

ELEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY.

The 11th Annual Meeting of the Synod was held on Tuesday, the 21st June, 1870.

Divine Service was celebrated on the morning of the 21st in the Cathedral.

Morning prayer was said by the Rev. Canons Bancroft and Bond; the lessons were read by the Rev. Canon Anderson; the Ante-Communion service by the Most Rev. the Metropolitan; the sermon was preached by the Rev. R. Lonsdell, D.D.; the Holy Communion was administered by the Metropolitan, assisted by the Venerable the Archdeacon, the Rev. Canon Balch and the Rev. Mr. Scarth.

At 2 o'clock p.m. the Synod met for business in the Cathedral School room, the Metropolitan presiding. After prayer the roll of the Clergy was called by the Clerical Secretary and that of the Laity by the Lay Secretary.

The Rev. R. W. Norman and Dr. Smallwood were appointed scrutineers to examine the list of Lay delegates.

The Metropolitan then delivered the following address:-

ADDRESS.

My Brethren of the Clergy and Laity,—In presiding for the first time over this your Annual Synod, I must ask you to bear with me, if I begin with a few remarks personal to myself.

Having been summoned by the unanimous vote of the Clerical and Lay representatives of the Church in this Diocese, when solemnly assembled in Synod, I felt that I had no alternative but to leave my quiet retreat in England, where I had watched over a simple and affectionate people for one and twenty years, to obey at once your call, and to come among you as your elected Bishop.

I felt that under such circumstances your call was the echo, as it were, of a higher summon from above; and I regarded the expression of your wishes as indicative of the will of God. I came out therefore to fill my allotted post, not without sundry misgivings, but at the same time with a strongly impressed conviction, and I may also say with an assured confidence, that He, who seemed so plainly to have marked out my path, and who Himself knew all my deficiences, would give me the needed strength, the requisite wisdom, and the grace to fit me for my new and unexpected work.

During the ten months that I have exercised my episcopal office among you, I may truly say that I have never once regretted the step which I have taken. The kind and generous reception which I met with on my first arrival from the inhabitants of this city and diocese; the cordial and affectionate desire shewn by the Clergy to carry out my wishes; and the very hearty co-operation of the Laity, who have evinced a zeal for the Church's welfare, as well as a respect for my office, which at once endears them to me—these would of themselves be sufficient to call forth my thankfulness, and make me content with my present lot. But I have yet further cause for gratitude from the marked way in which God has, in answer to my prayers, been graciously pleased to endue me with bodily strength, such as I have not experienced for years past, and to afford me other helps to fit me for the emergencies of my new position. To Him I desire thus publicly to give the praise.

I cannot help taking this early opportunity of acknowledging the debt I owe to my justly revered and beloved Predecessor, for the great work he achieved, with your assistance, in laying the foundation, and building up to its present height, the Church in

this Diocese, with all its synodical and other organization. indeed a glorious structure, which will ever bear the impress of his wisdom, his intelligence, and his Christian character. He has been the "wise Master Builder;" and it remains for his successors to rear the spiritual edifice, according to the model which he has designed with such consummate care and skill. There are many features in our Canadian Church system, especially as regards its synodical character, which have called forth the unqualified admiration of our brethren in the Mother Country. is from time to time the infusion of fresh life into it, that life of which the Holy Spirit is alone the Author and Giver.

And now there are certain points of general interest, in connexion with our Church and Diocese, which I desire to touch upon.

First, as regards our Country* Missions.

The number of these amounts at the present time to fifty-nine, having many of them from two to four churches or congregations attached to them. Of these I regret to say only eight are self supporting, and the remaining fifty-one are more or less dependent on the Church at large for their maintenance. It is essential that these should be properly and vigorously sustained; that the ministerial teaching in each mission should be efficient, the public services adequate, and our admirable church system heartily carried out.

But our attention must not be confined to existing missions. Whilst we use every exertion to preserve these in a flourishing condition, we must also be constantly on the alert to occupy fresh fields of labor as they present themselves. that if our Church has real life and vigour in her, her bounds will And I am persuaded be extending themselves year by year; and though an increased demand will thereby be made upon her resources, she will hail with joy every fresh necessity as it arises to multiply her missions, and

There are at this time two or three new missions which might with advantage be entered upon, in each of which a faithful missionary would find his labours abundantly rewarded; and each of which, if not undertaken by ourselves, will eventually be lost to the Church. There is also great need for two "Travelling Missionaries," to visit the lumber districts during the winter months, and to carry

to those hardy and endurant men the message of the Gospel and the ministrations of the Church.

May we not look forward to such an increase in our resources as will enable us to carry out these works of faith and labors of love, and that devoted men will not be wanting to fill these posts of self-denial to which the Church calls them?

In providing for the spiritual wants of our members we should have a due regard for those districts which cry out to us for help, but can bring little or no resources of their own to supply the stipends of their ministers. To refuse to establish a new mission simply because there is but little prospect of its being in any measure self-supporting, would be a fatal error. To despise a call from our brethren because they chance to be poor would be contrary to the spirit of the Gospel, and be unwise as well as unchristian. The fact of the Church's ministrations being demanded should be a sufficient reason for supplying that demand, if practicable, at any sacrifice to ourselves. There is much truth in the remark which I have somewhere seen, that "a Church which is content to lose its poor is losing its true riches."

And this leads me to speak of the manner in which our missions are at present sustained. The Church's work in this Diocese is to a certain extent fettered for lack of funds. Now, if it is to be carried on in a really earnest and hearty spirit, as I trust it will be, these five things are needed:

First, Our Church members in the various parishes must make a more strenuous effort to supply their proportion of the stipends of the Clergy who labor among them. I know that many of them can ill afford to do this, but I am very sure that they will see the paramount necessity of giving to the very utmost of their means for an object in which they themselves are so deeply interested.

Secondly, The richer Laity of the Church, in this city and elsewhere, must be prepared for an increased demand upon their contributions to the General Church Fund of the Diocese; or, I would suggest (what would be far more beneficial) that they be willing, as some have already done, to name a fixed annual sum as their regular subscription to the Fund. Their past liberality, whenever appealed to, makes me feel the most entire confidence that it will not be withheld, if only it be clearly shewn to them that their Church needs it.

Thirdly, In addition to the requirement of the Synod that an annual sermon be preached in every Church, it will be necessary

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that a bona fide collection be made from house to house in every parish or mission throughout the Diocese, in augmentation of this General Fund.

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Fourthly, It will be necessary that an enquiry be made into the state of the various Endowments which exist in certain parishes, and the manner in which each property is invested; also that a correct record be kep, by the Registrar of all such Endowments.

Fifthly, And above all, a better organization is required for the distribution of our Mission Funds. I am rejoiced to say that a Committee of Laymen has been sitting, for the purpose of remodelling our system of grants on the one hand, and our requirements for the people on the other. Whatever changes this Committee may recommend in their report, and the Synod may sanction, will, I trust, be carried out with the hearty concurrence of both Clergy and Laity.

It is the more necessary that the Mission Fund should be forthwith placed on a sound footing, since the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel is gradually withdrawing its hitherto liberal grant from the Church in this Colony.

I feel that there is yet another point which I dare not omit. I believe that no Church will thoroughly prosper, unless she enlarge her heart towards those nations which enjoy not the same spiritual blessing as herself. While trying then to meet our own pressing needs, we must not close our hearts towards those of our fellow-men who are sitting in darkness and the shadow of death. Let us make an effort, according to our means, to extend help to others, and then we may look for God's blessing on ourselves. "There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth."

During the past year the special collections throughout the Diocese have been carried on with much zeal, and with some success. The Annual Meeting, in the Mechanics' Hall, was perhaps the largest that has been held for many years. And we were glad to number among the pleaders for our work an eminent Bishop of the American Church. By his eloquence, the cause of our mission was greatly advanced; and, also, an opportunity was given for the interchange of those cordial and brotherly feelings, which will, I trust, ever exist between the two churches—each carefully adapting itself to the special requirements of its position, but both one, indissolubly one, in all essential matters of faith and practice.

"Facies non omnibus una, Nec diversa tamen, qualem decet esse sororum."

Whilst speaking on the subject of our financial resources, it will not, I trust, be thought out of place if I allude to a method very much resorted to at the present time, in order to raise money for religious objects-I mean that of Bazaars. I am quite aware of the multifarious and pressing nature of those efforts which, from time to time, claim the attention of Clergymen and others. aware too of the exceeding difficulty of obtaining funds for the But still the end, however accomplishment of any good object. desirable, can never sanctify the means, if in themselves unworthy. It seems to me that by so doing we are setting aside real Christian benevolence, as if it were a thing in these days hardly to be attained, and are substituting in its stead a spurious and worldly system of liberality, on which God's blessing can scarcely be expected, or even asked for. I should be very thankful to see a higher standard of almsgiving, and a healthier tone of charity, prevailing among the members of our Church.

Secondly, But I now pass on to speak secondly of the condition and prospects of our Clergy.

I have on another public occasion borne my willing testimony to the general character of those who minister in holy things among us. I doubt if there is any Bishop who can boast of a more laborious, self-denying, earnest Clergy than those who are working under my episcopal superintendence.

I cannot but speak with much thankfulness of the general harmony of views which exists among us, and of the soundness, faithfulness, and moderation, which for the most part mark the There will ever be some few whose preaching from our pulpits. opinions reach the extreme line of what the church permits; but I am not aware of any within my Diocese who are so decidedly overstepping that line as to call for my interference. Still there are some, whom I would gladly see conforming more heartily to the general feeling and spirit of the Church in which they serve. And I am extremely anxious that by a little modification of practice, and by the exercise of a conciliatory spirit, there may be brought about a more entire conformity throughout the Diocese, especially in the ordinary mode of conducting our Services. I hope that those who feel with me in this matter will be willing to make a sacrifice of their own cherished opinions, where at least no sacred principle is involved, in order to attain this desirable end; and that they will boldly lead the way in making such concessions.

It is the policy of our great enemy to separate us from one

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another as widely as he can; it should be our policy—our holy and Christian policy—to close our ranks, and wage our warfare side by side. Our strength lies in united action. And if God is pleased to draw us nearer together by the attraction of a loving spirit, this will make us strong against our common foe, and strong in the discharge of our spiritual mission. May it ever be so with us For then, and not otherwise, will our church answer to that description given in the inspired Song; she will be "beautiful as Tirzah, comely as Jerusalem, terrible as an army with banners."

As regards our Christian Brethren who belong to other communions, we should avoid anything like an attitude of antagonism towards them, or the use of hard words and unkind expressions, whilst we hold our own with an honest and firm hand. We should inculcate in our teaching sound and definite Church principles, and at the same time set forth clearly, distinctly, and prominently, the great and life-giving doctrines of the Cross. Our best weapon is I believe an earnest declaration of what we know to be God's truth, a simple uplifting of Christ before our people, and a desire to embody this teaching in our daily lives.

On the appointment of a Clergyman to any leading parish or mission, I propose in tuture either to induct him into his charge myself in the presence of the whole congregation, or to commission some one of my Clergy to act as my representative in so doing. The entrance of a Clergyman into a new sphere of labor, and his reception by the congregation, I feel to be of so solemn a nature, that the opening Service in which he takes part ought to be marked by some public ceremony befitting the occasion. I have prepared a Form of Service for this purpose, which is chiefly borrowed from one in use in the sister Church of America.

I spoke just now of the duty and expediency of sustaining our missions with vigour. But we must not forget that the Church has also a duty to perform towards the laborers in these missions. The incomes of the Clergy strike me as being lamentably small; not merely in comparison with the stipends allotted to them in other Dioceses, but also in comparison with those enjoyed by men who are engaged in other and less important callings. Many of our most active Clergymen are at present receiving barely \$600 a year. I am glad however to see it acknowledged in the authorized rules and constitution of the Church in this Diocese, that "the minimum salary of the Clergy shall be \$800 per annum." I should be still

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more glad if that intention could be carried out, though at present it seems scarcely possible, owing to the deficient state of our funds. I would express a hope that the attention of the Laity will be directed to this urgent question; and the more so, as I feel assured that no request will emanate from the Clergy themselves.

The fact that the supply of Clergymen is at present somewhat below the demand is attributable in part to this inadequacy of the remuneration we have to offer them. It is true, men can be found, but not men of the right stamp, to fill our ranks. And I am sure you will agree with me in feeling that it would be a serious disaster to our Church, if, in consequence of the lack of men, we were to lower the qualifications of our Clergy, and admit candidates of an inferior grade. My desire is to raise, if possible, the standard of ministerial efficiency, rather than to diminish it, assured that in these days especially we want a well-educated, as well as an earnest and faithful, body of Clergy.

The number of spiritual laborers within the Diocese at this time amounts to eighty-seven. Of these seventy nine are in Holy Orders, and the remaining eight are Catechists, or Lay Readers, licensed by the Bishop.

3. The training of our candidates for Holy Orders is not altogether on a satisfactory footing. The fact of our Theological College being at a distance places us at a disadvantage. And I should certainly be thankful if I could gather my candidates for the sacred Ministry around me here at Montreal, where I could watch their characters and conduct, and superintend their preparation for the Ministry. I feel unwilling however without more mature consideration to interfere with the present arrangement as regards the College at Lennoxville. But if it should eventually be found desirable to move the Theological Department nearer home, I doubt not that I should obtain from the churchmen of the Diocese the needed help to enable me to carry out the project. My present conviction is that, it we had in this city a Theological Institution, with a building worthy of its character, it would prove an immense blessing to the Diocese.

4. I feel anxious to take this opportunity of calling attention to what I consider a very lax and objectionable practice in administering the sacrament of *Baptism*, and in celebrating the Rite of *Marriage*, in private houses. There are reasons why it should have been permitted in this country, and principally from the fact of many parishes having been hitherto unprovided with

Churches. These reasons however for the most part no longer exist. I must request my Clergy to discontinue a practice so entirely without precedent in our Church, except in peculiar cases, and then not without the special permission of the Diocesan. As regards Baptism however the illness of the recipient is, of course, a sufficient ground for the use of the private service provided in our prayer book.

5. The subject of Liturgical changes has of late occupied some attention. I have on many occasions, both in the Convocation of Canterbury and elsewhere, advocated a certain modification of our rubrical directions, to suit the wants of the present generation. I would gladly see liberty given for the use of the Morning Prayer, the Litany, and the office for the Holy Communion, as separate services, according to the original intention; or, when used in their combined form, divested of certain repetitions which now mar their beauty.

We greatly need also a Third Form of Service, to be used in the evening in those churches where prayers have already been read in the morning and afternoon. This seems to be especially called for in our city congregations.

And further, we perhaps want a curtailed Form of Prayer for occasional or special use.

But for these we may well be content to wait until the Mother Church leads the way, which she is evidently prepared to do at no very distant day.

