All sail boats are to be divided into the following classes:

Class "A"—To be boats of the so-called "salmon boat" type, with square stern; centre board or ship keel; no outside ballast; keel of wood, not to be more than two inches below bottom. The dimensions of class "A" boats are not to exceed 28 feet over all, 8 feet beam, 40 inches depth amidships (including keel) 2 feet 6 inches draft; and not to be less than 30 inches depth amidships. The working sails are to not to be less than 30 inches depth amidships. The working sails are to mainsail and foresail; or foresail, mainsail and jib. The mainsail is not to exceed in area % of foresail; nor be less in area than one-half of foresail. The jib, if carried, is not to exceed in area one-quarter of the mainsail. Class "B"—To be jib and main sail, onen heats or skiffs, not to be over 25

Class "B"—To be jib and main sail, open boats or skiffs, not to be over 25 feet in length. They are to carry centreboard or standing keel; no outside ballast to be allowed.

# PEACE SOCIETY SEEKS ROOSEVELT'S HELP

# PLUCKY YOUNG GIRL

Shot a Scoundrel Who Deserved His Fate

Ethel Smith Fired Five Shots into Elme

Briggs When He Tried to Force an Entrance to the Smith Home

THORNTON, R. I., Nov. 29-Ethe Smith, the pretty little 15 year old daughter of Special Policeman Leander Smith, is under arrest tonight at the home of Chief of Police Howland Kimball, charged with killing Elmer Briggs, a resident of this town. The circumstances of the killing were such that after being obliged to arrest the child, Chief Kimball took her to his house, gave her a Thanksgiving dinner and deciared that she would not go to jail so long as she was under his jurisdiction.

Today's tragedy was the culmination of an estrangement between Briggs and his wife. About two weeks ago Briggs is alleged to have deserted his wife, leaving her without means to support herself and her three small children. Special Officer Smith, who is a well known farmer, took pity upon the destitute woman and he and his wife received Mrs. Briggs and her children into their home and were arranging to send them to the home of Mrs. Brigg's brother, who lives in Niantic, this state. Among the members of the Smith household was a colored servant named Mollie E. Manuel, who had been received into the Smith home had been received into the Smith home under similar conditions as Mrs.

Briggs returned to Thornton yester-day and learned the whereabouts of his wife. This afternoon, during the absence of Mr. Smith, Briggs came to the Smith house. He demanded admission of Charles Halliday, a colored cook, who was the only see boat the section. of Charles Halliday, a colored cook, who was the only man about the premises at the time. Halliday refused to admit him and when Briggs threatened to make trouble, Halliday started to bring Chief of Police Kimball to the scene, leaving in the house Mrs. Briggs and her children, Mrs. Smith and Ethel. The women and children, fearing that Briggs would force an entrance, locked all the doors and windows and built barricades of chairs.

After receiving the Manuel woman into his home, Mr. Smith, fearing that the woman's husband might offer violence, purchased a 32-calibre revolver. After Halliday left the house this afternoon, Ethel procured the weapon. As soon as Halliday was out of sight, Briggs again demanded admittance. This being refused, he drew a large carving knife from beneath his coat and cut away the netting from the screen on the front door. He then smashed a pane of glass in the door, reached his arm on the inside, turned the key in the lock and threw back the bolt. As he started to enter the house,
