Miss Jessie Woodbury has taken a position in the Victoria General Hospital.

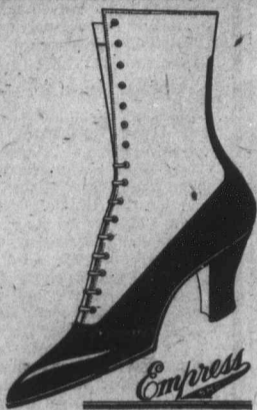
Mr. Seth Varner has sufficiently recovered to return home from the hospital.

ENDORSED

Nova Scotia has endorsed the suggestion of a national labor bureau, as presented in that province by Miss E. St. John Wileman, according to that lady who returned from Halifax on Saturday after presenting her scheme to the various legislative, civic and business bodies of the sister province. The Nova Scotia legislature, she said, had expressed its concurrence in the scheme and Premier Murray has promised to take the matter up with Sir Robert Borden, when that gentleman returns from the old country. The Halifax board of trade has adopted the proposals as set forth in Miss Wileman's memorial to the dominion government, and the business organizations of all the important towns in Nova Scotia have fallen in line with the idea. New Brunswick has been covered by Miss Wileman and everywhere she met with success. The whole scheme is now in proper shape to be presented to parliament when it assembles again.

The 7,000 British soldiers, survivors of the siege of Kut-el-Amara, have been driven 1,000 miles into Anatolia (Asia Minor) by their Turco-German captors. Trudging across the desert near the Bagdad railway, they have been cruelly humiliated. The London Times now learns that a large batch of them arrived at Konia late in 1916 in a terrible plight. "The greatest concentration of these unfortunate victims of the war is at Konia. This is the ancient city of Iconium, where the Apostle Paul suffered severe persecutions. His hardships, however, were slight in comparison to those the British prisoners have undergone. Hungry, insufficiently clad or sheltered, they have suffered unspeakably."

WAR WILL BE DECLARED SOON AFTER CONGRESS MEETS ON APRIL 2ND

Washington, March 23—The American Government has decided upon sweeping measures to be put into effect following the expected declaration by congress soon after it meets, April 2nd, that a state of war exists between the United States and Germany.

Fully appreciating Germany's policy of acting in war first and talking afterwards, the government has determined to provide against every possible emergency.

Broad questions involved were discussed today at a long cabinet meeting, to which heads of departments carried reports on preparations already made and those contemplated. Details are being taken up between President Wilson and the individual cabinet members.

Regretfully the government apparently has decided that since Germany is making war upon the United States, through ruthlessly killing of Americans and destruction of their ships, the issue must be met with steps much more far-reaching than mere attempts to protect individual merchant craft.

If anything is ahead to prevent this it is not now foreseen. Once a state of war is declared to exist, aggressive measures are expected to be taken.

As outlined after today's cabinet meeting, the preparations of the government are not to be for a short war, or a war marked by halfway measures. Nothing is to be taken for granted. A complete program has been prepared, so that everything done will be carried out in systematic and orderly manner.

The exact measure of American participation in the war is not expected to be revealed until after the president addresses congress, and until public sentiment crystallizes. So far as is known no political alliance with the entente allies is contemplated, although military, as well as naval, co-operation is possible, and the government will be unsparing in both money and supplies for the allies.

The president has not yet written his address to congress, although he has given it preliminary consideration and has a general idea of what he will propose.

London, March 25—All the clocks in the United Kingdom, it is announced officially, will be moved forward one hour at 2 o'clock in the morning of April 8. The clocks will be moved back again on September 17.

A Plan for the Assistance and Encouragement of Urban Poultry Keepers

The present year will see a great increase in the number of urban poultry keepers. The almost prohibitive prices of eggs and poultry during the past winter have caused many consumers to seriously consider the home production of these very necessary and useful commodities. It is important also that any efforts put forth in this direction result satisfactorily.

Many difficulties present themselves in attempting to rear chickens successfully on a small city lot. Experience has shown that the best way for urban poultry keepers to enter the poultry business is by the purchase of pullets in the fall. Well matured pullets are the most reliable winter egg producers and if well cared for will not only produce plenty of fresh eggs for the breakfast table but also return a reasonable profit on the expenditure entailed.

