreign and Domestic Missions in each congregation and the comparative results of such appeals from year to year.
- (3) To promote the formation of committees or the appointment of individuals in each congregation to interest the people generally in our Foreign and Domestic Missions, and to secure where it may be possible annual subscriptions to the Foreign and Domestic Funds.
- (4) To see that the collections after the Epiphany and Ascensiontide appeals are forwarded at once by the Churchwardens of each congregation to the Diocesan Treasurer of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and by him promptly forwarded to the General Treasurer.
- (5) That such Dioceses as already have a Committee on Domestic and Foreign Missions, either or both, be invited to direct such committee at once to act as the Corresponding Committee.

I hope that you will not fail to adopt at this session such amendments in our Diocesan Canon XIII as may be necessary to give effect amongst us to this resolution.

### THE PAROCHIAL AND DIOCESAN FINANCIAL YEAR.

Week and of Easter Day would be more profitable to all our people and especially to our office bearers, if they were not liable to be invaded and impaired by the pressing duties and the occasional excitement attending the closing of the financial year and the election of wardens and Lay representatives. I recommend you to appoint a committee to consider and report upon the advantages of making the financial year of every Parish end on 31st October, and ordering the election and appointment of Wardens and Lay representatives with the annual Vestry meetings, to be held immediately after 31st October. The same committee might consider also the advantages of closing the accounts of the Diocese on 30th November, and holding the Annual Synod in the month of January.

### THE CATHEDRAL OF THE DIOCESE OF OTTAWA.

Parish Church at Ottawa the Cathedral, the Mother Church in the Diocese of Ottawa. I have great satisfaction in inviting you all to a solemn service tomorrow, Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock, that we may implore God's blessing on the Cathedral and its use. The Evening Prayer of the Synod will be said as usual in St. John's Church at 5.30 p.m. The service at 8 p.m. in Christ Church will be a solemn benediction of the Cathedral.

The Very Reverend Dr. Lauder, who has been so long known amongst you as the Venerable Archdeacon of Ottawa, will be installed as Dean of the Cathedral. I have appointed as his successor in the Archdeaconry the Rev. J. J. Bogert, who will hereafter be known and welcomed among us as the Venerable Archdeacon of Ottawa. The Archdeacon, as you are aware, is a Diocesan and not a Cathedral officer. Accordingly no order is taken for his installation in tomorrow's service.

The installation of the Treasurer-Seneschal and of the Canons, who will form with the Dean the Cathedral Chapter, will be an interesting feature of the service. The Reverend Henry Pollard, of St. Augustin's College, Canterbury, and rector of St. John's tawa: the Reverend Andrew Cuscaden Nesbitt, of Bishop's Lennoxville, and Rector Smith's of Falls: George Jacob Low, of Trinity College, Toronto, and Retcor of Almonte; the Rev. Edward Arthur Welesley Hanington, B.A., of University College, New Brunswick, and Rector of St. Bartholomew's Church, Ottawa, and the Rev. William Jeffreys Muckleston, M.A., of Lincoln College, Oxford, and Rector of Perth, have accepted from me the dignity and title of Canons of Christ Church Cathedral, Ottawa.

Mr. William Horsley Rowley will also be installed in his office of Treasurer-Seneschal of the Cathedral. According to Cathedral usage and order, the Treasurer-Seneschal is a dignitary of the Cathedral. His place is after the Dean and Presentor and Chancellor, and prior to the Canons.

The sermon will be preached by my oldest and highly esteemed brother and fellow-laborer in God's Church, the Venerable Henry Roe, D.D., of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and Archdeacon of Quebec. I hope too that we shall be honored by the presence of the Primate of Canada.

I am deeply indebted to our excellent and painstaking Chancellor of the Diocese, for much valued help during the year, and recently for drafting and embodying in a proper instrument the Bishop's Compact, with the Rector and Churchwardens and Vestry of Christ church, as the foundation on which this Parish church becomes the Cathedral, the Mother Church of the people in this our Diocese of Offawa.

You will observe, my Brethren, that the Cathedral is not constituted under any Canon of the Synod or by any act of the Synod. It is the Bishop's Act, and the government and control of the Cathedral are in the Bishop, with the advice of the Dean and Chapter, and not in the Synod. I have made these statements with the view not of inviting any action on your part which would be out of order and inadmissible, but of awakening that interest and enthusiasm which will attend the union of all our congregations in the Mother Church—the Parish Church of the Diocese, wherein we meet as a unit, and that unit the Body of which Christ is the Head.

I have appointed the Rev. Arthur Phillips, of St. Augustin's College, Canterbury, and Rector of Hawkesbury, the Rural Dean of Prescott and Russell; also the Rev. A. Elliott, of Trinity College, Toronto, and Rector of Carleton Place, Rural Dean of Lanark; also the Rev. C. Scantlebury, of St. Boniface College, Warminister, and Rector of Huntley, Rural Dean of Carleton.

These appointments are for three years, with the possibility of a second period of 2 or 3 years, but with the determination on the part of the Bishop, as at present advised, not to entertain any representations from the clergy in favor of the appointment of the same clergyman for a third period.

There is so much business before the Synod that I regret that it has been necessary for me to occupy so much time. We will, however, now use all reasonable despatch in carrying each question which may be submitted to you to a safe and profitable conclusion. And may the power and presence of the Holy Ghost be with us to the end.

### Appendix-B. Reports of Standing Committees.

B-1. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Messrs. A. Code and J. P. Nutting were appointed official auditors for the year, with the remuneration of \$25.00 each. J. P. Nutting having resigned, David Tilley was appointed in his place.

The Executive, desiring to do business with the Merchants' Bank of Canada, as the Synod's Bank, authorized the Clerical and Lay Secretary to arrange terms with said Bank.

The Clerical and Lay Secretaries were authorized to borrow from the Merchants' Bank such sums as should be found necessary for current expenses of the Synod.

The Secretaries and Treasurer were authorized to make arrangements for the Synod Offices and Synod Hall. арр

W. L. Marler having resigned the office of Treasurer, the Bishop appointed C. A. Eliot in his place.

The action taken by the committee on the division of the funds of the Diocese of Ontario was ratified and confirmed, and the Committee was further empowered to settle all details in connection therewith.

The Registrar was authorized to obtain from the Registrar of the Diocese of Ontario all registers, deeds and documents belonging to or concerning parishes in this Diocese.

The Committee for the completion of the Episcopal Endowment Fund was instructed to engage a Clergyman or Layman to complete the work.

It was determined that the arbitration as to the division of the amount of the Macaulay Award be proceeded with, and that the Chancellor be instructed to press the claim of this Diocese.

A Committee appointed to open the new Books of the Diocese, duly curried out that work.

A report was received from the Chancellor on behalf of the Commissioners appointed in the matter of the division of the funds and securities. Such report being accepted and adopted, and a vote of thanks to the Commissioners passed.

A report was received from the Chancellor at the May meeting, as to the result of the arbitration, which was received with an expression of the full satisfaction of the Executive Committee. It was ordered to be printed.

A vote of thanks was passed to the Commissioners of the Diocese of Ontario for the manner in which our Commssioners were met and treated by them in the work of dividing the funds.

The Bishop was requested to re-arrange the Missions of Winchester, Chrysler, and Newington, so as to save \$250.00 to the Mission Board.

The Mission Board was requested to set apart \$400 per annum for opening up a Mission in the South of Ottawa.

The several standing committees made their half yearly reports at the Meetings in December and May, the substance of which will appear in their Annual Reports presented at the present session of the Syuod.

Your Committee regret that the amount is not larger, and would express the hope that the Capital may soon be increased to render an adequate income.

# B-7. REPORT OF DIVINITY STEDENTS, FUND COMMITTEE.

The Divinity Students' Fund Committee begs leave to report as follows:-

The financial statement submitted by the Clerical Secretary to your Committee shows total receipts for the year to have been \$335.83, made up as follows:—\$8.48, half share of collections received since division of Diocese; Lenten Offerings, \$127.66; interest on Consolidated Fund \$97.15; transferred from capital, \$102.54.

The expenditure in paying grants to exhibitioners amounted to exactly the same sum, viz., \$335.83.

We also learn from the same document that by the arrangement made between His Grace the Archbishop of Ontario, and His Lordship the Bishop of Ottawa, the following students were transferred to the Ottawa Docese, viz., Messrs. Howard, McCallum, Richards, Warren, and Steacy. Mr. McCallum having been ordained on the 16th May, is no longer on the list of exhibitioners, but your Committee, on petition and recommendation of Revd. Rural Dean Pollard, has placed on the list Mr. Robert Turley, of the City of Ottawa, a young man who has been accepted by His Lordship, and has already been attending Trinity College, Toronto. Judging from last year's total revenue, your committee could not guarantee even the \$65 per annum, which was the amount given last year, but resolved to divide the total receipts evenly among the five exhibitors, which would probably give each about \$60,00.

