1845.

THE District Visitors of St. George's Parish are again permitted to appeal to the Public in behalf of the Poor, and humbly to solicit the smallest contribution towards their relief. The funds placed at their disposal last year have, they trust, been judiciously appropriated, after a personal enquiry into the wants and claims of the indigent, and strict regard to the character of the applicant. Those in distress have been relieved, the sick and aged have been visited, and the careless and irreligious affectionately invited to turn from sin and error, and to wait upon the appointed means of grace and salvation. The Visitors have endeavored to keep up a friendly intercourse with the Poor of the Parish, to sympathize with them in all their trials and difficulties, and only regret that their limited funds, and the numerous applications for relief, have prevented their being as liberal as they could desire.

The Visitors trust that little need be said to recommend the District Society to the support and patronage of the Public. Indiscriminate charity is always attended with evil consequences ; it leads to imposition, lowers the moral character of Poor, and prevents that friendly intercourse between the rich and the poor, so useful in time, and so conducive to their happiness in eternity.

It is now generally admitted (at least by every liberal and correct mind,) that the result of District Visiting has, after an experience of several years, been productive of great good ; the evil practice of street begging is checked, the needy know where to apply for relief, and the rich have a safe channel for the distribution of private charity.

It only remains for the Visitors to express their unfeigned gratitude to the Giver of all Good, and to the friends of the Poor, for the encouragement and support which this humble Institution has hitherto received ; and relying on the promises of Him who spent His whole life in doing good, in visiting the Fatherless and Widows, and comforting those in sickness and sorrow, they commend **ST. GEORGE'S DISTRICT VISITING SOCIETY** to the continued support and patronage of a generous public.