Ordinarily, well matured pullets are rather scarce and difficult to obtain in the fall of the year. It is believed, however, if the matter were taken up systematically by poultry associations that the difficulty could be overcome, and, incidentally, could be overcome, and, incidentally, serve as a means of increasing the interest in the poultry industry. Practically every large town and city has its local poultry association. It is suggested that each association give some publicity to the suitability of thrifty, well matured pullets for profitable winter egg production and advertise the fact that the association is prepared to constitute itself a medium to arrange for the hatching and rearing of pullets locally and the distribution made in time to permit of the proper housing of the stock in permanent winter quarters before the severe weather set in, say by the last of October.

In order that greater effectiveness may be given to this proposal, the Dominion Live Stock Branch is prepared to extend, to all associations qualifying under these provisions, the same assistance that is given to associations desiring to purchase other kinds of pure bred live stock, namely, the payment of reasonable travelling expenses, during the time required to conclude the purchase and transport the stock to destination, of representatives of associations, in any section of Canada, desiring to purchase pullets in lots of 300 or more. Should it be desired, the Live Stock Commissioner will also nominate a suitable person who person who will be directed to accompany this representative and assist him as far as possible in the selection and shipping of the pullets.

In the general interests of the poultry industry throughout the Dominion and the urgent need this year for increased production of eggs and poultry and the releasing thereby of a large surplus for export to Great Britain, it is hoped that as many associations as possible will take advantage of this proposition. All Associations desiring to become active in this direction are requested to write the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa, at once for further advice and instruction in the matter, this spring and for their delivery in the fall. It could be announced that orders would be taken during the month of April and the first part of May. All those desiring pullets in this way could be required to join the association and make a small deposit covering the number required.

The Association could then make such arrangements as might be necessary with nearby co-operative associations, and breeders for the growing of the pullets, a minimum price to be decided upon for the different breeds and varieties. In the fall these could be assembled at some central depot in each

Grand Dukes With New Govt

Petrograd, March 27th, via London—The Grand Dukes and the Imperial Princess, in a joint telegram addressed to the Provisional Government today, not only formally associate themselves with the abdication of Grand Duke Michael, but also turn over to the new Government their official wealth, namely, their holdings of crown lands and other State grants heretofore attaching to their station.

The telegram reads:
Grand Dukes Nicholas Michaelovitch, Nicholas Michaelovitch, Alexander Michaelovitch and his family, Boris Vladimirovitch, Serge Michaelovitch, George Michaelovitch and Dmitri Constantinovitch, and Princes Gabriel Constantinovitch, Igo Constantinovitch and Alexandra of Oldenburg, inspired by love of country, have associated themselves entirely in the considerations expressed in the act of abdication signed by Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch, and express at the same time the firm resolution to support in every way, the Provisional Government.

As to their appanage, the Grand Dukes express the opinion that in consequence of this act it becomes the property of the State.



- 5—Do you require assistance?
 - (a) Help
 - (b) Horse labor.
 - (c) Fertilizer.

The Sydney Record of March 24th says: "If there are any doubters as to the efficacy of publicity of the right kind let them read this little story and have doubt give place to conviction:

A few days ago a local man, who was about to buy \$100 worth of furniture, decided to give the order to a large Upper Canadian mail order house. More than this, he wrote out the order on one of the blanks supplied by the Upper Canadian Company.

ITALIANS ARE PREPARED FOR OFFENSIVE ON PART OF HUNS

Rome. — A great Austro-German offensive on the Italian front is being freely predicted throughout Italy. Information reaching the Italian press from Switzerland has convinced the newspapers that such an action has been planned by the Central Powers for this spring. There is no uneasiness apparent however, by a general confidence that Italy is fully prepared and can meet any blow directed against her. General

Cadora is quoted by the Giornale D'Italia as saying to Salvatore Barzilai, Governor of the occupied Australian territory:

"Whether they came or not, I am acting on the principle that they will and in force, I am conscious of having neglected nothing that past experience may have taught and I am certain of having at my command a magnificent army, full of energy and faith and strengthened rather than worn by war. I have put at its head, with strict impartiality, chiefs possessing the greatest aptitude for their posts.