Your Committee, feeling strongly that some decided effort should be made to increase the revenue of the Fund, resolved unanimously to recommend to the Synod that there should be a resolution passed, making a collection compulsory in every church and station where service is held, on some special day, and the day fixed upon as suitable was Ash Wednesday. may be of interest in this first report urder the new Diocese, state. that whereas

for the year 1895-6, from the whole undivided Diocese, the pears only 186.56 was contributed by Lenten offerings, Ottawa portion alone sent in this year \$127.66; and also that in last year's report by Prof. Worrell there were 74 parishes in the undivided Diocese which gave no assistance whatever to this Fund, 39 alone giving what was contributed, whereas it appears that there are only a few parishes in the new Diocese which have not responded to the appeal for Lenten offerings for the Fund.

The Clerical Secretary states that a few of those in default have sent in their collections since the account was closed.

It surely ought to be, with every Clergyman and every Parish, a matter of honor that all legitimate Diocesan obligations should be faithfully discharged.

To show that there is cause for congratulation and hope, it may be mentioned that the new Diocese, comprised under the Archdeaconry of

Ottawa gave the year \$45.54 in excess of the previous year, thus:

As regards Foreign Missions, the amount in hand was not sufficient to pay the proper claims for Japan, etc.; indeed there would be a deficiency of \$650.00 if no more money was received during the present fiscal year.

Of these, the Committee could not comply with—for want of funds—Bishop Blyth's; for Work in Levant; for Chinese Work in British Columbia, and for Indian Schools until after further enquiry. 'They suggested that the \$200 granted to Docese of Selkirk might be given to Rev. Mr. Naylor; they acceeded to the request for \$13.75 a month for Rev. Mr. Metzumo, for one year; gave \$500 to Algoma Diocese, and assumed the expense of Mr. Waller's furlough, according to arrangement with the S. P. G. As to Mr. Borup, a committee was appointed to arrange with the Church people in Montreal, who had guaranteed the salary and expense, with regard to the requirements of the C. M. S. (It seems settled that Mr. Borup will leave in September for Uganda.)

A suggestion was made that all Sunday Schools should be asked to give one Sunday's collection each month to Missions.

The S. P. G. having decided to reduce the grants made to Canada and to withdraw altogether in 1900, the Bishop of Quebec was asked to consult the House of Bishops whilst in England, and appeal to the Venerable Society to reconsider their decision, which evidently was made under some misapprehension.

It was hoped that advantage would be taken of the presence of the Bishop in England, to negotiate with the C. M. S. as to their position with regard to the Board of Missions in Canada.

The observance of the Day of Intercession for Missions on or about the Festival of St. Andrew, was pressed upon the notice of the Board, and the Bishops of the Province were asked to urge the observance upon the Clergy.

A Committee was appointed to draw up a form of prayer for Missions for daily use, and another to revise the Mission Litany and Hymns used at Public Missionary Meetings.

Since last year a change has been made in the officers of the Board. Rev. Dr. Mockridge ceased his duties of paid Secretary-Treasurer and Editor of the Missionary Magazines, and Rev. Canon Spencer was appointed Hon. Secretary, and C. A. Eliot, Esq., Hon. Treasurer; and a temporary arrangement was made with Dr. Davidson, Montreal, to edit the Magazines until a permanent editor should be appointed. This was done because of a very general feeling that the Society could not yet afford to pay a sufficient salary to a Sec. Treasurer. It remains to be seen what the effect on the funds will be.

A very important matter was discussed at Kingston relating to the action of the General Synod last year in Winnipeg. A "scheme" for a "General Board of Missions of the Church of England in Canada" was passed by the Synod, whereby a Board of Bishops and Representatives from the Dioceses in the Dominion would control and direct all Missionary work. It is provided that all funds raised in any Diocese for Mission work beyond its own border, and shall be forwarded to and distributed by the Executive Committee of the General Synod. In fact this Executive Committee will perform all the duties the Board of Missions of the Ecclesiastical Province has been appointed to do by the Provincial Ecclesiastical Province has been appointed to do by the Provincial Synod. For convenience sake the Dominion has been formed into three Divisions, one of which is the present Ecclesiastical Province of Canada.

Naturally this "General Board of Missions" is the proper result of the "General Synod."

The "scheme" provides that the Executive Committee shall meet for the first time on the second Wednesday in October, 1897, in Montreal. To this Committee the Synod of Ottawa is asked to send Delegates, and this has been done.

# B-11. REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD.

The Mission Board of the Diocese of Ottawa begs leave to present to the Synod a report of its proceedings for the year ending April 30th, 1897.

The half-yearly meetings of the Board were held on the 2nd of December, 1896, and the 19th of May, 1897. Both meetings were well attended by members of the Board, which augurs well for the future welfare of this most important branch of the church's work.

The Board, now that it is fairly started on its career in this young Diocese, desires to acknowledge, with gratitude to God, the measure of success which has attended its first ingathering of collections to form a Mission Fund. The financial statement for the year ending April 30th

shows the receipts from all sources to be \$8,041.39 The disbursements, \$7,836, leaving a balance in hand of \$205.39.

In these disbursements is included \$1,022.88, being half the indebtedness of the fund when the separation from the Diocese of Ontario took place, and which that Diocese took out of Ottawa's share of the Sustentation Fund before handing it over. This sum has been restored to the Sustentation Fund, the capital of which now stands at \$15,157.12.

A full statement of receipts and expenditure will be appended to this report, which will show the winding up of the Board's connection with the Diocese of Ontario in the matter of the Mission Fund. The Board desires to draw attention to the gratifying fact that the same area now comprising the Diocese of Ottawa has contributed \$1,115.95 more than when it formed part of the Diocese of Ontario, and it is firmly persuaded that if the Clergy and Laity will endeavor earnestly to maintain the stability of this fund, upon which the growth of the Church so much depends, a great and blessed work can be done in extending the ministrations of the Church in every place from which a call for help comes.

There are at present 24 Missions receiving aid from this rund, whose united grants amount to \$5,200.

The necessity for re-arranging some Missions and opening up others, was fully discussed by the Board, when the following concusions were arrived at:—

It was recommended that as soon as the funds will permt, a grant of \$600 be made for missionary work in the County of Glengarry. This is a field that has long been neglected by the Church, and as there are now very few branches of the Church in that County, it was thought advisable to do aggressive work in order to gain a foothold for the Church; and for this purpose a large grant was recommended for the Missionary's entire support, as little or nothing can be expected from the Mission for a long time.

A grant of \$300 has been recommended for Whitney, on the Parry Sound Railway, where the Church must take up her position at once, to meet another demand which new railways are constantly forcing upon us. At present the Stations along this Railway are being served by the Missionary at Douglas, whose Mission includes Douglas, Grattan, Clontarf and Admaston for Sunday services, while Whitney, Round Lake and Killaloe receive week day services once a fortnight.

A grant has been made of \$300 to Rockland, a thriving village about seventeen miles from Ottawa, where there is an opening for the Church, as soon as the funds permit.

A grant has been made of \$400 for the starting of a mission south of Ottawa. This is a growing district, in which all the other religious bodies are at work, and have built churches. It is a matter of imperative necessity that the Church should at once take her place in this locality.

easure of to form a april 30th by the appointment of a Missionary, for whose support this grant is asked for a few years, in order to save our people and their children from being absorbed by others. The Board is of the opinion that no better missionary work can be done than in the outskirts of cities, where a grant for two or three years, in its infancy, may be the means of building up a congregation which will become in due time a strong supporter of the Mission Fund.

The Bishop, at his own suggestion, was requested to combine the Missions of Crysler, Newington and Avonmore, so as to make a saving of \$250 a year.

A letter from the Bishop of Algoma came before the Board asking for \$50 towards the building of a Church at Chisholm, within the Diocese of Ottawa, but served by the Missionary at Powasson, in the Diocese of Algoma. Mr. C. Macnab undertook to raise this amount during the session of the Board, and was successful, whereupon a cheque for \$50 was sent to the Missionary at Powasson.

A scheme for the better and more regular payment of Missionaries—known as the "Quebec scheme," was brought before the Board, and after discussion, the following resolution was adopted: "That the Quebec Scheme, as reported to the Mission Board, be submitted to the Executive Committee for their consideration, if their time will admit of it; and to the Synod of the Diocese, with the respectful request of the Mission Board, that the Synod do extend to them their counsel and influence in adopting it as a "by-law," subject from time to time, to such action as their experience may indicate to be advisable, and that the scheme be printed at once for the members of the Synod."

The Board is of the opinion that a change from the old system is necessary, and that the time has come when its Missionaries should no lorger be allowed to endure the discomforts they have too long been subjected to by the irregular payment of their stipends, and that it only requires patience and firmness to get this scheme, which is working so well in the Diocese of Quebec, into good working form in the Diocese of Ottawa.

