MINUTES OF COMMISSION OF SYNOD.

Kingston, 3d October, 1860.

The Commission did not meet for want of a quorum.

At St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, the Twentieth Day of February, Eighteen Hundred and Sixty-one Years:—

Which day the Commission of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met by appointment of Synod and was constituted with prayer by the Rev. John Tawse, M.A., of King, who had been called to the chair as Moderator.

Sederunt.—John Tawse, Monerator, John Campbell (Nottawasaga), John H. Macherras, John Brown, James Gordon, John Campbell (Brock), William McKee, Donald Ross, David Camelon, Kenneth McLennan, Ministers, and Jacob Wells, Elder.

Mr. McKerras was appointed to act as Clerk.

The Commission considered the application from the Congregation of Port Hope to the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly, for aid in erecting their place of worship, which had been referred to it by the Synod. There was read an extract minute of the Presbytery of Toronto certifying that the necessary papers had been supplied and that satisfactory evidence of the validity of the title had been furnished. It was accordingly resolved to instruct the Clerk of Synod to transmit the same to the Colonial Committee, craving on behalf of its petition their most favourable consideration.

No other business having been brought forward, the meeting was closed with prayer.

On motion of Dr. Urquhart, seconded by Mr. Niven, and passed unanimously, the Moderator tendered to Dr. Mathieson the thanks of the Synod for his appropriate and admirable discourse this day and for his whole conduct as Moderator, and he was requested to publish his sermon.

MINISTERS INVITED TO DELIBERATE.

The Rev. James Black, M.A., an Ordained Minister of the Church of Scotland, and the Rev. Thomas G. Smith, a member of the Presbytery of Chicago, Old School Presbyterian Church, United States of America, being present, were invited to take part in the deliberations of this meeting.

REPORT ON BUSINESS.

The report of the Committee on Business was called for and read. The Synod agreed to follow the order of business prepared by the Committee and the recommendations contained in their report.

- 1. On Bills and Overtures;—The Moderator, Convener, the Clerk, Drs. Barclay, Cook, Muir, Urquhart, Smith, and Livingston, Messrs Geo. Bell, Macdonnell, Charles Campbell, Spence, Walker, Treadwell, Fordyce, Malloch, and Barker, with instructions to meet at the close of this Diet, and thereafter by adjournment as they see cause, to consider all papers intended to be brought before the Synod and to report any recommendations that may occur to them in regard to their disposal.

Documents anent applications of the Rev. Archibald Colquboun of Mulmur, the Rev. Samuel Porter of Clarke, and the Rev. Thomas Fraser of Lanark, having been read, a Committee consisting of Dv. Cook, Convener, Dr. Mathieson, Dr. Muir, Mr. Morris, and Mr. Barker, was appointed to consider and report thereon, and on any other application of the same kind that may be made.

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APPLICATIONS TO COLONIAL COMMITTEE.

Documents anent applications from the congregations of Lanark, and Ross and Westmeath to the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland for aid in building Churches, having been laid before the Synod, a Committee consisting of Dr. Barclay, Convener, Mr. Campbell (Brock), Mr. Simpson, and Mr. Greenshields, was appointed to consider and report thereon, and on any other application of the same kind that may be made.

DISSENT AND COMPLAINT-AN ELDER'S COMMISSION.

The Synod heard a Dissent and Complaint of the Rev. H. Niven against a judgment of the Presbytery of Hamilton, of date 19th Dec. 1860, refusing to sustain an Elder's commission. Documents were read and parties called. Mr. Niven appeared for himself and Mr. Burnet was heard for himself in support of the judgment of the Presbytery. Parties having been removed the Synod resolved to defer its decision.

REPLIES TO ADDRESSES.

There was read a copy of despatch from the Secretary to the Colonies, of date 10th July 1860, acknowledging receipt of the Synod's Address of last Session to the Queen, and requesting the Synod to be informed that Her Majesty was pleased to receive it very graciously: also the reply of His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, to the Synod's Address, presented to him, on the occasion of his visit to Canada last summer; also the reply of His Excellency, the Governor General, to the Synod's Address of last Session.

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

The Synod elect the Rev. Alexander Spence, the Rev. John Barclay, D.D., and the Rev. James C. Muir, D.D., to be Trustees of Queen's College, in accordance with the Royal charter, and instruct the Clerk to intimate this election to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, that their names may be placed at the top of the list of clerical Trustees.

ELECTION OF CLERGY RESERVE COMMISSIONERS.

John Smith, Esq., and Rev. Dr. Machar were elected Clergy Reserve Commissioners, agreeably to regulations of Synod 1848; their names were ordered to be placed at the foot of the list of Commissioners and the Clerk was instructed to intimate this election to the Board.

ANSWERS TO REASONS OF DISSENT-INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

The Committee appointed to answer reasons of dissent from decision * on Appeal of John Robertson against the Presbytery of Toronto, respecting the mode of conducting the public psalmody of the congregation. of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, having been called upon, submitted answers which were read, when it was moved, seconded, and resolved, That the reasons now read be received and kept in retentis and that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the Committee for the manner in which they have drawn them up.

The Synod appoints the following ministers to conduct Divine service on Sabbath next;—In this Church, Rev. Professor Mowat, forenoon, and Rev. Robert Burnet, evening; in St. Andrew's Church, Point Levi, Rev. Dr. Barclay, forenoon, and Rev. James Patterson, evening.

PUBLIC COLLECTIONS.

The Synod renews the Act of last year for the regulation of public collections, as follows:

HEREAS it is desirable for various reasons to make alterations in the Act of Synod, 1854, anent the regulation of public collections for Missionary and other operations of the Church, and otherwise provide for the due observance of Synodical injunctions in regard to the matter, the Synod repeal the said Act, and appoint the following public collections to be made in all the Churches during the ensuing year, namely: First, for the Jewish Mission Scheme-On the first Sabbath of July; Second, for the Temporalities Fund-On the first Sabbath of October; Third, for the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund-On the first Sabbath of January; And Fourth, for the French Mission Scheme-On the first Sabbath of April; Provided always, that when the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper shall happen to fall on any of the said Sabbaths, or when any of the said Sabbaths shall be deemed unsuitable and inconvenient for making the collection, then another day may be selected by the Session within four weeks thereafter; Provided also, that in case of any congregation preferring to raise their contributions in any other way, as by subscriptions and donations, or to furnish them out of any fund under their control, they shall be at

The Synod, while rejoicing at the increased fruits of Christian effort in this Church, would earnestly urge on all their people the duty of still further augmenting the means supplied by them for promoting the cause of the Redeemer, hitherto so inadequate to the extent of the field daily opening up to the operations of the Church, and so far within what might be expected from the gratitude and love due to a crucified Saviour. They strictly enjoin all Ministers of the Church to fulfil the duty incumbent on them, of at least exhorting their Congregations to embrace the opportunities afforded them of contributing towards the maintenance and spread of the Gospel of Christ on all the days above specified: And the Synod enjoin every Minister on a Sabbath preceding that on which each collection is to be made, to give due intimation thereof from the pulpit, together with such information on the object of the collection as he may have been able to acquire; And they enjoin the Conveners of the several Committees and Boards for the management of the Schemes herein specified, to forward in good time to all the Ministers notices of the appointments herein made as they shall become due respectively, together with such statements as it may be of use and interest to read from the pulpit along with their intimations And n particular the

Synod enjoin the several Presbyteries, at their meetings next after the times specified, to inquire into the diligence of all their Ministers and Congregations in this matter and to record reports thereof in their Presbytery Books, and likewise instruct the Committee of Synod for revising Presbytery Books to notice how far Presbyteries attend to this injunction; And the Synod earnestly urge on all the people seriously to consider the duty of contributing liberally for the advancement of Christ's cause, according to the ability wherewith God has blessed them; And the Synod ordain a sufficient number of copies of this Act to be printed forthwith and distributed among all Ministers and Missionaries, who are hereby enjoined to read it from their pulpits on the first Sabbath after receipt thereof. This Act shall be annually renewed, with such amendments as the Synod may deem called for, and the expense of printing it shall be borne equally by the several Schemes, and the funds of each Scheme shall be charged with all expenses connected with its own management.

TEMPORALITIES FUND.*

The report of the Temporalities Board for the past year was called for and given in, including a Balance sheet of the financial affairs of the Board, a special report of the Home Mission Fund, and a statement of the Contingent Fund. These having been read it was moved by Mr. McKinnon, seconded by Mr. Fordyce, and unanimously resolved, That the Synod receive and adopt the reports, thank the Board and the deputations for their services during the past year, and further, while gratefully acknowledging the contributions of such congregations as have made collections for the Contingent Fund during the past year, in view of the insufficiency of the General Fund for the purposes of the Church, earnestly commend its importance to the support of the Church, and enjoin Presbyteries to use diligence that collections for the object be faithfully taken up.

REPRINT OF EARLY MINUTES.

The Clerk having made a statement respecting a continuation of the reprint of the early minutes of Synod, so as to include the second six years of the Synod's proceedings and thereby complete the undertaking, it was agreed that a subscription list lie open during this Session.

CHARGES FOR DISSENTS AND EXTRACTS.

The Clerk having also referred to the former practice of making a charge for the entering of dissents in the minutes, it was resolved to revive the same; and further as regards charges for extracts, associate Mr. Geo. Bell and Mr. Mackerras with the Clerk to report on that subject.†

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

The Synod re-elected Rev. Wm. Snodgrass, William Edmonstone, Esq. and James S. Hunter, Esq., to be Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund; directed their names to be placed at the top of the lists of ministers and laymen respectively composing the Board; and instructed the Clerk to intimate their election to the Board.

APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSE.

Application was made by the Presbytery of Kingston, for leave to take James S. Mullan and William Darrach, Students of Divinity, on trials for License. The same application was made by the Presbytery of Toronto, in behalf of Alexander McLennan, B.A., by the Presbytery of Glengary in behalf of Archibald Currie, M. A., and by the Presbytery of Quebec in behalf of James Douglas, B. A. The Synod having ascertained that circular letters had been duly issued intimating the intention of these Presbyteries to make this application, instructed these Students to appear before the following

MORRIN COLLEGE.