"The first element of success is the active faith of the nation in itself. For the army to resist, the country, whose every feeling is reflected by the army must resist also. Let it have faith in itself and it will have victory."

BRITISH SHIP ASTURIAS TORPEDOED

London, March 27.—The British ship Asturias was torpedoed without warning, it was officially announced today. Thirty-one persons killed, and twelve are missing.

The statement says: "The British hospital ship, Asturias, while steaming with all navigation lights and with all proper distinguishing Red Cross signs, visibly illuminated, was torpedoed without warning on the night of March 20. The casualties occurred: Military dead 11; missing 3, including one female staff nurse; injured 17. Crew: dead 20, with nine missing, including one stewardess; crew injured 22."

"The torpedoing of this hospital ship is included in the list of achievements claimed by U-boats, as reported in a wireless press message yesterday.

The German Admiralty yesterday announced the sinking of the Asturias. It is understood that when the Asturias was torpedoed she was carrying no wounded. She had disembarked a considerable number of wounded at a certain British port and was on a return voyage with some 300 persons aboard.

London. — The Government has arranged for the construction of 100 standard mercantile ships in three sizes of 18,000, 5,000 and 3,000 tons respectively, according to a statement made in the House of Commons.

London, March 26—(delayed by censor). —From a staff correspondent of the Associated Press.—The St. Louis, the first passenger vessel carrying the American flag, to cross the Atlantic since Germany's declaration of unrestricted submarine destruction, and the first armed American liner to enter a European port since the war began, arrived this morning. She carried a meagre number of passengers—33 all told—but her holds were filled to capacity with non-contraband freight. The St. Louis came through without interruption. No submarines were sighted, nor were there, at any time, indications that German undersea boats were after the big liner.

The journey was virtually without incident until the war zone was reached. Unusual precautions were taken as soon as the liner passed the Ambrose Light, but as she neared the danger point even the life rafts and collapsible boats were made ready for immediate use. Reflectors were strung up fore and aft and carbide lights were tied along the rail for use in the event the St. Louis became the victim of a torpedo or gunfire.

Nine autos comprising McLaughlin and Fords were unloaded at Wolfville on Tuesday morning of this week. This makes the seventh carload of McLaughlin Cars which have been brought to Kings County so far this season. A large number of interested people witnessed the scene.

CORRESPONDENCE

Editor Advertiser:

Dear Sir—I have just received the report of Dr. Hattie, Inspector of Human and Penal Institutions for the Province of Nova Scotia. It is a very serious report to be sent broadcast over the length and breadth of Nova Scotia. I feel it is a duty that some one owes to the citizens of Kings Co., to find out whether the report is true or not. If true find where the blame should be attached. If not true what other course should be pursued. If it is true, the blame should not rest upon the people of Kings County as a body. As there is not a more philanthropic people in Canada than the citizens of Kings.

If there was any need of proof for this statement we only need refer to the very large amount of money raised for the patriotic fund, and to the vast amount of money, labor, and energy given to the Red Cross, which was not only willing, but GLADLY given.

The people are always ready to respond and willingly to any demands charity may have upon them. I can safely say that ninety per cent of the people of Kings's Co., (and I think this a low estimate) not only desires but demands that our unfortunate poor shall be comfortably clothed, fed, and treated kindly. Also the home for the poor should be kept in good repair, comfortably furnished with beds, furniture and the rooms fixed up so they will be bright, cheerful and homelike.

Dr. Hattie's report referring to the Poor House or Cornwallis says: "The utterly wretched condition which this establishment continues to be maintained quite beggars any description. The building is in a disgraceful state of repair. The furnishings are in keeping with the state of the building. There are no blankets provided for the beds. The quilts are ragged and threadbare. The clothing is scarcely decent. Altogether it would be difficult to conceive of a more discreditably conducted institution. The living rooms lack even the barest semblance of comfort. Plaster is broken in nearly every bedroom. "This affording excellent hiding places for vermin which flourish abundantly."

