

N.S. SCHR. "KING OF AVON" AND TWELVE LIVES LOST

Captain Morris, His Wife, Sister and Three Children Drowned.

Wrecked in Southern Storm at Fort Morgan—Only One of Crew Saved—Schr. Was in St. John Recently for Repairs.

PARRISBORO, N. S., Sept. 30.—The secretary of the sch. King of Avon Co. here received a wire today from Mobile saying the sch. King of Avon was dismantled, capsized and driven ashore a total wreck and that the captain, his wife and children and the crew except one man were drowned.

The King of Avon was at quarantine off Fort Morgan when the hurricane struck and must have parted her chains or dragged ashore. The rest of the crew were killed. The mate's name was Olsen, and he lives in Halifax. The rest of the crew's identity is unknown.

The schooner was 417 tons register, was built in 1904 at Horton, N. S., and was valued at twenty-four thousand dollars and is insured for eighteen thousand dollars in Halifax and St. John offices.

MORLEY, N. S., Sept. 30.—The arrival regarding the residents of Dauphin Island was relieved today when word was brought to Mobile that there had been only four deaths which, with the twelve lost with the British schooner King of Avon, makes the total casualties there sixteen. Every building on the island has been swept away.

MORE SENSATIONS IN LONDON ELECTION CASE

Chief Witness for Prosecution a Disappointed Office Seeker and a Blackmailer—Conservative Returning Officer Among Those Bribed—Evidence of General Corruption is Plentiful.

(Special to the Sun.) TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 1.—The London election charges were again heard in police court here today. William Mulloy and Daniel Wiley surrendered to the authorities this morning.

John Cox, of the Dominion House, London, told of receiving an envelope from William Mulloy with Trudell's name on it. Alexander Milne, stranger, who was deputy returning officer, said Jeremiah Collins, complainant, had instructed him to fold ballots in a certain unusual way.

Just before the adjournment this afternoon two witnesses admitted getting \$10. It was put in an envelope before the election, held by some third party, and given after the election.

Edward Clark swore he was promised \$10 in committee room by Collins, to vote for Hyman, and some man held it. Collins was called in, and swore this man was Wiley, but Clark declared he did not know the man, though he would not deny it was Wiley.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 29.—Running at a great speed past a signal set against it, and a flagman who was wildly waving a warning to the engineer of danger approached, a New York express train bound for Philadelphia on the New York division of the Pennsylvania road crashed into a stalled Long Branch express at Edgington, 19 miles north of this city, today, with the result that three persons are dead and forty injured.

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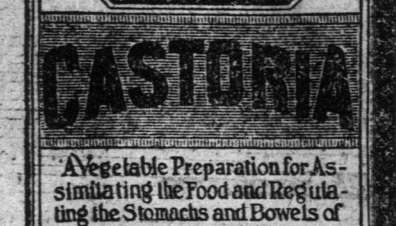

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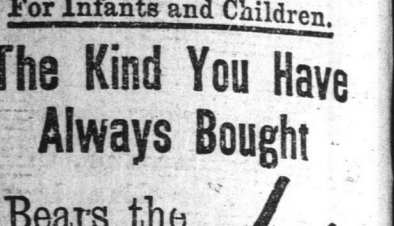
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