There was read a Memorial signed by John Cook, D.D., William Stewart Smith, LL.D., and James Dean, Esq., Governors of Morrin College incorporated by Act of the Provincial Parliament during its last Session, praying that in accordance with said Act and Dr. Morrin's Deed of Trust the Synod would appoint two ministers to be Governors of the College, and further, inasmuch as it was the desire of the founder of the said College that education for the ministry of the Church of Scotland should be given in it as well as that general education which is suited to all classes, that the Synod ordain that as soon as evidence shall be laid before this Court that there is a competent staff of Professors for common and theological education, such as is required by the laws of the Church, the certificates of such Professors shall be re-

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The Synod appointed Dr. Barclay, Dr. Urquhart, Judg: Malloch, and Mr. Morris, a Committee to consider and report on this subject to-day.

The Report of this Committee was read in the evening, as also the Act of Parliament incorporating the Institution, which report recommended that the Synod do express their thankfulness that an Elder of our Church, namely, Mr. Joseph Morrin of Quebec, Surgeon and Physician, should in his lifetime have devoted so large a sum as £12000 towards the promotion of liberal education in Canada and especially for providing means for the instruction of youth intended for the ministry of this Church, and their earnest trust that the intention of the donor may be fully realized, so that the Morrin College may prove a benefit to the Province and a valuable auxiliary of this Church, and that the Synod therefore agree to accept the authority to appoint Governors of the College, and appoint as their first Governors nominated by the Synod, the Rev. Alexander Mathieson, D.D., and the Rev. James C. Muir, D.D., and the Synod further agree to accede in other respects to the prayer of the petition so soon as sufficient evidence is afforded them, that the requirements of the Church with regard to literary and theological education are provided for to the satisfaction of the Synod.

It was moved by Mr. Greenshields, and seconded by the Rev. A. Mann That the Report be received and adopted and that in accordance with its suggestion, the Rev. Alexander Mathieson, D.D., and the Rev. James C. Muir, D.D., be and are elected Governors of the "Morrin College," as provided in the Act of Incorporation, and that a copy of this minute be transmitted by the Moderator to Mrs. Morrin-which motion passed un-

MAINTENANCE OF MINISTERS.

Reports of Presbyteries on the Interim Act anent the maintenance of ministers having been read, it was found that a majority of Presbyteries is in favour thereof, and the Moderator, in terms of the Barrier Act, declared the same to be a law of the Church as follows :-

HAT in every case where the settlement of a Minister is about to take place, it is absolutely necessary that the minimum stipend exclusive of any allowance from the Temporalities Board, be not less than four hundred dollars; that Presbyteries be enjoined to do all in their power to see that the congregations within their respective bounds, implement all pecuniary promises made by them to Ministers; and that the Synod retain all discretionary power in its own hands.

Some members having expressed their desire to dissent against the passing of this Interim Act into a permanent law, the Moderator ruled it incompetent to do so. The house having been appealed to, the Moderator's ruling was sustained by a vote of 32 to 29.

REPRESENTATION OF THE ELDERSHIP.

Reports of Presbyteries on the Bill and Overture anent the Representation of the Eldership sent down to Presbyteries by last Synod having been read, it was found and declared that the Bill is disapproved of by a majority of Presbyteries, and that a majority of Presbyteries report approval of the Overture with certain amendments. On motion of Mr. Snodgrass, seconded by Mr. Mann, it was unanimously resolved to appoint a Committee to reconsider the Overture and the Returns thereon and to frame such a measure as the wants of the Church seem to require. The Moderator nominated a Committee in terms of this resolution, consisting of Dr. Barclay, Convener, Dr. Cook, the Clerk, Mr. Greenshields, Judge Malloch, and Mr. Morris.

ATTENDANCE OF MINISTERS ON CHURCH COURTS.

Reports of Presbyteries on the Bill anent the attendance of Ministers on Church Courts having been read, the Synod refer the consideration thereof to the Committee on the representation of the Eldership.

METRICAL VERSIONS OF PSALMS.

The Report of the Committee on metrical versions of psalms was called for. No report was given in and the matter was allowed to drop.

QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

The Report of the Trustees of Queen's College having been read, it was moved by Mr. Snodgrass, seconded by Mr. Mackerras, and passed unanimously, That the report now read be received and that the Synod record their high gratification at the many evidences of extended activity and usefulness contained therein, more especially at the fact that all the Faculties contemplated by the founders of the University have now been organised—affording, as these evidences do, greater reason than ever for the Synod to solicit the interest and prayers of the Church in behalf of the Institution.

BURSARY SCHEME.

The Report of the Committee on the Bursary Scheme having been read by Professor Mowat, it was moved by Mr. Morris, seconded by Mr. Clark, and passed unanimously, That the Synod, recognizing the great importance to the growth and progress of the Church of the Bursary Scheme, earnestly recommend that upon the day in each year appointed by the Synod for the special outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the rising generation and upon the officers and students of the College, or upon such other day and in such other way as may be found convenient, congregations make collections in aid of the Fund, and that the Committee, with Dr. Machar as Convener, be reappointed.

ADDRESS TO THE QUEEN.

Dr. Cook, Convener of the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to the Queen, reported a draft address which was read and agreed to.

MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The fourteenth annual Report of the Managers of the Ministers' Widows, and Orphans' Fund having been called for was read, along with the Treasurer's statement and a copy of By-laws adopted by the Board. It was moved by Mr. Mackerras, seconded by Mr. Mackid, and passed unanimously, That the report now read be received and the thanks of the Synod conveyed to the Chairman and Managers of the Fund; that the Synod rejoice to learn the high degree of prosperity that has marked the Scheme during the past year; again renew their injunction to Presbyteries, Ministers, and Congregations, that they severally attend to the respective duties devolved upon them in connection with this Fund by Act of Synod and the By-laws of the Board; and recommend the Board to carry out their proposal to print a tabular digest of contribu-

PRESENTATION OF SYNOD'S ADDRESS TO THE PRINCE OF WALES.

Dr. Mathieson having read a narrative of proceedings connected with the presentation of the Synod's Address to the Prince of Wales, it was moved by Col. Thompson, seconded by the Rev. George Thompson, and passed unanimously, That this Court express, and hereby expresses, its entire satisfaction with the dignified conduct of Dr. Mathieson on that occasion.

APPLICATION OF REV. JOHN DARROCH FOR ADMISSION.

There was read an extract minute of the Presbytery of Toronto anent an application of the Rev. CHURCH PROPERTY.

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on account of the fulness of the Congregational Statistics submitted to the Synod last year he did not deem it necessary to send a report this year. The Committee is continued with Judge Logie as Convener, the Synod deeming the duties intrusted to the members thereof as of very great consequence. Members of Synod being aware of the existence of Church Properties, the tenure of which is doubtful or unsatisfactory, are requested to furnish information thereanent to the Convener of this Committee, and the Synod request the Convener to give directions to Presbyteries for the proper security thereof as he may have opportunity, and enjoin Presbyteries to attend to these, and further request the Convener to report all disputed cases to this Court from time to time.

DISSENT AND COMPLAINT—COMPLAINTS FROM SALTFLEET AND BINBROOK. The Synod heard a Dissent and Complaint of the Rev. Hugh Niven, Minister of Saltfleet and Binbrook, against a decision of the Presbytery of Hamilton, of date 18th July, 1861, respecting complaints which formed a subject of reference to the Synod last year and which were remitted for consideration with instructions. Papers having been read, parties were called, heard, and removed. It was moved by Dr. Cook, and seconded by Mr. Greenshields, That the decision of the Presbytery of Hamilton be sustained in reference to the first three clauses, and at the same time the Synod express disapproval of the terms in which the concluding recommendation is expressed and of such recommendation being embodied in the sentence, however in the circumstances it might have appeared necessary to be given, and the Synod appoint a Committee, consisting of Dr. Cook, Dr. Mathieson, Mr. Greenshields, and Mr. Morris, to confer with Mr. Niven in a kind and brotherly way, and to advise with him in reference to the whole circumstances of his position. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Snodgrass, and seconded by Dr. Mathieson, That the Complaint be sustained in so far as it respects the fourth clause of the sentence complained against, and that the said clause be expunged from the Records of the Presbytery of Hamilton, because of its unconstitutional character. son, That the Synod hereby declare the judgment of the Presbytery of Hamilton to be incompetent and decern that the conduct of the Presbytery is highly censurable, inasmuch as it appears on the face of the documents presented in this case, that they proceeded to sever the connection between the Complainant and his people in disregard of the laws of the Church. The Moderator having asked, Shall this motion pass? a vote was demanded, when it was affirmed by 48 against 6.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

DIET IV.

At St. Andrew's Church, Quebec, Saturday, the First Day of June, Eighteen Hundred and Sixty-one Years:—

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met according to adjournment and was constituted; devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. J. Campbell (Brock); and the minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and sustained.

REPORT OF THE EXAMINING COMMITTEE.

Dr. Cook read the Report of the Examining Committee, recommending that Messrs. Currie, Douglas, Darroch, Mullan, and McLennan be taken on trials by their respective Presbyteries, but that Presbyteries be enjoined not to grant License in any case unless the student stand to their satisfaction a full and searching examination founded on Hill's Lectures, and that Presbyteries be reminded that the Synodical examination is in no respect intended to supersede the Presbyterial examination; that Mr. John Darroch, who produced evidence of a complete theological education at Princeton, an extract of his License and a Presbyterial Certificate, be received as a minister of this Church, the Committee believing that he will prove a valuable acquisition, and that in his case the law requiring a year's probation previous to induction be suspended as the Presbytery receiving him may see fit; and that a Committee consisting of Dr. Cook, Convener, Dr. Mathieson, Professor Mowat, Dr. Muir, Mr. Spence, Dr. Barclay, Dr. Urquhart, Mr. George Bell, Mr. McKerras, Judge Malloch, Dr. Smith, Mr. Greenshields, and Mr. Morris, be appointed to consider the whole matter of studies preparatory to the ministry, with instructions to consult the Principal, professors, and Trustees, of Queen's College, and report on this subject to next meeting of Synod.

It was moved by Mr. Mann, seconded by Mr. Douglas, and passed unanimously, That the report now read be adopted, and the abovenamed Committee appointed.