I much hope that the new Lectionary, which has been prepared with great care by the Ritual Commission, and has passed the English Convocation, will be submitted to our Provincial Synod at its next meeting. The adoption of this new Calendar of Lessons will be a great boon to our Church, and has long been wanted.

I propose putting into the hands of my clergy a Form of Harvest Thanksgiving. It may be used this year merely as an optional service, with a view to some approved Form being ultimately submitted to the Provincial Synod for its sanction.

6. The expediency of having one authorized Hymn Book for the Diocese, if not for the whole Province, has been much on my mind. A committee appointed by the Provincial Synod upon the subject is now sitting, and will I hope before next year be prepared with its Report.

There are many difficulties and arguments which array themselves against the adoption of such a book, but the countervailing advantages seem to me to be immense.

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I have long felt that the lack of uniformity in this respect is a prominent source of the Church's weakness; and I should heartily rejoice to see it remedied. We are rich in Hymn Books in the present day; and from the varied treasures that exist an excellent selection may be made, and one that would, I hope, commend itself to persons of all views, and would meet with general acceptance. In any case it would be very unwise to make the reception of such a book compulsory on our congregations: it would be sufficient that its introduction into the Diocese or Province should be permissive, sanctioned as it would be by authority.

7. I cannot omit the mention of a subject, which has given rise to some discussion in the lesser meetings of our Clergy and Laity. I refer to the Ruri-deacanol system.

I know that it has not found much favour with the Clergy generally; but feeling that the office is of ancient origin, and that it now forms an integral part of our Ecclesiastical system, feeling also that it may be made extremely helpful to the Bishop, as well as conducive to the good order and working of the Diocese, I am unwilling lightly to abandon it. I must therefore ask you to bear with me in my conservative wish that it should be continued as a part of our Church Organization. I propose however, in the event of vacancies occurring, to leave the selection of the Rural Dean in a great measure in the hands of the Clergy of the Deanery. This will relieve me of some responsibility, and make me feel that the office is filled by one of your own choice. It may also be desirable to review and re-cast the form of instructions given to the Rural Dean, on his appointment by the Bishop.

8. I am thankful to say that I have been enabled to visit the larger half of the Diocese, namely forty-three missions, during the past ten months; and I hope to complete my visitation of the whole before the commencement of another winter. My first Episcopal act was to consecrate the little church at Como in September last. Other churches are now in the course of erection; and several, especially in the Deanery of St. Andrews, will be ready for consecration during the ensuing autumn. I have held Confirmations in twenty Parishes, and received nearly four hundred persons intofull membership with the Church. I have also ordained six Clergymen, who are now at work in the Diocese.

And now, as to the future of our beloved Church in this land, I cannot but think that the prospect is bright and hopeful. With a sound and devoted Clergy, loving the work which their Heavenly

Master has given them to do, and anxious by the power of His Holy Spirit to win souls to Him; and with a generous and right hearted Laity, zealous not merely for their own, but for the Church's welfare, we have little to fear. There is a great and glorious work entrusted to us by our Lord, and happy for us, if during our short hour of life we take, each of us, our part in the fulfillment of it. On you, my Reverend Brethren, devolves the important duty of acting as leaders in the progress onward; and whilst you go forward, undaunted by the difficulties before you, and confiding in the promise of your Lord, sure I am that our Lay Brethren will rally round you, upholding you in your great enterprise by their untiring aid, and cheering you by their sympathy.

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I have now only a few more words to add regarding the present Synod, which I have to-day the privilege of opening, and over which I have the still greater privilege of presiding. I have looked forward, to its meeting with some degree of anxiety, knowing the influence which its calm and dignified bearing will have upon the Church at large, and feeling the great responsibility of the part in it which I am called to take. But of this I am assured, that if He whose aid we have solemnly invoked, is Himself with us, my anxiety will be exchanged for thankfulness. The eyes of many of our brother Churchmen are turned towards Canada at the present time; let it be seen, from the temper we display at our Synod meetings, that we can come together as Christian brethren, and separate with our hearts warmed, and our spirits calmed and chastened.

I am inclined to think that in all mixed gatherings of Churchmen there is some little danger, lest a feeling of clanship should be allowed to spring up between the Clergy and Laity. This should be especially guarded against; for surely the interests of the one body are the interests also of the other; and the moment those interests are divided, the well-being of the Church is in peril of being weakened.

It is for this reason that I would venture to recommend a very sparing use of our privilege of voting by orders. It is important for both parties that the privilege exists; but we should resort to it only on very exceptional occasions. This manner of voting should be regarded by us as something rather held in reserve, than brought into frequent exercise—as a power which should be rather felt, than often used. It is well for a church when its Clerical and Lay members feel such mutual confidence towards each other, that they can consult together with perfect freedom and singleness of

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purpose. And better still is it when they can be seen habitually voting together, and acting together, without distinction. This should be our rule; the other only the rare exception.

And may I not also express a hope, an earnest hope, that the Clerical members of this Synod may have come here prepared to lay aside their sectional differences—that from the tone which prevails within these walls it may be happily apparent to all that the spirit of party is speedily dying out, and that the spirit of union is taking its place.

Try to forget, my Reverend Brethren any little specialties, either of doctrine or practice, which have in days past ranged you on separate sides; and think only of the greatness of those matters on which you are sent here to deliberate, and of His honour which should be dearer to you than all else. Look at each question which shall come before you, not as to how it will affect yourselves, but how it will affect the Church at large.

In your recent sessions the subject which engaged your attention was of an unusually exciting character, and naturally aroused a certain warmth of feeling. That subject has now passed away, and with it I trust any little irritation which it called up at the time. We shall henceforth do well to lay aside all bitterness of feeling, and devote ourselves to those questions of practical importance which shall come before us. And surely if our deliberations are conducted in a spirit of self control, and as in the presence of God Himself—if we speak with all deference towards each other, and with due respect for the opinions of those who may chance to differ from us—then may opposing views be expressed without the slightest risk of our harmony being disturbed.

I have full confidence in those who are now before me, that they will strive to promote the feeling which I have expressed; and that their chief forbearance will be exercised towards myself, in presiding for the first time over this important Assembly.

May the Holy Spirit so possess our hearts with His calm and gracious influence, that we may speak with all Christian love and wisdom! And may He Himself so direct all that shall be said and done during this present session, that it may tend to the advancement of His glory, and the growth of His Kingdom among us!

The minutes of the last meeting of Synod were read and confirmed.

Moved by the Rev. R. Lonsdell, seconded by Dr. Small-WOOD:

That Mr. James Hutton be re-elected Treasurer of the Synod. Carried.

Moved by Dr. SMALLWOOD, seconded by Major CAMP-BELL:

That Messrs. A. F. Gault and D. McCord be appointed Auditors. Carried.

Moved by the Rev. Canon BANCROFT, seconded by Major CAMPBELL:

That this Synod cannot allow the Rev. Canon Balch and M. H. Sanborn, Esq., to retire without putting on record its high appreciation of their long and faithful services as Secretaries of the Church Society and Synod; and that the present Secretaries be requested to communicate this resolution to the Rev. Canon Balch and Mr. Sanborn. Carried.

Moved by Rev. Canon Bond, seconded by Rev. J. Fulton:

That a Committee be appointed to propose a resolution expressive of the sense of the loss by this Synod, in the death of the late Right Rev. Francis Fulford, Lord Bishop of this Diocese and Metropolitan; and that an expressive of deep sympathy be conveyed to Mrs. Fulford and family. Carried unanimously, the Synod

REPORTS.

The following Report of the Executive Committee was submitted by the Rev. Canon Balch.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Page 50. Proceedings of the 10th Synod, 1868, will be found the Rules and Bye-laws for the administration of the property, missions, and other duties of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, which says:—"And the said Committee shall furnish to the Synod, at each stated annual meeting of the Synod, a report of its operations, and a clear statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Committee during the preceding year, and of the state of the funds and property belonging to, or vested in, or under the control of the Synod."

In compliance with the said instructions, the Executive Committee beg leave respectfully to report:

That no annual statement for the year ending January 1st, 1869 could be submitted to the Synod, because there was no annual Synod held during the year. The See of Montreal became vacant in September, 1868, and by provision of the law, a Special Synod was called, and met in November, 1868, for the purpose, and only for the purpose, of electing a Bishop and Metropolitan of Canada. The Special Synod at that meeting failed to elect, and adjourned to meet again on the 11th May, 1869, at which time the Rev. Ashton Oxenden, M.A. Rector of Pluckley, Kent, and Honorary Canon of Canterbury Cathedral, England, was elected. He was consecrated in Westminster Abbey, and was subsequently enthroned in the Cathedral of Montreal, Sept, 5, 1869. The present Synod, therefore, is the first annual Synod to which the Executive Committee of the Incorporated Synod and Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal could report. Their Report, therefore, embraces two years, viz., from June, 1868, to June 1870:

The Reports of the Rural Deans, together with the Reports of the Rectors, Incumbents and Missionaries of the Diocese, give full and for the most part satisfactory statements of the condition and progress of the church in the Diocese. These will be published in the

report of this Synod. A digest of the whole would have been carefully prepared by the Secretary, and inserted in the body of this report for the convenience and information of the Diocese, but returns have not been received from all the parishes and stations. Forty-two returns have only been received.

The present Secretary was elected in 1867 Secretary of the Church Society, which Society was afterwards merged into the Incorporated Synod of Montreal, June 1868. He was (see p. 57 proceedings of the 1st Synod), the elected Secretary of the Synod, and at the meeting of the Executive Committee, August 12th, 1868, he read to the Committee notes from the Dean and Wardens of the Cathedral to the Committee, objecting to his holding the office, and he declined the appointment, whereupon Bishop Fulford wrote to the Committee, who adopted a resolution asking the Secretary to hold the office until November. Before November the See was vacant, and no Synod could be held until it was filled, and therefore, the present Secretary was obliged to continue in office until to-day, and now respectfully asks to be relieved, because the duties of Canon of the Cathedral are incompatible with the duties of Secretary.

MEETINGS OF COMMITTEE.

There have been held according to law meetings of the Executive Committee during both years; on the 2nd Wednesdays of February, May, August and November. Adjourned meetings have been held in May, 1868, August, 1869, and a special meeting, September, 1869.

TREASURER OF THE S. P. G. FUND.

At a special meeting of the Committee, September 14th, 1869, the Treasurer read a letter from the Secretary of the S. P. G., relating to the resignation of T. B. Anderson, Esq., who for 30 years had faithfully discharged the duties of Treasurer, and the Committee unanimously entered on their minutes, a vote of thanks to Mr. Anderson, which at their request was conveyed to him by the Metropolitan.

Mr. James Hutton was appointed Treasurer in place of Mr. Anderson.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

At the meeting held May 13th, 1869, a Committee was appointed to report a plan for carrying out a Superannuation Fund, and at the

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meeting November 10th, 1869, the said Committee's Report was adopted and the Fund commenced as follows:

Moved by the Rev. D. Lindsay, seconded by the Rev. R. Lind-

say:
1st. That the Superannuation Fund be now commenced.

2nd. That every Clergyman, to be entitled to the benefit of this Fund, subscribe \$5 per annum.

3rd. That an annual sermon be preached on its behalf, and that a Committee be appointed to work out its details.

SYNOD HOUSE.

At the meeting of the Committee held August 25th, 1869, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved.—That in the opinion of the Executive Committee, it is very desirable that the Bishop of Montreal should transfer the property known as the Cathedral Schoolhouse, to the Synod, in consideration that the Synod should pay the Bishop interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum on £2,129 18s., the amount of the Bishopric Endowment Fund invested in such property, and subject to the arrangement presently subsisting between the Cathedral and the Bishop.

At the meeting of the Committee, November 10th, 1869, the following document was read by the Secretary:

With reference to the resolutions of the Executive Committee passed at the meeting held on the 25th of August last, on the subject of the Cathedral Schoolhouse property, the Lord Bishop of Montreal declared in writing as follows:—

"With reference to the foregoing resolution, I hereby agree to convey the property referred to in the resolutions to "the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal," in consideration of the Synod allowing the Rector of the Parsonage or Rectory and "Parish Churchof Montreal," to continue to use, for Sunday school purposes, in the same manner as heretofore and now, and for ever, the building presently erected on the said property, or such other building as may at any time hereafter be erected in its place on condition of his paying the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars currency per annum to cover the expenses of heating, lighting, and care-keeping of the portion of the said building so used in connection with said Sunday-school; and in furthur consideration of the Synod paying to the Lord Bishop of Montreal interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, on the sum of two thousand, one hundred and

twenty-nine pounds, eighteen shillings and one penny currency, being so much money belonging to the Bishopric Endowment Fund and invested in said property; such interest to be payable semiannually on the 10th day of November and May in each and every

Montreal, 6th November, 1869.

(Signed,)

And it was thereupon resolved that a conveyance of said property be accepted from the Bishop on the terms above proposed, and that the Treasurer of the Synod be, and he is hereby authorized to accept such conveyance on behalf of the Synod and to execute all

Moved by Mr. Sanborn, seconded by Mr. Bond, that the Secretary, the Chancellor and the Treasurer be a committee to have charge of the Synod building, and by whom all necessary arrangement shall be made for insurance, repairs and proper care, and by whom the use of it shall be granted from time to time, upon such terms as they shall see fit; and that the same Committee shall be charged with the duty of making regulations for the Library.

REVISING GRANTS TO MISSIONS.

At the stated meeting, February 9th, 1870, the following resolution was adopted:

Mr. BRYDGES moved, seconded by Dr. BANCROFT, that a committee of Laymen be appointed to examine into the whole system of our mission grants, and to report to the Committee.

The BISHOP appointed Messrs. Brydges, Hutton, Bethune, Gault, Sanborn, and Dr. Smallwood said Committee.

At the stated meeting of the Committee, August 12th, 1868, the Secretary read a paper stating that the Diocese for years, in consequence of anticipating revenue, has really been in debt to the amount of \$5,000, and proposed to obtain that sum over and above the ordinary income. Before the death of Bishop Fulford fair progress had been made in this behalf, and the sum of \$864.84 was subscribed. Upon the decease of Bishop Fulford, the Secretary found the application met with little favor, and after consultation with the Very Rev. the Dean, the venerable Archdeacon and several prominent Laymen of the Church, all of whom approved of the measure, he applied for aid to a few friends and churchmen in the States.

The application was most cordially received, and arrangements

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made to pay \$1,000 United States currency, in January, \$1,000 in February, and whatever balance might be needed to the extent of \$3,000 or \$4,000 more in the month of March.

The instalment for January amounting to \$1,075, United States currency, was accordingly paid to the Treasurer, and at the stated meeting of the Executive Committee, February 11th, 1869, the following resolution was moved by the Venerable Archdeacon Leach, seconded by the Rev. H. F. Darnell:

"Resolved, That the Executive Committee, having had submitted to them a statement of the Secretary of the Synod, learn with satisfaction the results of his exertions, and tender to the Secretary their thanks for his successful efforts to improve the Mission Funds of the Diocese.

