# VON ARNIM IS RETREATING FROM NORTH SEA TO LILLE

Seventeen Divisions of Teutons Are in Dis- EPIDEMIC IS ordered Flight Following Allied Attacks --- Enemy General Has Placed His Troops In a Trap.

Paris, Oct. 17.—The whole of the German army of Gen. von Arnim is in retreat from the North Sea to the region of Lille, having been beaten back and overthrown by the Allied attacks today. The retirement is assuming the proportions of a rout. Seventeen Reports Indicate That Condidivisions comprise the army of von Arnim.

Military observers here believe that Gen. von Arnim will have extreme difficulty in extricating himself from the position. It is held that he remained too long against all strategic and military laws when he was outflanked and virtually surrounded.

Resistance by the Germans is crumbling all along the battlefront, except in the region of the Argonne and Northern Champagne. There American troops under Gens. Liggett, Cameron and Bullard, and French troops under Gen. Gouraud, are engaged in

The Prussian Guards, giving ground inch by inch, are dying, but not surrendering, in an effort to save their right wing.

## FOE'S DEFENCES ALONG THE BELGIAN FRONT ARE TORN FROM TEUTON'S GRASP

Enemy Line From Sea to Swiss Frontier Can in Future Be Outflanked Instead of Being Attacked Frontally -Rapidity of Allied Attacks in Flanders Carried the Huns Off Their Feet.

Paris, Oct. 17.—The fate of the German defences along the Belgian coast, and in the great Lille industrial area, has been sealed by the continued advance of the Alled armies, under King and in the great Lille industrial area, has been sealed by the continued advance of the Allied armies, under King Albert, on the 30-mile front in Flanders. The significance of the evacuation of the Belgian coast line is far greater than the gain of Flanders territory with its many airdromes and submarine

bases.

The extreme right wing of the German defences in the west has been wrenched away from the protecting sea. Henceforth the immense line which has been buttressed by the sea on one end and by the Swiss frontier on the other, forcing the Allies always to attack frontally, can be outflanked.

It is believed here that the Allied attack in Flanders did not surprise the Germans, but the rapidity of the advance did. The enemy is now powerless to retrieve the situation.

Allied Rush Was Swift.

The Allied rush has been so quick that the hope is expressed here that Lille, Tourcoing and Roubaix will be found almost intact.

The operations in Flanders are bound to have a vital effect on the whole western line. While the British attack across the Lys will bring about the evacuation of the Lille salient, the march of the Belgians on Ghent will have a marked influence on the general retreat in the west, to which the Germans are irrevocably condemned by the Flanders advance.

### PUBLIC LIBRARY ORDERED CLOSED BY BOARD OF HEALTH; INFLUENZA VICTORY STATISTICS TO BE OBTAINED NOW

Progress of Disease To Be Watched From Day to Day To Determine Whether Further Restrictions Shall Be Imposed-Drinki ng Fountains Closed.

In view of the fact that the board of health has a ssurance that the epidemic of Spani influenza is abating in the city or yielding perceptibly to the treatment so far prescribed in the closing schools, churches, theatres, etc., and the forbidding of all public gatherings, it has been decided that further steps are necessary, and these were promulgated at a special meeting of the board heid on Wednesday afternoon.

First, the public library is to be closed immediately, and all books now out are to be disinfected on their return. The likelihood of these books carrying the influenza germs from person to person was apparent, and it was considered wise that this be eliminated without further delay.

Fountains To Be Closed.

While bubbling fountains are recognized as the most sanitary of public drinking contrivances, the board believed these might be assisting in the spread of the disease, so they will be shut off at once to avoid even the suspicion of dahger.

#### ALL AMUSEMENT HOUSES IN TORONTO WILL CLOSE

TORONTO, Ouct. 16.—Announcement will be made tomorrow closing every place of public amusement in Toronto, inch ng theatres, moving pleture houses and music halls. At a meeting of the local board of health Monday theatreowners petitioned against such action, and the authorities took the view that the outbreak of influenca was not sufficiently serious to make the order. Since then, however, the educational campaign which has been inauguarated by the health authorities has resulted in very few persons attending any public entertainments, so that it will not be a matter of any great hardship to the theatre people if they do close up. In fact, some of them have already done so.