A resolution was adopted by the Board recommending the Woman's Auxiliary of the D. and F. M. Society in this Diocese to include Diocesan Missions in their work.

The financial statement for the year ending April 30, is herewith appended.

B-12. Report of the Board of Rural Deans.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa:

The Board of Rural Deans at their meeting in May, appointed the Missionary Deputations for this year, and received and considered reports from the several Deaneries. These were referred to the Chairman, to prepare therefrom the Annual Report of the Board to Synod

It has not infrequently happened that the Board has come in for some very sharp criticism at the hands of the Synod—but this year they ask for your forbearance, as, having been bereft of one-half their number by the resignation of the Rural Deans of Carleton, Lanark, and Prescott and Russell, they come before you in mourning. The remnant that remaineth of the old Board, viz., the Rural Deans of Renfrew, Stormont and Pembreke, deem it their duty, as a tribute of justice—no less than an act of courtesy—to place on record an expression, not alone of regret, at the severance of old ties, but also of the Board's appreciation of the services rendered to the Church, more especially in the Country Missions, by the Rev. J. J. Bogert, for 15 and a half years Rural Dean of Carleton; by the Rev. A. C. Nesbitt, for 15 and a half years Rural Dean of Lanark (Renfrew also forming part of his Deanery for the first 7 and a half years); and by the Rev. H. Pollard, for 9 years Rural Dean of Prescott and Russell.

To the new Rural Deans who have just been appointed to the vacancies thus created, the Board extends the assurance of a very ready welcome, and expresses the hope that the infusion, all at one time, of so large a quantity of new blood into an old body, may not result in so great a shock to the system as to produce a state of collapse.

I.-CARLETON DEANERY, REV. J. J. BOGERT, M.A., RURAL DEAN

The Rural Dean reports generally a steady improvement throughout the Deanery. Two new parishes have been created, Archville and Janeville, making the total number 20. "To the additional power for Church work, by the increase of Clergy from 18 to 20, must be added the presence, wise counsel and most valuable assistance of the Lord Bishop, who is always ready and willing to help wherever opportunity is presented.". In the personnel of the Clergy, there have been changes, Revds. W. Fleming, James Empringham and F. B. Hodgins having left the Deanery, and Revds. W. Y. Daykin, J. Fisher, D'Arcy T. Clayton, F. W. Squires and W. J. Southam having been received into it, Under head

of "Property" the Rural Dean reports a Church at every station in which regular Sunday services are held, and a Parsonage in every Country Parish, except Nepean, Janeville and Archville. City Parishes there rae but three Parsonages. Special commendation is due the Parish of Manotick for the splendid advance it has made in its contribution to Clergyman's stipend, from \$470.00 in 1890 to \$900.00 in 1896, and \$850.00 in 1897, while at the same time the parish has been building and paying for a Parsonage.

During the year there was held a meeting of the Ruri-Deaconal Chapter, and a Conference of Clergy and Laity, presided over by the Lord Bishop. The Rural Dean, on retiring from the office which he has held for the past 15 and a half years, desires to thank the Clergy and Laity for the suppport they have given him in the performance of his duties, and calls attention to the advance which has been made in Church life and work during that period, as evidenced by the increase in Parishes 7, of Clergy, 9; of Churches, 22; of Parsonages, 7, and also by the improvements in the accessories of Divine worship which testifies to greater reverence and deeper devotion on the part of those concerned.

The Rural Dean reports one new Mission opened, that of Tennyson, and that the Missionary, Rev. C. F. Lowe, is a hard working and painstaking priest, who is doing good work on Church lines. The hope is expressed that in the not distant future another new Mission may be formed out of the Parishes of Clayton and Lanark. In his opinion a great opening is at hand in this new Diocese for so re-arranging Parishes and Missions as to increase the staff of Clergy, and thereby render possible an attempt to reclaim many who in times past, when Clergy were few, strayed away from the ecclesiastical home of their ancestors. He anticipated great results from the labours of the new Rural Dean, Rev. Archibald Elliott.

# III.-PEMBROKE DEANERY, REV. W. A. READ, RURAL DEAN.

This is a new Deanery, formed out of part of the Deanery of Renfrew, as set forth in the address of the Lord Bishop to the Synod last year. The Rural Dean reports that with the exception of Mattawa, which has been vacant since November last, Church work has been vigorously carried on and successfully sustained throughout the Deanery. In Beachburg, the Missionary, Rev. W. J. Moody, has been working with much energy and enthusiasm. As a result the long standing debt on the Parsonage has been removed, two Sunday Schools have been begun, with attendance of 60 pupils, a site for a Church at Westmeath has been given by a parishioner, Mr. Thomas Monsel, and another parishioner, Mr. James E. Bromley, has given the stone necessary for the building. In Cobden much good work is being done by the Missionary, Rev. J. A.

Shaw, supported by an appreciative body of parishioners. Two Stations, Douglas and Grattan, have been taken from the Mission, considerably reducing its strength, though a new Station, "Haley's," replaces them, with probably less than half the families. At this latter place a site has been purchased for a Church. A pulpit and Bishop's Chair has been presented to St. Paul's Church, and a tower and spire is being added to the building. In Petawawa, the Rural Dean reports the Missionary as laboring very energetically, and accords him much praise, it being a very large and very poor Mission, the Missionary being in journeyings oft, and not without perils. A new Church has been built at Tennants' Settlement, making five Churches in the Mission. St. George's, Alice, has been renovated, and a new organ purchased, while the debt on the Parish has been reduced to \$270.00. In regard to the Parish of Pembroke, the Rural Dean reports with much modesty, reporting it as pursuing the even tenor of its ways, which means that they have decidedly advanced the Rector's stipend, contributed generously to all the Diocesan Funds, added to their new Church Building Fund \$200.00, purchased and paid for a new organ, and in general kept up the excellent record of several years past. Stafford, the one other self-supporting Parish in the Deanery, is also the strongest in point of Cnurch population, having 125 families. The past year has excelled all previous years in regard to Parochial contributions, those to outside objects having more than doubled. The old Parish Church of St. Stephen has been entirely reseated. The Rural Dean makes special reference to the stipends of the Missionaries, as manifestly inadequate, viz., Beachburg, \$500; Cobden, \$618; Petawawa, \$462.00, and no present possibility of increase in any of them. Each Parish has its Parsonage. One Church in Petawawa Mission, and the Rectory and Churches of St. Stephen and St. Thomas, in Stafford Parish, are not insured. One meeting of the Ruri-Deaconal Chapter has been held, and the Deanery visited throughout by the Lord

# IV.-PRESCOTT AND RUSSELL DEANERY, REV. H. POLLARD, RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean reports one vacant Parish, Bearbrook, through the removal of the Rev. D'Arcy Clayton to Carleton Deanery, the transfer of the Rev. Wm. Lloyd to Quebec, the reception from Quebec of the Rev. Q. N. Hunter, the removal of Rev. J. Fraser from Navan and the appointment of the Rev. R. Orr as his successor. At Hawkesbury, an organ chamber has been added to the Church; in Plantagenet Mission the Parsonage has been much improved, while in Metcalfe the energy of the Missionary, the Rev. C. Clark, has been rewarded by a most liberal response for the Building Fund of the new Church, now in course of erection. It is also in contemplation soon to build a new Church at Navan. considerable subscriptions having been already promised or paid. Owe

ing to the peculiar position of the Deanery, it has been hard to get the Clergy of both ends together for meeting of Chapter, but this difficulty will disappear with the new railway facilities soon to be offered. The statistical returns show but little variation from last year, except in regard to Clerical income, which is greater in amount by \$400.00 than reported previous year, and number of Communicants increased from 591 to 719.

# V.-RENFREW DEANERY, REV. C. V. FORSTER BLISS, RURAL DEAN.

The report from this Deanery shows some re-arangement of Mission The Lay Missionary at Grattan, who had charge of Calabogie and Opeongo work, has retired, and a Missionary has been stationed at Douglas, with outstations of Admaston, Grattan and Clontarf, the congregation at Calabogie having been attached to the Mission of Reufrew. The work along the line of the O. A. & P. S. Railway is being performed by the Missionary of Douglas until such time as it may be feasible to appoint a travelling Missionary for the whole field west of Eganville, as recommended two years ago, and endorsed by the Synod, on funds becoming available. The first Church work at Whitney (Long Lake) was begun last year by Mr. George Field, Student of Trinity College, and ceased on his return to College in October. 'On the appointment of the Rev. W. P. Garrett to the Mission of Douglas, he was also licensed by the Bishop to perform work at Killaloe, Madawaska and Whitney, and Mr. Garrett is now performing this additional duty at the cost of much time and labor. There has been held one meeting of the Kuri-Deaconal Chapter, and a Conference of Clergy and Lay Workers, at which the Lord Bishop presided. From returns received from Parishes and information otherwise obtained, the Rural Dean reports that in every department of Church work throughout the Deanery, save one, advance has been made, and that the year has been marked by real progress. In the Parish of Arnprior, the services at Galetta have been increased from monthly to fortnightly; in Combermere a parsonage is being built from funds collected in Ottawa and elsewhere by the Missionary, the Rev. W. A. E. Butler, who, it may be noted, has, during the past year, gone through more hardships, and been subjected to greater strains on his powers of physical endurance than probably any other In Douglas, Sunday Schools have been Missionary in this Diocese. opened, with 21 pupils, and an excellent beginning made by the Missionary. In Eganville the balance of debt on the new Church at Lake Dore has been paid, and the debt for improvements to St. John's Church and Rectory reduced from \$400.00 to \$200.00. In Renfrew two town lots have been purchased and paid for, and contract let for the erection of a The Deanery has been visited throughout by the Lord Bishop, who held 11 services and Confirmed 81 candidates.