If these "indescribable" conditions are and have been existing, it is easy to see where the blame rests. The Overseers and Clerk are wholly responsible, as there is no power that has any control over them. They have the power to give the poor the same treatment that Royalty receives if they wish to do so or they can give them the kind of service that Dr. Hattie says they are getting, and have been for several years. If the Overseer and Clerk are responsible for this awful stain and reproach brought upon the good name of our County, they should have been retired from all public duties many years ago.

This report of Dr. Hattie's is either TRUE or it is NOT true. If it IS true we would suggest to Mr. H. H. Wickwire that he instruct or advise his followers in the Kings County Council which are in the majority (knowing them to be intelligent men. I believe they would consider his advice favorably) to retire this old board at the first opportunity, and appoint new men who are willing to carry out the wishes of the people. If he does not do this, I am afraid the responsibility of the awful conditions described in Dr. Hattie's report will indirectly fall on him. If the Doctor's report is NOT true then Mr. Wickwire should explain the situation to the Honorable G. H. Murray and see that Dr. Hattie is retired and the position filled by a man who will make a truthful report.

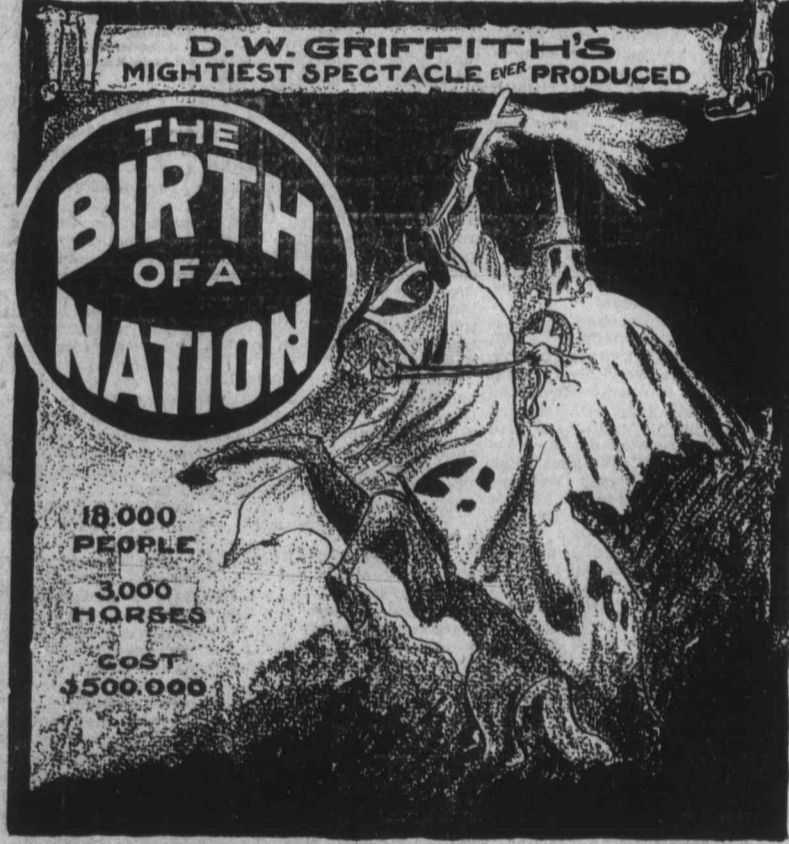

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FRENCH MAKE IMPORTANT GAINS

Paris, March 27—All of the lower forest of Coucy has fallen into the hands of the French, together with the villages of Petit Barisis, Verueuil and Coucy-La-Ville, according to the official statement issued by the War Office tonight.

The text reads: "Between the Somme and the Oise the enemy artillery, violently counter shelled by our guns, bombarded our positions on the front of Roupy, Essigny and Benay. Several attempts to advance by the Germans were stopped short by our fire."

