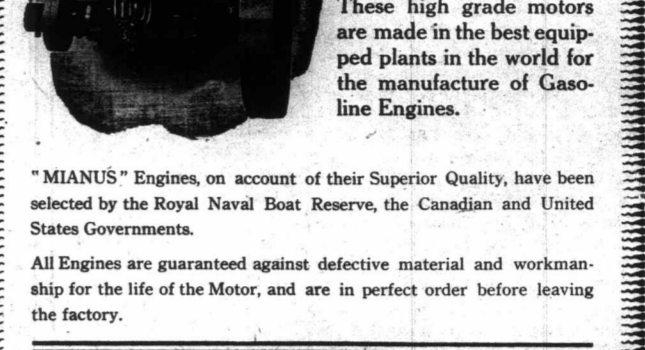

BELGIUM

By R. C. Knorr, With Maps. (Home University Library, 256 pp., 35 cents and 75 cents.) London: Williams & Norgate; Toronto: W. Briggs.

The appearance of this authoritative and very readable account of Belgium and its people, at a price which places it within the reach of every one, is very welcome at the present moment. Mr. Knorr makes no pretensions to originality or exhaustiveness of treatment, yet his little book is no mere compilation hastily thrown together, to meet a sudden popular demand. It is the work of a scholar well versed in his subject, and based not only on reading but on personal knowledge of the country and its people, which are described with a sympathy too deep and genuine to shrink from any casual adverse judgments.

It does not detract from this value that Belgium is described as it was when the war broke out, for that which was will, in all its essential features, be again when the war is over; and we agree with him that were it possible to destroy this people's nationality and their determination to live their own lives in their own way, they would have been destroyed long ago. For centuries the wealth and the geographical position of the Belgian Netherlands have made them the Naboth's vineyard of the neighbouring Powers; for centuries they have been "the cockpit of Europe," the convenient battleground of alien hosts; for nearly 300 years, from 1555 to 1830, they were under foreign domination—of the Spaniards, the Austrians and the Dutch; yet throughout all "Belgian" people—Dutch, Flemish and Walloons—have clung stubbornly to their individuality and to their ancient tradition of ordered liberty. If this secular struggle has developed in this certain unvarying equilibrium, the Belgian Ensur point out is not to be wondered at. The Belgians, throughout their long history, have had little reason to love foreigners.

Letters have been received in London which tell of Russian officers buying and selling German and Austrian prisoners, of German civilians who purchase them for French and Russian wounded, of English hospital nurses who beg for them in Serbian for wounded Serbs and Nishians in the Arabic dialect of Tunis and Algeria for wounded African soldiers in France. At Petrograd the press of the Holy Synod has for months been kept busy, not only in providing the Bible Society with Testaments and Gospels for the Red Cross hospitals in Russia, but also in supplying large editions for distribution by Army chaplains among the soldiers of the Tsar. Already the Bible Society has provided more than a million and a half volumes of the Scriptures in scores of different languages for the armies of friends and foes alike.

These extraordinary undertakings have in no way reduced the society's normal service, and since the war began would come to the aid of the translation service, to be made into six languages in which it has never been printed before.—*The Times, London.*

TWO MILLION ACRES OF AGRICULTURAL LAND FOR SETTLERS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

The interior of Central British Columbia has a vast area of rich soil and enjoys splendid climatic conditions. It has hitherto been practically closed to settlement owing to lack of transportation facilities, but with the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway through to Prince Rupert, is now attracting attention from experienced cultivators, who realize the great possibilities of this new district.

FIELD ROOT AND VEGETABLE SEED SITUATION

For three months after the outbreak of war much anxiety was felt throughout North America as to supplies of field root and vegetable seeds that came principally from the warring countries of Europe. The field officers of the Seed Branch, devoted much of this time to a study of the possibilities of creating a supply of Canadian grown seed for 1915 planting. It was advisable in the autumn to select and specially store any biennial roots that were transplanted this spring for seed production.

Fortunately the European seed crop of 1913 was much above the average for practically all kinds. Owing to previous shortage in supplies most Canadian seed houses had increased their orders by 50 per cent or more and had received full delivery. The excellent seed crop of 1914 was also harvested in spite of war conditions and, although deliveries have been delayed and transportation excessive, most seed houses have received the greater part of their orders. Canadian seed houses of good financial standing are thus in a position to carry over sufficient supplies to meet a very considerable part of 1915 requirements.

SUFFRAGE AND EDUCATION

President Henry Noble MacCracken of Vassar College was recently asked by the Poughkeepsie Courier where he stands in regard to equal suffrage. He expressed his views as follows:

"There are excellent reasons why the executive head of an institution which harbors many degrees of political opinion within its walls should not engage actively in any political propaganda. This fact, however, does not prevent a college president, it seems to me, from making clear his own attitude as a private citizen on any matters of public interest, or from using his voice as a citizen like any other private man. Let me say, therefore, that seven years ago in New Haven I signed a petition requesting suffrage for women of that state, and I have seen no reason since then to alter my opinion. And I may add that but one argument has

greatly appealed to me, an argument drawn from my personal experience. "By nature and training I am an educator. I find the privilege of the vote has been an educational factor in my own life. In a profession which has required more than almost any other the highest degree of activity, my right to vote in the quiet library of study, my right to use the ballot has been almost the one motive which has drawn me out into real citizenship. In my capacity as a teacher of men at Yale university and of women at the Smith college, I have found from the point of view of education no essential difference in their grasp and mastery of intellectual problems. Any educational advantages, therefore, which belong to the one sex should, so far as I am concerned, belong properly also to the other; and since I have found the vote an educational factor in my own life I sincerely desire that it may soon be extended to women."

1,500,000 BIBLES

The correspondence of the British and Foreign Bible Society throws many curious sidelights on the nations now engaged in war. Since the commencement of the war a letter has arrived from the society's English agent at Constantinople reporting that his staff in Turkey are all continuing their usual work and that he himself daily attends his office in Pera and receives much correspondence at the hands of the Ottoman Government.
