Official Inspection of Grand Trunk's Ontario Lines. Three of the Grand Trunk officers—Mr. H. E. Whittenberger, General Superintendent of Ontario Lines, Mr. W. P. Filson, Commissioner of Industries, and Mr. J. E. Duval, General Superintendent of Car Service—have just completed a tour of inspection in the St. Catharines, Thorold, Welland and Port Colborne districts. The Grand Trunk has a network of busy lines in this southern section of Ontario and the officials journeyed from point to point in a special train. The road and its equipment were found to be in excellent condition with an ample supply of cars to meet the demands of the ever growing traffic. The requirements of the new industrial plants, including calls for the construction of sidings, were examined and plans were made to supply extra shipping facilities where necessary. "Industrial development is proceeding rapidly in these districts," said Mr. Filson, Commissioner of Industries, in speaking of the inspection tour. "There is no pessimism among the manufacturers but on the other hand a hopeful outlook is general. New patterns, better designs are being sought and they are looking forward to a future not of commercial depression but of active trade." "The deepening of the Welland Canal is causing quite a 'boom' in trade in that zone. Agricultural and fruit growing prospects are very bright and new industries in connection with fruit growing are being planned. The Forest-Sarnia District between the Grand Trunk Main Line and Lake Huron is coming along very fast and will soon be a real revival of the Niagara territory in fruit raising for a great deal of money is being spent there on the orchards. 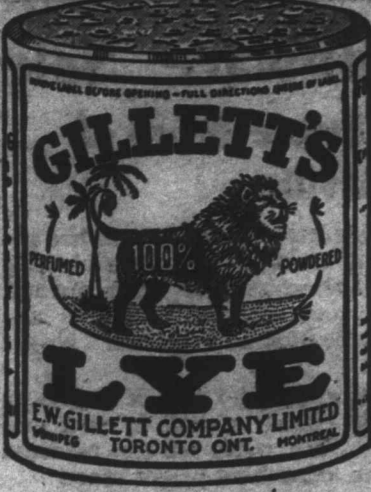

EAST MEET WEST UNITED BY NEW LINKS OF STEEL

Last Spike Driven in New Grand Trunk Pacific Transcontinental Route on Tuesday—Some Features of a Herculean Accomplishment.

Nechako River Crossing, B.C., April 7, 1914.—Steel east and west on the Grand Trunk Pacific was linked up today, the last mile being laid in the presence of Mr. M. J. Dowling, Vice President and General Manager, and other officials of the company.

This point is 371 miles east of Prince Rupert and 1,375 miles from Winnipeg. Steel reached here a few days ago from the west, and one track-laying gang was then disbanded having used up material available as the track-laying outfit coming from the east was expected to supply all steel to this point.

Since the beginning of the year, steel has been laid on 143 miles of line. Contractors have been straining every resource to get the grade finished ahead of the track-laying gangs, which were pressing them hard from both directions.

The main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific extends from Winnipeg, Man., to Prince Rupert, B.C., a distance of 1,746 miles. The line first follows the Assiniboine Valley in Manitoba, and runs through a district well settled before the advent of the railway.

The Grand Trunk Pacific is described as the best new railway ever constructed. The route through the Yellowhead Pass in the Rocky Mountains is an exceptionally favorable one, offering the lowest grades of any transcontinental—four-tenths of one per cent., or 2 1/2 feet in the mile, against east-bound traffic, and five tenths of one per cent., or 2 1/2 feet in the mile, against west-bound traffic.

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History.—The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company was incorporated by Act of Parliament in 1903, which authorized special arrangements for bond guarantees for the company. Construction was begun in Manitoba in 1905, and on the Pacific end in May, 1908. The first steel was laid in September, 1906.

Line proceeds from the Pass to the headwaters of the Fraser River, skirting the north shores of Yellowhead and Moose Lakes. Fraser River Valley is followed and crossed four times between Tete Jaune and Prince George, elevation dropping as course is proceeded westerly from 2,400 to 1,880.

Under the G.T.P. Saskatchewan Railway Co. a chartering construction has begun on the branch from Talmage to Weyburn, and the line is completed except for track work, and will be in operation during 1914.

Melville-Regina Branch leaves the main line at Melville, Mile 279 from Winnipeg, striking north easterly and northerly for 56 miles to Regina, passing through Yorkton at Mile 257.

Princo Albert Branch leaves main line at Princo, Mile 422 from Winnipeg, thence northerly for 111.8 miles into Princo Albert.

April 7th, 1914 will go down in history as a date marking an era in advanced transportation facilities in Western Canada. On this date the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. has been under construction from Lake Superior westward, and on the Pacific Coast (Prince Rupert, B.C.) eastward, was connected up at the Nechako River in British Columbia, so that now the steel ribbon stretch from the Pacific Ocean to the Great Lakes.

GOVERNMENT CAPITULATES (Special to The Ontario)

DALE'S BANK DEPOSITORS THINK LAW SHOULD BE AMENDED

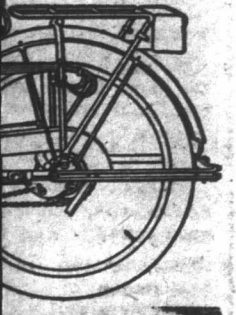