# VI.-STORMONT DEANERY, REV. R. L. M. HOUSTON, RURAL, DEAN.

The Rural Dean reports no change from last year in number of Parishes, Churches, Clergy or Parsonages, but in Sunday Schools one less. There has been an increase in Clerical stipends of \$187.00, and a decrease of nearly \$500.00 in other Parochial contributions. The value of Church property is reported as greater than that of any other Deanery except Carleton. In Communicants there is an increase of 133, and in Baptisms 27. The Rural Dean deprecates the withdrawal, as contemplated, of one or two Missionaries from the Deanery, owing to scarcity of Church population, and pressing demands of the Church in other Deaneries. says that should such a retrograde movement be deemed advisable by the Synod, he would suggest that on no account should more than one Missionary be withdrawn, and enters the plea that the \$250.00 grant thus saved ought in all fairness and justice be applied elsewhere in the Deanery, by beginning work in the long neglected and forgotten County of Glengarry, instead of taking the grant so saved to another part of the Diocese.

In conclusion, the Board again invites the attention of Synod to the manifestly inadequate stipends paid to the Missionary Clergy, and to the urgent necessity for some regulations designed to secure them a living income.

# B-13. Report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

Returns have been made from all Parishes. Several changes were made in the statistical forms and special pains were taken to impress upon the Clergy the necessity of giving details of each part of the Parish or Mission. By desire of the Bishop, those who have not compiled with this direction will receive back their returns to be corrected and forwarded to the Clerical Secretary without fail before June 15th.

The Committee recommends the drawing up of uniform Parochial Registers for use in the Diocese, containing columns giving such information as the Synod requires.

The following Parishes call for special notice :-

Manotick shows a decrease of 180 in Church population. St. Luke's, Ottawa, shows a great financial depression. Beachburg shows a marked improvement in Parochial activity, but a decrease in Clerical stipend, which we recommend to the serious consideration of the Rural Dean. The Parish of Eganville has made clear and neat returns, a worthy example

Taking the Deaneries and comparing with last year's returns: Carleton shows an increase of 76 families, a decrease of 40 Church population, an increase of 48 Communicants, decrease of 51 Baptisms, an increase of 202 Confirmees, a decrease of 27 marriages and an increase of 23 burials.

Financially there has been an increase in the amounts contributed to objects outside the Parishes.

Lanark shows increases of 64 families, 142 Church population, 356 Confirmees, 23 burials. Financially there are increases of \$128 for erection of property, \$128 for Clerical Stipends, \$2,009 for Parochial objects, a decrease of \$88 for outside objects.

Prescott and Russell shows increases of 29 families, 35 Church population, 125 Communicants, 143 Confirmees. We would draw the attention of the Rural Dean that there are reported only three early celebrations during the year. Financially there are increases of \$355 for Parochial objects, and \$396 in Clerical stipends.

Renfrew and Pembroke are classed together for the purposes of comparison. There are increases of 48 Confirmees and 17 burials. Financially \$49 increase in Clerical stipends, for Parochial objects \$516, and for outside objects, \$294.

Stormont shows decreases of 84 families, 120 Church population, but an increase of 133 Communicants. Financially, Clerical stipends have icreased \$187, but there is a decrease of \$72 for outside objects.

Summarizing, we find throughout the Diocese an increase of 113 families, 98 Church population, 224 Comunicants, 766 Confirmees and 13 burials. There is a slight decrease in the amount spent for the erection of buildings. Clerical stipends have very materially increased, as also have the amounts contributed for Parochial objects, as well as for objects outside the Parish.

Your Committee has very little comment to offer, but to say that the work of preparing this report is rendered unnecessarily arduous by the tardiness of a few of the Clergy.

There is a marked improvement in the returns generally, and as the

Lord Bishop has intimated, they are a fair indication of the State of the Church.

There is a steady and healthy progress in every Department, and the bright outlook of the Diocese at its inception has continued.

### B-16. Report of the Committee on Deceased Members.

The Committee on deceased members beg leave to report that during the past year three members of Synod have died: The Reverend C. B. Pettit, Canon of St. George's Cathedral, Kingston, and for many years Rector of Cornwall; John Duchelle Hunton, and Richard Pope, Lay Delegates.

Charles B. Pettit, Priest, was born in Grimsby, Ont., in 1827, ordained in Cobourg by Bishop Strachan, 1st Bishop of Toronto. After serving some years in Missionary work in the Diocese of Toronto, be became Rector of Richmond, where he laboured for 22 years. Afterwards he was appointed Rector of Cornwall in 1877, which position he occupied until 1894, when he retired. Removing to Toronto, he lived there until his death in December, 1896.

Richard Pope, Barrister, and Deputy Commissioner of Patents, died in February, 1897, in his 70th year. For the past 25 years he had represented St. John's Church as Lay representative to the Diocesan Synod.

John D. Hunton, at the time of his death Senior Church Warden of Christ Church, Ottawa, had represented his Parish in the Synod for some years. Mr. Hunton died in July, 1896, in the 50th year of his age.

### B-17. Report of the Committee on Religious Education in Public Schools.

1. At a meeting held on December 1st, 1896, the Committee took into consideration the scheme for the recognition of Voluntary Schools and for securing religious education in Public Schools, which was referred to it for consideration at the last meeting of the Synod, and which is as follows:—

### TAXATION.

- All ratepayers to contribute to a common "building" fund necessary to meet the cost of providing accommodation for all Public School children not attending Voluntary Schools.
- 2. All ratepayers to contribute to a common "Educational" Fund, necessary (with the Government grant) to meet the cost of imparting secular instruction to all children attending Public Schools (including Voluntary Schools).

This sum, with the Government grant, to be distributed among the various Public Schools (including Voluntary Schools) according to the average number of children attending each school,

# VOLUNTARY SCHOOLS.

3. Any religious body conducting a school in a suitable building, provided at their own cost, and (a) having an average attendance of at least thirty pupils maintaining a standard of efficiency in secular subjects, and (b) using the Public School Text Books, and (c) employing as teachers only those holding Public School certificates, to be entitled on the written application of at least twenty heads of families resident in the School District, to have such Voluntary School placed on the list of Public Schools, subject to the same inspection, and to share in such "Educational" Fund, according to the average attendance, as in the case of the other Public Schools.

# RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

4. Religious Instruction to be given in all Public Schools from 9 to 9.30 a.m. (a) Such Religious Instruction to be based upon a common text book in the ordinary (State) Public Schools and (b) in the (Voluntary) Public Schools to be such as the various religious bodies may respectively desire to impart to the children of parents of their own communion.

5. Pupils in either case not to be required to join in religious exercises or receive religious instruction objected to by their parents or guardians.

And the Committee thereupon passed the following resolution:

That this Committee gives a general assent to the scheme for securing religious instruction in Public Schools, printed at page 43 of Synod Journal of 1896, and especially the provisions as to religious instruction in Public Schools during the first half hour of each day, and that Mr. Orde, the Secretary of this Committee, be requested to correspond with similar committees of other Dioceses in the Province of Ontario for the purpose of co-operating with them and securing further information.

2. That the said resolution was presented at a conference on Diocesan Committees on Religious Education, held in Toronto on the 28th December, 1896, at which Conference your Committee was not represented, and was embodied in the Report of said Conference.

The said Conference passed certain important resolutions, the result of which is embodied in the "Scheme for Religious Education in the Public Schools in Ontario," which appears in full in the Printed Report of the said Conference, and is in its main outlines now approved by your Committee.

3. Since its last meeting and since the said Conference, your Committee has had the opportunity of further correspondence on the subject of the scheme submitted to it at the last session of the Synod, and has received further and better information as to the objects and practicability of such scheme, and after further consideration thereof, at two meetings of your Committee, held on the 18th May, 1897, your Committee

tee deems it proper to point out the fact that the proposed scheme as submitted to it for consideration is practically a scheme for the recognition by the Government of Voluntary Schools upon certain conditions, and that the question of Religious Education in Public Schools, while of great importance in itself, is, so far as the proposed scheme is concerned, merely one of the incidents thereof. Your Committee deems it wise to draw special attention to this fact, as the proposed scheme has an object of far greater and more lasting importance in the subject of education in general than the sole object of securing religious education in the Public Schools of the Province as they now exist.