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DISSENT AND COMPLAINT-COMMISSION OF WM. WRIGHT.

The Synod proceeded to give judgment in the case of Dissent and Complaint heard the first day of this Session. It was moved by Mr. Greenshields, and seconded by Mr. Peter Watson, That the Complaint be sustained, and the name of Mr. Wright, whose Commission was rejected by the Presbytery of Hamilton, be entered on the Roll of this Court. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Mylne, and seconded by Mr. Mann, That the Complaint be dismissed, and that the Commission be not sustained. It was also moved in amendment by Judge Malloch, and seconded by Mr. Morris, That inasmuch as it appears to this Court that the Moderator of the Session of Saltfleet and Binbrook gave public notice from the pulpit of the meeting of Session for the election of a Representative Elder, which notice was a regular notice to the whole Session to meet, and as Mr. Wright was elected at that meeting, the Commission be sustained. A vote having been taken, the second amendment was carried against the first by 40 to 4, and the motion against the second amendment by 28 to 13, and the Moderator declared

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place on Monday morning, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

Which day the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met, according to adjournment, and was constituted; devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. J. S. Douglas; and the minutes of Saturday's proceedings were read

SABBATH SCHOOLS.*

The Report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools having been called for, was read by Mr. Macdonnell, Convener. It was moved by Mr. George Bell, seconded by Mr. John McKinnon, and passed unanimously, That the Synod receive the report now read; express gratification with the intelligence it conveys of the increasing interest manifested in Sabbath Schools, and of the number of schools reported; re-appoint the Committee with Mr. Macdonnell as Convener; suggest that each Pres-

bytery appoint a Committee of its number to receive the returns from each congregation and transmit them to the Committee; warmly recommend this vital and important object to the affectionate regard of all our people; and require Sessions to see to the constant direct teaching of Scripture and the Shorter Catechism in their Sabbath Schools.

MINUTE OF PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO-INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

The Synod heard read an extract minute of the Presbytery of Toronto, of date 21st May last, declaring, in regard to the sentence of the Synod given last year in the case of Robertson vs. the Presbytery of Toronto, that it does not yet appear to be expedient to interfere with the use of the melodeon in the psalmody of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto. It was moved by Dr. Mathieson, and seconded by Dr. Urquhart, That in the present state of the question the answer given be considered satisfactory, and that the matter be remitted to the Presbytery of Toronto, with instructions to see that the injunctions of last Synod be attended to. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Snodgrass, and seconded by Mr. Mann, That it appears from the minute now read, that the Presbytery of Toronto has not exercised a due and necessary diligence in giving effect to the Synod's deliverance of last year, yet learning that the Presbytery has misunderstood the nature and extent of the power given by this Court, now instruct the Presbytery of Toronto to use forthwith all lawful means in the exercise of its authority over the Session of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, to cause the sentence of this Court, given last session, to be carried into effect, to wit, "to cause the musical instrument which has been for some time in use in that Church to be removed without unnecessary delay after this date." A vote having been taken the motion was carried by 35 to 14, and the Moderator declared accordingly.

FRENCH MISSION.*

The report of the French Mission Committee having been called for was read by the Convener. It was moved by Dr. Urquhart, seconded by Mr. Mackid, and unanimously resolved, That the Synod receive the report and re-appoint the Committee with Mr. Snodgrass, as Convener, and the members thereof resident in Montreal as an Executive Committee; accept with gratitude the ascertained though still slight indication of reviving interest in this important mission afforded by the increased contributions of the people, this year as compared with last; and earnestly solicit, not only a continuance, but also an enlargement of this liberality, with the view of enabling the Committee to engage another Missionary.

CONGREGATIONAL STATISTICS.

A report from the Committee on Congregational Statistics was read by the Convener. It set forth that while 70 Sessions had made returns

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this year, no return had been received from 37 congregations, only 10 of these being vacant charges, and recommended that the Synod require returns to be given in by these also, so that the Church may be put in possession of one complete return which it has not yet obtained. It was moved by Mr. Greenshields, seconded by Mr. Mann, and agreed, that the Report be received and the Committee thanked for their labours; and as it is most desirable to obtain one complete return from every Session, that Sessions that have not made returns be, and are, enjoined to send returns for the past year to the Rev. Robert Dobie, Convener of the Committee, not later than the 15th day of July next.

A document purporting to be a report of the Committee on union between this church and the other Presbyterian churches in the Province, and a minute of a meeting purporting to be a meeting of the Committee on union, were read. It was moved by Dr. Cook and seconded by Mr. John McKinnon, That Dr. George's report be received, and that the thanks of the Synod be given to Dr. George, for his attention to the business intrusted to him by the Synod, for his judicious conduct in calling to his aid, in absence of the Committee appointed by the Synod, so many able and tried friends of the Church, and for so decidedly refraining from committing himself or the Synod to any basis or terms of union, while yet ascertaining that there was a friendly spirit open to further and more definite negotiation in the other Presbyterian bodies in the Province; appoint a Committee to prepare such basis of union for this Church to agree to, and to receive any communication or overture on the subject of union which may be sent to them from Committees of other Presbyterian bodies and to report both to the next meeting of Synod; and the Synod do in the meantime enjoin on all the office-bearers of this Church to cultivate a friendly and brotherly spirit with the office-bearers of other Presbyterian churches, agreeing with us as they do in all things essential in doctrine, worship, and ecclesiastical order, and that ministerial communion and interchange of pulpits be authorized when it is found convenient and desirable.

After some discussion the consideration of this subject was deferred.

The discussion consequent on the reading of papers on the matter of union yesterday was resumed. It was moved in amendment to Dr. Cook's motion, by Mr. Mackerras, and seconded by Mr. Walker, That the report of the Convener of the Committee on union having been read, the Synod, while adhering to the past declarations of this Court as to the desirability of union among the Presbyterians of Canada who are agreed in doctrine and discipline with the Church of Scotland, yet finding that in present circumstances the proposed union cannot be entertained without disturbing the harmony of this Church, take no action on the report and do not reappoint the Committee on this subject, but the Synod express their earnest trust that though a visible union is evidently impracticable at present, all branches of the Presbyterian body in Canada may avoid unseemly rivalry and cultivate a spirit of Christian charity. The question was put, motion or amendment? when the latter was carried by a vote of 29 to 20, and the Moderator declared accordingly.

FINAL STATEMENT OF CLERGY RESERVE COMMISSIONERS.

There was read and laid upon the table a final statement of the Clergy Reserve Commissioners per the Treasurer. The Synod recommends the Commissioners to put the balance now in the hands of the Commissioners in charge of the Temporalities Board, to be paid by them to its rightful owners.

MEMORIAL AND PETITION-INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

There was read a memorial by John Robertson, Esq., of Toronto, complaining of the Presbytery of Toronto for not seeing the sentence of Synod in his case of Appeal carried into effect, as also a petition signed by the Hon. Justice McLean and Col. E. W. Thompson, members of the Session of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, representing that they deemed it most prudent to forbear any proceeding towards the removal of the musical instrument complained of from that Church.

MEMORIAL OF THOMAS KYDD.

There was read a memorial by Thomas Kydd, of Goderich, containing certain complaints. The Synod agreed to appoint and hereby appoint a Commission, consisting of the Rev. John Hogg of Guelph, Rev. George Macdonnell of Fergus, and Col. E. W. Thompson of Toronto, to advise with the Presbytery of London at their meeting at Goderich, on the first Wednesday of September next, in regard to the contents of the memorial, and enjoin the said Presbytery to give heed to such advice as these Commissioners may give, and proceed according to the laws of the Church, and instruct the Clerk of the Presbytery of London to notify all parties concerned of the said meeting.

REPORT ON PRESBYTERY RECORDS.

Professor Mowat read the report of the Committee on Presbytery Records, as follows:—

That the Committee recommend the Records of all the Presbyteries to be attested as carefully and correctly kept cum his notis,

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In the Records of the Presbytery of Glengary the name of the Representative Elder of Lochiel is not given in the minute recording that his Commission was presented; the Moderator's circular is not copied into the minutes of the pro re nata meetings held on Sept. 19, Feb. 27, and March 27; and in the minutes of Inductions at Martintown and L'Orignal it is not stated that the Act of Independence was read to the ministers inducted, nor that they signed the Formula, and the bonds for Widows' Fund:

In the Records of the Presbytery of Guelph on pages 20 and 22 the name of Mr. Macdonnell appears as Moderator and Clerk at the same meeting; and in the minute of Induction at Mount Forest it is not stated that the Act of Independence was read to the minister:

In the Records of the Presbytery of Quebec the minute of members present at each meeting is not in the usual form; and no mention is made of the production of Session Records, of the Sustaining of Elders' Commissions when presented, and of inquiry as to whether the Synodical collections were taken up:

In the Records of the Presbytery of Montreal three minutes are signed by the Clerk previously to his appointment as Clerk; and there are no marginal notes:

In the Records of the Presbytery of Hamilton the minutes of the meeting held on April 17th, have been engrossed before being sustained at an ordinary meeting:

In the Records of the Presbytery of Toronto the Christian names of those mentioned are not given even when noticed for the first time; in the minutes of three Inductions the words "in name and by authority of the Presbytery of Toronto" are used instead of the words, "in name of our Lord Jesus Christ and by authority of the Presbytery of Toronto;" and it is not stated that inquiry was made whether the Synodical collections were taken up, nor whether Session Records were called for:

In the Records of the Presbytery of Bathurst there ought to have been mention made of Rev. William Johnson's reasons of removal from the charge of Arnprior:

And in the Records of the Presbytery of London the signature of the Moderator is wanting to the minutes of June 2, 1860, and July 19, 1860; the signature of the Clerk is wanting to the minutes of Nov 21 and Dec. 5; deleted words are not marked in the margin on page 90, line 21, page 92, line 11, and page 94, line 23; words interlined at page 92, line 24, are not noticed in the margin; and in some instances the phraseology is not happy, e. g., on page 92, line 14, the word "as" should be "of," same page, line 39, the word "various" is ambiguous; on page 103 the time of day is ambiguous, not being marked A.M. or P.M., and on page 90 it should be stated that the Elders' Commissions presented were sustained.