The Executive Committee beg leave to request their brethren in the United States, who have assisted the Secretary by contribution or otherwise, to accept of their cordial acknowledgement of their assistance."

The opinion having been expressed that another effort to obtain the balance of the debt in Montreal would prove successful, the Secretary suspended the arrangement made in the States until by a simultaneous collection in all our city churches together with personal application by Messrs. Shelton and Mackenzie. And the Secretary had the agreeable duty, whilst thanking our generous brethren in the States for what they had done, of assuring them that the sums pledged to be paid in February and March were not required.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee, November 10, 1869, the following resolution was adopted:

Moved by Canon Bond, seconded by Canon Anderson:

That the thanks of this Committee be given to the Rector and Incumbents of the Churches in the City of Montreal, and to Mesars. Shelton and Mackenzie, for their valuable aid in obtaining the balance of the debt due by the Diocese to the Mission Fund.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE OF THE DIOCESE FOR MISSIONS.

Upwards of \$18,000 per annum are required for the support of missions on our present scale; of this sum, from \$5000 to \$6000 per annum were contributed previous to the 1st of January, 1868, from the whole Diocese. The Treasurer's Report shews the amount given. This revenue is derived from three sources.

Bishop Fulford thus speaks in his pastoral letter of 15th of August, 1868:

"The funds which the Synod will have to administer are derived from three sources:

1. The grant from the S. P. G.

2. The income arising from the capital received for commutation of life interest in the Clergy Reserves.

3. Annual subscriptions, collection in churches, &c.

Of these, the grant from the S. P. G. is, as you well know, in course of gradual withdrawal. I have just received notice that £180 sterling will be taken off from the grant next year, and it will be subject to further diminution every year until the whole is Out of what we do receive, we are bound to pay all pensions and salaries for which the S. P. G. is pledged, so that a very small balance remains free for our use in the general work of The Clergy Reserve Fund, though not subject to diminution, like the former, is nearly all appropriated to the original Clergy, in whose names it was commuted; only a small portion has yet fallen in to be added to the general funds at the disposal of the Synod. The only source, then, to which we can look for any immediate or effectual assistance, in order to obtain an increase of funds, is no 3: 'The annual subscriptions, collections in chur-

The plan of raising revenue for the support of Missions under the 3rd was by annual collections, and annual subscriptions and deputation meetings; in other words, an annual effort. sent Secretary believed that such a plan admitted of little improvement, and could not meet the growing wants of the Diocese on the one hand; nor on the other, its diminished income by the withdrawal of the grant of the S. P. G.

He therefore discussed at length, in a Report made to the Church Society in January, 1868, the plan of frequent contributions—small gifts often made—in other words, the Scriptural plan of weekly offerings. That Report was received with favor. It was unani mously adopted and a large edition ordered to be printed for circulation, and in the last Pastoral of Bishop Fulford, which was published after his decease, he approved of the plan. Some progress towards carrying it into operation was then made, but the Secretary was satisfied it could not be sufficiently carried out unless some one gave his personal attention in connection with the Committee. The Executive Committee of November 13th, 1868, adopted the following resolution:

"On motion of Dr. Bancroff, seconded by Mr. Curran, it was Resolved that the Secretary be requested to make arrangements, promptly, for holding missionary meetings throughout the Diocese."

And the Secretary agreed to give four months to the work, one to each Deanery, leaving town in May and returning in July, if the daily service at the Cathedral was provided for. The Brethren in the city, present at the meeting, agreed to do the duty, and the Secretary spent January and February in visiting the Deaneries of Bedford and Iberville, with what success the Reports of the Rural Deans and Charges will show.

But before the remaining Deaneries could be likewise visited, the Brethren in the city, found the duty of the daily service inconvenient, and the Secretary was notified in writing that his absence from the Cathedral could no longer be supplied. This compelled a relinquishment of the appointed visits in those Deaneries. Having made the Report required on behalf of the Committee, perhaps the Secretary may, on his own account, be allowed to say that his three years' experience in the office only confirms the conviction already expressed in many ways, and on many occasions, that small gifts, so as not to be burdensome to the giver, frequently made so as to form the habit of giving, and also to accumulate a larger income—in other words, the Scriptural plan of weekly offerings is the only plan which will meet the growing wants of this Diocese and make it both self-supporting and self-extending.

The Secretary, in this, his last official act, may be pardoned if he adds, that he esteems it one of the greatest privileges of his life, besides other modes of working for missions, to have advocated by public preaching or speaking, on one hundred and six occasions, the holy cause of missions. He has endeavored to be faithful, and in now surrendering his trust, desires to render his grateful acknowledgments for the kindness with which his labors have been regarded, and the many acts and expressions of hospitality and friendship which he has received from his brethren the Clergy and Laity.

Dr. Balch gave notice that he would move the adoption of the foregoing Report.

The Treasurer Mr. James Hutton then read the following Statement:

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The following Report of the Lay Committee on Diocesan Missions, appointed by the Executive Committee, was read by the Chairman, Mr. C. J. Brydges:

REPORT.

The Committee appointed by the Executive Committee to enquire into the question of the missions, throughout the Diocese of Montreal, beg to make the following Report:

The grant from the S. P. G. is now £2000 Stg., but it has been intimated from London that this amount will be gradually diminished, and that in a few years it will entirely cease.

This will render necessary increased contributions in the Diocese itself towards the support of the Missions, and forces also attention to the necessity of reducing to the smallest possible sum the payments towards the Missions.

It is obvious that the system which has hitherto been in force has failed. It was a system which was at first mainly dependent upon the grants from the S. P. G., and although these have been steadily decreasing, no systematic effort has, so far, been made to put the Missions, as far as practicable, upon a self-sustaining basis.

A circular was addressed by the Bishop, at the request of the Committee, to the Clergyman in charge of each Mission, requesting certain information. The replies to these questions were tabulated, and by this means tolerably correct statements have been obtained. It seems that, whilst in some localities not much improvement has taken place, in many places it is clear that much more can be done to support the Church.

The old arrangement was that the Society paid a fixed sum to the Clergyman on condition that the congregation provided a further amount as agreed upon. As a rule, this arrangement has been only partially carried out, and it is clear that a different system must be at once put in force.

The Committee have had the advantage of the presence of the Metropolitan at their meetings, and they are glad to know that the recommendations, which they have decided to make, meet with his Lordship's full concurrence.

After having carefully considered the whole matter, the Committee have decided to recommend as follows:—

1. That it is essential that as many as possible of the present Missions and Parishes should become dependent solely upon their own resources for the maintenance of the Church.

2. That it will conduce in every way to the advantage of the Church, if the principle is clearly admitted that each Mission must look forward to becoming at an early date self-supporting, so that the available Mission Funds may be employed in establishing new missions in districts where they are required.

3. That, with this view, the payment of Mission salaries be made entirely by the Treasurer of the general Church funds of the Dio-That each Mission or Parish agree to pay, semi-annually, such sum as may from time to time be agreed upon; that a guarantee be given from the Mission or Parish that such agreed sum shall be regularly paid to the Treasurer, and that such amount to be so paid to the Treasurer shall be subject to revision as circumstances may render advisable.

4. That, to properly carry out the foregoing plan, a Board of Missions shall be appointed annually in each Deanery, to be composed of four Clerical and four Lay members, who shall annually report upon each Mission in the Deanery, and their recommenda. tion with regard to it, to the Executive Committee; the Bishop to appoint the members of the Board in each Deanery. clearly understood that the payments for each Mission are all to be made upon the basis of making the Mission as early as possible self-sustaining, and that this will probably be partly accomplished by gradually increasing the amount which the Mission will be required to pay to the Treasurer.

5. That, excepting in any special case which may be directly recommended by the Bishop, each fresh application for a Mission grant shall emanate from the Ruri-decanal Meeting, who shall forward it for consideration to the Mission Board appointed by

6. That the salaries to be paid to Clergymen employed as missionaries shall not be less than the following, viz.:-

For Deacons..... \$500 per annum.

For Priests under 10 years standing.. For Priests above 10 years standing. 600

7. That the sums to be hereafter received from the S. P. G. be paid in full to the Treasurer to be dealt with, as hereinbefore recommended, as part of the General Mission Fund, care being taken that the claims of certain older Missions and annuitants are properly respected.

8. That to properly carry out these various arrangements, it is indispensibly necessary that a permanent paid Secretary be appoint-

of

ed, who will act under the directions of the Executive Committee, and who will also act under the advice of the Chancellor, as Registrar for all matters connected with Endowments, etc.

The Committee believe that the foregoing rules, if adopted and strictly carried out, will get rid of the difficulties under which the Mission Fund has been administered—will create a desire in the different districts to make each mission as fast as possible self-sustaining—and thus permit of the available funds being made use of in opening new fields of labour and usefulness in the Diocese.

Mr. Brydges gave notice that he would move the adoption of the foregoing Report.

The Venerable the Archdeacon stated that the Committee on Canons respecting powers of Incumbents and Churchwardens, had no Report to make; that made in 1868, being deemed sufficient.

The following Report of the Committee on Education was read by the Rev. Canon Balch:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

By reference to the Report of the Committee, made to the Tenth Synod, (which met June 16th, 1868), found on pages 25, 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30, and printed in the 10th Annual Report, the proceedings of the Committee and its suggestions to the Synod, may be known. And, by reference to pages 58 and 59, of the same Report, the Legislation of the Synod, on the report of the Committee may also be known.

The first meeting of the Committee on Education under the said Legislation of the Synod was held August 12th, 1868, the Most Rev. Bishop Fulford, present, and presiding.

The Committee at that meeting resolved to confirm their efforts for a time to the specific duty of founding in or near Montreal a girls' school of the highest order. And a sub-Committee was appointed to enquire and report a suitable building or site, for the proposed school; and also to draw out and publish a statement of facts, which might represent the necessity, and recommend the object.

Both of these duties were discharged by the Committee. But, before any of the measures proposed and adopted by the Committee

could be carried into execution, the Diocese was deprived of its deeply lamented Bishop. BishopFulford's work was done! The Master called him to receive his reward!

The labors of the Committee were of necessity suspended until Bishop Fulford's successor could put himself at the head of this

The first meeting of the Committee, Bishop Oxenden, present and presiding, was held October 8th, 1869; and, at an adjourned meeting, held October 18th, 1869, it was resolved to purchase the property known as 108 Mansfield street, for the proposed girls' school.

To prevent pecuniary embarrassment, it was also resolved to raise the sum of \$30,000, and a Committee consisting of his Lordship the Metropolitan and four Lay members of the Committee were appointed to obtain the money.

At a subsequent meeting held November 10th, 1869, some of the members of the Committee appointed to raise the Endowment Another sub-Committee was appointed, which framed and issued a circular to the Diocese, modifying the plan previously adopted, and naming \$1,000 as the sum necessary to found the proposed school; no satisfactory replies were made to that circular.

The last meeting of the Committee was held May 11th, 1870, when it was resolved that the Secretary of the Synod should make a report to the Synod, setting forth brielly, the work done by the Committee, and asking leave to continue their labors.

The Committee would have been gratified to be able to report more satisfactory results; but it must be remembered that in works of this kind, patience is required, and sometimes repeated disappointments must be encountered before success crowns the

The necessity for such a school is just as great, and, even more urgent now, than when its creation was determined by the Synod. The ability of the Diocese to found such a school is, unquestionably, as great, if not greater—therefore the Committee do not propose to abandon the effort, but ask leave to continue their labors.

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June 20th, 1870, at the Synod House. At a meeting of the Committee appointed to consider and report upon the question of some division of the Diocese of Montreal, The Archdeacon in the Chair.

Present: -Rev. Dr. Bond, Rev. R. Lonsdell, Rev. E. Du Vernet, The Chancellor, and J. Hutton, Esq.

That it is inexpedient to take any Resolved unanimously: measures to bring about any division of the Diocese of Montreal under present circumstances.

The Archdeacon gave notice that he would move the adoption of the foregoing Report.

The Rural Dean of Hochelaga then read his report. (See

appendix A.)

The Reports of the Rural Deans of St. Andrews and Iberville were not read in Synod but are inserted by direction of the Metropolitan. (See appendix A.)

The Rev. Canon Bancroft having been called on for the Report on the Division of Parishes, stated that the Committee appointed to consider that matter had not yet been covened.

The Synod then confirmed Mr. Mackenzie's resolution, carried at last Synod "That article 10 of Constitution be altered so as to read "A quorum shall consist of 25 Lay and 15 Clerical Delegates." The Synod also confirmed Mr. Bethune's resolution, together with Mr. Mackenzie's addition thereto, to the effect that the Secretary perform the duties, and receive the fees authorized to be performed and received by the Registrar. (pp. 55-57 Proceedings of Tenth Synod.)

Moved by Mr. Strachan Bethune, seconded by the Rev. That the Report of the Committee on Canons Canon Bond: be read and considered to-morrow. Carried.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Notices of motion were handed in by the Revs. J. Fulton, J. B. Davidson and Canon Balch.

CONSIDERATION OF MOTIONS.

Moved by Dr. SMALLWOOD, seconded by Rev. J. B. DAVID-SON:

That the election of Provincial Delegates be proceeded with to-morrow at 3 p. m., and that the ballot be left open for one hour. Carried.

Moved by the Rev. R. Lonsdell, seconded by Mr. D. McCord:

That the election of the Executive Committee take place to-morrow at 4 o'clock, p.m., and that the ballot be left open for one hour. Carried.

Moved by Mr. L. H. DAVIDSON, seconded by Mr. Welch: That lists of the Clerical and Lay Delegates be printed for the use of the House. Carried.

Moved by the Rev. J. B. Davidson, seconded by Canon Bond:

That as certain Members of the Synod of a neighboring Diocese are present, such members Lay and Clerical be invited to take seats in the body of this house. Carried.

The Synod was then adjourned to 10 a.m. on the following day.

The Metropolitan pronounced the Benediction.

SECOND DAY.

The proceedings of the second day commenced with the reading of morning prayer in the Cathedral at nine a. m., after which the members of Synod assembled at 10 o'clock for the transaction of business. After prayer by the Metropolitan the rolls of Clerical and Lay Delegates were called by the Secretaries and the minutes of the previous day's proceedings were read by the Clerical Secretary and confirmed.

REPORTS.

The Venerable the Archdeacon read the following Report of the Committee for preparation of adddress on the death of the late Metropolitan:

That the members of the Synod, at this its first meeting after the decease of the Most Reverend F. Fulford, D.D., Lord Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan, desire to record their sense of the great loss sustained by them and the Church at large through his death. The organization of the Church in the Dominion by Synods was, for the most part, effected through the persevering zeal, energy and wisdom of the departed prelate; and the efficiency of its workings in is Dioceseis mainly due, by God's blessing, to the tact and discernment with which he presided over the deliberations of this House.

