

#### **GERMANY**

Berlin, Aug. 29, via London.— The new Austro-German offensive movement in Eastern Galicla has forced a Russian retreat over a long section of the front. This announcement was made today by army headquarters, which also stated that the resistance of the Russians in the north near Kovno had been broken, and that in the centre of the line Prince Leopold's forces, pursuing the Russians fur-ther, had almost overtaken their right wing.