"South of the Oise our troops continued their successful advance. All of the lower forest of Coucy, as well as the villages of Petit Barisis, Verueuil and Coucy-La-Ville, fell into our possession. Our advance guards have reached several points in the western outskirts of the forest of St. Gobain and the upper forest of Coucy. Our losses were slight in the engagements in this region."

"North of Soissons we made important progress north of Neuville-Sur-Margival and northeast of Leully."

"In the Argonne a surprise attack on the German lines in the sector of Bolante enabled us to take about twenty prisoners."

"On the Verdun front the artillery fighting was quite violent in the direction of Hill 304 and north of Bezonvaux."

CANADIANS MADE ANOTHER RAID

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, March 26—(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent Canadian Press) — Sunny weather, with its drying winds, permitted the resumption of activity in the Canadian front this morning with one of those typical raids which keeps Fritz wakeful and anxious. The enemy were on the alert, and a stiff fight took place when a raiding party went across into the Huns' territory. The enemy finally gave way, and as he fell back was caught under the barrage of our guns and suffered what is believed to have been material losses. No prisoners were taken by the Canadians on this occasion.

DANES MAY BAR ARMED STEAMERS

TWO BRITISH DESTROYERS LOST

London, March 27—Two British torpedo boat destroyers have been sunk, one by striking a mine and another after a collision with a steamer. It is officially announced tonight. The Admiralty statement reads: "A British destroyer recently struck a mine in the Channel and sank. Four officers and 17 men were saved."

"Another of these vessels sank today after a collision with a steamer. One man was lost. There were no other casualties."

Hon. F. B. McCurdy will visit Nova Scotia in April and during his stay will deliver addresses on the war. He will speak at Shelburne, Liverpool, Halifax and other points.

German Aviator Killed

London—Another of Germany's best military aviators, Fritz Mannschott, has been killed in an air fight on the western front, according to a Berlin despatch transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph correspondent at the Hague.

The area of Belgium is 11,375 square miles, of which the Germans still occupy almost 11,000. For purpose of comparison it may be said that the area of Nova Scotia is 21,000 square miles.

MAY OFFER SEPARATE PEACE TO RUSSIA

London, March 27—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam says: "According to a Berlin telegram received by the American Bourse, Berlin is filled with rumors that Germany has offered a separate peace to Russia. The terms offered are said to be complete autonomy to Poland, and internationalization of Constantinople, the evacuation by Russia of Australian territory and a Russian protectorate over Armenia."

Unpreparedness

"There is not an infantry regiment of the regular army in the United States today east of Texas. There is not a battery of field artillery of the regular army in the United States today east of Kansas. The cloth necessary to clothe five hundred thousand volunteers has not yet been woven. The officers to train them have not yet been found. The rifles and ammunition to equip them have not yet been started. The camp for their mobilization have not yet been located. And worst of all, the urgent recommendations for the beginning of this gigantic task by not yet even been read by the Secretary of War. "Defenseless America" is no longer a movie maxim merely, but an appalling fact. The crime of 1898 is being recommitted by wholesale and the people are being gulled twice a day by official bulletins from Washington regarding the mammoth preparations for war, ignorant of the fact that the preparations are all on paper. How long, Mr. President, how long?"

Thus the Boston Transcript bewails the unpreparedness of the United States after nearly three years of war in Europe, during which time it was known that the American republic might any day be drawn into the struggle. The existing American army is tied to the Mexican border, and must stay there. It will ever need reinforcements if the United States goes actively to war with Germany, for that would create a new opportunity for Carranza. He would have a chance to unite all Mexican factions by declaring war upon the "States" for the alleged purpose of recovering Texas and other lost provinces.