The members of this Synod are filled with a sorrowful consciousness that they have been deprived of a faithful friend and father as well as an able President, and wish to bear this testimony to the worth and faithfulness of him whose loss they record.

The adoption of the Report was moved by the Archdeacon seconded by the Rev. Canon Bond, and unanimously passed, the Synod rising.

The Rev. Canon Bond read the following Report of the Assessment Committee:

That the Venerable Archdeacon Leach, the Rev. E. DuVernet, Rural Dean, the Rev. J. P. Dumoulin, the Rev. James Carmichael, the Rev. M. S. Baldwin, the Hon. L. S. Huntingdon, M.P., George Moffat, Esq., and the mover and seconder of the Resolution, be a Committee to draw up an address of sympathy and encouragement to the Protestant Episcopal Church of Ireland in her present noble effort to sustain herself.

The following amendment was moved by the Rev. R. W. NORMAN, and seconded by the Rev. T. W. FYLES:

That the Metropolitan be requested to appoint a Committee with instructions to draw up an address expressive of sympathy for the Irish Church in its new phase of existence.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. H. F. DARNELL, seconded by Mr. HIRAM FOSTER:

That a Committee be appointed to draw up an address of sympathy and encouragement to our Protestant fellow Churchmen in Ireland in their present noble effort to sustain themselves. Lost.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON, seconded by the Rev. H. Montgomery:

That a Committee, to be named by the Bishop, be requested to draw up an address of cordial sympathy to the Church of Ireland in the critical pethodology which she is passing, believing that she is a most important bulwark as protesting against the corruptions of Rome. Lost.

The Synod adjourned till 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod re-assembled at 2 o'clock.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

A deputation was received from the Synod of Quebec consisting of the Lord Bishop of that Diocese, Revds. Henry Roe, and S. Scarth, Honble. Edward Hale, Messrs. H. S. Scott, R. W. Henneker and Edward Chapman.

The Bishop of Quebec and Mr. Henneker having addressed the Synod the Metropolitan submitted the following resolutions to the Synod, which were carried unanimously:

That the Statutes of the College be altered so that there be no Trustees or College Council forming jointly with the Bishops the Corporation, as at present; but that in place thereof there be, besides the Bishops, the following ex-officio Governors, viz.: the Chancellor of the University, the Principal of the College, the Professors of Divinity, Mathematics and Classics, and the Rector of the Junior Department, together with other six Governors to be appointed by the Bishops jointly, and ten to be appointed, one-half by the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, the other half by the Synod of the Diocese of Quebec.

That the Governors, other than those holding office in the University or the College, be appointed for three years, or in the case of those appointed by the Synods in such form and for such time as they may decide.

That the Principal and Vice Principal be appointed in the manner provided for the appointment of ordinary professors, and not as at present by the Bishops only, but the appointment of Divinity Professors to be vested as at present in the Bishops solely.

That the College shall lay before each of the Synods annually a Report exhibiting the financial and educational condition of the institution.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The Venerable the Archdeacon on behalf of the Committee appointed to prepare an address to the Church of Ireland read the following, which was adopted unanimously, the Synod rising:

THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL TO THE CHURCH OF IRELAND:

Our distance does not prevent nor diminish our sympathy with you. Connected with you in all spiritual respects, and related closely and practically in a special manner, inasmuch as the greater part, we believe, of the members of the Church in Canada have been nurtured under the care of the sister Church of Ireland, we take occasion to say that your present circumstances, brought

SESSION

about by recent events of such an extraordinary character, haveexcited in us the deepest interest.

We have, in thought and feeling, sometimes with painful apprehension, sometimes with a more cheerful and encouraging faith, participated in the noble efforts you have made, and are yet making, for your continued life and more extended powers of usefulness. It is with profound sorrow that we have witnessed the adoption of any measures that tend, or seem to tend, to lessen the resources of the Church in Ireland, or her influence or authority, whether these measures have been dictated by necessity or adopted from expediency. Nevertheless, we beg leave to express an earnest hope, and even a belief, which our imperfect and partial experience here on a smaller scale, but of an analogous kind, seems to warrant, that the spiritual vitality of the Church of Ireland will be found, not only sufficient for her preservation, but under the gracious providence of Almighty God, will prove great enough to cause her to emerge from her present transitional condition more vigorous, and above all, more united than she has ever been.'

This we pray that God may bring to pass speedily, for the sakeof Ireland and the glory of His Holy Name.

Moved by Thomas Simpson, seconded by the Rev. J. C. DAVIDSON:

That the Metropolitan be respectfully requested to forward to His Grace the Lord Primate of Ireland the address of the Synod to the Irish Church for presentation to the National Con-

The Rev. J. Constantine (by permission of the Synod) read the following Report of the Committee appointed by: the Rural Deanery of Bedford on the subject of the Mississiquoi High School.

The Committee appointed at the Ruri-decanal meeting, held at: Waterloo, Deanery of Bedford, the seventh day of June instant, toinquire into the affairs of the Missisquoi High School, beg leave to

REPORT:

1. That the institution was formally vested, by deed of sale, in the Lord Bishop of Montreal and his successors, and placed under. his and their continual control, for purposes of education, according to the principles of the Church of England.

A debt of \$400 on the building was paid by a grant from the

Church Society of the Diocese.

2. The school was under the supervision of the Rev. J. B. Davidson, as principal, from date of deed until 15th July, 1864, with uniform success as a Church School.

3. In 1864, the principalship of the school was resigned by Mr. Davidson, on which a meeting was called by the Archdeacon, with a view of placing the school under the management of the Clergy

of the Deanery.

This meeting, however, appears to have resulted in the management falling into the hands of a local Committee of Laymen, of whom only one has continued to take an active share in its management, and under whom several teachers have been engaged in succession.

4. Since the resignation of Mr. Davidson, the distinctive church character of the school may be said to have ceased, but without any increase of scholars or greater popularity accruing; rather

the contrary in both respects.

The present attendance, male and female departments included, is about 30, the average attendance for the year about 50. The school has received a Government grant from its commencement to the present time. For 1869 it was reduced to \$131.97. Your Committee recommend that the original design of the founders as expressed in the deed, to make this a Church school, should be adhered to, but that the exemption provided by the deed, for all scholars not members of the Church of England, be fully carried out.

Efforts to extend its usefulness beyond its present sphere should be made.

For this purpose it seems desirable that a strong local influence should be combined with facilities for attracting pupils from a

larger area.

They recommend that it should be a Church school for the Deanery of Bedford; at the same time that its management should be of a liberal character, with all its educational privileges equally open to those who, not being members of the Church of England, would claim exemption from specific religious teaching. In order to increase its means of usefulness, they would hope to draw out additional funds, in the form of subscriptions or scholarships, so

that, with the aid of present or future grants, the efficiency of its teaching power might be maintained at a good standard in both

For the present they recommend:

I. That a small grant be made from Church funds, as one means of bringing the school before the public in its real character.

II. That a few plain rules for its foundation and management should be drawn up and sanctioned by the Rural Deanery and the

III. That a Clergyman be appointed to visit the school once a year, and report to the Ruri-decanal meeting. (This is in nowise to interfere with Government inspection, which is still to be

IV. That in point of expenditure the school do not go beyond the same scale as other Academies or High Schools in the neigh-

The whole, nevertheless, submitted.

A memorial on the same subject from the inhabitants of Sweetsburg was handed in by Mr. LAY, and read by the Lay Secretary as follows:

MEMORIAL.

To the Most Reverend the Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Mon-TREAL, and METROPOLITAN, and the Reverend the Clergy and the Lay Delegates in the Diocesan Synod assembled:

The Memorial of the undersigned Members of the Vestry of Christ Church, Sweetsburg, in the Township of Dunham, in the said Diocese of Montreal, and others, residents of said Sweetsburg

MOST RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH:

That your memorialists have learned that at the late meeting of the Ruri-decanal Chapter of the Deanery of Bedford, holden at Waterloo, a Committee was appointed to enquire into, and report to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, at its next sitting, upon

the working management and present position of the Missisquoi High School, a certain academical institution situated in the wicinity of Sweetsburg.

That agreeably to the terms of the resolution of said Deanery meeting, appointing such Committee, the Reverend Messrs. Constantine and Fyles, members of said Committee, made certain inquiries regarding said school; but, so far as we are able to learn, sought no information concerning said school of the people of this vicinity, who feel a deep interest in the permanent establishment of a thorough institution of learning in this locality.

That, in our opinion, such a school as above intimated, may be readily established here, and command a hearty support of the undersigned, and others equally interested therein.

That in view of the importance of the permanent establishment of such a school to this section of the Eastern Townships in particular, we, the undersigned, have felt it incumbent upon us to address you at this time, and we beg leave to add that, in our opinion, any farther action on the part of the Synod, in relation to said Missisquoi High School, without first obtaining the views of the people of this locality in relation thereto, and, if practicable, their hearty concurrence therein, would tend to complicate the serious troubles now existing in this parish, and, we humbly aver, would greatly hinder the advancement and prosperity of the said Missisquoi High School.

We would, therefore, earnestly request that you would stay further action in the matters in question, until such time as the opinion of the people of this section, in relation thereto, may be known, and, if possible, their concurrence in such action, to be taken in the premises, secured.

And your memorialists, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

The original motion was then put to the Synod and carried.

The Archdeacon on behalf of the Committee on Canons stated that the Committee had not anything to add to its Report of 1868.

Moved by Mr. S. Bethune, seconded by Rev. R. LINDSAY:

That the consideration of this Report be deferred until next session, and that the duties of the present Committee be continued with instructions that it recommend to the Synod such Canons as are necessary for present legislation. Carried.

Moved by Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON, seconded by Mr. C. GARTH:

That this Synod, subject to the Provincial Synod, accept the revised Lectionary as sanctioned by the Convocation of Canterbury, and that the same alterations and changes are hereby authorized in this diocese, when assented to and ordered by the Lord Bishop.

Moved in amendment by Rev. H. F. DARNELL, seconded by Mr. T. R. JOHNSTON:

That this matter be recommended for consideration to the Provincial Synod.

After discussion, The Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON, by permission of the Synod withdrew his resolution and Rev. Mr. Darnell his amendment.

Rev. Mr. Rollit moved, seconded by Rev. Mr. Fulton:

That when any parish or mission has any matter to bring before the Executive Committee, the said parish or mission shall have the right to elect a Layman, who, together with the Clergyman, if there be one, shall be entitled to attend any meeting of the Executive Committee, to bring such matter before it, and to take part in any discussion thereon, but without the right to vote. Mr. J. B. LAY moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Garth:

That any parish which is dissatisfied with, or deems itself aggrieved by, the proceedings of any Deanery meeting or Mission Board, may appeal, subject to the approval of the Metropolitan, to the Executive Committe. Lost.

The original motion was put and lost.

It being I o'clock the Synod adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod re-assembled at 2.30 o'clock.

On motion of Rev. Canon BANCROFT the Ven. Archdeacon Patton of the Diocese of Ontario was invited to take a seat in Synod.

On motion of the Rev. James Carmichael the Rev. Mr. Stinson of the Diocese of Toronto was invited to take a seat in Synod.

Moved by Mr. J. B. LAY, seconded by Rev I. CONSTANTINE:

That, in the opinion of this Synod, the present system of granting marriage licenses in this Province is unfair towards our own Church, as contrasted with the privileges enjoyed by the Roman Church, in the appropriation of the revenue derived from the sale and use of such licenses—and that a Committee be appointed to draft the necessary petition to Parliament on behalf of this Synod, setting forth the grievances complained of, and urging the proper remedy in the premises.

Rev. J. B. Davidson moved in amendment, seconded by Dr. Smallwood:

That the subject of marriage licenses be referred to a Committee to be named by the Bishop, with instructions to investigate all the legal bearings of the case, and unite with any other Christian bodies now prosecuting the same before proper authority-Carried.

The Bishop named the following committee:—Mr. J. B. LAY, (Convener), Revs. J. Constantine, Canon Balch,

and R. W. NORMAN, Mr. STRACHAN BETHUNE, Mr. WINN, Mr. ED. CARTER.

Moved by Mr. J. B. LAY, seconded by Rev. R. W. NORMAN:

That a Committee be appointed by the Bishop to report in what way the evils arising from intemperance can be mitigated or removed. Carried.

His Lordship nominated the following committee:—Mr. J. B. LAY (Convener) Rev. D. LINDSAY, Rev. W. JONES, Messrs. S. Bethune, Major Campbell, Chas. Garth and Dr. Smallwood.

Moved by Rev. H. Montgomery, seconded by Rev. J. B. Davidson:

That a Committee be appointed to prepare a petition to Parliament praying for an amendment of the law requiring the Clergy of the Church lo have two witnesses to each entry in their registers, whereas the signature of the Roman Catholic Priest alone is required.

By permission of Synod the motion was withdrawn after discussion.

Rev. F. ROBINSON, seconded by Dr. SMALLWOOD:

That this Synod deeply regrets the loss which it has sustained by the death of the late Henry Roebuck and James Moir Ferres, who were long most faithful and energetic members of this Synod. Carried unanimously.

Moved by the Rev. G. SLACK, seconded by the Rev. R. LINDSAY:

That the election of five governors for the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, take place in due course at this meeting of Synod. Carried.

Moved by Mr. T. SIMPSON, seconded by Mr. C. GARTH:

That 25 names be named by the House from which to elect, by ballot governors of Lennoxville College. The five having the highest number of votes to be the governors for three years. Lost.

Moved by the Rev. H. F. DARNELL, seconded by Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON:

That the election of governors be made in the same manner as the election of the Executive Committee, and that we now proceed to ballot. Carried.

The Bishop appointed the Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON, and Dr. SMALLWOOD, Scrutineers.

The Scrutineers reported the following elected Governors of Bishop's College: G. Moffatt, C. J. Brydges, John S. Hall, the Rev. Canon Bond, the Rev. R. W. Norman, and Ed. Carter, Q.C. (equal.)

The Rev. Canon BOND having declined to act, Mr. EDWARD CARTER became in course the fifth governor.

Moved by Mr. F. MACKENZIE, seconded by Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON:

That no Layman may be a member of the Executive Committee who has not paid in as a subscription to Diocesan Missions for the year preceding at least five dollars. Carried.

Moved by Rev. C. Bell, seconded by Mr. H. Foster:

That in future all monies received by the Treasurer shall be acknowledged by him either in some Church newspaper from time to time, or immediately by post. Withdrawn.

