# WAS IT SUICIDE

Friends Unite In Allegation of Foul Play-Declare Death of J. Slavin Could Not Have Been Accidental.

(Copied from Halifax Herald)

Yarmouth, May 19th-The body of John Slavin (colored), the victim of those still mysterious happenings at Yarmouth, on the night of Nov. 12, 1923, was interred in Mountain Cemetery, Yarmouth. The funeral services were in charge of the Rev. W. J. Davidson, pastor of Disney Chapel. He was sasisted by Brother Nathan Smith, local preacher in the colored Southern Baptists Will No Nordic Superiority commital services at which was recited the simple but beautiful ritual of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the large number present, nearly all of whom were intimate friends of Slavin's returned to the mortuary chapel, where the Rev. Mr. Davidson read the lessons and preached a short sermon from I Cor. 15, in which he dealt with the suddenness of the departure of the deceased and the need for continual preparedness. The music for the service was furnished by the choir from Disney Chapel Nathan Smith sang a solo "Fade, Fade Each Earthly Joy." Favorite hymns were sung and the service was brought to a close by the singing of 'Nearer My God to Thee." Miss Mary Slavin, the only sister of the victim, came today from Acaciaville to attend the funeral.

They were a unit in asserting that John Slavin met his death through foul play. They say, with truth, that when last seen he was far from intoxicated and well able to look after himself. #### THE AWAKENING.

In the issue of The Dawn of April 19th, we wrote editorially upon the need of co-operation among our people, whereby business enterprises could be established in order to give employment to our boys and girls and in order that we ourselves might become an integral part of the commercial and business world. We invited all persons who might be interested to write us, giving their views upon the proposed convention. Since TION. We can never hope to climb the editorial appeared we have been surprised beyond measure at the genuine enthusiasm which our people have shown.

Each day letters are pouring into this office, commending The Dawn for taking the initiative in this movement, suggesting places and times for the convention, suggestions of methods of creating interest in the conventions. Some have even submitted concrete and well defined plans for operating certain business-Some of these letters we have published, others we intend to publish from time to time, as rapidly as our limited space will permit us to

One of the most pleasing notes which has been sounded—a common note sounded in every letter- is the suggestion to proceed cautiously, to be sure that the organization, when it becomes a living theing, is placed in the hands of hones, competent and scrupulous men and women.

These letters show that our people are becoming interested in their own welfare and in their posterity. When a people are willing to come together and sacrifice and work and INVEST their meagre earnings for a common cause it may be rightly said of them that they have caught the true vision of the future, that they have begun to tread the rugged road which leads to higher civilization and to racial success.

What matters it if some of our group have begun co-operative businesses and have failed? Is that a reason why WE can not begin and can not SUCCEED? It is said that the Colored people of the States today own 650,000 homes, conduct 60,000 businesses, operate 1,000,000 farms and that their accumulated wealth amounts to \$1,500,000,000. They own 45,000 church buildings. They own and control schools, the property of which is worth \$30,000,000, and on these schools they expended last year \$28,000,000. These figures at first glance seem mythical and yet they are vouched for by the United States Bureau of Statistics. If our brothers and sisters in the South have accomplished thus in spite of race prejudice, disfranchisement, the peonage system, the "share-crop" system (a system of highway robbery), discrimination in every walk of life-what might we do, WE who are his majesty's subjects, who are not proscribed against; we who are surrounded and protected by the spirit of British fair play and love for justice-what might we not do if we only try?

Two things however are obvious. So long as we are willing to do the scavenger work and to be the burden bearers in this country, or in any country, there will be no serious objection on the part of other races. Again, if we ever rise beyond this level it will be through our own efforts, our own intelligence, our own industry and through CO-OPERAto success upon the shoulders of other peoples. If in this country there are not enough positions for all we can not hope that our children will be given positions if it means that the children of other races must be excluded. But there is an alternative and the alternative is that we make places for our own boys and

What would do more to stimulate race pride among ourselves, what could do more to raise us in the respect of other races, what could do us more good materially or spiritually than seeing a chain of well conducted business places established and conducted throughout the Dominion by our own people?

We feel highly gratified at the results so far obtained through our efforts to owrk up the convention. We hope soon to be able to announce definitely the plans, the place, and the time of the convention. Keep your eyes on The Dawn.
