ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SHAREHOLDERS.

TORONTO, 10th September, 1879.

The Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway Company, duly called by advertisement, was held this day at the office of the Company, in the City of Toronto.

The following Shareholders, among others, were present:—Messrs. Donald Mackay, J. J. Vickers, W. H. Beaty, L. R. Bolton, John Baxter, N. Dickey, W. Ramsay, and E. Wragge.

Mr. W. Ramsay, Vice-President of the Company, on motion, was appointed Chairman of the meeting.

The Secretary then read the following advertisement, convening the meeting:—

TORONTO, GREY AND BRUCE
RAILWAY.—General Meeting of
the Shareholders.—The Annual General
Meeting of the Shareholders of the
Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway Company will, in accordance with the by-laws
of the Company, be held at the Offices of
the Company, corner of Bay and Front
Streets, in the City of Toronto, on
Wednesday, the tenth day of September, 1879, at the hour of twelve o'clock,
noon. By order,

The Chairman then briefly addressed the Shareholders present, informing them that owing to illness, Mr. Gordon, the President of the Company, was unfortunately unable to be present, and recommending that the meeting adjourn for a few days, in the

hope that Mr. Gordon would be then well enough to attend. He thought that Mr. Gordon would probably desire to aldress the Shareholders on the affairs of the Company.

Mr. Donald Mackay then moved, seconded by Mr. L. R. Bolton:

"That having heard the explanations of the Vice-President in regard to the desirability of an adjournment, this meeting concurs in the same, and does now adjourn until Wednesday, the 24th day of September, 1879, at 12 o'clock noon."

The resolution, on being put to the meeting, was declared carried, and the meeting then adjourned.

TORONTO, 24th September, 1879.

The adjourned Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway Company was held in accordance with the terms of the above resolution on Wednesday, the 24th day of September, 1879, at the offices of the Company. The following gentlemen were among those who were present:—Messrs. W. Ramsay, L. R. Bolton, W. M. Clark, W. B. Hamilton, R. Notter, E. B. Osler, Edmund Wragge, John Fiskin, W. S. Lee, Donald Mackay, J. J. Vickers, R. Gooderham, N. Dickey, A. B. Lee, E. S. Cox, and W. H. Beaty.

Mr. W. Ramsay, on taking the chair, called upon the Secretary to read the Minutes of the meeting held on 10th September, of which this meeting was an adjournment. This was done, and likewise the advertisement convening the adjourned meeting. The minutes read were duly confirmed.

The Chairman then informed the meeting that Mr. Gordon, the President of the Company, was still not sufficiently well to be present at the meeting to-day. He very much regretted Mr. Gordon's illness and absence, and felt sure he only expressed the feelings of every one present when he said so. Mr. Gordon's recent illness has been a source of deep regret to every one interested in the affairs of the Company. He trusted that he would soon be quite restored to health.

After a few remarks on the general affairs of the Company, the Chairman called upon the Secretary to read the following:

REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF DIRECTORS,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING SOTH JUNE, 1879.

The Directors beg herewith to submit to the Shareholders the usual yearly statement of Capital and Revenue accounts up to 30th June, 1879, duly audited.

A decrease, as compared with last year, has taken place in all the sources of revenue. The following figures show to what extent the traffics have fallen off.

The expenditure on Revenue Account has amounted to \$204,433.87 against \$207,001.11 last year, a decrease this year

of \$2,567.24.

This expenditure would have been considerably greater had the road and rolling stock been efficiently maintained, but owing to the question as to change of gauge not being disposed of, no work has been done which could by any means be avoided.

The total number of Passengers carried was 118,652 against 143,431 last year.

The average receipt per passenger was \$0.85, and the quantity of freight moved was 92,855 tons against 94,300 last year, giving an average rate per ton of \$1.77, as compared with \$1.89. The reduction was caused by the lower rates prevalent, which only gave an average of 3.01c. per mile against 3.15c. last year.