Moved by the Rev. W. B. Curran, seconded by Rev. J. CARMICHAEL:

That the thanks of this Synod are due and are hereby tendered to James Hutton, Esq., for the efficient and courteous manner in which he has ever rendered his voluntary services as the Treasurer of the Diocese. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Rev. J. Constantine, seconded by Rev. T. Mussen.

That the thanks of this Synod are due and are hereby tendered to the Grand Trunk, Vermont Central, and Stanstead and Chambly Railway Companies, to the Ottawa River Navigation Company, and to the Richelieu Navigation Company for their kindness in granting half-fare tickets to the members attending Synod. Carried unanimously.

Moved by the Rev. J. B. Davidson, seconded by Mr. C. Garth:

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That the thanks of this Synod are due and are hereby tendered to the proprietors of the Daily News and Gazette, for their kindness in supplying their papers to the Synod during its session. Carried unanimously.

Moved by Rev. Canon Anderson, seconded by Ed. Carter, Q.C.

That the warm thanks of this House are due and are hereby tendered to the Most Rev. the Metropolitan for the able and courteous manner in which he has presided over this Synod. Carried by acclamation.

The Metropolitan having pronounced the Benediction the Synod adjourned.

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APPENDIX A.

DIOCESE, AND EXTRACTS FROM MISSIONARY REPORTS.

REPORT OF THE RURAL DEAN OF HOCHELAGA, NOVEMBER, 1869.

My Lord,—On Tuesday, the 9th Nov., at 40'clock, the members of this Deanery met after due notice, in the school room of St. George's Church, and adopted this report.

There were present 13 Clergymen and 10 Laymen who represented 11 incumbencies. The Deanery comprises 20 incumbencies. Divine service was held at 7 p.m. in St. George's Church, politan.

The routine business appertaining to the Deanery was transacted and I have to report:—

1st. The recommendation of the following grants, provided the conditions stipulated are fulfilled, viz., New Glasgow with Kilkenny \$300, provided \$150 be contributed by the Mission.

There has been no new work entered upon, since last report, within the limits of the Deanery. It still consists of one Parish, ten Missions, and nine Incumbencies, wherein are twenty-three Clergymen and two Catechists—a decrease of one clergyman. Clergymen to the Deanery.

The Rev. O. Fortin has been appointed to the charge of the Mission Church of St. George's in this city with a view also of initiating a French service with sermon, resigning St. Ours, St. Victoria and St. Robert.

The Rev. A. L. Fortin has been appointed to the mission of St. Ours and places adjacent.

Mr. De Gruchy has left Lake Brandon and has taken charge of the Academy at Berthier where he acts also as Catechist.

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Mr. J. Allan, sometime student at Lennoxville, has been appointed catechist at New Glasgow with Kilkenny.

There is no Mission vacant within the Deanery. In consequence of the decrease, chiefly by emigration, of the members of the Church in Brandon, the missionary schoolmaster has been removed and the Mission is served at certain intervals by the Rev. J. Merrick, and the school is taught by a female teacher. There are now two abandoned Missions, with excellent churches in them, within the Deanery, and Brandon, it is to be feared, will soon be a third Mission so given up. There is little doubt that if these missions had been filled with clergymen able to officiate in the French tongue, this sad result would not have existed, seeing that in years gone by in one part of this Deanery hundreds have left the various Protestant denominations for the Church of Rome, because of having first lost their own language and been deprived of opportunities for schooling.

It is respectfully submitted to the Bishop that the month of July would be suitable for confirmation in the country parts of this Deanery; in some of the Missions there has been no confirmation since 1864.

New Buildings.—A new Church is being erected for the congregation of St. George's, Montreal, which it is hoped will be ready for Divine Service in September, 1870; it is built to seat 1,250 persons.

The new church at Chertsey Mission of Rawdon is now used for Divine Service.

Existing Buildings.—In the last report of this Deanery, two things were specially mentioned, as requiring attention, and which are beyond the prevince of the Rural Dean:—Ist. the amount of property belonging to the church uninsured, causing in some part of the Diocese almost every year serious loss; and 2nd. the condition of the parsonages and Church property at New Glasgow, where the property is being destroyed from want of care.

The Church at Brandon is also in a decaying state, but Professor Hicks is endeavouring to obtain money, so as to prevent its going altogether to ruin.

The attention of the Bishop is respectfully drawn to the fact that two churches are unoccupied within the Deanery, because of the lack of members of the church, and that they must necessarily soon be in ruins.

There are seigniorial dues accumulating on two of the properties of the Church which if not settled may soon issue in unpleasant legal proceedings.

ENDOWMENTS.

There has been no material addition to the amounts given in former statements (see p. 38, 9th meeting of Synod.) It seems to be advisable that a clear record of these endowments and of all church property should be kept by some central authority, where all changes might be noted and by reference to which the tenure incumbrances, and object of the endowment, &c., could easily be discovered. There is at present a perplexing question concerning the church property at Kildare, held as part endowment which ought speedily to be set at rest.

It was intended to furnish a schedule of the property of the church in the deanery with this report, but it is not yet completed. It is, however, strongly recommended that such a statement should be prepared for the next Synod in June, 1870.

Berthier.—The statement of the property at Berthier by Rev. W. C. Merrick is attached to this report and is complete. The property consists of site of church, parsonage and glebe, mortgages, cemetry, site of school-house with addition to glebe. There is a rent of 2s. 6d. per annum on an addition of land to the site of

New Glasgow.-Site of church, parsonage house and about 70 acres of lands; house and land worth about \$600. There is an annual rent on the property.

Kilkenny .- Site of church.

Rawdon .- Site of church and burial ground, parsonage and glebe value about \$600.

Chertsey .- Site of church.

Kildare.-Site of church, parsonage and glebe, value about \$1,400; portion of glebe sold; \$1,400 secured by mortgage; money funded \$300.

Sorel.-Rectory and money invested \$5700.

Mascouche-Parsonage and Glebe.

Coteau du Lac .- Site of church; parsonage and land attached, value about \$2,800.

Laprairie.—Site of church, parsonage and garden.

Lachine.-Site of church and parsonage.

Longueuil.-Site of church.

It would be well that the record should be as complete as possible, stating also the notary or notaries, before whom deeds were passed.

It is suggested that some layman should be appointed to settle

the question at Kildare.

Deputations.—The Lord Bishop was requested to make the necessary arrangements.

Division of Parishes.—A very efficient Committee on motion of the Rev. Canon Bancroft, D.D., was appointed at the last meeting of Synod to report at the next meeting of Synod as to what steps are necessary to secure the division of the Parishes erected by letters patent rom the Crown. It is to be hoped that this question, which has been before the Deanery and Synod for several years, will be settled by the report of this Committee, and the action of the next meeting of Synod (see p. 55, 8th meeting of Synod.)

The aspect of the Deanery during the past year indicates spiritual progress, on the whole, though in one quarter the cause of

the church has been sady neglected.

The two things desired in the last report of the Deanery have not yet been obtained, viz., "a better provision for the payment of the Clergy in the country of the portion of their stipend derived from the Missions and a parochial school in every mission; the former is before the Synod by a notice of motion, little has been done yet to secure the latter.

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RURAL DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

The Rural Dean of Bedford when called upon in Synod for his Report stated that none could be presented, according to the Canon of Synod regulating the duty of Rural Deans, as no Report was prepared or agreed to at the Meeting of the Rural Deanery held at Waterloo, on the 7th June last.

REPORT OF THE RURAL DEAN OF IBERVILLE.

NOVEMBER, 1868-69.

In presenting his report for the year now drawing to a close, the Rural Dean would first of all observe that during the vacancy of the See it was not thought advisable to hold any meetings of the deanery. The time for the annual meeting has this year been changed in order that the Executive Committee, which meets on the 10th of this month, may be furnished with such information as may enable them to ascertain the present condition of the Parishes and Missions, and their ability to contribute towards the maintenance of the Church in their midst, that grants may be apportioned accordingly.

Reports have been received from all the Missions, with the exception of Chambly, and the same have been forwarded to

The number of questions has this year been wisely reduced, and only such retained as are variable in their answers, and likely to elicit additional information respecting the progress of the Church in the diocese. One satisfactory feature of the reports is that in some of the Parishes there is no debt on the property of the Church, and in others it is but small, and strenuous efforts are being made for the extinction of the same. It is to be earnestly hoped that this property, so essential to the prosperity of the Church and the comfort of the clergy, may be soon covered by insurance; and the recent destructive fires in the city of Montreal of the church edifices of other religious bodies should act as a warning to the members of our own communion not to neglect so important a duty.

A letter has been received from the churchwardens of Hemmingford containing a statement of the present condition of that Mission, and the impossibility of retaining the services of the Rev. J. Morrison without an additional grant of \$200, and they pray that the Deanery do recommend that the same be granted by the Mission Board at its next meeting. Two of the clergy have in their reports suggested that clerical assistance be afforded to the incumbent of Huntingdon, who is stated to be in very delicate health, and unable to discharge the very onerous duties of that extensive Mission, The following are the changes that have occurred in the Deanery. The Rev. C. Lancaster resigned last Easter his position as assistant minister, of Clarenceville, and has

accepted a charge in the new Diocese of Albany. The Rev. C. F. Thorndyke resigned the rectory of Chambly, and has been succeeded by the Rev. R. D. White.

The Rev. James Morrison late of the diocese of Quebec has been licensed by the Lord Bishop to the Mission of Hemmingford, vacated by the Rev. E. Du Vernet, who has been appointed assistant minister of the parishes of St. George and St. Thomas.

L'Acadie has been detached from the Rectory of St. Johns and is now served by the Incumbent of Laprairie.

There are no vacant Parishes or Missions.

The missionary deputation, which consisted of the Rev. Canon Balch, and the Rural Dean, were enabled to hold meetings in all the Parishes and Missions with the exception of Lacolle, which was not visited in consequence of the impassable condition of the roads. The collections amounted to \$63 and were transmitted to the Treasurer of the Synod. In conclusion the Rural Dean would observe that though in the judgment of some the Ruridecanal organisations have not answered the purposes for which they were created, and the high expectations which some ardent minds had formed of them, yet he cannot but feel that they are not without their value, inasmuch as they afford the clergy a good opportunity of examining the reports of each other's work, and to take council as to the means and methods by which the purposes of their ministry may be most effectually carried out.

All which, nevertheless, is respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF RURAL DEAN OF ST. ANDREWS.

St. Andrew's, June, 1870.

MY LORD BISHOP,

I beg to transmit a statement of the returns furnished by the Clergy of this Deanery. The report is, I regret to say, imperfect owing to the neglect of one party not having favoured me with an answer.

Our Ruri-decanal meeting was held this year at Onslow, when the opinion was expressed that it is desirable to open a Mission in the township of Bristol, in which there are two new churches, at present under the charge of the Reverend Missionaries of Onslow and Clarendon. From the correspondence which I have had with those parties there is every reason to expect that the congregations would cheerfully contribute to the support of a zealous missionary.

It was the intention of the late Metropolitan to have formed the township of Eardly and parts adjacent into a separate Mission; at present it is served by the clergyman at Aylmer, so that it is impossible for him to give that attention which such a large field requires. The consequence is that a church commenced several years since by the Rev. F. Brathwaite remains statu quo, and must soon crumble down if more energetic means be not adopted.

The township of Portland, formerly part of the travelling missionaries' cure, is now supplied with the stated ministrations of religion. The Rev. Mr. Smith divides his services between Portland and the north part of Hull, in which stands the village of Chelsea, nominally in the cure of Rev. J. Johnston.

After several years' hard labour in a mission extending through the mountain region lying between Lachute and the Gatineau river, a distance of nearly one hundred miles, the Rev. F. Codd was compelled, by failing health, to resign that duty. He has accepted the mission of Portage du Fort and Havelock, vacant by the removal of the Rev. J. Gribble to a parish in United States.

The mission of Buckingham has at length been supplied by the Rev. J. Rollit having removed to that station from North Gere.

The Mission of Grenville has been for some time without service owing to the protracted illness of its laborious pastor, the Rev. F. Neve. The four churches are now closed and the congregation without the means of grace. I do earnestly hope that something may speedily be done to supply this lack of service.

There are eight churches awaiting consecration, viz.: one on the Gatineau; another higher up the stream, near the Kazzubazzua; the others, not far back from the Ottawa.

During the last autumn and part of the winter I was enabled to visit each Mission in the Deanery, with the exception of Buckingham, then vacant, and travelled over six hundred miles. The sum realised from the missionary meetings then held, amounted to one hundred and sixteen dollars; the largest collection, \$19.20, was taken up in a wilderness mission on the Gatineau; the smallest, \$1.75, at the church in Hull.

It would be desirable that the proper authority, the Archdeacon, should visit those Missions where year after year the people are

backwards in raising for the clergyman the stipulated salary, and inquire into the cause of this neglect.

I would suggest that every clergyman residing in a parsonage should be obliged to see that the same, with the outbuildings, be kept in repair.

There exists a very general feeling of dissatisfaction in this Deanery that no acknowledgment has been made during the last two years of the monies collected for missionary purposes, and that the names of contributors have not been published as formerly. I would beg to say that it is desirable that the list of names with the amount subscribed be published in a tract form and distributed.

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EXTRACTS FROM MISSIONARY REPORTS.

HOCHELAGA.

The Rev. J. D. Borthwick, writes ;

" After five years our little church is entirely out of debt and ready for consecration . Uninterrupted services have been carried on since its reopening morning and evening, and the congregation is slowly increasing.

Great attention is paid to the choir of the church and for the last year better singing and a heartier service have been rendered than in

KILDARE.

The Rev. J. Merrick, writes:

" I regret to announce that this section of the country suffered most seriously, from the great drought which prevailed here during the summer of 1868, the result being that not even the seed sown, in many instances, was received in the harvest returns. Much want and suffering arose in consequence. From such circumstances, together with other well known embarrassments which some of our people are labouring under, the work of the Church was attended with unusual difficulty; many needed repairs, &c., could not be carried out.

Again this year I am happy to record a generous public act on the part of the Mission of Berthier. During the summer of 1868, when the days and nights were so intolerable with continued heat, our good young friends together with other well wishers from Berthier, headed by the Rev. W. Merrick, kindly paid us a visit, for the purpose of holding a Concert, and though the pecuniary result was small, owing to the fears of the people for their harvest, yet the salutary effects in promoting union, and calling out the energies of our young people in such movements were productive of much good. From the proceeds of the Concert (\$40) the roof of the Parsonage has been covered where needed, and some other work executed, and a pump provided: but nothing is as yet done towards the completion of the upper part of the Parsonage house, so

MASCOUCHE AND TERREBONNE.

The Rev. T. Godden, writes:

"In forwarding a short summary of the Church's work in this Mission, if it would not be a repetition of words, I would include the opening remarks of that of last year, when what would be for encouragement is best known to him who gives the increase, and who can best see the growth of that seed we labour to sow. Thus in many instances we cannot discern what we would like yet hope and labour, and would express deep gratitude to God for the mercies of the year, in that it has witnessed no interruptions of the services of the Church in the Mission.