- 4. After giving the proposed Voluntary School scheme much earnect consideration, your Committee is of the opinion that in its general outlines the scheme is practicable in Cities and large Towns, and merits the endorsement of the Synod for the following, among other reasons:
  - I. Economy.
  - II. Efficiency in Secular instruction.
  - III. Provision for Religious Instruction.

# I. Economy.

The scheme commends itself on the ground of economy because by its adoption municipalities could in many cases be saved the expense of purchasing School sites and erecting and maintaining school buildings, by merely utilizing for school purposes and under school board regulations and provisions, buildings built or provided by religious bodies for school purposes, the sole practical difference (so far as education is concerned) between such schools and the ordinary Public Schools being that such religious bodies would have the control and supervision of the character of the religious instruction to be given therein.

## 11. Efficiency in Secular Instruction.

Voluntary Schools being under the same system of Government Inspection as the present Public Schools, and employing as teachers, only those holding Public School certificates, and using the same text books, a guarantee is thus provided for at least equal efficiency as is now secured. And furthermore, in cases where it is desired to raise any school to the highest possible efficiency, an opportunity would be afforded to effect this by private voluntary contributions, without laying any additional burden upon the taxpayers.

### III. Provision for Religious Instruction.

The scheme offers a practicable method for procuring Religious instruction. We would point out that while the scheme provides that the children in all Public Schools (including Voluntary Schools) shall receive exactly the same secular instruction, it also enacts that Religious Instruction shall be given in the ordinary Public Schools for one-half hour each day from a text book acceptable to all Christian bodies. And

further, it affords to members of any religious body the opoprtunity to furnish, at their own cost, the Religious Instruction they desire.

Your Committee would therefore recommend:

- 1. That the Voluntary School Scheme in its general outline be endorsed by the Synod as being desirable and practicable in Cities and large Towns.
- 2. The appointment of a representative Committee with instructions to confer and co-operate with any similar committees appointed by other Religious bodies to deal with this matter.
  - 3. To report to the next meeting of this Synod.

B-19. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PARISH BOUNDARIES.

Your Committee on Parish Boundaries beg to report that they have held two meetings. At the first of these, which took place on the 2nd December, 1896, Mr. L. M. Fortier was elected chairman.

On the 10th December, 1896, a circular was mailed to the Clergy throughout the Diocese as follows:—

"604 Maria Street, "Ottawa, 10th December, 1896.

"Revd. and Dear Sir,-

"In pursuance to a resolution to that effect, passed by the "Committee on Parish Boundaries, at its late Meeting in the City of "Ottawa, I have the honour to request you to be so good as to furnish "ne with a statement indicating the boundaries which you and your "Churchwardens would desire to have regarded as the boundaries of "the Parish or Mission, or of the Parishes or Missions under your "charge. I may ald that it will greatly oblige and facilitate the work "of the Committee if you can make it convenient to give this matter "immediate attention. For the authority on which this circuiar is "issued, I respectfully refer you to the resolution appointing the Committee on Parish Boundaries (p. 43, Journal, 1st Sess., Synod Dio." Ottawa.

Out of the 53 incumbents of Parishes and Missions, 17 only sent answers to this circular, and of these answers 13 only are of a definite character; so that 40 of the Clergy have yet to be heard from dennitely in this matter. # Appendix C .- Division of Funds.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Ottawa, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

May it please Your Lordship .

The Commissioners appointed by the resolution of the Synod of the Diocese on the 11th July, 1896, under the agreement arrived at by Judge Senkler with the Diocese of Ontario, with respect to the division of the funds and securities, have the honor to report as follows:—

After the prorogation of the first Synod of this Diocese in July last, the Chancellor of this Diocese, in conjunction with Chancellor Walkem, of the Diocese of Ontario, prepared and completed a formal agreement between the two Synods; and on the 12th August, 1896, said agreement was executed in triplicate by His Grace the Archbishop of Ontario and your Lordship; an original of which agreement is herewith submitted. A printed copy of the agreement referred to will be found on page 79 of the first Journal of this Synod.

The Synod of the Diocese of Ontario having appointed as their Commissioners Dr. R. T. Walkem, Q.C.; Chancellor; Mr. E. J. B. Pense, Treasurer, and the Rev. Stearne Tighe, correspondence ensued between us and the authorities of the Diocese of Ontario regarding a meeting of the Commissioners, which was ultimately held in Kirgston on the 16th, 17th and 18th November, 1896, when all six Commissioners met for the purposes of dividing the funds and apportioning the securities between the two Dioceses.

Your Commissioners were most courteously received by their brother Commissioners in Kingston, and every effort was made (by late sittings and otherwise) to accomplish the work of the Commission at this November session of the Commission; with the result that the division of the funds and securities was practically completed, with the exception of some details of account.

The amount of the capital apportioned to this Diocese was \$192,988.34, the details of which (along with a synopsis of the securities apportioned as representing the same) will be found in a copy of certain minutes of the meeting of the Commissioners appended hereto.

The making and adjusting of the accounts between the two Dioceses, owing to the fact that the Synod of Ontario had necessarily administered the funds belonging to this Diocese since the 1st of May, 1896, occupied considerable time, asd necessitated a great deal of correspondence between Ottawa and Kingston. Your Commissioners again met at Ottawa on the 30th December, 1896, and were then afforded much assistance by the Lay Secretary of this Synod, Mr. J. F. Orde, by the Diocesan Treasurer, Mr. C. A. Eliot and by the Clerical Secretary. After a protracted meeting, your Commissioners resolved to request the Lay Secretary and the Treasurer to proceed to Kingston, and there confer with the Ontario Commissioners respecting adjustment and details of the accounts. Subsequently, on

the 7th and 8th January, 1897, Mr. Orde, and Mr. Eliot were kind enough to accordingly visit Kingston, where they were most courteousy received by the Ontario Commissioners and the Clerical Secretary of that Diocese. After a somewhat protracted conference in Kingston, the Lay Secretary and Treasurer returned to Ottawa, reporting a partial settlement of the accounts between the two Synods. Subsequently the Rev. Canon Spencer, Clerical Secretary of Ontario, visited Ottawa, and a conference took place with him in respect to the details then still open.

After a great deal of correspondence between the authorities of both dioceses, all accounts (with the slight exception to be mentioned presently) between the two Synois, were adjusted by the Commissioners engaged, and on the 14th May, 1897, these accounts were signed by the six Commissioners and by the Clerical Secretary of Ontario, and the Lay Secretary of this Diocese, a signed original of which accounts is here with submitted. The only outstanding question between the two Synods now is the amount due to this Diocese by Ontario for interest on the Leanox and Addington debenture, which was set aside by the Commissioners to answer the award of the arbitrator referred to in the agreement of the 12th of August, 1896. A note wil be found appended to the accompanying accounts with respect to this matter.

In submitting this report, your Commissioners desire .o express their apprecation of the fair and courteous treatment they received from their brother Commissioners of Ontario, whose evident intention, while properly protecting the interests of their own Diocese, was throughout to do what was fair, right and proper. Every facility was given to your Commissioners for the examination of the books of the Synod of Ontario, and of the securities dealt with. All such securities were examined separately by your Commissioners, the Chancellor, and Clerical Secretary of Ontario affording your Commissioners all available information respecting the latter. The Treasurer and Lay Secretary brought back with them from Kingston the securities apportioned to this diocese. The mortgages included therein have since been all assigned to this Synod, and the assignments registered. The balance has been paid to this Synod in cash in accordance with the concluding entries in the accompanying signed accounts.

We have requested the Chancellor of this Diocese to report separately respecting the arbitration proceedings under the agreement of the 12th of August, 1896, the Executive committee having instructed the Chancellor to press the arbitration in November last. Before closing this branch of their report, your Commissioners desire to place on record their high appreciatios of the valuable services rendered to them by the officials of the Synod, especially by the Lay Secretary, Mr. J. F. Orde, and the Treasurer, Mr. C. A. Eliot.

#### DIVISION OF SECURITIES.

Meetings of the Commissioners appointed by the Dioceses of Ontario and Ottawa, to apportion the funds belonging to the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, under terms of a deed or agreement made between the two Synods, dated August 12th, 1896, were held in the Synod Office, Kingston, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, November 16th, 17th and 18th, 1896.

There were present :-

Representing Ontario Diocese—R. T. Walkem, Q. C., Chancellor; Rev. Stearne Tighe, and Edw. J. B. Pense, Treasurer.

Representing Ottawa Docese—J. Travers Lewis, Chancellor; Judge Senkler and W. H. Rowley.

It was agreed under terms of the deed of August 12th, 1896, that Mr. J. A. Worrell, Q.C., Toronto, be appointed the umpire or referee referred to therein.

