Lancaster.—A noble looking vessel, of over 1400
tons Register, named the "David G. Fleming,"
was launched on Saturday last from the Yard of
the Builders, Messrs. W. & R. Wright. She is
built of hickory-wood, oak and pine, pine, the
timbers being fastened by rivets. Her hull is
thoroughly copper fastened, and fitted up in
the most superior style. The "D. G. Fleming"
is altogether one of the best specimens of our
naval architecture, and has been specially surveyed
for her intended service in the Slave Trade.

She is to be used in the building of Slave Ships,
& C. Reed, and is to run her line of Ports
between this Port and Liverpool, under the
command of Capt. Nichols, *et. al.*

elected to the chair, and Peter Strode, Esq., having

affairs of Boston, now members of several members

*On motion of Mr. David Allen, Resolved, that the
opinion of the meeting, that the time had come for the
city of Boston to separate from the rest of the State,*

*and make a muni-
cipality, be passed;*

*and that a Committee be appointed
for negotiating upon what basis such a separa-
tion can effectually be made.*

by the meeting to be a Committee, to carry out the
object of the above resolution, namely: Messrs.*

*John C. Littlehale, Thomas Coram, Oliver W. Con-
gle, Stephen Phillips, and William Cowell,*

*together with the Alderman and Councillors repre-
senting the Western Ward.*

*The thanks of the meeting have been voted to the
Chairman, the meeting adjourned.*

Joseph Richardson, from Liverpool for Boston, with

about 150 passengers, on Thursday night last, 29th

Dec., struck on Block Island, about 10 miles off the

coast, and sank in less than half an hour, with

about three hundred afterwards. Seal Island Light

bearing N. W., 5 miles distant, 30 of the crew

and 6 passengers were saved in the boat—and about

115 persons (including the Captain) were down

with him. The four hours lost in the search before his

four mate, carpenters, and women and 5 men—a

Little Boat with the Captain, the Launch with first and

second mate, and the Gig with the steward, who was