The Church's work has gone on, on the whole quietly and orderly, and we hope profitably, and in addition to this a little has been done in the material part of the work.

In the beginning of the year we had a very interesting Missionary Meeting, the first for the year; the attendance good and the collection also creditable. Very instructive addresses were delivered by the Rev. J. Godden, and the Rev. J. Allan; last, but not least, by your worthy Secretary, Dr. Balch. Our church has undergone some interior and much needed improvement in painting and such like; a new brick chimney has also taken the place of an old unsightly crumbling pile of stone, all which was effected out of the offertory collection. The grave yard fence, which was of board, and in a dilapidated condition, has been entirely renewed, towards which each family was assessed equally, and the sum of \$27 realized, about covering expenses. This would have been very inadequate had not the people assisted in furnishing posts and rails and Mr. Pangman a gratuitous supply of boards. To him we are indebted for many things in connection with the Church, and I would not fail to mention the trouble he and a few young people of the congregation have taken in beautifying the house of God for Christmas celebration. The illuminated texts, and the designs were most appropriate to the season.

Amidst the more than ordinary local demands, and the partial failure of the crops we have, I am thankful to say, been enabled to do a little towards our annual contributions to the society, and that in excess of either of the years I have had charge. And I am confident if many would consider rightly the nature and object of their annual contributions, and the promise attached thereto, they would be larger even though labouring under emergencies of local requirements. And here it would be forgetful and ungrateful in me if I should fail to allude to our indebtedness to Mrs. Pangman (in England) wife of the late Hon. J. Pangman, for her liberal contributions towards the support of the Mission this year, and also for continuing her name on our Church Society I'st. Since the beginning of November, through the request of the Rural Dean, in the absence of a Bishop, I have had temporary charge of the Mission of New Glasgow, where I endeavour to give a fortnightly service."

NEW GLASGOW AND KILKENNY.

Mr. James Allan, (Catechist) writes:

"I beg to report that I took charge of this Mission on 19th September last. In it there are two churches to be served, one at New Glasgow and another at Kilkenny, as also two congregations assembling respectively in a Union Chapel at Lower Kilkenny, and a school house at New Paisley. At New Glasgow there are three services in the month, two of which are in the morning and one in the afternoon, and at New Paisley there is a monthly afternoon service. At Upper Kilkenny, where the church is situated, there is one morning service in the month, and another in the afternoon; and in the Union Chapel at Lower Kilkenny, the services are the same as at the church.

I am happy to say that these arrangements appear to work well; and, considering the long distance that most of the people have to come and the rough roads, the attendance is very fair.

At New Glasgow the Holy Communion has been administered by my father twice, and at each of the three other places once; on which occasions six children were baptized and the mothers churched.

As I have instituted a weekly collection for the Church Mission Fundinsated of a yearly one I hope to be able to report in future a much

larger sum; and here I desire to express my gratitute to those ladies who have so heartily entered into the work as collectors.

I would only add that I feel deeply indebted to the church wardens both at New Glasgow and Kilkenny for their valuable assistance in carry-those members of the church, and to Mr. Tindale of New Paisley who have so kindly and hospitably entertained me, and furnished me with horses for my journeys."

SOREL.

The Reverend Canon Anderson, reports:

"A considerable reduction in our church membership has taken place since the last report. Several families, numbering upwards of thirty souls, have, during the past year, left the parish for other parts, and in addition, the death of some heads of families have occurred, still further reducing our previously weakened congregation. In fact, from the continuous operation for the last few years of these combined causes of emigration and of death, the Protestant parish of Sorel is already reduced to nearly one third of its former strength and numbers.

But if this is the dark and discouraging side of the picture, the bright and encouraging one is found in the fact, that more has been done for the cause of Christ in our weakness than was previously done in our strength. The contributions to the Church Society for the past year are in excess of those of any preceding year, amounting between subscriptions and sermons to \$147. Different parties have this year contributed to the society's resources who never contributed before, and the collector gratefully reported, that for the first time in his experience, of now many years' standing, he had been received in every house and by every individual, with a cordial welcome. The valuable and willing services of Mr. Jones, as collector, are again thankfully acknowledged. The contribution to Foreign Missions exhibits also a large increase on the subcription of last year, amounting to \$140, divided between as before the Colonial and Continental Church Society, and the Aftican mission under Bishop Crowther. The increased support given this year to Foreign Missions is doubtless due in part to a communication received direct from Bishop Crowther in acknowledgment of a previous remittance, and giving many interesting details of his vast and important field of labour. This was read to the congregation, and elicited so much interest and sympathy that the contributions to the Foreign field were spontaneously and largely increased.

The appeal for Sabrevois has now become one of the stated annual appeals in this parish, and the sum of \$24.50 was raised after sermon in its behalf.

The parish has this year gratefully to acknowledge two valuable bequests left to it for different purposes. The late John Dugald Cameron, Esquire, of the H. B. Company, and more than half a century ago a resident of Sorel, left by will a bequest of \$260 for the Protestant poor of the Parish. This amount was, by a few friends in Sorel, increased to \$300, and invested in Dominion Stock, at 6 per cent, the interest in perannual interest will be but small, yet it forms the nucleus of a much needed fund, as the congregation have to provide not only for their occasional poor, but for the whole maintenance of a perfectly destitute, blind, and friendless woman, left now for many years upon their hands for support.

The other donation was the sum of one hundred dollars, which had been set apart by the late Mrs. W. Buttery, with the intention of presenting it to her clergyman at Christmas, for church purposes. It pleased God somewhat suddenly to remove her before this design could be executed, but her family and executor faithfully carried out her wishes, placing the money in the rector's hands, at the time, when she herself had hoped to have done so. And with their consent, as the church purpose above all others of most lasting and important character, to which it could be designated, the donation was by him appropriated to the Sorel Endowment Fund, and deposited in the bank for that purpose.

Such cases of generosity to the church and to her institutions have hitherto been far too rare in this now long established parish, but it is hoped that the report of this year heralds a brighter day for the parish, even with its diminished numbers and resources. And that in the days to come, whether giving of their penury, or giving of their abundance, yet that giving from the love of Christ, there will be many who will be rich towards God; many who will heed the words of the Lord Jesus, how

DUNHAM.

The Rev. J. Godden, writes:

He said, "It more blessed to give than to receive."

"Since the last report was issued, I am very that 't'ul to say that the services of the Church have been uninterrupted y held in this parish. The Word has been preached and the sacraments duly administered, with what success One only can tell, but let it be little or great God alone must have the glory. Our duty is very plain to use the means and leave the results with Him. I trust the means have been faithfully used. May the results be great and blessed! During the past two years we have done something more towards improving the parish church. The old iron bell has been broken up and replaced by a good metal one of 933lbs., at a cost of \$327.50, and last year a very substantial iron fence was erected on the front of the church yard at a cost of over \$90. I may say at the same time that while these improvements have been making, the missionary fund has been liberally supported. Many thanks are justly due to the kind collectors, as well as to the organist and choir for their kind and valuable services."

SOUTH STUKELEY.

The Rev. C. P. Abbott, writes:

"A few years ago I mentioned the fact that the mission had sustained a great loss in the removal of some excellent church families, and I regret to state their loss has not yet been made good; but those families who have remained continue well attached to the church. I propose this year to make an effort to raise a sufficient sum to build a commodious church shed, which will, I think, secure a larger and more regular congregation, especially during the winter.

It is much to be wished that an edifice so neat and thoroughly built as the church in this Mission (so far as it goes) should be completed by the addition of a spire; but I fear this will have to be posponed for a long time to come, in the absence of external aid, unless a new accession of church people come to the Mission."

SUTTON.

The Rev. J. Smith, writes:

" In July 1868, the late lamented Metropolitan consecrated All Saints Church, Abercorn, and also held a confirmation at the same time. The services will be long remembered by those who were privileged to be present. His address was very earnest, and made an impression that

In looking back on the past five years of my incumbency of this mission, it is matter of thankfulness to record that something has been done for the advancement of our beloved Church. There has been an increase of membership. The number of communicants doubled,—sixtyeight candidates presented for confirmation, - a new church edifice built, a partial endowment fund being formed, and the sum total raised for church purposes within the mission amounts to \$7,500.

Surely the works of our hands have been prospered amid the many difficulties with which the Church has to contend.

During the past year (1869-70,) the weekly plan of collecting the Diocesan Mission Fund's subscriptions has been introduced, and attended with the most encouraging result, twice the amount of any former year having been raised. May this be an incentive to go on in well doing, working out the apostolic rule faithfully and diligently, each one laying

The legacy of \$100 from the late Mrs. John Simpson has been received, and invested for the partial endowment fund. This is a part of the Church's work that should address itself to her faithful children. The Church is, year by year, becoming more dependent on the offerings of her members, pressingly calling for a large increase of liberality, so that when foreign aid shall be withdrawn, she may be able to continue her work with increased usefulness and efficiency. This by God's blessing may be done. The prayer of faith, and the willing mind will recognize both the duty and the privilege of consecrating to God's service a portion of what He has so freely given. May the hearts of her children be so moved that they who have but little may husband that little, that a portion may be set apart for God's service, and they who have much, may they be moved to reach the standard of the scriptural declaration, that, unto whomsoever much is given of him shall be much required."

WATERLOO.

Rev. D. Lindsay, writes:

"We have as a parish much cause for thankfulness. We have had more than ordinary demands upon us and they have all been liberally met. The weekly contribution for the Mission Fund is so far successful, and I think a simple and efficient way of collecting the offerings for that Fund. Some of the increase, no doubt, is due to the fact, that more pains has been taken to make the members of the church understand our position. I am sure the more it is known, the more largely will be the response. We have had some changes since the last report. One of our oldest and most consistent churchmen, Mr. H. L. Robinson, has gone into business in New York. We shall miss him in the Sunday school (of which he has been Superintendent a great many years,) and in every work, which requires help and liberality from the laity. Our new church has somewhat exceeded the estimates, and we are now making an effort to raise the remaining amount. I hope and pray that in all these things we be constrained by the love of Christ, and diligently

cultivating the spiritual life, for these are the only true sources of success in the varied works of the Church."

THORNE.

The Rev. C. T. Kaapcke, writes:

"This is a new settlement. The roads, where there are any as yet, are bad. The country is thickly settled. The people are poor. There are no churches! no burying places! There cannot be enough done for the religious education of the children. The people are also either too poor or too careless to buy books for the children.

The congregation in Leslie is generally good. They began to build a new church there, and have expended upon it about \$144. It is very necessary to finish this church soon. There are about \$220 more necessary for it. There is some zeal among the people. Some Romanists have attended since some time the services on Sundays, (only once a fortnight,) and they don't think 7 miles too far to come.

I have also some hopes of my German congregation. They give nothing to me as yet, but they have begun to build a church. I have services in the German language in their private houses.

Without churches there can be little or no progress here, and there are more difficulties in a place like this than rich brethren are aware of. Come over and help us."

WEST SHEFFORD.

Rev. A. T. Whitten, writes:

"In this Mission I may say there has been much to depress and little to encourage us during the past year. During the two former years, a bell and a baptismal font were provided for the church, by the exertions of the people themselves aided by kind friends from a distance. This year our people have purchased a cabinet-organ, which, as it is a very good one, assists materially in the praises of the congregation rendered to Almighty God in his House. The Sunday-school has increased, and a greater interest has been manifested both by teachers and scholars than heretofore. The attendance of the congregations has been much as usual. We have an additional instance of liberality towards the church in this place from one who does not belong to it, but who is a constant attendant and has always been among the foremost to contribute towards its maintenance in this place, God having put it into his heart to add to our yet very small endowment fund, the sum of \$750, thus setting an example to others blessed with this world's wealth, saying in very significant if not expressed language, 'Go thou and do likewise.'"

ST. JOHNS.

"The Rector, (Rev. H. F. Darnell,) derives much satisfaction from the review of the affairs of this parish during the past year. The members of the Church continue undiminished in number; the places of those removed from time to time being in most cases met by fresh accessions; reminding us of the fact that, however much we may individually be missed and regretted, the Lord will never cease to raise up those who will be ready to do His work and advance His cause. Would that all His professed servants would so live and labour in their appointed spheres as to be more sensibly missed when withd: awn from the scene of their efforts! The attendance at the Sunday services and at the Holy Com-

munion continues most satisfactory, and the congregations upon Christmas day, Good Friday, and Ash Wednesday have visibly increased. The Friday evening services, whilst they present a fair average as regards attendance, might be much more generally improved. It is a matter of surprise that so few comparatively should avail themselves of them, so calculated as they are to keep alive the flame of devotion through the week, and to refresh the spirit amid the cares and business of this present The annual meeting of the Church Society in this parish was held in February last, and was fairly attended. The Rural Dean, and the Rev. Dr. Balch delivered most impressive addresses. The collection amounted to \$16. To the Rev. Dr. Balch, the society is indebted for an increased interest in its work throughout the parish. The scheme of weekly collections finds favour with many, and will be put to the test as soon as circumstances will permit. The balance of the debt on the High School, \$500, (five hundred dollars), was liquidated last Easter. The edifice and the lot on which it stands is now the unencumbered property of the church; though the interest derived from it is but a poor return for the outlay, still the rent which it yields furnishes a nett endowment of some £40. (forty pounds) per annum. The school building is now in good repair, and, under the efficient management of Mr. Master, the principal, is doing a most important work. The number of scholars is over one hundred. A third stained window, in memory of the late George Hall, Esq., erected by his widow and son, has added much to the appearance of the church. The windows are all the workmanship of Mr. J. C. Spence, of Montreal, and, both as regards cost and character, give general satisfaction. Nothwithstanding the scarcity of money, the annual subscriptions to the society are considerably in advance of last year; even better things yet are looked for."

WEST BROME.

"The Reverend T. W. Fyles thankfully reports the mission of West Brome to be in a healthy state. The Church members have, year by year, steadily increased in number: and their love and zeal for the Church have increased also. Much valuable lay help is now given in the Mission. Mr. Caleb Benham has been licensed, by his Lordship the Metropolitan, as a Lay-Reader. A Sunday-school has been opened in the Benham neighbourhood, and is doing well under the superintendence of Mr. Edward Roberts, one of the church-wardens of Holy Trinity. The Sunday-school at Fulford is still carried on by Mr. John Graves, church-warden. The parochial Guild at Iron Hill expended \$17 last winter in charitable works; and the Sewing Society earned enough money to pay for 60 chairs for the church. At West Brome village, the services are well attended, and steps are being taken for the erection of a church, Mr. Brisée having promised half an acre of ground for a site. A handsome window, to the memory of the late bishop, has been placed in St. Stephen's, Fulford, Mr. James Getty, sometime church-worden, after a lingering illness which he endured with meekness, died in faith on the 29th of May The mission has lost in him a consistent supporter."