In dealing with and apportioning the Mortgage securities, it is understood and it is agreed (unanimously) that as to those classed as "good" and "fair," all payments received since 1st May last and all interest accrued to 1st May last are to be taken into consideration in reaching a final balance. Whereas, on the other hand, in dealing with the securities classed as "doubtful," as "dependent chiefly on Real Estate," and on Real Estate itself, the accrued interest and all payments since 1st May last are to go to whichever Synod the various last named three classes of securities may be apportioned by this Commission.

The funds and securities to be dealt with were those recorded on pages 248, 249 and 250 of the Journal of Proceedings of Ontario Diocese, as per Auditors' statement of Capital Account on 1st May, 1896, the total amount being \$546,972.84, to which sum the Commissioners added balances of interest at the credit of the Clergy Superannuation Fund, \$512.10, and at the credit of the Divinity Students' Fund of \$551.39. The total amount to be dealt with was \$548,036.33, divided as follows:—

#### Appendix D-Arbitrators' Report.

Ottawa, 18th May, 1897.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Ottawa, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

May it please Your Lordship:

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Diocese, held in November last, it was resolved that the arbitration contemplated by the Deed of Agreement between the Synods of Ontario and Ottawa, dated 12th August, 1896. should be pressed by this Synod, and I was then instructed to proceed with the matter with all despatch.

Accordingly, after considerable correspondence with the authorities at Kingston, the arbitrator, Mr. J. A. Worrell, Q.C., Chancellor of the Diocese of Toronto, appointed the 4th February, 1897, for the purpose of proceeding with the reference in Toronto.

The task involved considerable research respecting the dealings of the Dioceses of Toronto, Huron and Ontario, with the original clerical commutants with the government, before and during the years 1863 to 1869. The record of these transactions was not to be had in print, after exhaustive enquiry; nor were the original documents and agreements relating thereto readily found. In my search for material on which to found our case, I received great assistance from the Rev. Rural Dean Bogert, who preceded me to Toronto, and with whom I spent a most profitable day in Toronto before the argument. The secretary of the Diocese of Toronto afforded us such information as was there obtainable; but, owing to the old records of that Diocese not being at present catalogued or systematically kept, I experienced some difficulty in obtaining desired information. It was not, in fact, until the day of the argument that we were able to obtain all of the material used upon the reference.

It will be remembered that the question submitted to the arbitrator was with respect to the proper disposition of the sum of \$12,432.00, required under the award known as "The Macaulay Award" (referred to on page 594 of the Journal of the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario for 1868) to meet the annual payment of \$345.92 to the Bishop of Ontario and \$400.00 to the Archdeacon, heretofore administered by the Synod of Ontario in the Cergy Trust Fund,

The arbitrator, Chancellor Worrell, Q.C., took up the reference early on the 4th February, 1897; Dr. Walkem, Q.C., representing Ontario, and I representing this Diocese. The Rev. Rural Dean Bogert was present throughout the proceedings, and afforded me most valuable information and assistance.

The evidence submitted on behalf of both Synods was wholly documentary. The argument lasted all day; the arbitrator reserving judgment. It was agreed by both sides that the fee of the Arbitrator, Chancellor Worrell, should, in any event, be borne equally by both Synods, and that each Synod should, in any event, bear its own costs.

On the 1st March, 1897, I received notice from the arbitrator that he had made his award, a copy of which instrument (dated 27th February, 1897) is herewith submitted.

It is well here to indicate the sums of which the \$12,-432.00 in dispute is composed.

After careful perusal of all the evidence obtainable, it was found that the sum in dispute was made up as follows :-

£3,108 0 0\$12,432 00 The result of the award is that, out of the \$12,432.00 in question, Ontario retains (A) the \$3,024.00 in trust to pay the income thereof to the Archdeacon of Ontario; that Ontario also retains (C) the \$5,765,33, during the incumbency

of the present Archbishop, being the amount in the Clergy Trust Fund of Ontario utilized @ 6 per cent to help pay the Bishop of Ontario his £400.0.0. a year, but that, after the See of Ontario shall have next become vacant, this \$5,765.33 is to be divided equally between Ontario and Ottawa; and that the (B) \$3,642.67 is directed to be forthwith divided equally between the two Synods, as part of the Clergy Trust Fund.

The result of this to us is that this Synod immediately gets \$1,821.38 from Ontario, as part of the Clergy Trust Fund; and also will receive, on the next vacancy in the See of Ontario, \$2,882.66, as part of the Clergy Trust Fund; making in all \$4,704.04 immediately or ultimately payable to Ottawa, out of the \$6,216.00 which was Ottawa's maximum claim upon the occasion of the arbitration.

Accompanying this report, I append a copy of the Macaulay Award, dated 29th September, 1859, and copies of the Covenants entered into by the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario with the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, dated respectively the 5th August, 1863, and 30th January, 1868. These three documents, which were only obtainable after considerable enquiry and research, will afford those interested some historical information upon the matters in dispute.

I do not here set out the various arguments put forward, pro and con, on the occasion of the arbitration proceedings. The facts and arguments in support of the contentions of this Synod are somewhat voluminous, as contained in my brief; but I trust that the Synod will assume that, considering the limited amount of data obtainable, its case was fully presented to the Arbitrator.

I desire to add, before closing, that the Arbitrator accorded me a most courteous and patient hearing; and I further wish to again express my thanks to the Rev. Rural Dean Bogert for his valuable services, and Mr. J. F. Orde for timely assistance in the consideration of this matter.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

WHEREAS, by an Indenture bearing date the Twelfth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety six, and made between The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario (hereinafter called "the Synod of Ontario") and the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa (hereinafter called "the Synod of Ottawa") AFTER RECITING that the Diocese of Ottawa had been lately set off from the Diocese of Ontario, and that by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed in the fifty-ninth year of Her Majesty's reign and Chaptered 117 provision was made for the incorporation of the Synod of Ottawa, and for enabling the said Synon to take and receive from the Synod of Ontario such proportion of the funds and property held in trust for various purposes by the Synod of Ontario, as the Synod of Ottawa might become entitled to by virtue of any arrangement or agreement arrived at between the said Synods, IT WAS THEREBY arranged and agreed among other things that the Clergy Trust Fund of the Diccese of Ontario should be so dealt with that there should be first deducted from the capital of the said Fund the sum of twelve thousand,

four hundred and thirty-two dollars "required under the award known as the 'Macaulay Award,' to meet the annual payments of three hundred and forty-five dollars and ninety-two cents to the Bishop and four hundred dollars to the Archdeacon," and that subject to such deduction the fund should be divided equally between the Synod of Ontario and the Synod of Ottawa, and the question of the proper disposition of the said sum of twelve thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars was thereby referred for determination to me as Arbitrator, it being provided that until an Award should be made in respect of the said sum of twelve thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars the Synod of Ontario should pay the said sum of three hundred and forty-five dollars and ninety-two cents, payable to the Archbishop, and the sum of four hundred dollars payable to the Archdeacons of Kingston and Ottawa out of the interest thereof, and that the said capital of twelve thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars should be thereafter disposed of by the Synod of Ontario in accordance with the terms of the said Award.

NOW KNOW YE that I, the said Arbitrator, having taken upon myself the burden of the said reference and having duly heard, weighed and considered the allegations and matters urged on behalf of the said Synod of Ontario and the said Synod of Ottawa. and also the proofs, vouchers, and documents which have been given in evidence before me, DO HEREBY MAKE and publish this, my award of and concerning the matters so referred to me.

FIRSTLY. I DO AWARD, order and adjudge that the sum of three thousand and twenty-four dollars (or seven hundred and fifty-six pounds of old Canadian currency) received by the Synod of Ontario in or about the years 1863 and 1864 from the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto be retained by the Synod of Ontario subject to the trusts and conditions under which the same was paid to the said Synod by the said Church Society of Toronto in pursuance of the said "Macaulay Award."

SECONDLY. AS REGARDS the sum of nine thousand four hundred and eight dollars, being the balance of the said sum of twelve thousand four hundred and thirty-two dollars, I DO AWARD, order and adjudge that such portion thereof as would be required to yield if invested at interest at the rate of six per cent per annum the sum of three hundred and forty-five dollars and ninety-two cents, now payable to the Archbishop of Ontario, that is to say,

the sum of five thousand seven hundred and sixty-five dollars and thirty-three cents be retained by the Synod of Ontario during the Incumbency of the See of Ontario by the said Archbishop, and on a vacancy of the said See occurring by the death of the said Archbishop or otherwise, that the said sum be divided equally between the Synod of Ontario and the Synod of Ottawa as part of the said Clergy Trust Fund, and that the balance of the said sum, namely three thousand six hundred and forty-two dollars and sixty seven cents, be forthwith divided equally between the said two Synods as part of the said Clergy Trust Fund.