The Synod having heard the reportadopted the same, and the Moderator having asked if any member had any other observations to make on any

of these Records, none were offered, and the Synod instructed their Clerk to attest them accordingly, and ordered Presbyteries to attend to the remarks made, and cause the necessary corrections as far as is now practicable.

REPORT OF SYNOD AND COMMISSION RECORDS.

The Report of the Committee appointed to revise the Synod and Commission Records, bearing that these are carefully and correctly kept, was read, and the Moderator was instructed to attest them accordingly.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.*

The Report of the Committee on Sabbath observance was read. It was moved by Mr. McMorine, seconded by Mr. Mackid, and passed unanimously, That the Synod, believing the religious observance of the Sabbath to be essential to the real prosperity of the Province, approve of the efforts made by the Committee in reference to the desecration of this Holy Day in Public Offices and by Railway and Steamboat Companies, and reappoint the Committee, with the Rev. William Bain as Convener.

ACT ANENT CALLING AND SETTLING OF MINISTERS.

The Act anent the calling and settling of ministers was continued at interim, and Presbyteries were instructed to report thereon to next session of Synod.

AMALGAMATION OF CONGREGATIONAL TRUSTEES AND MANAGERS.

The Rev. George Macdonnell was heard in support of an Overture by him for the amalgamation of Congregational Trustees and Managers into one body. The Synod appoint Mr. Snodgrass, Judge Malloch, and Mr. Morris, a committee to report on this subject to next meeting of Synod.

REPORT ON APPLICATIONS FOR LEAVE TO RETIRE.

The Report of the Committee on applications of ministers for leave to retire was read, recommending that the Rev. Thomas Fraser of Lanark, the Rev. Archibald Colquhoun of Mulmer, and the Rev. Samuel Porter of Clarke, be permitted to retire in the enjoyment of their commutation allowances from the Temporalities Fund in full. It was moved, seconded, and agreed, That the report of the Committee to that effect be adopted, and that the Presbyteries of Bathurst and Toronto be instructed, and they are hereby instructed, to give effect to this resolution according to the laws of the Church; and further in regard to the Rev. James Stuart of Woodstock and Norwich, who was present and submitted to the pleasure of the Synod as to his retirement, the Synod instruct the Presbytery of London to accept of his resignation, he being allowed to enjoy his commutation allowance from the Temporalities Fund in full.

ADDRESS TO THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

Mr. McMorine read a draft Address to the Governor General which was adopted, and the Clerk is instructed to transmit a copy thereof to

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His Excellency, along with a copy of the Synod's Address to the Queen, with a request that it may be forwarded to the proper quarter.

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APPLICATIONS TO COLONIAL COMMITTEE.

The Synod considered an application from adherents of the Church in Ekfrid to the Colonial Committee for aid in building a place of worship. The Synod instruct their Clerk to authenticate the documents read, and the Clerk of the Presbytery of London to forward them to the Secretary of the Colonial Committee with an extract of this deliverance. The Synod gave like instructions in regard to an application of the same kind from the congregation of Lanark which it was agreed to

REPRESENTATION OF THE ELDERSHIP.

The Committee on the representation of the Eldership having been called on, the Convener stated that they had been unable for want of time to prepare a report. The Synod retransmit the following Overture, with an addition to the third clause, as an interim Act:

That every Kirk-Session shall elect one of their number to represent the Session, in the Superior Courts for the year, and it shall be the duty of the Minister to call a meeting of Session, for the purpose of such election, on some convenient day within two months after the rising of

It shall be the duty of the Presbytery to ascertain that Kirk-Sessions and Ministers perform their several duties in this respect, and take order where from any cause, an election has not taken place within the two months specified, that it be made with all convenient speed.

The Representative Elder shall in every case hold office till his successor is appointed, or till the expiry of the two months.

It shall be competent for Representative Elders to resign and for Sessions to appoint a successor, whose Commission shall be valid when presented to the Presbytery.

COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS FOR 1862.

The Synod appoint the Moderator, The Clerk, Presbytery Clerks, Dr. Cook, Dr. George, Dr. Barclay, Rev. J. Bain, Rev. K. McLennan, and the Representative Elders from Montreal, Brockville, and Toronto, their Committee on Business for next Session.

COMMISSION OF SYNOD.

The Synod appoint their Commission to meet in St. Andrew's Church, Kingston, on the first Wednesday in October next, at noon, in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, on the third Wednesday of February next, at noon, and oftener by adjournment when and where the Commission may choose. Nine Commissioners shall be a quorum, of whom five must be Ministers. In all their actings the Commissioners shall proceed according to the Act of Synod, 1859, anent the nature, powers, and duties of the Commission of the Supreme Court of this Church.

It was moved by Mr. Greenshields, seconded by Dr. Barclay, and passed unanimously, That the Synod record their thanks to the Minister and members of St. Andrew's Church, Quebec, for the very kind and hospitable manner in which they have received and entertained the members of this Court during this Session.

The minutes of this Diet were read and sustained.

CLOSING OF SESSION.

The Moderator then addressed the Synod, and after praise and prayer said,—

In the name of the LORD JESUS CHRIST, the KING and ONLY HEAD of this Church, and in the name of this Synod, I dissolve this meeting, and appoint the next annual meeting of Synod to convene in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, on the last Wednesday in May, Eighteen Hundred and Sixty-two years, at eleven o'clock, forenoon:

APPENDIX A.

REPORT OF THE BOARD FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE TEMPORALITIES FUND.

The Board for the management of the Temporalities Fund beg to lay upon the table, for the consideration of the Synod, a balance sheet of the financial affairs of the Board exhibiting the receipts and disbursements of the Board during the past year.

A special report has been prepared concerning the Home Mission Fund.

The Board have particularly to call the attention of the Synod to the state of the accounts of the Board, and to request the Synod to take all possible measures for enforcing congregational collections in aid of the Contingent Fund. It will be seen that although the maintenance of the Contingent Fund is absolutely necessary to enable the Board to meet the charges upon it, many congregations neglect to remit collections at Fund is sustained with greater liberality, the Board will not long be able to pay the non-commuting ministers at the rates which they now receive. And the Board submit to the Synod the propriety of again enforcing congregational collections.

The retiring members are: Dr. Barclay and Mr. Snodgrass, ministers, and John Young, and Thomas Paton, laymen.

HOME MISSION FUND.

The Board have not relaxed their exertions for the increase of this important Fund. Deputations have visited the Presbyteries of Bathurst and Kingston, and have been instrumental in exciting a warm, and general interest in its prosperity. In Ottawa, Kingston, Belleville, and many other places visited, the meetings were large and of the scheme in the Congregations visited; from some of the progress gratifying accounts have, however, been received. The Board have much pleasure in alluding to the generous spirit with which the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Kingston, have responded to the to over \$4700, and several names have yet to be added to the list of subscribers.

It is to be regretted that no accounts have yet been received from several of the Congregations visited last year by deputations; and the Board are doubtful whether to request the Synod to enjoin the Ministers of these Congregations to report or to send another deputation to brethren in this good work.

The Board have much satisfaction in informing the Synod that over £7000 most of which is payable in five yearly instalments has already to their knowledge been subscribed. It is the intention of the Board,

The special thanks of the Board are due to the Rev. R. Burnet, Hamilton, the Rev. James Bain, Scarboro', John Paton, Esq., Kingston, James Croil, Esq., Aultsville, and George Neilson, Esq., Belleville, gentlemen who at much personal inconvenience rendered valuable assistance to the Board, by taking part in the deputations to the various Congregations visited. The members of the deputations express in strong terms their sense of the kind manner in which they were received by the people in the various Congregations.

In conclusion it is only necessary to state, that the result of the whole movement continues to be such as to encourage the Board to hope, under the blessing of God, for a large measure of success in the prosecution of a scheme, of the most vital importance to the progress, and prosperity of the Church.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

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The Finance Committee beg leave to submit their Report together with the Treasurer's account, for the past Synodical year. Your Committee have received during the period embraced in their report \$543. Of this sum \$375 were for the year 1860, \$112 for arrears, and \$56 from the sale of copies of Minutes of Synod and the printed Statistical Digest of last year. The arrears still due amount to \$317. Of this large sum \$211 are due for 1860, and \$106 for previous years. Thus the revenue accruing for the past year proper, would have been \$586, had each Session done its duty in this matter and contributed its quota, which with the \$56 derived from the sale of printed matter would have swelled the income for 1860 to \$642.

The arrears are due by 46 Sessions; of which 29 are indebted for 1860, 1 for a previous year, and 16 for both 1860 and previous years combined. Your Committee would call the attention of the Synod to the case of those Sessions that belong to the class last named, particularly to Camden, Mulmur, W. Gwillimbury and Innisfil, Woodstock and Norwich, where arrearages have been allowed to accumulate for a period extending from three to five years, and would respectfully urge your Reverend Court to issue its injunction to the Presbyteries within whose bounds these defaulting Sessions respectively are, to take such measures as may be deemed best in such case to bring them to a sense of the duty they

Your Committee take this opportunity of drawing the attention of the Synod to the rapid ratio with which the item of printing is increasing from year to year. From a sum not exceeding \$100 in 1855, it has swelled to \$375 in the year just ended. In order that the Synod may be able to discharge its present liabilities and meet its obligations from year to year Your Committee feel that some plan must be devised for reducing this item, so that it may not exceed the sum of \$250 annually; as, if it entail a larger expenditure, the ratio of assessment must necessarily be raised and such a step would be most inexpedient at present. To remedy this growing evil, it is hereby suggested that a Committee on Printing be appointed, either as a separate Committee, or by attaching its duties to those falling within the sphere of the Finance Committee, whose business it shall be in conjunction with the Clerk to decide what matter shall be printed annually and to introduce strict economy into

The liabilities at present due by the Synod amount to \$426.70. To meet this the Treasurer has in hand the sum of \$62.76, leaving a balance of \$363.94 against the Synod. Even though the arrears were paid, the Synod would still be indebted to the extent of \$46.94, a most unsatisfactory state of things, which must be remedied, if possible, within the present year, so that Your Committee may be able next Session to report a surplus in the treasury after meeting all obligations.

REPORT OF THE MANAGERS FOR 1860 AND 1861.

