MR. CHAPLEAU'S ADMISSION.

Talcahuano that the two regiments of Government troops which were taken to that part recently from Coquimbo from the transport Imperiale revolted when they heard of the defeat of the Balmacedists at Placilla last Friday. They shot to death all of their officers and disbanded.

Nearly 4,000 coal miners joined the soldiers and togother they have practically taken possession of the town of Coronell about 25 miles south of Conception. All sorts of excesses have been committed by them. Houses and stores have been sacked and burned. The slightest protest against their actions is mot by rific shots. Women have been abducted and subjected to brutalities of the most revolting character.

| COULDN'T COUNTENANCE GAMBLING

Reasons Alleged for the Pope's Determination to Remain in Rome.

Rome, Sept. 2.—It is asserted that exPremier Crispi will presently publish documents intended to demonstrate that France
desired to have the Pope leave Rome in
1889. It is learned at the Vatican that
any such statement would be quite without
foundation, and that consequently, in case
Signor Crispi should smake it, he would be
proved to have been misinformed. It is a
fact that the Pope did, in 1889 form the intention of leaving Rome. His first idea
was to go to Spain, but when he considered
that he would be in comparative isolation in
so remote a country, he abandoned that idea
andentered into negotiations with the Prince
of Monaco, the situation of whose territory
offered easy and convenient access to all
visitors and all Catholics. The old Prince
sent an ambassador to Rome, the bishop of
Monaco, Monsignor Theurel, who fully enioyed his confidence. Complete arrangements were made, the apartments for the
Pope were designated, when a letter of extreme importance was received from the
Prince making certain conditions relative
to the sojourn of the Pope. One condition
was that gambling should be allowed to
continue without interruption. The conditions were such that the Pope could not
accept, and a representative was dispatched
to Monaco with the hope of securing some
compromise, but the plan fell through. But
France had nothing whatever to do with
the matter. Signor Crispi had his suspicions that something was going on, but he
did not succeed in getting a correct idea of
what it was.

PAYMENTS OF MISSIONARIES.

In the Dominion House of Commons the other night:
Sir Richard Cartwright, on the vote for
the Indians of New Brunswick, called attention to the fact that \$1,015 was paid last
year to missionaries, and asked an explanation of it. It occurred to him that missiontion of it. It occurred to him that mission-aries might be better employed nearet home. Mr. Dewdney said that was a bonus to clergymen who had been doing special work among the Indians. Sir Richard Cartwright—Of what de-nomination are these missionaries? Mr. Dewdney—They are all Roman Catholics

Sir Richard Cartwright—This is a departure with which the House should have been acquainted. This should have been brought down as a special vote. Out of \$6,000 spent among the Indians of New Brunswick \$1,000 have been appropriated for the payment of salaries of a number of clergymen. That was not contemplated by the House when the money was voted. Clergymen in various parts of the Dominion have devoted a great deal of time to the spiritual welfare of the Indians. If we are going to pay these men, I do not know where you are going to draw the line. This is a question of considerable imputation and I stoud like to have further

information as so how long these gentiemen have been paid, and what relations they occupy towards the Indians.

Mr. Flint said the Indians would e a great deal better off if the money was a sent in providing food. No doubt their spir and welfare was important, but the matter should be carefully considered, for other denominations would be claiming this privilege.

Mr. Dewdney said that in Nova Scotia most of the Indian agents were Roman Catholic priests. In New Brunswick there were two agencies, and the rest of the work had been done by these clergymen, who had received salaries for years back.

Sir Richard Cartwright said that when these facts were known there would be a number of applications made from various denominations which had been concerning themselves in looking after the Indians.
