

There are also other difficulties in the way of the negotiation of a reciprocity arrangement. Some of them, as regards Gulana, are discussed in recent issues of the Georgetown Argosy. Canada imports largely from Gulana, the preference in favor of sugar from the British colonies having worked to make this a chief market for its main product. The experience, however, does not seem to have been all that the people of the colony wished. Quiana makes no return in kind for Canada's concession, which in the case of sugar is quite heavy, the rates on the raw article for refuning being 31-12 cents a hundred pounds when brought from British countries, 45 cents when admitted under the intermediate tariff, and 52 cents under the general or maximum tariff. The ground of complaint is that the benefit of this concession by Canada does not go so much to the southern grower as to the northern consumer. It seems to be the position of the Gulana growers that this is not right.

The situation is complicated also by the fact that in the interest of the Canadian refiners the Government at Ottawa permits the entry at British preferential rates of foreign grown sugar to the extent of a percentage of this country's consumption. The Argus says it is a first consideration with Gulana in making a reciprocity arrangement that the Canadian Government shall bind itself to discontinue this arrangement. Other wise it is maintained Canadian refiners would be put in a position to absorb the whole benefit of the preference, as, it is charged, they have on occasion done in the past.