The Board of Managers submit the following report :-

The country has been gradually recovering from past depression. An abundant harvest was gathered into the garners of the husbandmen of the Province, and the Scheme has participated in the general prosperity. It evidently holds a sure and firm place in the affections of the

The collections have this year been on the whole of a gratifying

Full details with regard to the financial position of the Board will be found in the Treasurer's Report, which it is needless here to recapitu-

While some congregations contribute statedly to the Fund, others dole out petty sums with a miserable parsimony that does discredit to

the Christian profession.

In last Report the Managers stated the belief that in two or three years an augmentation might be made to the existing annuities. The Board still cherish this hope, although they think that the permanent investment of the Fund should have augmented to Forty Thousand Dollars Currency, before any increase can be made with entire confidence, that the Board will be able to maintain the increased rate with regularity. While looking forward to the prospect of being enabled at no distant date to augment the small annuities now enjoyed by the Widows and Orphans of Ministers. The Board have real pleasure in being able to state that even now in the infancy of the Fund, the average of the annuities paid, is equal to that of the old and long tried Fund of the Church of Scotland. It will be the aim of the Board by cautious management to give to this Scheme a like position of stability and large usefulness.

The Board have prepared a codification of their existing bye-laws which they have adopted. They have also adopted a number of new byelaws regulating various matters of detail and practical management, several of which are adopted from the rules of the Fund of the Church

APPENDIX D.

REPORT OF FRENCH MISSION SCHEME.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland:

The Committee whom you have been pleased to charge with the management of your French Mission during the past year, do not require to submit a lengthened report. You will justify them in avoiding as much as possible a repetition of statements made on former occasions, and, remembering that it is the work of one man that constitutes the entire active operations of the Scheme, you will not expect from them a great deal of new matter respecting his labours. They are confident, moreover, that the missionary's words will be more interesting and acceptable than their own, and they therefore in a great measure give place to them. From these it will be seen, that besides professing to be animated by a commendable spirit, he speaks of progress, and is not without a cheerful hope as to the issue of his humble attempts at evangelization. Your Committee have reason to be satisfied with the abundance and faithfulness of his labours, and though he has been tried with sufferings of extraordinary severity,-having been called upon to attend first his wife, a woman of simple but sincere piety, and then three of his children, on their death-bed-he has not allowed himself to be forgetful of his position as an ambassador for Christ, and his devotedness, instead of relaxing, seems to have increased, through the laying on of the Lord's hand in blessed and sanctified trial. He spends the Lord's day in preaching, and every week day, weather permitting, in visiting the people from house to house, confirming those who have made a profession of the Protestant faith, and reasoning with those who have not yet done so. The majority of the people are unable to read, but there are exceptions, and these he supplies with Bibles or New Testaments, and tracts, as the circumstances suggest. Many of them are very poor, not having proper clothing and shoes, and this affects the attendance at his meetings. It would afford your Committee much gratification to be able to assist him in regard to this matter with money or materials, but the amount of the contributions sent them by the congregations of the Church is so small, that they are obliged to practise the most rigid economy, in order to make regular payment of his salary. For this and other objects, chiefly the extension of the Mission, your Committee have been hoping for a larger manifestation of liberality, and though they have been disappointed hitherto, they still urge the duty and wait for better results.

In a resumé of his labours of date 29th April last, Mr. Baridon

says :-

"I would remind you that your field of operations embraces 5 parishes or townships across the Lines, that is to say, at the extreme north of the counties of Clinton in New York, and Hemmingford in Canada. These different territorial divisions extend from the limits of Canada, with a radius of 25 miles from east to west, following the Province Line, and something less from north to south, embracing a circle of about 50 miles.

"The Canadians compose about one-half of the population. They have 5 churches served by priests and French Jesuits, who are very active, sparing no pains in overseeing their people, scattered throughout the country. It is among that population more or less attached to the religion of Rome, that I labour in the work which your Society has intrusted to me.

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"Our work among that people, I repeat, is not that of party spirit, not that of mere anti-Roman Catholics, having for aim only to make a noise, or to beat down the Catholic in order to uplift the Protestant. Your aim is more noble and more Christian than that. If I have well understood my commission, it is that your aim is to cause to penetrate among these people and at their own homes, the knowledge of salvation as it is taught in the Word of God, that is to say, "that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that we are saved by grace through faith and not by works." This sweet message is unknown even to the best instructed Roman Catholic. The old man who has passed his life in the schooling of the priests, and the youth who receives his first lessons, are equally plunged in total ignorance, as to the good news of salvation by grace. The word which instructs and which sanctifies, has never reached their ears, and has never rejoiced their hearts by its message of peace. It is, then, among these souls truly unfortunate, spiritually speaking, that we have to work as servants of God. Whilst have suffered great afflictions during the year, by the loss of my children, I have nevertheless been most fortunate in my labours among these people, as I have had free access to them. Of all the visits I have paid to Catholics, to the number of upwards of 100 families, I have never once been unkindly received. I have been able to read with them the Word of God, to speak to them and to answer peaceably their objections, and even among some of them, to end my visits with prayer, and receive an invitation to return. Such receptions appear to me to be significant, and seem to teach us that where we can enter with the Bible in our hands, there God also is passing by, and has prepared some hearts to receive instruction from His Word.

"The districts embraced in our field have for chef lieux or centres, Chazy, Champlain, Perry's Mills, Sciota, Centreville, and Moers. These principal places, with their vicinages, comprehend the greater number of the families who have passed from the Romish Church to that of the Bible. Other families, equally Protestant, are scattered at long distances in the woods, and make, with the first mentioned, a total of 60 families at least, without counting those who are neither Catholics nor Protestants. These last listen, nevertheless, to the word of God, and prefer my visits to those of the priest. It is, then, among this mixture of Protestants, and Catholics, and unbelievers, that I hold from place to place, and by turns, as often as I can, little meetings in which I read to them the Word of God, pray with them, and instruct them in the truths which the Bible teaches. In consequence of their distance from each other, it is not easy to unite them in great numbers at once, but 10, 15, and 20 persons are often thus assembled. They are poor, living mostly from hand to mouth. The children, and often the parents, object that they are neither clothed nor shod in a proper way to come to the meetings. This state of things is an obstacle, and tries the patience of the Missionary. The bad state of the roads in the woods has to be endured, and long journeys have to be undertaken in view of the salvation of souls, and in obedience to the will of God. Go feed my sheep who wander, is a condition which ought to be fulfilled in our work at present, and cannot be dispensed with. The order of the Master to His messengers was, "Go. I send you as sheep among wolves," and this command will be of permanent obligation, so long as there are sinners perishing without God and without hope in the world.

"I have visited several families in the environs of Hemmingford, in Canada, and propose returning as soon as I can, after which I will write to you. I have informed you in my monthly reports, that the American Baptist Society, to whom the chapel at Sciota belongs, have again taken possession of it, and support there an Evangelist of their

communion. The Wesleyans have also commissioned a preacher to the Canadians. Let us hope that each of them will have for his aim the

glory of God, and the salvation of souls.

"Although the priests do all that is in their power to warn the people against me, yet we are gaining some little ground among the Romish population. Much especially among the youth, who go neither to confession nor to mass. The commandments of the Church are unknown to them, and one might consider them rather as Protestants than Catholics. I was a few days ago in a family nominally Roman Catholics, at the mid-day repast. It was a Friday; their dinner was pork and vegetables, and I asked why they ate meat on that day, when their religion forbade it. They answered me from the Bible, "that it is not that which enters the stomach which defiles a man," and that they did not trouble themselves with the priest. The number of these who thus act and speak, is very great among the Catholics of this country.

"I regret that our work is in the States, for the satisfaction of those who could have more heart in it if it were in Canada, but for all that

it is no less according to the Word of God.

"It is evident that souls are everywhere in the field which is the world, and that everywhere the Gospel ought to be preached. I will visit more in detail the Township of Hemmingford, and will take all pains, if it is possible, to establish a station there, dropping if need be some station across the line to occupy one in Canada."

The Treasurer's statement is appended, from which it will be seen that there is an increase of \$89 in the contributions to the Scheme during the past year, as compared with the receipts of the previous year. The sums total of both the congregational collections and the donations are larger. It is so far well that the interest felt in the Mission, as measured by the pecuniary support it receives, is manifesting a degree of upward tendency. But your Committee submit that there is still great room for improvement in this particular. Last year 40 congregations contributed \$523.16; this year 53 contribute \$575.60. If the other 40 on the Synod Roll, which have ministers, some of them being large city congregations, would give the average collection received from these, say \$10, your Committee would then be in a position to engage another Missionary.

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APPENDIX E.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE JEWISH AND FOREIGN MISSION.-1860-1861.

The Committee respectfully beg leave to report :-

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1st. As to the operations of the Mission and the Missionary. In last report it was stated, that the Missionary, the Rev. E. M. Epstein, M.D., with his wife and two children, had arrived at Salonica.

There he spent some months, labouring in concert with the Missionaries of the Church of Scotland, taking part in the maintenance of a service on the Sabbath, acquiring the languages, and maintaining a dispensary. In Salonica a heavy affliction befell the Missionary. His eldest daughter, Fanny, an intelligent girl, whose letters had begun to interest the readers of the Juvenile Presbyterian, was carried off, after a brief illness by typhoid fever, on the 16th of August last.

As the Committee have always had in view the adoption of a field of labour, independent of those occupied by the Committee of the Church of Scotland, but yet so situated as to permit of cooperation with them, a mode of action, moreover, which the Church of Scotland Committee heartily concurred in, the Missionary was advised to visit Monastir, Berea, and Larissa. This he did, in conjunction with the Rev. Mr. Crosby, Missionary at Salonica and Mr. Shillinger, since deceased. After visiting these places, Dr. Epstein proceeded with his family to Monastir, to enter upon the work of the Mission there.

THE FIELD.

2nd. Monastir is the principal city in Macedonia. Its population is about 45,000. It is distant from Salonica, the Thessalonica of the New Testament, about 90 miles. The Bulgerians and Turks compose the larger portion of the population, being respectively about 15,000 and 24,000. There are from 3 to 4000 Jews. There are many villages around, with populations of Bulgarians, varying from 5000 to 20,000, among whom the Gospel ought to be preached. There are numerous Mosques, 1 Greek, and 1 Romish Church in the city; but no Protestant Missionary had, ever before the arrival of Dr. Epstein, been stationed in Monastir. The Turks and Greeks maintain schools for boys and the Lazarists sus-

tain a Roman Catholic School.