The Directors have spared no efforts during the past year to secure the carrying out of the proposed improvements to the line, including the change of gauge, as mentioned in the last Annual Report. Some progress has been made in that direction, but the Directors regret that untoward circumstances have prevented much being done towards the accomplishment of the object in view. In negotiating with the Government of Ontario, it was found that the General Elections, which took place in June last, were a bar to progress, until after that date, and in the municipalities, the prevailing depression in business circles made it undesirable at once to press negotiations to an issue, especially in view of the probability—now happily realized—of an abundant harvest being gathered this summer in the district served by the line, and the consequently speedy return of more prosperous times.

The Directors have had interviews, from time to time during the past year, with several of the leading Bondholders, both English and Canadian, in regard to the affairs of the Company. These gentlemen, while regretting the unfortunate position of the road, united in agreeing that immediate steps ought to be taken by the Government, the Municipalities, and the different classes of parties interested, in putting the road in good working order.

The Directors are now actively engaged in prosecuting the scheme, and they would urge upon their successors the importance of pressing forward the undertaking without delay, and hope they will bring the question to an issue within the present year.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The Chairman moved the adoption of the report, seconded by Mr. A. B. Lee, which was carried unanimously.

It was then moved by Mr. W. S. Lee, seconded by Mr. E. B. Osler:

"That Mr. James Graham and Mr. J. Sydney Crocker be appointed auditors of the accounts of the Company for the current year: and that in the event of the resignation during the year of one or both of them, that the Board be empowered to appoint their successors." Carried.

It was then moved by Mr. A. B. Lee, seconded by Mr. John Fiskin:

"That the thanks of the Shareholders be given to the President. Vice-President, and officers of the Company, for their services during the past year, and that each Director be paid \$5 for every Board meeting attended by him during the last year." Carried.

It was then moved by Mr. J. J. Vickers, seconded by Mr. L. R. Bolton:

"Whereas John Gordon, Esq., the President of the Company, has during the past year devoted a large portion of his time to the interests of the Company, and also rendered important services, and it is the desire of the Shareholders that he should be recompensed therefor,—Resolved, that the Directors of the Company for the ensuing year be and hereby are authorized to vote him such amount as they deem proper for such services." Carried.

It was then moved by Mr. Robert Gooderham, seconded by Mr. E. Wragge:

"That Messrs. W. S. Lee and E. S. Cox be appointed Scrutineers for taking the vote of the Shareholders on the election of Directors for the ensuing year, and that the poll be closed after it has been opened for five minutes without a vote being tendered or received, and that the Scrutineers be paid \$5 each for their services." Carried.

The Scrutineers then proceeded to take the votes of the Share-holders for the election of Directors by ballot, and having done so, reported the following gentlemen duly elected:

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

TORONTO, 9th September, 1879.

To the President and Directors of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway.

GENTLEMEN,—I regret that I cannot report that during the past year the track and structures of the Railway have been efficiently maintained, for owing to the straitened circumstances of the Company and the unsettled question of change of gauge, no more has been done than has been sufficient to keep the Railway open for traffic.

The result is that the rails between Toronto and Orangeville are in a bad condition, and are such that unless steps are taken to provide some renewals, it will be, I fear, impossible to keep the Railway running through the coming winter. North and west of Orangeville there are a considerable number of ties required; these should be put in before the frost prevents such work from being done; 25,000 are necessary.

Several of the bridges have had repairs made on them; and with a few more slight repairs, they can all be made safe for the winter, with the exception of the Humber Bridge and the large bridge at Mount Forest on the branch line into that station. The Village of Mount Forest, I believe, will find what funds are necessary for the temporary repairs of the latter bridge. The Humber Bridge, a portion of which was destroyed by fire at the beginning of May last, has been temporarily repaired by a trestlework, pending the decision as to a change of gauge and the consequent necessity for a new bridge over that river; the temporary trestle, however, cannot be relied upon to withstand the spring freshets should they be in any degree heavy, and new trusses must either be provided during the winter, or the risk of a stoppage of the traffic in the spring will have to be faced.
