"The import of Spruce deals during the past month has again been excessive, but prices of Spruce have been well maintained; the country buyers, however, must be getting well stocked, and we cannot expect to see the present rate of consumption continue, and as the stock is now more than last year, it is very desirable that imports should be moderate for the remainder of the season. Pine deals are very unsaleable."