The field in which, in providence, the Synod has been called to labour is then a most, important one. The Jewish population in Monastir is small, but yet means may be found to gain a footing among them. While the Missionary will be directed to make evangelization among them, his steady aim, the Committee yet think that much good may be accomplished among the Bulgarian population also. The population of Bulgaria Proper is about 5 millions, but Bulgarians are scattered all over European Turkey. They are industrious and intensely national. They are opposed to the rule of the Greek hierarchy, and in their present condition the claims of the Bible ought to be put before them and might be listened to. The Missionary thinks that a school would be a useful auxiliary to his work, and is of opinion that a suitable Bulgarian teacher could be obtained. The service of a colporteur would also be very useful in visiting the population of the city and of the many villages around and scattering there the Word of God. The Committee would rejoice to carry out both efforts if their funds permitted it, for one missionary can accomplish but little in so vast a field, and so new to missionary effort. Dr. Epstein maintains a Sabbath service in German for the benefit of the few Protestants in the city and preaches regularly, but at times the attendance is very small. He also maintains a Dispensary, open three days in the week during the forenoon, and he visits daily among the poor. Dr. Epstein desired a supply of Bibles and Testaments for distribution, and a communication has been opened with the British and Foreign Bible Society with a view to secure these for his distribution. Mrs Epstein has opened a little female school.

The receipts by Dr. Epstein from paying patients during last year were £10 10s. stg which were applied to the purchase of medical requisites.

The missionary is doing what he can. Let him be sustained by the sympathy and the prayers of our people.

FUNDS

3rd. The receipts indicate that the interest of the people in the Mission is still maintained, though it is matter of regret that some influential congregations have withheld a helping hand. The Treasurer's statement accompanies this report which shows that there is a balance on hand of \$2103.18; of this sum, however, \$1391.72 is at the credit of the Aiton Jerusalem Mission Fund and is not applicable to the general purposes of the mission. The Committee acknowledge the receipt from the Jewish Committee of the Church of Scotland of £50 for the support of the Missionary. The Synods of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, which adopted the Mission as one of their Schemes have also contributed to the funds of the Mission, though the contributions from the former province have been limited to two congregations whose collections were of the most liberal character, viz., Picton and Gairloch, and Salt Springs. The Committee have prepared an abstract of the sources of the revenue of last year and are gratified to state that it exceeds that of the previous year. A legacy of \$100 was received from the estate of the late Miss Fleming of St. Athanase in Lower Canada.

CANADA.

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In concluding this branch of the subject, and earnestly urging upon the Synod the duty of maintaining this interesting effort to obey the command of the Master, to preach the Gospel, the Committee would remind the Synod "that there is that giveth and yet increaseth," and would express their confident trust that ample means for the prosecution of the work will not be a wanting. We have sent forth the first Foreign Missionary ever sent from Canada. Let the willing gifts of our people shew that no fitful zeal actuated us, but a real love for, and an anexious desire to spread, the knowledge of "the truth as it is in Jesus."

And let us, to use the words of the Convener of the Scheme of the Church of Scotland "remember the obligations we owe to the Jewish nation, and the responsibility lying on us to seek the good of those from whom we have derived all our religious privileges and consolations, and of whom, as concerning the flesh, Christ came. Let us be sharers of these great blessings promised to all who seek the good of Israel, and by our liberal contributions and fervent prayers labor for the coming of that day when the restoring of the Jewish nation to their position as God's own people, and their acknowledgement of Jesus as the Messiah shall be even as life from the dead to the Gentile world and shall usher in the time when all shall know the Lord, and when the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdoms of the Lord and his Christ."

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Committee have not yet made any recommendation of a Missionary to the Colonial Committee for this important field. In accordance with the instructions of the Synod at last meeting they communicated with the Colonial Committee and received authority to recommend a Missionary to be deputed to plant the standard of our Zion in that important Colony, the Committee of the Parent Church undertaking to provide for his outfit, passage and salary.

The Committee have not yet made any recommendation of a Missionary. but they will use their best judgment, if the Parent Church still desires it, in the selection of a suitable Missionary for British Columbia.

The amount expended during the same period has been \$1601.80, leaving the Committee \$118.73 in debt.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Synod, the Committee addressed a circular, of which a copy is appended, to all ministers of the church, earnestly appealing for aid. By several congregations this appeal was most liberally met, but the Committee regret to add that the number of Congregations which responded is only 17—surely a small proportion when the increasing number and wealth of our church are considered.

The number of participants in the benefits of the Scheme during the past year has been 33. Of these nearly all are studying for the church, the only exception to this rule being when the Bursary is specially con-

The disposal of the Bursary Fund is left entirely to the Principal and Professors, and the Committee can confidently add their own testimony to that of the Senatus, in assuring the Synod and the church that the scheme is of vital importance to many who are passing through their college course. But for the aid thus afforded not a few of our best and most promising students would have to abandon their studies for the ministry, and would be compelled to employ in secular pursuits those talents and energies which

During the past year two other endowments have been completed. The Kingston ladies have transferred ten shares of Commercial Bank stock to the College for this purpose. It is earnestly hoped that the good example thus shown will be followed. The executors of the late John Mowat, Esq., have also paid over to the College the sum of \$800, being the amount left by that generous friend of the College to found

The Committee would also express their sense of the liberality and benevolent spirit manifested by the St. Andrew's Church Sabbath School at Quebec, which annually contributes \$50 in addition to aiding

The Committee feel that it is scarcely necessary again to attempt to prove the usefulness of this scheme. Many members of Synod can speak from experience of its benefits, and the effects of the timely aid given to students for the ministry are yearly seen in the annual accessions to the Church. To provide for the annually increasing population of Canada, among whom are numbered so many adherents of the venerable Church of our fathers, is a constant aim of our Church Courts, and foremost among the difficulties in the way of this has been the want of ministers for vacant stations. This want cannot be better met than by fostering Queen's College as our training Institution, and by affording aid to those who cannot obtain their college training without this assistance. The Committee respectfully commend this important scheme to the Synod and ask for an annual collection to be made on the second Sabbath of February, or some other convenient day.

A full statement of the accounts will be found appended to the annual Report of the Trustees of Queen's College. All which is respectfully submitted.

At the Orphanages of Calcutta, Bombay, and Madras, there are now 18 orphans supported in connection with this scheme, and at the Canadian school, Calcutta, nearly 50 girls are receiving a Christian education, provided for them by our Sabbath Schools. In addition to his

duties during the day, the teacher of the Canadian school is constantly engaged in preaching to his Hindoo neighbours during the evenings.

The above facts convey briefly the visible results of the 6th year's operations of this scheme, and a few explanations may be permitted in

regard to the plan pursued.

The Orphanages are maintained by the Scottish Ladies' Association for Female Education in India, a Society which has the countenance and aid of the General Assembly's Committee on Foreign Missions. In all heathen countries the condition of the female population is one of utter degradation and misery. Hindostan forms a striking illustration of this fact, and it has long been felt that to elevate woman there, to infuse the sacred influences of Christianity into the families and houses of the people, would more effectually advance the interests of religion than any other mode of missionary operations. With this view Orphanages have been successfully maintained in the capital cities of each Presidency, and from these, young women are now annually sent forth who have received all the advantages of Christian training and education, and many of whom are imbued with Christian zeal and love. As teachers, and as the wives of native catechists, these converts penetrate into the Harems and the Zenanas where no Missionary can ever enter, and exert an influence over multitudes of their countrywomen, who, in their seclusion, could never otherwise have heard of a Saviour. In this Christian land how often are many of our best and strongest influences associated with the teaching and example of a mother or a sister. That our fellow-subjects in India may in this way be raised to like privileges, is the humble yet earnest effort of this scheme.

Very satisfactory accounts are received from the Orphanages of the conduct and progress of the girls, and most touching are the letters and tokens of affection which pass between them and their Canadian supporters. But lately the sudden death of a Canadian sabbath scholar, when communicated to the orphans, was received with tears and every expression of grief, and in Canada intelligence regarding the Orphanages is eagerly sought for and read with avidity. The orphans are of all ages, from two years upwards. Some of them are girls of great promise, and one, Ruth Iona, having been admitted to the communion

of the Church, is now most usefully engaged in teaching.

In addition to the establishments above mentioned, a further opening has been recently heard of at Sealkote, the station where the Rev. Mr. Hunter and his family were cruelly murdered during the mutiny. Over the spot a memorial Church is about to be erected, and an Orphanage has been organized under a most efficient teacher. Five boys in this Institution are about to be maintained in connection with our own Juvenile Mission.

At a time when it was difficult to procure orphans, the Canadian school was commenced, and has now been nearly four years in successful operation. The teacher is a young man of ability and zeal, and is aided by his wife. In the evenings he is able to preach to large audiences, and a little knowledge of the healing art is of service in gaining the attention of his fellow-countrymen. There are about 50 girls in attendance at this school, which could be increased to any extent did

the funds permit.

Northern India is now suffering under a famine of almost unprecedented severity, several months of heat and drought having burnt up the crops which form the sole means of subsistence of the population. Great numbers of the poorer classes have, it is feared, already perished, and many orphans are left unprovided for. But a few months since great difficulty was experienced in keeping up the limited number of inmates in the Institutions, and many of our schools had waited years

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before orphans could be appropriated to them. The fatal ravages of famine have effected a sad change, and surely such an appeal cannot be listened to without a response from Christian hearts. It comes from a land to which Great Britain is indebted for much of her wealth, and without which she could not now fill her proud position in the world. It comes from those who are now our fellow-subjects, and whose spiritual welfare was too long sacrificed to wealth and power by a mercenary company. With greater force than ever therefore does this scheme commend itself to the youth of our Church. By their contributions much good has already been done in India, and the way is now open under God's blessing to accomplish even greater things. The influence of such an effort cannot fail to react with beneficial effects upon our rising generation, training them to liberality and self-denial before the love of the world or the pursuit of gain can have hardened their young hearts, and preparing them for the generous support in after life of our own church and her various schemes. Such an effort as this, humble in itself, may therefore be of vast importance in its future results, and in reliance on the Divine blessing it is again commended to the counten-

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Synod's Committee on Sabbath Schools, have now to submit their fourth Annual Report. While they cannot point to any marvellous success, it is satisfactory to be able to state, that the number of enrolled Sabbath Scholars reported, is greater than that of any previous year.