WHEREAS the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto and the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron, by bonds bearing date the thirtieth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, became bound each to the other in the penal sum of one hundred thousand pounds of lawful money of Canada, WHEREBY AFTER RECITING that before the incorporation of the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron, the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto had received divers lands, stocks, funds and moneys for the various purposes for which the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto was authorized to hold the same under and by virtue of the Act of Parliament incorporating the said Church Society, AND ALSO that the Act of Incorporation of the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron authorized and enabled the said last named Church Society to take, receive and hold any property that might be transferred or conveyed to that Society by any other Church Society of the Church of England in Canada, AND ALSO that the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron had just claims to receive some portion of the said lands, stocks, funds and moneys of the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, AND ALSO that the basis of apportionment should be decided by the arbitrament of the present Bishops of Toronto and Huron, and the Honourable Sir James Buchanan Macaulay, they were conditioned that if the said Church Societies should well and truly obey, abide by and perform any award that might be made under the hands and seals of the said present Bishops of Toronto and Huron, and the said Honourable Sir James Buchanan Macaulay, or in the event of the said Bishops being unable to concur in a joint award, then of any award of the said Sir James or concernalone touching Buchanan Macaulay, division or apportionment of the ing the stocks, funds and moneys of the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, between the said Church Societies and the manner in which and the time when such division or apportioment should be carried out, then those obligatios should be void.

NOW KNOW YE that we, the said Arbitrators, having taken upon ourselves the burden of the said award, and heard and examined the allegations and matters urged on behalf of each of the said Church Societies, DO unanimously award, order and adjudge as follows respecting the matters submitted to us by the said Church Societies.

FIRST. In respect of the funds of the Widows and Orphans' Fund of the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, WE DO AWARD, ORDER AND ADJUDGE that the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall convey, assign and transfer to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron absolutely in full satisfaction and discharge of all claims of the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron on the said Widows' and Orphans' Fund the following securities:

In respect of the lands held by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto for general purposes and for the Students' Fund, WE DO AWARD, ORDER AND ADJUDGE that all those lands now held by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto which are within the local limits of the Diocese of Huron, amounting to one thousand five hundred and eighty acres, together with two hundred acres within the same limits held in trust for the Students' Fund, be conveyed and assigned to The Church Society of the Diocese of Huron forever, AND we also recommend that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts shall convey and assign all their lands within the same limits, amounting to three hundred and eighty-eight acres, to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron at d their assigns forever.

THIRDLY. In respect of lands held in special trust WE DO AWARD, ORDER AND ADJUDGE that the Toronto of the Diocese of Church Society convey and assign to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron and their assigns forever ALL lands within either of the Dioceses of Toronto or Huron to which special trusts are attached for the benefit of any church, parsonage, rectory or otherwise howsoever within the limits of the Diocese of Huron such lands held by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, amounting in all to nine hundred and two acres.

FOURTHLY. In respect of all other funds held by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto except the commutation fund, WE DO AWARD AND ADJUDGE that the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall transfer, convey and assign to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron absolutely the following securities:

FIFTHLY. In respect of the Commutation Fund, WE DO AWARD, ORDER AND ADJUDGE that the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall assign, transfer and deliver to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron in Debentures in the Schedule hereto annexed, signed by us, at their par value, the sum of sixty-six thousand and fifty-two pounds and five shillings and in cash the sum of four hundred and ninety-eight pounds and fifteen shillings which the said Church Society of the Diocese of Huron shall accept and receive in full satisfaction and discharge of all their claims upon the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto in respect of the said Commutation Fund, except as hereinafter mentioned.

SIXTHLY. WE DO AWARD, ORDER AND AD-JUDGE that the said several conveyances, assignments, transfers, divisions, and payments shall be made by The Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto to The Church Society of the Diocese of Huron on or before the fifteenth day of January next, and that the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall continue to pay the salaries and annuities charged respectively on the Commutation and Widows' and Orphans' Funds of the Clergymen, Widows, or Orphans within the Diocese of Huron, on the first days of October and January next, and that in the conveyance assignment and transfer of all or any of the securities hereinbefore named to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron, any unpaid interest thereon shall be calculated to the first day of January next and allowed to the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto by the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron as a payment of so much money to the said last named Church Society.

SEVENTHLY. That on the completion of the said conveyances, deliveries and payments the said Church Societies shall execute each to the other under their Corporate Seals the following deeds and bonds:

FIRST. Mutual releases touching and concerning all and every the matters, claims and things mentioned and contained in this award and all cause and causes of action of every kind and nature either at law or in equity to the date of this our award.

SECONDLY. Mutual bonds in penalties of one hundred thousand pounds respectively to save harmless and indemnified from any loss any of the Clergy whose salaries are charged by covenant made with The Church Soclety of the Diocese of Toronto on the Commutation Fund in either Diocese at the date of this our award or the Widows and Orphans of any Clergymen in either Diocese who are or would be entitled to a charge on the Widows and Orphans' Fund at the date of this our award if no division of that fund were made The Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto becoming so bound to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron to make up any deficiency in the annual amount so chargeable upon the Commutation or Widows' and Orphans' Funds for the Clergy Wfdows and Orphans in this second section mentioned within the Diocese of Huron, AND the said Church Society of the Diocese of Huron being bound to the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto in the same manner and to the same extent for the Clergy Widows and Orphans in this second section mentioned within the Diocese of Toronto, but that no such deficiency shall be payable by either Church Society to the other unless notified by the Church Society so claiming for such deficiency on or before the first day of February in the year next after that in which such deficiency shall occur, the year for calculating such deficiency being from the first day of January in one year to the first day of January in the next year.

THIRDLY. That the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall execute a bond to the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron in a penalty of ten thousand pounds, that on the deaths of the present Bishop of Toronto the present Archdeacon of York and the present Archdeacon of Kingston severally, the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto shall pay to the said Church Society of the Diocese of Huron the following sums: On the death of the Bishop of Toronto the sum if £2,686, 13, 4 (two thousand six hundred and eighty-six pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence).

On the death of the Archdeacon of York the sum of £1,333, 0, 0 (one thousand, three hundred and thirty-three pounds).

On the death of the Archdeacon of Kingston the sum of £756, 0, 0 (seven hundred and fifty-six pounds),

And also on the deaths of all of the said three Clergymen the said Bishop and the said Archdeacons (or on the first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy, whichever shall first happen) pay to the said Church Society of the Docese of Huron the further sum of £1,205, 13, 4 (one thousand two hundred and five pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence), the whole of such payments to be made by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto in any securities held by such Society at the time of such payment bearing six per cent interest at their par value, but before any such payment or payments shall be made by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, the Church Society of the Diocese of Huron shall execute a covenant to the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto that the said sums so paid as in this section mentioned, together with the sum of £2,352, 00 (two thousand three hundred and fifty two pounds) which shall be provided by the said Church Society of the Diocese of Huron, shall stand, be and remain forever a fund from the proceeds of which shall be paid a salary of four hundred pounds per annum to the Bishop of Huron for the time being, and a salary of one hundred pounds per annum for an Archdeacon of Huron for the time being, it being our intention, AND WE DO HEREBY AWARD, DECREE AND ADJUDGE that similar sums should be paid by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto for

the benefit of the Eastern Diocese, whenever that Diocese shall be set apart, on the same conditions as the said sums are hereby awarded to the Diocese of Huron. And that the sum of £8,333, 6, 8 (eight thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds, six shillings and eight pence) should also be set apart from the said Commutation Fund and stand forever in the said Diocese of Toronto as a fund from which after the death of the present Incumbents a salary of four hundred pounds per annum shall be paid to the Bishop of Toronto for the time being and a salary of one hundred pounds per annum to an Archdeacon of the Diocese of Toronto for the time being. And The Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto,

Of the Second Part.

WHEREAS the Right Reverend John Strachan, Lord Bishop of Toronto; the Right Reverend Benjamin Cronyn, Lord Bishop of Huron, and the late the Honorable Sir James Buchanan Macaulay, Knight, by their award, made in the matter of the Church Societies of the Dioceses of Toronto and Huron, adjudged and ordered that for the benefit of the Eastern Diocese, whenever that Diocese should be set apart, and upon the death of the then Archdeacon of Kingston, the sum of seven hundred ad fifty-six pounds should be paid over by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto to the said Eastern Diocese as and towards creating a fund for the payment of an annual salary to the Archdeacon of the said Eastern Diocese, and that the said Diocese should set apart out of their funds such a sum as with the foregoing sum of seven hundred

and fifty-six pounds, would realize and secure an income of one hundred pounds per annum to an Archdeacon of said Eastern Diocese.

AND WHEREAS the said Eastern Diocese has been duly erected and set apart under the name of the Diocese of Ontario, and the said Archdeacon of Kingston hath de-

parted this life,

Therefore, and in pursuance of the terms of the said Award, the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto hath paid over to the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario as representing the said Diocese of Ontario the said sum of seven hundred and fifty-six pounds for the purposes aforesaid, and the said the Incorporated Synod hath agreed to set apart for the purpose of completing the said fund to be known as "The Archdiaconal Fund," the sum of nine hundred and ten pounds thirteen shillings, and four pence (£910, 13, 4).