KNOWLTON AND BROME.

The Rev. Robt. Lindsay, writes:

"On Easter 1869, this Mission consisting of the congregations of St. Paul's, Knowlton, and St. John's, Brome Corners, gave up all the missionary allowance received from the S.P.G., and from that time I have been

supported wholly by the people to whom I minister.

At the confirmation, 1868, it was talked over with the late bishop how the out station which for several years had been carried on in connection with this Mission and paid for by the Mission could be sustained, as the funds which now paid the assistant minister could no longer be so applied. The late bishop suggested that on resigning the grant I should do it conditionally that provision be made for the out stations, which in resigning I did.

The Rev. R. D. Mills has taken charge of the out stations which are working saccessfully, and takes the S.P.G. grant drawn by this Mission.

(These eight (8) out stations are school-houses.)"





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APPENDIX D.

CONSTITUTION, RULES, AND REGULATIONS OF THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

DECLARATION.

WE, the Bishop, the Clergy, and the Laity of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Montreal, assembled in Synod, and intending, under God's blessing and guidance, to consider and determine upon such matters as shall appear necessary for the welfare of the Church in this Diocese, desire, in the first place, for the avoiding of all misunderstanding, to make declaration of the principles upon which we propose to proceed.

We desire that the Church in this Diocese shall continue as it has been, an integral portion of the United Church of England and Ireland; and we declare our firm and unanimous resolution, in dependence on Divine aid, to preserve those doctrines, and that form of Church government, which are at present recognized by the Church of England and

Ireland.

It is our earnest wish and determination to confine our deliberations and actions to matters of discipline, to the temporalities of the Church, and to such regulations of order as may tend to her efficiency and extension; and we desire no control or authority over any but those who are or shall be members of our own Church.

CONSTITUTION.

1. The Synod shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, of the Clergy of the same, licensed to the cure of souls therein, or holding office in any church, college or school under the jurisdiction of the Bishop (such Clergy not being

under ecclesiastical censure), and of Lay representatives, to

be elected as hereinafter provided.

2. The Lay representatives shall be male communicants of at least one year's standing, of the full age of twenty-one years, and shall be elected annually at the Easter meetings, or at any Vestry meeting (specially called for such purpose by Incumbents, after due notice on two Sundays), held by each Minister having a separate cure of souls, and all Laymen within the cure, of twenty-one years or upwards, entitled within such cure to vote at Vestry meetings, or who hold pews or sittings in the Church, though not entitled so to vote who shall have declared themselves in writing to be "Members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and to belong to no other religious denomination," shall have the right of voting at the election.

3. The Minister himself, if present, shall preside at the election; and in his absence, the Curate or Assistant Minister, or the Senior Church-warden, or a Chairman elected by the majority of those present, taking precedence in the order

in which they are here named.

4. Evtery separate cure served by a licensed Minister shall be entitled to elect two Lay representatives; but when there shall be two or more congregations, having a corresponding number of church edifices, within one cure, then each of such congregations shall be entitled to elect two representatives.

5. All Lay delegates shall, each one before taking his seat in Synod, produce to, and deposit with, the Lay Secretary or other officer of the Synod appointed to receive the same, a Certificate of his election in the following form, to be signed

by the Chairman of the meeting:

"This is to certify that at a meeting held this day for the purpose of electing delegates to represent this congregation or parish in Synod, being the parish or mission of——,—, a communicant of one year's standing, and of the full age of twenty-one years, was elected by the Laymen of this congregation, who have a right to vote at such election, by virtue of their having, in accordance with the 2nd clause of the Constitution of the Synod of this Diocese, declared themselves in writing, in a book kept for that purpose, to be members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and

to belong to no other denomination, and being otherwise qualified under the provisions of said clause.

And such certificate shall be considered and taken as sufficient proof of the election; and such Lay delegate shall continue in office till his successor is apppointed.

6. If a vacancy should occur in the number of representatives, by death, resignation, or any other cause, the Minister shall proceed to hold a new election with as little delay as possible, after due notice.

7. Clergymen who have served in the Diocese and are resident in the same, but are now superannuated, may attend the meetings of the Synod and vote at the same.

8. The Synod shall meet on the third Tuesday of June in every year, in the City of Montreal, or at any other such time or place as said Synod shall appoint at its last previous meeting; provided also, that the Bishop may call a special meeting when he shall consider it necessary to do so; or shall do so on the requisition of ten Clerical and thirty Lay members; and at such special meeting no other business shall be transacted than that stated in calling the meeting.

9. When the Bishop is not present, his Commissary shall preside in his place; and when the See is vacant, the senior Dignitary of the Church, next in rank to the Bishop, in the Diocese, shall, within a fortnight of the occurrence of such vacancy, summon a Synod, to be held in not less than thirty days, to elect a successor to the See, at which he shall preside, and at such meeting no business except such election be proceeded with.

10. A quorum of the Synod shall consist of no less than twenty-five Lay and fifteen Clerical Delegates.

11. There shall be two Secretaries, one from the Clergy, the other from the Laity, who shall keep regular minutes of all proceedings of the Synod, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose, shall preserve all papers, memorials, and other documents, shall certify the public acts of the Synod, and shall deliver all records and documents to their successors; and give notice to each Minister and Vestry of the time and place appointed for any stated or special meetings of the Synod; this notice to be given at least three weeks before such meeting. The rate of salary to be paid

to the Secretary shall be settled and determined by the

Executive Committee.

The Secretary shall also perform the duties and receive the fees connected with the office of Registrar of the Diocese, viz., keep a record of all Church properties and moneys in the different parishes, and of all the changes that from time to time take place, and a certified copy of every deed and deeds of consecration, and boundaries of parishes, and every acquisition of property shall be sent to him by the Rural Deans. He shall be entitled to receive a fee of \$1 for the registration of each document, and 50 cents for every copy of the same. The boundaries of every parish or mission erected under authority of the Canon, as well as of every existing parish or mission, shall be entered in a book, to be kept by the Secretaries of Synod for that purpose, and a copy thereof shall be furnished to any person applying for it on the payment of a fee of one shilling.

12. There shall be a Treasurer of the Synod, who shall receive and disburse all moneys collected and paid under its authority, and keep account thereof; and two Auditors who shall annually inspect and report on the condition of the

accounts.

13. The vote of each order shall be taken separately, when so required by any three members, each vote being determined by the majority of the members present in each order.

14. No rule shall be binding on the members of the Church in this Diocese at large, which has not received the concurrent assent of the Bishop, the Clergy, and the Laity, and

which has not been passed in the Synod.

15. Any proposition for an alteration of the Constitution, Regulations, Rules of Order, or Canons, shall be introduced in writing, and considered at the meeting at which it is introduced; and if approved by a majority of each order, shall lie over till the next meeting of the Synod, but shall not be finally adopted unless approved by majorities consisting of two-thirds of both Clergy and Laity then present.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. The first meeting of the Synod in each Session shall be preceded by public morning prayer, with a sermon and the

Holy Communion; and the collection at the offertory shall be devoted to missionary or such other purposes as the Synod

2. The business of every day shall be preceded by special prayer for the Divine guidance and blessing, according to a form authorized by the Bishop.

3. After this prayer the Clerical Secretary shall call over the roll of the Clergy, to be furnished by the Bishop, and mark the names of those in attendance; and the Secretary shall call over the names of the several parishes, missions or cures, when the certificates of the representatives having been presented, shall be examined by the Secretary and a Committee of two to be named by the Chairman for that purpose; and where found satisfactory, the names shall be recorded and read by the Secretary.

4. The election of new Secretaries shall then be made by the Clergy and Laity respectively, and a Treasurer and two Auditors shall be appointed, all of which officers shall be elected by ballot if demanded, and shall hold their respective

offices until their successors shall be chosen.

5. After this, on the first day, and on all other days, after prayers, the order of business shall be as follows :-

I. Reading, correcting, and approving the minutes of the previous meeting.

II. Appointing Committees.

III. Presenting, reading, and referring memorials and petitions.

IV. Presenting reports of Committees, and of the Treasurer and the Auditors.

V. Giving notice of motion.

VI. Taking up unfinished business.

VII. Consideration of motion. VIII. Orders of the Day.

An address from the Bishop shall be in order at any time.

FOR THE PRESERVATION OF ORDER.

1. The Synod shall meet the first day at two o'clock in the afternoon, and afterwards at ten o'clock each forenoon during its session, unless otherwise ordered by the Synod.

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And when it adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Chairman leaves the chair.

2. On the appearance of a quorum, fixed by the Constitution of the Synod at twent-yfive Lay and fifteen Clerical delegates, the Chairman shall call the Synod to order; and should there not be a quorum at the appointed hour, the Chairman is authorized to adjourn the meeting during pleasure.

3. Immediately after the Chairman shall have taken the chair, the meeting shall be opened by prayer according to a form authorized by the Bishop; and the minutes of the preceding meeting shall then be read to the end, that any mis-

take therein may be corrected by the Synod.

4. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to the Synod, to be decided without debate. When called upon to explain a point of order, he shall state the rule applicable to the case, without argument or comment.

5. Members of the Synod shall sit uncovered, the clerical members to be habited in bands and gowns, and every member before speaking shall rise from his seat and address himself to the chair. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Chairman shall name the member who is first

to speak.

6. When the Chairman is putting a question, no member shall walk out of or across the house; nor when a member is speaking shall any member hold discourse to interrupt him, except to order, nor pass between him and the chair, and every member present when a question is put shall be required to vote on the same. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, and then those who vote in the negative.

7. No member, save the mover of a motion, who is entitled to reply, shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of he Synod, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which may have been misunder-

stood, and then he is not to introduce new matter.

8. A member may, of right, require the motion in discussion to be read for his information, at any time during the debate, but not so as so interrupt a member speaking.

9. A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Synod, if appealed to, shall decide the case, but without debate; if there be an appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to.

10. No member shall speak disrespectfully of the Queen or any of the Royal Family, nor use improper language against the proceedings of the Synod, or against particular members thereof, nor speak beside the question in debate.

11. The Chairman may at any time desire the Synod to be cleared of strangers, and may suspend the debate then in progress until the Synod be so cleared.

12. No motion shall be put or debated unless the same be in writing and seconded; nor shall any motion prefaced by a written preamble be received by the chair.

13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, but such motions, as well as motions to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

14. All questions shall be put to the Synod in the order in which they are moved.

15. After a motion has been read from the chair it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Synod, but it may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment with the permission of the Synod.

16. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received by the chair unless to amend it, or postpone it to a certain day, or to lay it upon the table, or for adjournment; and no more than one amendment to the proposed amendment of a motion shall be in order.

17. On a division the names of those who vote for, and those who vote against, the question, shall be recorded in the minutes, if required by three members. And a question once determined shall not be brought up again the same session without the unanimous consent of the Synod.

18. Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the Synod, shall be presented by a member in his place, who shall be answerable to the Synod that they do not contain improper or impertinent matter.

19. In order to expedite the business of the Synod, it is required for the future that the clerks of the several Vestries in this Diocese, or where there is no Vestry Clerk, the Chairman of the meeting, shall send to the Clerical Secretary of

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the Synod within six days after their election, the names of the Lay delegates elected at any meeting held for that purpose; and the Secretary of this Synod shall attend at the place where the Synod is to meet at 9 o'clock of the first day of meeting, to record the names of said Lay delegates.

REGARDING COMMITTEES.

20. All special committees shall be named by the chair, unless otherwise ordered, and in such cases the election shall be elected by ballot. They shall appoint their own Chairman, and a majority of the number named or elected shall be a quorum competent to proceed to business.

21. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman, who, or some member deputed by him, shall explain to the Synod the bearing of any portion of the report,

if requested by any member of the Synod.

22. Reports of Committees shall be received in course, unless ordered to be re-commanded, but further action thereon

shall be by motion as in other business.

23. All notices of motion intended to be brought before the next Synod shall be sent in to the Clerical Secretary at least six weeks before the day of meeting; and it shall be the duty of the Clerical Secretary to keep a record of such notices, and to issue a circular statement of the business for the ensuing Synod, with reports of Committees, and the order in which the same shall be brought up. The circular to be forwarded to each Clergyman and parish, one month before the meeting of the Synod.

24. That the expenses of the Synod, such as printing, &c., be defrayed by an ordinary collection made in each parish or mission on the Sunday preceding the meeting of Synod.

RULES AND BY-LAWS, RESPECTING THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROPERTY, MISSIONS AND TRUSTS OF THE SYNOD.

1. That the property of the Synod be managed and administered by a Committee to be called "The Executive Committee," and to be composed of the Lord Bishop, His Commissary, the Secretaries, the Registrar, the Treasurer, and of 15 Clerical members, and 15 Lay members, to be

elected annually, at the annual stated meeting of the Synod, and such Committee shall have the general and full control over the collection, investment, and expenditure of all monies belonging to, or in any way vested in, or under the control of, the Synod, and the leasing, purchase, sale, and general management and administration of all property, real and personal, belonging to, or in any way vested in, or under the control of the Synod, except when otherwise especially provided or ordered by the Synod.

2. The said Committee shall meet quarterly in the City of Montreal on the second Wednesday in the months of February, May, August and November, and shall be presided over by the Lord Bishop, and in his absence by his Commissary, or, in case of the absence of both, by a member elected from among themselves.

3. A quorum of said Committee shall consist of seven members, of whom three shall be laymen; and the said Committee shall furnish to the Synod, at each stated annual meeting of the Synod, a report of its operations, and a clear statement of the receipts and expenditures of the Committee during the preceding year, and of the state and condition of the funds and property belonging to, or vested in or under the control of, the Synod, and to receive and consider all applications for aid towards opening any new missions, filling up vacancies, or providing for any alteration, in the circumstances of any existing ones.

1. IV. The Committee shall have power to purchase and circulate in the Diocese the Holy Scriptures, and such publications as have the sanction of the Church, viz: the Prayer Books, Homilies, Catechisms, Collects, with the addition of Books and Tracts circulated by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, in London, and such other publications as may be approved of by the Bishop.

5. Such Sermons as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall direct, shall be preached in each year, in each parish, chapelry and missionary station, in the Diocese, on such days as the Bishop shall appoint, in favour of some one or more of the objects of the Synod, and a collection made in aid thereof, which shall forthwith be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Synod, and no grant or benefit from the Synod shall be obtained for any object, within any parish, chapelry or

missionary station, within which such sermon or sermons shall not have been preached, and such collection shall not have been made.

6. By-law to make provision for the administering and improving the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, of the late Church

Society of the Diocese of Montreal.