In the beginning of January, your Committee addressed a circular to every Minister and Missionary in connection with the Synod, and to various other parties known to take an interest in Sabbath Schools. As the results of their enquiries, the Committee have received replies from the representatives of 47 Sabbath Schools. In those Schools the number on the Rolls amounts to 3718, thus giving an average of 79 scholars to each School. The number of Teachers made known in the Returns as at work in this noble department of Christian effort, is 190 male, and 175 female, or a total of 365. Of the scholars, 201 are stated to be above 14 years of age, though it is highly probable or rather certain, that the proportion is greater than that number indicates. Some of the Returns have not distinguished those above 14, while the number attending Bible Classes is 464. If then we take that number as about the amount of scholars above 14, we have fully one-eighth of the whole. While this ratio is certainly not as good as that of the Schools of the Church of Scotland, where last year the number of scholars above fourteen, was rather more than one-fifth of the whole number; it is probably quite as large as the Synod could have anticipated. It is fervently hoped that while the number of our Sabbath Scholars of all ages will greatly increase, that of those who are approximating to fulness of age, will constitute the largest part of the addition. During the past year, our Sabbath Schools report an increase of 173, and a decrease of 118, giving

A variety of publications is taken in the Schools. The "Juvenile Presbyterian," it is pleasing to find, holds the first place in relative importance. The number of copies taken in the Statistics, is 1041. The following periodicals are recommended in the notes contained in the Report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools of the Church of Scotland:—"Sabbath School Messenger, Band of Hope, Child's Own, Child's Companion, Bible Class, Lamp of Love, Teacher's Offering, Friend of Youth, Mother's Friend." "In teaching those scholars who are unable to read," say the Notes, "the 'Peep of Day,' and 'Line upon Line,' have been found invaluable, as also the Missionaries Book, first grade." Your Committee would here commend to the notice of our Sabbath Owen Sound. It was begun in the summer of 1860, and is Christian, instructive, and felicitous in style and manner.

It is very gratifying to observe that the Missionary spirit as seen in growing liberality of giving for the cause of Christ, is cherished and advancing among the young people of the Church. The amount of contributions from Sabbath Schools in the "Returns" for 1860, is \$562.82.

The following Sabbath Schools are either new or previously unknown to your Committee:—Arnprior, Beauharnois, Markham, Osnabruck and Russeltown Flats. In last year's Report the following Schools occur which have not been heard from this year:—Arthur, Cumberland, Midhope, Orangeville, Melbourne, St. Joseph St. Montreal, North Eastof scholars on their Rolls then amounted to 649. Chatham, Darlington, Galt, Hamilton St. John's, Lochiel, Martintown, Neapean, Scott, and

Three Rivers, with Sabbath Scholars amounting to 553 on their Rolls, formerly reported. In the "Acts and Proceedings of the Synod" for 1857, the following Churches are marked in the statistical tables as having Sabbath Schools, with scholars to the amount of 737, viz.:— Beechridge, Camden, Goderich, Huntingdon, King, Lachine, Lancaster, Richmond, Seymour, St. Louis de Gonzague, Vaughan, Williams, and Williamsburgh. In the "Presbyterian" of February last, the Sabbath Schools of St. Andrew's Church, Hamilton, are shewn to have 20 teachers, and 199 scholars, together with a Bible Class of 20. Besides those enumerated* Dundas and Mount Forest are known to have Sabbath Schools. If we allow 100 scholars for these 2, we may estimate the number of unreported scholars as 1521, which with the 3718 reported this year, would give us 5239 Sabbath Scholars from about 60 pastoral charges. In addition to all these, a considerable portion of the children of our Church attend Union Sabbath Schools, of whom the Committee have not heard specifically. There may also be some Sabbath Schools in operation in connection with the Church, that have altogether failed to make themselves known.

The Committee venture again to iterate the sentiments that it is in the highest degree desirable that each Pastor should take a special interest in the working of Sabbath Schools, and if possible be a Sabbath School Superintendent himself. He will, in all probability find, that here lies one of the most important and one of the most encouraging departments of his pastorate and ministry. At least eighteen of the replies state that the Minister is the Superintendent of the Sabbath School belonging to his charge. This, it will be observed, is nearly one-half of all the reported Schools. The fact not only proves the growing interest taken in this delightful part of ministerial work, but also argues well for the future of our Church. When the ministry are earnest here, they are almost certain of success, at least to some extent; and it may be hoped will have the honour of bringing many of the young of the fold to the Shepherd and Bishop of their souls, who will Himself feed

them with "the living bread."

Under wise and Christian influences, the Sabbath School is capable of much variety of good. Prayer meeting amongs the Teachers, the Young Men's Christian Association, Mutual Improvement Classes, are among the different branches that may be said to belong to this parent Institution. Missionary Societies of a juvenile charreter, as well as festive celebrations and benevolent efforts, all cluster around the same great centre. While in some instances, the Sabbath School is the pioneer of the regular gospel ministry, and the fully organized Christian congregation, it is always affected by the state of true religion in its neighbourhood. "The returns show," says the last Report of the Parent Church, "that the Sabbath Schools of the Church have received a great impulse from the unusual religious interest manifested in the course of the past year; and one great advantage of our Sabbath Schools is, that they present a vast organization throughout our land, admirably calculated to fix and render permanent in their efforts the impressions of such special seasons of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. The religious interest in our larger towns especially, was sustained by the prayer meetings and preparatory classes connected with the Sabbath School work. The result of this quickened feeling on the part of the teachers, was a more earnest dealing with the children in their class, and a more extended and regular visiting of the children at their homes.

This, in a great measure, explains the unprecedented increase of 14,000 scholars in one year."

At the last Census in Scotland, the proportion of Sabbath Scholars of all denominations, was 1 in 10 to the people at large. Last year the number of enrolled scholars in the Church of Scotland, was 125,196, or "1 in 23 as the proportion of scholars to population over the whole Church. The proportion for the previous year was 1 in 25." These statistics are fitted to remind us that to arrive at a similar advancement, our ratio must increase. If we suppose that we have 80,000 members and adherents throughout the Province, we ought according to this rate, to have

not less than 8,000 Sabbath Scholars under our tuition.

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The Sabbath School work among us calls for more labourers. The proportion at present seems to be less than 1 to 10, between teachers and scholars. Not only, however, is there a call for Christians to give themselves to this excellent work, it is equally important that the teachers should be well qualified and adapted. Undoubtedly the best and most essential of all qualifications in Sabbath School Teachers is, that they be living epistles of Christ, "known and read of all men," but along with this preliminary attainment indispensable to success, much intelligence, skill and acquirements are requisite, in order to efficient Sabbath School teaching, while all must be sustained by prayer, preparation and perseverance. Thus going forth in faith and love, no Sabbath School Teacher need to doubt that God will send forth the life-giving and healthful Spirit of His grace, to honour the patient and painstaking efforts which from week to week, and Sabbath to Sabbath, are consecrated to the glory of the Head of the Church.

In the general disposition of our congregations to avail themselves of the aid of Sabbath Schools, there is great encouragement to go forward We have not to complain that only the poorer class of our people avail themselves of these means of grace. Every class among us is to be found, the Committee believe, in our Schools. The rich and the poor are there, and while many attend whose Christian education is neglected at home and in the family, there are also in regular attendance, those who are faithfully watched over by parental love, and trained from childhood to know the holy Scriptures." Of the Sabbath School it is said, that "it has become the grand instrument in the hands of the Church for proclaiming Christ to the rising generation. It is felt to be almost an essential part of the machinery of every Christian congregation." The Committee, therefore, venture again most humbly, earnestly and affectionately, to urge upon every Minister of this Church to take the liveliest interest in this cause, and if at all possible, to have a Congregational Sabbath School, where he may meet with and influence for higher good, the young and rising generation of his flock. The circumstances of our country, as well as those of our Church, require this. For while the Christian and devotional elements are encouraged by our Common School system, it also appeals to each Pastor to have an especial regard to the religious instruction of the day scholars belonging to his congregation. This he can most conveniently as well as most effectively do, by means of the Congregational Sabbath School.

Without at all disparaging those "Union Schools where the truth as it is in Jesus," is soundly inculcated, your Committee are of opinion that the Pastor's own Sabbath School may be expected to yield richer and better fruits. This conviction seems to be increasing among our ministry, and every Minister will find that while it is good to take, as far as possible, the oversight of his young people who attend a Union

Sabbath School, by visiting that School and taking part in its exercises, it is better, if possible, to have them under his own immediate superintendence. Great difficulties, the Committee are aware, often exist, but greater difficulties have often been overcome. Those that in some instances have been successfully met in the North of Scotland, in connection with Parish Sabbath Schools, were more discouraging than are those with which in Canada, our Church has to contend. With humble and prayerful determination, the happiest results may be realised.

Your Committee rejoice to believe that the laity of the Church are growing in their zeal on behalf of Sabbath Schools. Let many more Christian men and women come cheerfully forward to uphold the hands of their Ministers in this important work, and cordially co-operate with them. And the Committee would suggest to every Sabbath School Teacher that visiting at the homes of the scholars is most profitable. It is decidedly better that each teacher should visit his or her own scholars, when absent, than that any delegate, however excellent, should do it. Like pastoral visitation, this labour not only benefits the receiver, but also the giver of it, whilst it tends to prepare the teacher and to draw the scholar most beneficially.

In conclusion, the Committee respectfully request the Synod to enjoin every Presbytery to appoint a Committee on Sabbath Schools, whose business it shall be to receive all Reports at the first meeting of Presbytery to be held in the year. The Committee that may be appointed by the Synod can send to each of the Presbyteries tabular forms as early as the first week of the year. Such an arrangement will greatly facilitate the labours of the general Committee, and tend to a completeness not hitherto attained.

NOTES FROM THE "RETURNS."

