THE BROADSTONE MURDER.

The Dublin papers contain some additional

particulars regarding T. Spollen's apprehension. Mrs. Spollen says that her husband on coming home at eight o'clock on the evening of the murder, remembered that he had forgotten his time-book in the office of Mr. Little, and fearing it might be discovered, he went back to the room and found it there and brought it home.

Spollen is described as a hard working man, of a handy turn, and of sober and industrious habits. He appears, too, to be a man of some taste; the walls of his neatly furnished comfortable cottage are profusely adorned with pictures in gilt frames, and the small piece of ground in front of it is laid out in pretty flower beds, with one or two little plots of peas, now in blossom, interspersed.

The prisoner never evinced any disinclination to enter into conversation on the subject of the murder. He frequently discussed the matter with persons in the employment of the company always expressed his horror of the crime, and was noticed for constantly observing "What a nerve the fellow must have had that did it!"

The Freeman's Journal states that among the means resorted to shortly after the crime was committed for assisting to discover the murderer was a clairvoyance, and that there was forwarded to the police authorities from England, a statement, alleged to have been made by a clairvoyant operated upon in the usual way, that the murderer's name was "Spollen," or a similar name, and that he lived in "a cottage near the railway."

In the Dublin Freeman of the 27th ultimo we read: Mrs. Spollen and her daughter Julia were examined at great length by the Crown Solicitor and Mr. Guy on the 26th ult. Their respective statements were fully written out, and read to them on the 26th ult.

FRANCE.
PARIS, July 2.—The Count de Montalembert has declined to be put in nomination for Angers at the second elections, which take place on Sunday.

SPAIN.
MADRID, June 30.—Marshal Narvaez, on his accession to office, suspended the sales of church property, but entered into negotiations at Rome with the view of obtaining the approbation of his Holiness for the sales already effected.

DENMARK AND THE DUCHIES.
The reply of the Danish Government to the Cabinet of Berlin is dated June 24th. It does not admit the German interpretation of the question, but pronounces to convoke the Diets of Holstein and Lauenberg, while denying the right of those provincial assemblies to decide upon questions affecting the entire Danish Ministry.

She declares that she refused to comply with the request, looking upon the coins as "blood money," but she told him that she would, if he were anxious for a doctor, pawn his watch and so pay the fee. Since then the watch has been recovered by the police, and the time and place of the actual pledging, as compared with her statement, have been found correct. From her statement, likewise, it would appear that the money taken from the cashier's office upon the occasion of the murder was not in the first instance placed where it was found by the police. The prisoner, she states, procured a tall ladder, and ascending to the top of the chimney of the old locomotive sheds near his own cottage, introduced a spike cross-wise into the shaft of the chimney, which having a bend in it, could not be seen through from below and upon this he let down the case or bucket containing the money; it remained there for some time, but subsequently he divided the amount into heaps of silver and gold, and deposited them in the places in which they were afterwards found.

The statement made by Julia Spollen relative to the piece of cloth in which some of the money has been found wrapped up, and which she said she had got from her aunt to make a bonnet, has been corroborated, as the aunt of the child was examined, and identified the piece of cloth as that which she had given her niece for the purpose above stated.

On Wednesday, the 1st inst., the prisoner Spollen was remanded until the 9th instant, when it is expected that new evidence will be adduced. A razor, marked "James Spollen," was found in the canal on the 1st instant.

The key of Mr. Little's office—on the night of the murder—was found on Saturday evening near the place indicated by Mrs. Spollen. This is regarded as a most important piece of evidence against the prisoner, even though his wife be precluded from giving her testimony before a court of justice as it appears she is. Thus it will be seen that her statement respecting the concealment of the plunder, and the disposal of the key, with the instruments used in the murder of Mr. Little, has been fully confirmed. That she knows who the murderer is has been proved. But her husband denies that he is the guilty party. He does not insinuate a charge against any one else, but contents himself with denying the truth of her disclosure.

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SARDINIA.
The Chamber of Deputies at Turin, in its sitting of 29th ult., voted the bill for piercing a tunnel through Mount Cenis by a majority of 93 to 23. The Senate was engaged in the discussion of the bill for transferring the maritime arsenals to La Spezia.

PRUSSIA.
BERLIN, July.—The Prussian Weekly Journal has been seized, in consequence of not having formally announced to the proper authority a change in the editorial staff, although it was duly set forth in the imprint.

BADEN.
CARLSRUHE, June 30.—A Concordat has been concluded at Rome on the same basis as that of Wurtemberg.

IRELAND.
There is a report that Her Majesty will visit Cork and Kildare in the course of the summer.

Mr. J. Knight Boswell has sent in an application for a patent to erect a new theatre in the city of Dublin.

The assizes for the county of Kildare are to be held in future at Naas only, and not alternately at Athy and Naas.

On Monday night there was a large fire in Lincoln's-place, Dublin, and property to a considerable amount destroyed.

The next meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science will be held at Dublin, commencing on August 26.

On Monday last the Very Rev. Patrick Leahy was consecrated Archbishop of Cashel. Dr. Leahy was Vice-rector of the Catholic University.

In the Court of Queen's Bench, Dublin, on the 30th, Dr. White, Inspector of Lunatic Asylums, who was hurt by the railway collision at Dunkitt some months back, obtained a verdict against the company of £2500.

At the fair of Borrisoleigh, last week, a terrible faction fight which lasted for three days, took place between the "Magpies" and the "Black-birds," when several persons were so severely beaten that they are not expected to recover.

Along the Great Southern and Western Railway from Dublin to Cork, a distance of 156 miles, the grass of the embankment and ditches on each side has been sold by contract to various persons, at the average rate of about £5 per acre, yielding a clear profitable income to the company of nearly £1000.

H.M.S. CONWAY.—This venerable hulk, which has been dismantled and laid on the mud opposite Ringaskiddy for a considerable time past, has been now again brought to Haulbowline, and is undergoing a refit. She is to be devoted to the Coast Guard Service, and will be stationed at Galway.—Cork Examiner.

Mr. Keys, of London, has obtained a verdict, with £1260 damages, against the Ballymena and Londonderry and Coleraine Railway Company, for the loss of a box of watches. The trial lasted three days. The plaintiff wanted to take the box into the carriage with him, but was prevented by an officer of the company, who took it into the luggage van, from which it was stolen.

APPROACHING EXTINCTION OF THE IRISH LANGUAGE.—A curious table, which is given for the first time in the Irish census, looks like an indication of the approaching extinction of the Irish language. Less than five per cent. of the population have returned themselves as ignorant of English; and not a fourth of the whole are able to speak the original language of their country.