Now These Presents Witness and it is hereby covenanted and agreed between the parties hereto that the parties of the first part, their successors and assigns shall and will set apart, and at all times hereafter keep set apart, the said sums of seven hundred and fifty-six pounds and nine hundred and ten pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence making together the sum of sixteen hundred and sixty-six pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, as and for a perpetual fund called "The Archdiaconal Fund," the annual proceeds of which shall be devoted towards the payment of the Annual Salary of one hundred pounds to the Archdeacon of Ontario.

Lord Bishop of Huron, and the Honorable Sir James Buchanan Macaulay, Knight, by their Award, made in the matter of the Church Societies of the Dioceses of Toronto and Huron, on the twenty-ninth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine adjudged amongst other matters that for the benefit of the Eastern Diocese whenever the said Diocese should be set apart and for the purpose of creating a fund for the payment of an annual salary to the Lord Bishop of the said Diocese of Ontario, being the Eastern Diocese referred to in said Award, the said Church Society should pay to the said Eastern Diocese upon the death of the said Bishop of Toronto the sum of two thousand six hundred and eighty six pounds; on the death of the then Archdeacon of York the sum of one thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds; on the death of the Archdeacon of Kingston the sum of seven hundred and fifty six pounds, and also on the deaths of the said Clergymen or on the first day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy, whichever shall first happen, the further sum of one thousand two hundred and five pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, the whole of such payments to be made by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto in any securities held by such Society at the time of such payment, bearing six per cent. interest at their par value.

And that said new Diocese should set apart out of their funds such a sum as with the said sums would realize and secure an annual income or salary of four hundred pounds to the Bishop of the said new Diocese.

And whereas the said Eastern Diocese has been duly set apart and erected under the name of the Diocese of Ontario, and a Bishop thereof has been duly elected and consecrated and by an Act of Incorporation "The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario" is authorized and enabled to take, receive and hold any property for the benefit of the Diocese and has all the Corporate rights, powers and privileges conferred on any Church Society in this Province—and in part performance of said Award, the said Archdeacon of Kingston being deceased, the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto hath paid over to The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, the sum of money payable by the said Church Society of Toronto upon, the death of the Archdeacon of Kingston. And whereas the said Lord Bishop of Toronto departed this life on the

first day of November last, and the Archdeacon of York is virtually deceased, and The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario is entitled to receive said monies for the purposes mentioned.

Now this INDENTURE witnesseth that in pursuance of the said in part recited Award and of the direction in that behalf contained the said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario covenants to and with the said Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto that the said sums of two thousand six hundred and eighty-six pounds, thirteen shillings and four-pence; one thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds, and one thousand two hundred and five pounds thirteen shillings and four pence so to be paid as aforesaid to the said Diocese of Ontario by the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto-that is to say the sum of two thousand six hundred and eighty-six pounds thirteen shillings and four pence to be paid on the death of the said Lord Bishop of Toronto; the sum of one thousand three hundred and thirty-three pounds to be paid on the death of the said Archdeacon of York; the sum of one thousand two hundred and five pounds thirteen shillings and four pence to be paid on the deaths of all the said two Clergymen, together with the sum of one thousand four hundred and forty-one pounds six shillings and eight pence which shall be provided by the said The Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, shall stand, be and remain forever a fund from the proceeds of which shall be paid a salary of four hundred pounds per annum to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Ontario for the time being.

# Appendix E.-Registrar's Report.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa:

The Registrar of the Diocese begs to report—

I was appointed Registrar by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese on the Twelfth day of June, 1896.

I have opened the following books in connection with the office:

- (1) A general register for the registration of the official acts of the Bishop, Clergy, and Officers of the Synod; list of the Clergy, etc.; Confirmations and Ordinations, etc.
- (2) Books for the recording of conveyances in connection with the Parishes of the Diocese.

I propose also to have a book describing the boundaries of the Diocese, Archdeaconries, Rural Deaneries and Parishes.

These are books kept by the Registrar of the Diocese of Ontario, and I propose to follow his admirable system as nearly as possible.

# DEEDS AND PARISH REGISTERS.

I have received from the Registrar of the Diocese of Outario all Parish Registrars, Title Deeds, etc., in his possession, connected with the various parishes in the Diocese of Ottawa, all of which are in the vault

In this connection I might remark that some of the Parish registers are of the most flimsy character, and I would respectfully suggest that the Synod should adopt a form of Register which should be used in future, so that the system may be made more uniform than it is at pre-

I have so far received no Parish Registers from the Clergy of the Diocese, and would request those who have registers which are filled up, or which are not in a good state of preservation, to have them sent to me.

# Appendix G-Quebec Scheme.

The Quebec Scheme is arranged as an additional By-law of the Mission Board, to be numbered XI, and the present No. XI will be No. XII. See pages 86-89 of Canons published by authority of Ontario Synod in 1891.

H. POLLARD,

Chairman of Committee.

- XI (A1) On the occurrence of a vacancy in any parish or mission, or at the request of the Churchwardens of any congregation, or at the desire of the Lord Bishop; and at the expiration of every three years, it shall be the duty of the Board to confer and arrange with the local authorities as to the amount to be contributed therein towards the maintenance of a resident Clergyman.
- A (2). This conference shall be held by the Rural Dean or some other Clergyman selected by the Bishop, and all reasonable efforts shall be made beforehand to secure the presence of as large a number of the members of the congregation as possible, who shall be made parties by their own signatures to the subjoined agreement.
- B. When the amount to be contributed has been agreed upon, the following memo of agreement shall be executed, not to be used in any Civil Court, but to be kept on record for the purpose of avoiding any misunderstanding as to the amount and the dates of payment.
- C. Memorandum of Agreement between the Diocesan Synod of Ottawa and the Churchwardens and members of ...... Church, in the Mission, or Parish of.....

Dated at ...... on the ...... day of ...... 15....

Churchwardens.

- D. The Board shall be ultimately responsible to the Clergyman for the amount stated in the memorandum, but shall pay him on each quarter day only such sums as may have been received from his congregations, with the addition of any grant voted by the Synod and due for the quarter.
- E. In every instance where a congregation shall be found to have failed in contributing the amount promised, it shall be the duty of the Board to make prompt enquiries of the local authorities as to the cause of the non-payment, and to take such action as they shall see fit, under the sanction of the Bishop.
- F. As the Board has no Capital sum of money at their disposal, they must proceed in each case of failure to reach with promptness a decision as to the date up to which they will be ultimately responsible for the Clergyman's stipend.
- G. No fresh memorandum of agreement shall be made with any congregation until they have paid to the Clerical Secretary the amount for which the Board has made itself ultimately responsible to the Clergyman; and such amount shall be paid to the Clergyman as soon as it has been received from the Congregation.
- H. When the Clerical Secretary is obliged to send the Clergyman less than the full quarter's stipend, he shall enclose the following letter to the Congregation, to be read to them by the Clergyman, and by him returned to the Secretary, with a duly signed declaraton that he has so read it.

I. On the 28th of April, 28th of July, 28th of October, and 28th of January in each year, or on the following day, should any of these dates be a Sunday, the Secretary shall address, if authorized by resolution

of the Sub Committee mentioned in Paragraph K., to the Clergyman of any Congregation which may have failed to send in to the Secretary the balance due to the first day of the current quarter, the fellowing notice:

(Signed).....

The Clergyman shall read the foregoing notice on two Sundays, and the services shall be suspended on and from the third Sunday. The Clergyman shall return the notice to the Secretary, with declaration that he has read it, duly signed and dated. The Clergyman shall at the same time inform the Bishop that he has suspended the services in ...... Church, at......

- K. There shall be a sub-committee, consisting of the Bishop and the Clerical Secretary, and at least ten members of the Mission Board, appointed by the Board, with power to add to their number others who may not be members of the Board. This sub-committee shall be responsible to the Mission Board for carrying out the provisions of this By-law. They shall meet whenever summoned by direction of the Bishop, and on the following stated days, 28th of April, 28th of July, 28th of October, 28th of January, or the following day, should any of these dates prove to be on a Sunday. Four shall form a quorum.
- L. The Board shall in each case adopt such measures as they shall consider most likely to induce each congregation to live punctually up to its agreement with the Board.
- M. Should any Clergyman obtain written permission from the Board to receive any portion of his stipend direct from the Wardens, he may give them receipts for such portion, and the Board will accept such vouchers as representing the amount stated in the voucher.
- N. It shall be the aim of the Board to make the stipend of Missionary Priests \$800.00 per annum and of Missionary Deacons \$600.00, or as near that sum as the revenue at the disposal of the Board will allow.
