The War Situation.

Alexieff has forwarded his official report of yesterday's bombardment of Port Arthur. It gives only the barest facts The Russians seem mystified as to the Jap maneuvering in this last fight. Instead of attacking the fleet or batteries they poured shot and shell into the city. This may have been simply to worry the Russians. On the other hand it may have covered an attempt to land troops. Reports as to movements of troops in Korea are largely speculative. So rigid is the Jap censorship that little that is definite leaks out. The Mikado is supposed to have 200,000 men in Korea, and it is thought that a general advance has commenced. By way of London comes another report that the Vladivostock squadron was destroyed, at a terrible cost to the Jap fleet in ships and men. The Russians are believed to be moving north with the object of making a stand at Wiju. They are reported to have lost 2,000 men in the recent skirmishes. St. Petersburg hears that the Japs have entered Manchuria west of the Yalu River. This is unlikely as it would place them between two Russian forces. Great Britain and United States have protested to Russia against blocking the channel at New Chwang antil their warships, which have been wintering there, are enabled to pass out. 

At last night's meeting of the board of works, Chairman Wyatt's scheme to lay permanent pavement in this citinstead of merely graveling the road ways, as has been done in the past was discussed at length. Mr. Wyat produced some blue prints showing the specifications of the class of pavemen he would have the city put down. He proved by figures that Hamilton had saved money by laying a light class of tar macadam pavement on residen tial streets. Putting gravel on the roads, as London was doing, was mos unsatisfactory, he said. If the city purchased a tar macadam plant, he felt that it would be a progressive move. 
