

W. MIDDLESEX RALLIES AROUND LIBERAL CHIEFS

Party Workers Vote Confidence in Both Sinclair and Mackenzie King.

SINCLAIR SPEAKS Scores Ferguson For Broken Pledges—Sees Victory Coming.

Mount Brydges, July 9.—Although signs of an Ontario election are nowhere discernible, West Middlesex Liberals are taking no chance of being caught napping. This afternoon at a meeting held in Community hall here, the nucleus of a strong organization was perfected under the eyes of Hon. W. E. N. Sinclair, K. C., leader of the Liberals in the Ontario house, and Hon. Nelson Parlman, Ontario Liberal organizer. J. C. Elliott, K. C., Liberal candidate for West Middlesex in the federal house, gave the association some valuable advice based on his experience in many hot campaigns a few years ago in the same riding.

Hon. Mr. Sinclair was greeted with cheers, stated that he had not come to make a speech, but simply to meet a few of the party workers. He expressed his confidence in the Liberal government in power as a result of the election.

Work Every Riding.

"The dominion campaign comes first and it may not," said Mr. Sinclair. "If it does Mr. Elliott will be elected and then you can clear the boards for an Ontario election. We aim to have a Liberal candidate in every riding in Ontario and a Liberal government in power as a result of the election."

King Is Right Man.

"Premier King was a classmate of mine at university," continued Mr. Sinclair. "He is the only man in public life that has remained in the position he occupies. His administration at Ottawa has justified his selection as leader of the Liberal party. I feel satisfied that the Canadian electors have appreciated his business administration and will trust their affairs to him for another term."

Pledges For Union.

The present Ontario government had been elected by less than 50 per cent of the total vote. He has a majority of 40 in the house. Mr. Sinclair pointed out that those opposed to the Conservatives should join hands. The Liberal chief stated that suggestions that had been done at the last election the Liberals would have been in power with a majority of seven.

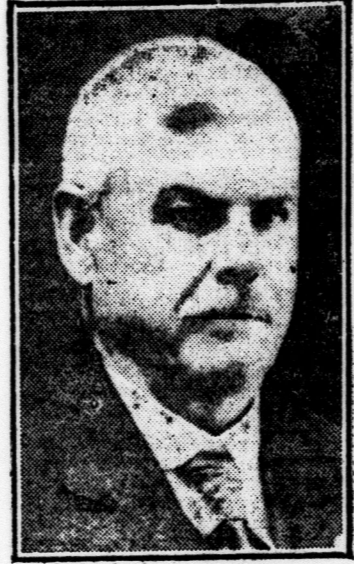
ROAD COMMITTEE STIRS UP WRATH

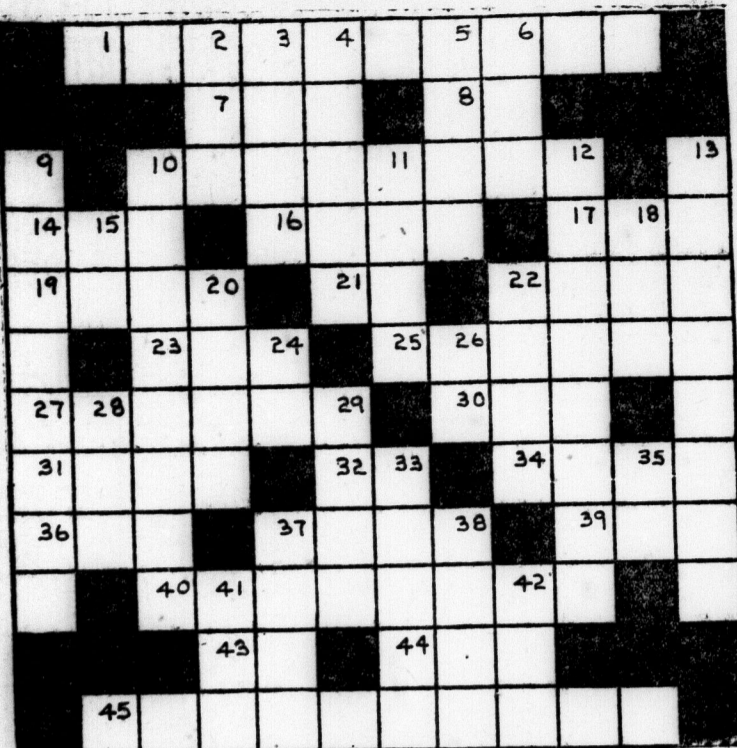

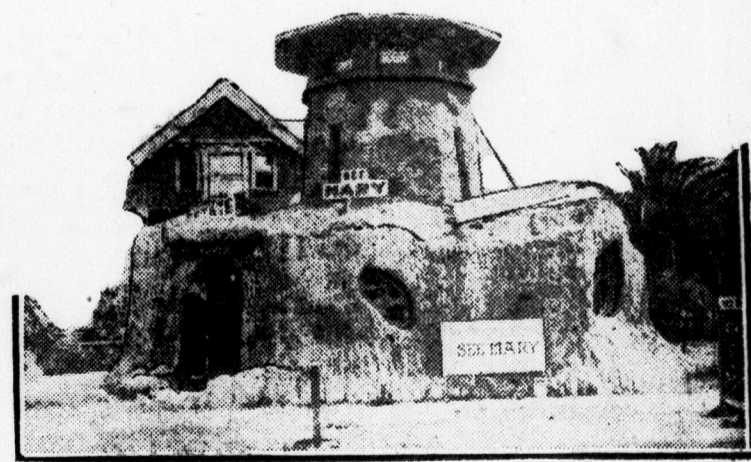