On the naval side the Americans are in somewhat better case. They have many cruisers and destroyers, useful though not so fast as the modern English and German vessels of those types. To hunt submarines and convoy food and munition ships through the war zone would be a service of no little utility. The opening of the American ports to Allied war ships would be expected. As for land forces, much time would necessarily elapse before the United States could place on the firing line in Belgium or France any force of useful size, since the men would have to be found, trained and equipped, and our neighbors are not only three years late in starting but without up to date experience in such matters. In time they could raise an immense army, but that they would do so unless convinced that invasion was likely is not probable. Yesterday's advices from Washington and Boston were to the effect that the American public expects war, but even if action of the President confirms that opinion a considerable period of confused preparation must elapse before much can be done beyond some form of participation in the war against submarines. Wall street suggests that the most practical step the United States can take is to give the Allies an immense credit for the purchase of supplies and material of war. To do that alone would be to permit the Allies to pay for the defence of the United States in blood and money. Such a credit would be useful, and good business, but if the United States is going to war in a formal way it will have to do a great deal more than sell goods to solvent purchasers at a fine profit. It will have to risk blood and treasure or confess that it does not think the cause worth fighting for.

SPECIAL WAR TAX

RESULTS EXCEED EXPECTATIONS

Receipts from the special war taxations, enacted shortly after the outbreak of war, have so far greatly exceeded expectations. Under the Special War Taxations Act the Canadian banking institutions are obliged to contribute one million dollars annually to the country's revenue, and loan, trust and insurance companies are also taxed for substantial amounts. Offer special levies such as the postal war tax on drafts and cheques and the tax on railway tickets have also produced large sums for the public treasury.

The Excess Profits Tax has proven particularly successful and returns from this source have been much beyond what Sir Tomas White first estimated. When he imposed this tax the Finance Minister estimated it would produce about thirty-five million dollars during the full period of three years over which it extends—an average of twelve million dollars yearly. The tax being retroactive, this year's taxation was collected upon the accounting period corresponding roughly to the first year of the war. At that time business was very much depressed and dislodged, sub-normal business conditions notwithstanding, it is estimated that the bill produce for this first year period at least fourteen million dollars, and possibly fifteen millions. The tax for the year 1916 will yield the enormous sum of between twenty and twenty-five million dollars. The first two years of the taxation will thus produce an amount equal to what it was estimated would be secured in the three years. The third year, 1917, is expected to produce another twenty-five million dollars. The final results will thus be almost double the original estimate.

Fatality in Halifax

Halifax, March 26th.—Dennis Ryan, an aged citizen, who was run down on Saturday by a tram car and taken to hospital, died there on Saturday night. He was for years an employe at the D. A. R. freight shed.

Absolute Equality for Jews Under New Regime.

Washington, March 26.—Absolute equality of Jews in Russia with all others in own property, to reside in any place, to serve in the army and navy; to participate in educational advances and at the polls, has been proclaimed officially, say advices received at the Russian embassy. Therefore it is understood there will be no further restrictions upon the issue of passports to Russia or American Jews who desire to visit Russia, than those common to other persons.

TENSION BETWEEN NORWAY AND GERMANY

Amsterdam, March 23.—Indications of renewed tension between Germany are appearing in the German newspapers. The Cologne Gazette makes a feature of an editorial headed, "Norwegian insolence," in which it says: "The press of Norway in these days has assumed a tone of an insulting character, which Germany cannot tolerate. The Norwegians would do well to remember that their unbridled press campaign once before led to diplomatic tension. A sense of responsibility should have kept the papers from again singing the same tune."

CONFERENCE N. S. COAL MINE OPERATORS

Ottawa, March 23.—Sir George Foster has called for the 2nd of April a conference of Nova Scotia coal mine operators. The meeting will discuss the whole question of the output of coal this season and the prospects for transportation. The mining output has fallen off greatly owing to the labor situation, many of the men enlisting for service overseas. Ten million tons used to be supplied to St. Lawrence ports. Now much of this has been secured in the United States. It is hoped to make such arrangements as will greatly increase the mining operations and also provide against transportation congestion.

IMPORTATION OF FRUIT INTO BRITAIN

Ottawa March 22.—The British government has decided to relax the restrictions upon the importation of fruit from the British Dominions. Fruit up to fifty per cent of last year's imports will be allowed. Absolute prohibition of the importation of fruit will go into effect on July 1st next, except under license.

That the British Government intends to purchase six hundred tons of canned salmon monthly for the British troops, was the statement made by Sir George Foster this evening. This order will be in addition to the 50 per cent of last year's imports authorized for commercial purposes.