At Thursday morning's meeting of the health board a deputation from the theatre owners is expected to be present and announce their willingness to close until the medical health department thinks it safe to reopen.

Meanwhile the medical health officer has already notified them not to admit children under 17 years of age.

Another preventive measure adopted today directs all employers of labor to insist that their employees report on the first appearance of symptoms and then send them home with instructions to go to bed at once.

At the city clerk's office up to 5 o'clock this afternoon 31 deaths from the "flu" were reported and 17 from pneumonia. This brings the total number of deaths from the "flu" so far this month up to 198 and from pneumonia 109, making a total of 307 deaths. There are about 709 cases of the disease in the various hospitals of the city.

Thirty-eight city fremen are down with the influenza and about 175 street railway employees. There are 47 cases in the police force.

1. Discontinue the acceptance of the return of unsold copies. Exceptions: Employees of newspapers who are employed directly at the home office by a newspaper as wholesale distributors to newspayer as wholesale distributors to newsboys, news agents and news stands, may return unsold copies, provided such unsold copies have not been in the hands of retail dealers, news stands or newsboys. Such employees should not take back, under any consideration, papers which already have been distributed for sale.

2. Discontinue sending papers within three months after date of expiration of subscription, unless the subscription is renewed and paid for. (This ruling to be effective January 1, 1919.) Newsdealers may be extended credit to the amount of one month's supply.

3. Exceptions: Copies may be given free to employees of newspapers if such is the present practice of the office.

Except Some Institutions. Except Some Institutions.

4. Copies may be sent free to camp libraries of institutions recognized by the Government, such as Y. M. C. A., K. of C., etc. Copies should not be sent to individual soldiers unless formerly employed by the newspapers.

Copies may be sent to public libraries, which will agree to bind or otherwise permanently pressure the libraries.

Copies may be sent to public libraries, which will agree to bind or otherwise permanently preserve the files of the papers.

Copies may be given free in return for actual services rendered.

Copies may be sent free to clipping bureaus which render an equivalent service to the newspapers.

Copies for service purposes only may be sent free to newspaper correspondents and press bureaus.

Controller Pringle expressed his satisfaction of the terms of the ruling, and said he thought it would be pleasing to the Government. He announced that he would add an additional regulation prohibiting the starting of any new newspapers in Canada during the period of the war, with two exceptions—the proposed Farmers' Daily and a small four-page publication in Montreal.

The controller also announced that for the present he did not propose to do anything in regard to the regulations of posters in Canada.



If she is permitted to withdraw her disarmed troops without further fighting, her people must accept all conditions of settlement, and will be highly fortunate if the Allied nations permit such an armistice to be arranged.

The answer to that question will depend upon what form of conference Germany is requesting. 

Northwood: Q. 1.—What branches of the service are open for recruits?
2. Is it compulsory for a recruit taking a three months' course in London for lieutenant to go through the Royal Military College at Kingston? the Royal Military College at Kingston?

3. Would one year at high school be sufficient for a recruit to qualify for a commission in the Infantry?

4. Are they accepting recruits for the Army Service Corps?

5. Are category A men admitted in the Army Service Corps?

A.—Infantry, Royal Air Force, Canadian Engineers, Tank Battalion, Army Medical Corps and Army Service Corps.

2. No. The local course is for the infantry, while the Kingston Military College qualifies men for commissions in the Canadian artillery.

3. Yes, provided that he possesses the necessary ability, although men with matriculation are preferred.

4. Yes, if properly qualified, such as motor transport drivers or expert horsemen.

Chatham: Q.—Can a soldler with leave of absence to work at farming, write to his commanding officer and have his leave extended to work in a munition plant during the winter months?

A.—Present regulations state that no further harvest leave is to be granted extending beyond October 31, and his commanding officer has no power to grant him this leave under present regulations, although they may be altered in the near future.






