SEVEN DROWNED.

Eight Young Men Shipwrecked and Lennox..... Dr. Meacham.... 18 Only One of Them Rescued.

Borron, June 9.—About 6 a.m. yesterday a party of eight young men started for a fishing excursion in a sail boat. When they were about one mile from Thompson's Island, in Dorchester Bay, the boat was struck by a squall and capsized. All but one were swimmers, but instead of trying to swim ashore they tried to climb on the boat, which was so heavily ballasted that their weight would force her beneath the surface, leaving them struggling in the water. In this manner the strength of the men was exhausted, and they sank, one by one, until but one was left. The survivor, Walter Quinlan, had sunk for the last time, when the boat, in rising, came up under thoughton.

THE feasibility and economy of the new process of electrical tanning, notwithstanding the doubts which have been expressed to the contrary, have just been conclusively proved in Lordon. A large number of persons interested were brought together at an electrical tannery. A hide of leather was taken from the tanning butts and was cut up in front of the onlookers. This hide had been placed in the revolving butts five and a half days before. It was well and and a half days before. It was well and thoroughly tanned, equal to that which had stood five or six mouths in the ordinary process. The process consists in simply placing the hides, after cleaning, in a large revolving wooden butt, with water, and a known proportion of tannin, and subjecting them to a current of electricity while the butt is slowly revolved. In the ordinary course the tannin tans the outer surface of the skin, forming an almost impermeable surface, which nin tans the outer surface of the skin, forming an almost impermeable surface, which very slowly penetrates to the center. In the new process the current causes difusion, the tannin is taken up quickly, and the leather is thoroughly tanned in the short time mentioned. The formation of gas in the interior of the pores may also have something to do with it, and the heat generated no doubt aids the process. Be this as it may, the result is unquestionable, and in spite of the opposition of old-fashioned leather is beginning to be sold in the market, and gives every Indication of becoming a staple commodity.

PROPER NOURISHMENT.

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