1. That all rents, issues, or profits of lands or tenements, held by the Synod for the Widows and Orphans of clergymen, and all monies given or granted for the same purpose, unless special provision be made by the grantor or donor of the same, for the distribution thereof otherwise, shall be put to the credit of a Fund to be called "The Widows' and

Orphans' Fund."

- 2. That the Synod shall and will put to the credit of the Widows and Orphans' Fund yearly, and every year, a sum of money equal to One Pound Five Shillings, for each duly recognized Clergyman in the Diocese, from the Fund of General Purposes, provided that Fund shall bear such a charge upon it; and that, after the current and customary expenses of the Synod are paid, the charges for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund shall be the first paid from the General Purposes Fund, and that such sum shall be put to the credit of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the first day of April, in each year, on the Lord Bishop forwarding to the Treasurer a list of the Clergy duly recognized, signed by his hand.
- 3. That each Clergyman, either Incumbent or Travelling Missionary, having cure of souls in his Diocese, in order to entitle his widow and widow and children to claim the annuity hereafter provided, from the passing of this By-law, or from the time of his appointment in the Diocese, shall remit to the General Fund of the Synod, the sum of £1 176 per annum; shall observe the directions from time to time give. by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, in respect of the collections to be made on behalf of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, unless such Clergyman shall have been excused by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in writing, under his hand, from making such collection or collections, in any church, chapel or station, served by him; but it is essential to the stability and prosperity of this Fund, so as to meet the demands that may be hereafter made upon it, that every Clergyman in the Diocese

should contribute towards its maintenance, and it is therefore hereby declared, that any Clergyman refusing to become a subscriber, or neglecting to make the annual collections in his parish or mission, (except as above stated) shall not be entitled to any benefits of the Fund for his widow or orphans. Should, however, any Clergyman fail to become a member, and afterwards desire to join it, he shall make application to the Executive Committee, through the "Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee, and if the "Executive Committee" should favorably receive his application, it can only be on payment of all back subscriptions.

4. The Treasurer shall lay before the Executive Committee at its meeting in May in each year, a statement of all monies invested, or in his hands, belonging to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and of all monies received and paid on account of the said Fund since the last annual statement.

5. That from and after the passing of this By-law, the Synod shall pay an annuity to the widow of every Clergyman who, at the time of his decease, shall have been duly licensed to the cure of souls in this Diocese, and recognized by the Bishop, or have been placed on any retired list with the consent of his Lordship; and from the passing of this By-law, or from the time of his appointment in the Diocese, shall have been a subscriber, as set forth in rule 3, and who shall have complied with the requirement of this By-Law, such annuity to be of fifty pounds currency, payable in two equal half-yearly payments on the first day of January and July in each year: the first of such half-yearly payments, or such portion thereof as may have accrued from the day of the death of her husband, to be made on the day above mentioned, next following the death of her husband, so long as she shall remain a widow. In the event of marrying again, the question of continuation of annuity to be re-considered. And in case such widow shall have one or more children at the time of her husband's decease—the lawful issue of her marriage with him-she shall, for each and every such child, not exceeding four in number, be entitled to receive Five Pounds currency per annum, payable at such times and in such manner as has been before provided for the payment of the annuities of widows without children.

All annuities paid for children shall cease on the day at

which they attain the age of eighteen years: provided always that in the case of the death of such widow, before the children have attained the above age of eighteen years, the annuity of such children shall be increased to *Ten Pounds* per annum for each and every such child until they attain the above mentioned age. And in case of a Clergyman deceased, leaving no widow, but leaving children, then such children to enjoy the annuity as above provided. But as circumstances may occur to cause this Fund to fluctuate in its amount, the Executive Committee may, on receiving a special report from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Chmmittee, respecting the funds of the Synod, increase or diminish the annuity to the widows and orphans, should it appear advisable or necessary so to do.

6. As it is just and equitable that when any such Clergyman should in future marry a lady many years younger than himself, and thereby in the common course of events leave a widow for many years drawing her pension, and so become a heavy burthen on the Fund, the following scales of fines shall be established as a Rule of the Synod for all under such circumstances.

8. Every widow, or the guardians of any of the Orphans of a Clergyman, desiring annuities from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, shall apply by memorial to the Synod for such annuity, setting forth the time of decease of such clergyman, the name of such widows, and the names and ages of each of the children, as the case may be.

9. Every annuitant on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, shall, whenever he or she may be paid his or her half-yearly annuity, make one of the following declarations, in the presence of a clergyman or Magistrate, which declaration shall be attested by the Clergyman or Magistrate before whom it is made:

10.—Should any doubts hereafter arise as to the interpretation of this By-law, or the construction which should be put upon it, or upon any of its clauses, such doubts should be referred to the Executive Committee, who shall make a report thereupon to the Synod, at its nearest stated Annual Meeting, and the decision upon such doubt shall be final.

11.—That upon the voluntary removal of a Clergyman from this Diocese, he shall thereby forfeit all claims for a pension in favor of his widow or children, and that all exceptional cases shall be submitted and adjudicated on as they may

12.—That superannuated Clergymen shall retain their interest in the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, simply, and on the continued payment of their annual subscriptions.

ELECTION OF BISHOP.

1. The House of Bishops shall present two or more persons to the Synod of Montreal, one of whom may be elected as the Bishop of Montreal; and in case no election shall take place from the names so nominated, the House of Bishops shall again exercise the same right of romination until a

choice shall be made by the Synod; and no other persons shall be put in nomination for the office of Bishop except such as shall be nominated by the House of Bishops; provided a Resolution respecting the election of Bishops of the Diocese, passed at the meeting of the Synod on Wednesday, June 17th, 1863, be adopted by the Provincial Synod, respecting the election of future Bishops of Montreal, such Bishops continuing to fill permanently the office of Metropolitan.

2. In such election by said Synod of Montreal, the Clergy and Laity shall vote separately by ballot—the Clergy by individuals, and Laity by parishes or cures. A majority of votes in each order shall determine the choice, provided that two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote are present, and two-thirds of all the parishes or cures entitled to be represented; otherwise two-thirds of the votes of each order shall be necessary to determine the choice.

ARCHDEACON.

1. The Archdeacon, upon receiving the reports of the Rural Deans, shall inquire into the cause of the non payment of such sums as may be due to the Clergy from their respective parishes or cures.

2. The Archdeacon shall also see that all Church property in the Diocese is kept in good repair.

RURAL DEAN.

1. The Rural Deans are officers of the Bishop, receiving their commissions from him, and are to report the proceedings of their Deaneries to the Bishop, through the Archdeacon.

2. The Rural Deans shall hold a Ruri-decanal meeting, in their several deaneries, once every year. Special meetings may be called by them at the desire of the Bishop.

3. Each Rural Dean, at the annual meeting of his deanery, shall submit a report of such statistics connected with the different missions or parishes, as he shall have been able to collect from the Clergymen and Church-wardens in their several cures; such reports shall be presented at the Ruridecanal meeting, previous to their being forwarded to the Archdeacon.

4. The Rural Deans shall collect such statistics as the

Bishop may direct; and all matters relating to the boundaries of parishes, or the erection of new ones, shall be referred to a Ruri-decanal meeting.

5. The Rural Deans shall have no power of interference on their own mere motion, in matters of discipline, in any parish or motion. All such matters shall be referred to the Bishop, to be dealt with as he shall think-proper.

STATUS OF PARISHES, ETC.

1. A Mission is an ecclesiastical division supplied by a Clergyman, who receives the whole or the greatest part of his stipend from foreign aid.

2. A Parish is an ecclesiastical division including within its limits a Church and Parsonage, and providing within itself at least one-half of the stipend of the Clergyman who is its incumbent.

3. A Rectory is a Parish, raising within its limits the whole of the stipend of the Incumbent. Provided always, that it be understood that nothing herein shall be regarded as affecting parishes erected by Letters Patent from the Crown.

4. The minimum salary of the Clergy shall be eight hundred dollars per annum.

BOUNDARIES OF PARISHES.

1. The boundaries of all Missions, Parishes and Rectories shall be defined by a Ruri-decanal meeting.

2. That in cases where the boundaries cannot be arranged by such mutual agreement, then the Bishop be requested to issue a commission of two Clergymen and two Laymen, none of whom shall be locally connected with such Parishes or Cures, directing and authorizing them to investigate the merits of the case and decide thereon, and to report their decision to t. Lord Bishop for his consideration; and should his Lordship approve of the same, then the boundaries so arranged, approved and declared, shall be the boundaries of the Parishes and Cures aforesaid. The expenses of such commission to be borne by the Parishes to be arranged.

3. That all repairs and dilapidations of Church property shall be d frayed by each Parish individually.

OCCUPANCY OF PARSONAGES AFTER DECEASE OF INCUMBENT.

1. At least three months from the time of decease shall be allowed to the widow, or children, or other relatives, of the late Incumbent, provided that they have been resident with him and forming part of his family up to the time of his decease, before they, or she, or he be called upon to leave the Parsonage.

2. If the Glebe or any other land be under cultivation, the crop thereof belongs, of course, to the lawful representatives of the deceased, unless his successors consent to refund the expense incurred in such cultivation, when the crop be-

longs to the incoming Incumbent.

3. In the case of meadow land the grass belongs to the successor; but if made into hay the same is the property of the representatives of the deceased.

4. The above rules apply to Clergymen on their being

placed on the superannuated list.

CHURCH-WARDENS.

The Incumbent and Church-wardens of every church and chapel being a body corporate and politic, the administration of the temporalities of every church or chapel is by law vested in them; but for the more perfect and efficient administration, and with a view to leaving the Incumbent more complete leisure for the discharge of his sacred office, it is expedient that certain duties should be under the more immediate superintendence of the Church-wardens.

Wherefore it shall be the special duties of the Church-wardens of every church or chapel, within fourteen days after appointment or re-election in each year, to make a faithful inventory, in duplicate, of all the movable property of the Corporation, and to insure the same, and all the buildings thereof, at their full estimated value, with some English or Provincial Fire Insurance Company, duly incorporated. And at each appointment or re-election of Church-wardens, the outgoing Church-warden or Church-wardens shall present a true and faithful balance sheet of the accounts of the Corporation to be filed with the above-mentioned inventories in the vestry of the Corporation, and also shall hand over to his or their successors any balance of moneys remaining on hand.

To provide for the due care and preservation of the said movable property, together with the administration of the real estate thereof, during their tenure of office.

Carefully to superintend and to enforce the execution of all contracts for the furnishing, repair, and preservation of the Church, Parsonage, Burial Ground and Glebe, and to take the necessary steps to exact penalties in case of their non-fulfilment.

To secure the warmth, cleanliness, and ventilation of the Church, and the supply of vestments, linen, books, and bread and wine for the celebration of the Holy Communion.

To provide such books and documents as the Synod may from time to time require to be kept.

To afford the Incumbent every assistance in their power in the supervision of the sexton, the organist, the clerk and the choir, and the inferior officers of the Corporation.

To provide strangers with seats during the celebration of Divine Worship, in so far as the capacity of the building will allow.

To maintain good order and quiet in and about the Church or Chapel, and in the adjoining roads and public places during Divine Worship, and prosecute all offences against that good order and quiet. Vide Incorp. Statutes, c. XXII.

To collect, in accordance with the statute, pew-rents, sub-scriptions, alms, and offerings of the congregation, and to keep a faithful account of the receipts and disbursements of the congregation.

To notify the Incumbent of any grievous sickness or destitution among the members of the congregation, and generally, and as far as in them lies, to promote the comfort and welfare of the Clergyman and congregation.

A copy of those instructions shall be sent to the Incumbent and Church-wardens of every Church and Chapel, and shall be read aloud by the Chairman of the Vestry, at each annual election of the Church-wardens.

COMMUNICANTS.

The Vestry of every charge and parish represented in this body shall hereafter be required to furnish a suitable book or books in which shall be enregistered the names of all persons who are members of the Church in full communion, with the

date of their first communion, as nearly as can be ascertained; and this register shall be in all cases kept by the Clergyman holding such charge or Parish, and shall be the property of the Parish; and copies or extracts thereof, certified by the Incumbent, or, in his absence, by the Churchwardens, shall be full evidence of the status of any person in such congregation at the date of such enregistration.

CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

NOTICE OF ORDINATION.

The names of the candidates for Holy Orders on the Bishop's list shall be transmitted to each officiating clergyman to be published by him during service at each place where he officiates, at least one month before the day of Ordination.

SUSTENTATION OR ENDOWMENT FUND.

a.—An annual sermon shall be preached in each Parish or Mission throughout the Diocese, on behalf of this fund, and the whole of the proceeds of the same shall be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Church Society.

b.—An annual meeting for this object, i. e., connection with those of the missionary purposes of the Church Society, shall be held in every Parish or Mission throughout the Diocese, and the amount of collections made at the same shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Church Society.

c.—Arrangements shall be made for bringing this plan, and the necessity for vigourously working the same, before the people in every Parish or Mission in the Diocese,—and with this object, a scheme for holding the requisite meetings, or preaching the requisite sermons, shall be drawn up, and the Bishop shall be requested to name a deputation or deputations for attending the same,—and, in addition, each Parish and Mission is earnestly recommended to create a local endowment fund.

SUPERANNUATED FUND.

1. A sermon shall be preached annually in every congregation throughout the Diocese, and collections made for a Superannuation Fund.

2. The clerical subscription shall be five dollars.

3. The management of the fund shall be placed in the hands of the Church Society.

4. Each case for participation in the benefits of the said Fund shall be determined upon its particular merits by the

REPRESENTATION TO PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

The number of Clerical and Lay delegates to represent each Diocese in the Provincial Synod having been fixed by the Provincial Synod at twelve of each order, the Clerical and Lay Secretary at the preceding Diocesan Synod shall always be ex-officio amongst the number of delegates to represent this Diocese at any meeting of the Provincial Synod, with eleven others of each order to be elected by ballot at each annual meeting of the Synod.

SCHOOLS.

1. There shall be attached to every Mission and Parish, when practicable, a Day School and Sunday School; and also in every Rural Deanery there shall be established a

2. The Master of such Day School shall be a member of

the Church and receive a license from the Bishop.

3. The religious instructions shall be exclusively under the directions of the Clergyman, and the general management shall be vested in the Ministry and Church-wardens.

4. The schools shall be maintained by school fees, and public grants, and by suscriptions and endowments. And all the fees shall be collected by the schoolmaster, who shall

account to the Church-wardens for the same.

5. The Sunday School shall be entirely under the direction of the Clergyman of each Parish or Mission, whose duty it shall be to nominate the teachers, to select suitable books of instruction for the several classes, to train and instruct as

far as practicable, the teachers themselves, "to catechise from time to time the children," and to see that nothing is taught inconsistent with the doctrine and discipline of the Church.

6. A Standing Committee of Synod shall be appointed to select suitable books for Sunday and Day schools.