1. Arnprior.—This Sabbath School was only established last year. It was superintended by the Rev. Wn. Johnson. Of 70 scholars on the Roll, 8 of the girls were above 14. Some of the pupils gave promise as to vital Christianity. Prizes were given for diligence and good conduct. The "Children's Paper" was taken in the School. No published Scheme of Lessons was used. The Teachers held meetings for consultation respecting the interests of the School.

2. Barriefield.—The Superintendent of this School is Mr. John Barr, Divinity Student. 12 of the girls are above 14. Prizes are given for regular attendance and accuracy of recitation. Dr. Machar's "Scheme of Lessons" is used. A monthly collection is taken up in aid of the Calcutta School, and several of the scholars have private Missionary

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3. Beauharnois.—This School is superintended by the Minister, the Rev. F. P. Sym. Good attention is paid to preparation of lessons. It has contributed Four Dollars for Missionary purposes.

4. Belleville.—This Sabbath School gives prizes for regularity of attendance. It does not use any published Scheme of Lessons. It has periodical examinations. The Minister is Superintendent.

5. Brockville.—Prizes are given for accuracy of recitation of lessons. The "Edinburgh Sabbath School Teachers' Notes" are used. It has had 6. Buckingham.—No prizes are given. There is also a Mission Sab-

bath School in connection with the Church.

7. Clifton.—The Minister is Superintendent of the Sabbath School.

8. Cornwall.—The "Childrens' Paper," in addition to the "Juvenile Presbyterian," is taken in the School. The "Scheme" of the Montreal Sabbath School Teachers' Association is used.

9. Fergus.—The "Children's Paper," and "The Sunday School Dial," in addition to the "Juvenile Presbyterian," are taken in the School. Occasional Teachers' meetings are held. The School has a monthly

10. Guelph.—Evidence of vital Christianity seen in four of the scholars whose parents go to no Church. The Montreal "Scheme" is used. The Teachers meet weekly for studying of the lessons, and for securing uniformity in teaching.

11. Hemmingford.—This Sabbath School has been in operation for two

12. Kingston.—This is the largest of our Sabbath Schools, the number on the Roll being 248. It is in a prosperous state. There is a general "interest in good things" manifested. No prizes are given. In addition to the "Juvenile Presbyterian," the "Presbyterian S. S. Visitor," and "Tract Journal" are used. The School has a "Scheme of Jacobs, and "Jacobs, and "Scheme of Jacobs, and "Jacobs, and "Jacobs of Lessons," prepared and printed for its use. It supports 2 orphans in India. The Teachers "meet occasionally for conference and spiritual improvement," with good results. At the monthly Missionary meeting an address is given, and a collection made for Missionary objects.

13. Lanark.—Prizes are given "for reciting without failure the whole Shorter Catechism." Besides the "Juvenile Presbyterian," the School takes the "Child's Paper," and the "Good News." "Mrs. Mc-Lean who keeps Mother's prayer meeting at her house once a month, reports the attendance weekly of upwards of 30 girls and boys, appa-

14. L'Orignal.-This Sabbath School superintended by the Minister, is connected with another at Hawkesbury, of which Mr. Fairbairn is

15. Markham .- There are 2 Sabbath Schools in connection with St. Andrew's Church; 1 in Markham Village, and 1 at St. Helen's, Cashiel. Prizes are given for "regularity and diligence." Those who attend the

Bible Class give some evidences of vital Christianity

16. Montreal, St. Andrew's .- This Sabbath School has had the largest increase, with one exception, (that of Pointe St. Charles) of any reported School. Out of a Roll of 207, 57 scholars were new during the year. For Orphanage and the Canadian School they have contributed \$47.95. Teachers' meetings are held for consultation. They are of decided utility. The Teachers also hold a prayer meeting on the first Sabbath of each month, to solicit a blessing on the work.

17. Montreal, St. Paul's .- During 1860, three members of the Church presented 190 volumes to the Library, which was materially renewed. The School uses the Montreal "Scheme of Lessons," has quarterly examinations, gives no prizes. The Teachers hold monthly meetings to implore the Divine blessing. "All matters affecting the maintenance, stability, usefulness, and general well-being of the Sabbath School are

discussed."

18. Montreal, Pointe St. Charles .- This Sabbath School reports the largest increase of any of our Schools. 34 girls and 30 boys were added during the year. It has an Infant Class, the Teacher of which gives prizes to encourage preparation. The "Bible Class Magazine," and a great variety of other periodicals are taken. Monthly meetings are held by the Teachers for devotional exercises, revising the Roll, admitting Teachers, and improving the administration of the School.

19. Newmarket.-The Rev. Mr. Brown states that owing to his congregation being so widely scattered, and the most of the families being at inconvenient distances from Newmarket, it has been deemed advisable not to have a Sabbath School connected with the congregation. There is a well conducted Union Sabbath School in the Village. Mr. Brown is much alive to the benefits to be derived from Sabbath Schools.

20. Niagara.—The children are generally interested in the work and

will profit by it.

21. Nottawasaga .- Connected with this charge are 5 Sabbath Schools, each of them superintended by an elder, whose name it bears. Each elder must regularly conduct a School, Bible Class, or Prayer Meeting. The Minister superintends the School. Good has been done at the Schools. They are partially closed during the inclement winter Schools. weather.

22. Osnabruck .- This School was only commenced last year, and was open only for "the six summer months." It has not yet a Library. There has been afforded evidences of true religion in some of the scho-

23. Ottawa .- A book is given to each Scholar on the first Sabbath of

the year. 40 copies of the "Children's Paper" are taken.

24. Oxford.—There are 4 Sabbath Schools in connection with this charge, superintended generally by the Minister. In one or two instances evidence of Divine life in the souls of children has been given. Prizes are given for repeating Scripture and Catechism. There are periodical examinations. The Teachers are too widely scattered to be able to meet together conveniently.

25. Peterboro'.—The Teachers meet for mutual help and improvement. The "Children's Paper" is taken.

26. Portsmouth.-The decrease in numbers is connected with the falling off of the village owing to the closing of ship-yards. One girl died in the fall giving very hopeful evidence of her faith in Christ. each scholar who comes in time and is otherwise satisfactory, a ticket is given. Four tickets entitle to a paper on the first Sabbath of the

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The gift of a Bible is offered to each scholar on repeating the whole of the Shorter Catechism without mistake. "The Child at Home," and the "Tract Journal," published by the Boston Tract Society, are circulated and recommended. Dr. Machar's "Scheme" of Lessons is used. Great attention is paid to sacred music. The Teachers mostly live at a distance from the School. They meet twice a year for conference and prayer. The School has "two delightful social meetings; one on the morning of the first day of the year, and the other when strawberries are in season. Last summer all the Schools of the Church were united in this manner, 500 children being present, with a large number of parents and friends. This gathering was held in the

27. Quebec.—The Schools of St. Andrew's Church, and of St. Roch's, and of Wolfe's Cove, have realised an increase in each during the year. In the first, of 15; in the second, of 20; and in the third, of 10. No "Scheme" of Lessons is employed. The contributions of the year amount to over two hundred and forty dollars (240), being a third in advance of that of the previous year. A Queen's College Bursary, the French Mission, an Orphan at Bombay, &c., receive the benefits of this most exemplary liberality. Quebec thus stands highest among our Sabbath Schools in the exercise of the privilege of giving. For five years past the Sabbath Scholars of this charge, have contributed Fifty Dollars annually for a Bursary in Queen's College.

28. Ramsay.—"Two thriving Union Schools are kept; one in the Village of Almonte, with about 150 scholars, and one in Carleton Place, with nearly 100, partly composed of Teachers and children be-

29. Russeltown Flats.—Arrangements are being made for obtaining the "Juvenile Presbyterian," and "a good Library from reliable

30. Toronto.—In some instances a greater degree of earnestness and attention among the scholars has been observed. A ticket is given to each scholar present at the opening of the School. A second ticket is given to those scholars who have said their lessons satisfactorily. A hundred tickets entitle the holder to a prize. The "Children's Paper" is distributed. The Edinburgh Sabbath School Teachers "Scheme" is used. In the Junior Classes Brown's Catechism, Watt's Hymns, and the 1st and 2nd Class Books of the London Sunday School Union, are made use of. The Teachers meet every Thursday evening for preparation of the lessons for the following Sabbath, and for discussing what affects the interests of the School. These meetings have been beneficial, inducing "greater earnestness on the part of the Teachers in the good

31. Valcartier .- This School is only open four months in the year, owing to the shortness of the season and scattered dwellings of the people. "Thomson's Sacramental Catechism," and a Catechism on Presbyterian Church Government, are used in the higher classes.

32. Wolfe Island.—This School gives prizes for regular attendance. It employs "Edinburgh Teachers' Notes."

33. Williamstown.—The School is addressed monthly, and has contributed \$8.27 to the Canadian School.

34. Woolwich.—There are here 2 Sabbath "Union" Schools, superintended by our Minister and the Minister of the Free Church. The 44 mentioned in the Statistics, are those belonging to St. Andrew's Church. The Ministers preach twice to the Sabbath Scholars, in the spring and

APPENDIX I.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCES.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland.

The Committee on Sabbath Observance beg to report that they forwarded to the several branches of the Legislature, during its last session, petitions setting forth the sacred character of the Sabbath as a Divine Institution, and praying for the abolition of labor on that day in all the Departments of Government, and in all the public works under its control.

Your Committee also, in course of the past year, addressed communications, in compliance with the instructions of last meeting of Synod, to the Directors of the following Railways, viz. the Grand Trunk, the Great Western, the Prescott and Ottawa, the Brockville and Ottawa, and also to the Directors of several of the Steamboat Companies, respectfully reminding them of the great power possessed by them in the providence of God, to contribute by the proper regulation of their business, to the right observance of the Sabbath, and of the obligations resting upon them to employ that power so as not to bring upon themselves, or others the guilt of desecrating that day which God, in his wisdom and grace, has authoritatively required all men to keep holy.

The Committee need not remind your Reverend Court of the importance to the best temporal and eternal interests of men, of the Scriptural observance of the Sabbath, feeling assured that the Synod is fully alive to this importance, and desirous also, in faithfulness to the obligations resting upon it as representing an important branch of the Church of Christ in this Province, to discharge the duty incumbent on it in this
